

Public Utilities Investigating Local Station

John E. Toolan, Labels Antiquity Structure "Pest Hole"

At the instigation of State Senator John E. Toolan, the Public Utilities Commission has started an investigation of the present passenger station of the New York and Long Island Railroad on Broadway.

Toolan was called into the local electric light fight by the residents of the railroad, and was retained by them as their representative. He declared that the railroad is representing the inclusion of a new station, the electrification plans and attending improvements, as a gift to the city when the city is entitled to a new station without making any of the concessions it is asked to make to secure the improvements planned.

"The present station," said Toolan, "is a pest hole and it is a wonder the whole city of South Amboy has not been contaminated through its use."

In the event the Commission, after investigation declares the present station unfit for public use, the railroad may be required to erect a new station or make the changes recommended, regardless of what developments result from the court action now pending with relation to electrification.

Meantime, the fight of the east end residents against Ordinance No. 53 which empowers the council to take necessary arrangements with the railroad for the carrying out of the improvement plan is progressing.

Yesterday morning in the office of court Commissioner Stephen Somers at Perth Amboy, the Mayor, members of the council, City Clerk and City Engineer appeared to give testimony for a writ of certiorari hearing to take place May 4 at ten a. m. in Elizabeth before Supreme Court Justice Case.

HIGHWAY ENGINEERS MAKE SURVEYS FOR PROPOSED ROUTE "C"

Modification to Carry Highway North of Hospital Anticipated

Into the city Monday came four parties of engineers of the State Highway Commission to obtain new data for a proposed highway route through the city. The men worked on the project in various parts of the city and outlying sections.

Four routes have been laid out and plans for each route have been worked out. The engineers who came here Monday, concerned themselves only with Route C, which it is understood is preferred by the Highway Commission. Although studies have been made in the past of all four routes, the work on Monday was the only actual surveying work that has been performed to date.

The fact that the engineers came here with instructions to make a detailed study of the ground over which proposed route C would pass, is believed by many to indicate that this route which would bisect the city by crossing Bordenstown avenue in the vicinity of the hospital, will be followed.

While the route to be covered by proposed route C is by no means definitely decided upon, it is understood that the plans as originally drawn, which call for the passage of the route passing over a corner of the hospital grounds will likely be modified to pass further west so as to clear this property entirely.

I, Charles T. Mason, Mayor of the City of South Amboy, do hereby request that the standard time throughout the City of So. Amboy be advanced one hour at two o'clock A. M. on Sunday, April 28th, 1935 and that such daylight saving continue until the last Sunday in September of this year at 2 o'clock A. M. when the standard time of the seventy-fifth meridian of longitude west from Greenwich be resumed.

All public offices and proceedings of the officials, insofar as the City of South Amboy has control, shall be regulated accordingly, and all citizens are requested to cooperate with the observance of the daylight saving plan as set forth in this proclamation. Dated April 25th, 1935.

HOFFMAN THANKS BOARD FOR NAMING SCHOOL IN HONOR

Admits Pleasure at Changing of Name to "Harold G. Hoffman High School"

Governor Hoffman, in a letter to the local Board of Education, read at Wednesday night's daylight session of that body, admitted he was pleased that the local High School had been named in his honor. The School Board at its previous meeting a month before had voted to abandon the numeral designation of the high school in favor of the name "Harold G. Hoffman High School of South Amboy." The Governor's letter read as follows:

March 30th, 1935

Dear Oscar:

I have your letter of March 28th, officially notifying me of the action of the Board of Education in changing the name of the South Amboy High School to the Harold G. Hoffman High School of South Amboy.

I suppose my modesty should cause me to object to this action, but frankly, I must confess, that I am very much pleased. I cherish many fond memories of the South Amboy High School and of course, I am very proud to know that the board unanimously adopted the suggestion that it be named for me.

Will you please convey my sincere appreciation to the members of the board.

It is understood that the Board now plans to have the name of the high school erected on the John st. side of the school, above the top of the upper tier of windows. The method of anchoring the letters has not been definitely decided upon, it appeared.

A request, in letter form, from Dr. J. F. Weber, on behalf of the Medical Association, that the School Nurse talk to parents on the merits of vaccination as a small pox preventive and anti-toxin treatment as a diphtheria safeguard was given favorable action by the Board.

Applications for positions in the local school system were received from Vincent Abbatiello, of Cliffside Park, N. J., a former resident, and graduate of St. Mary's High School, and Mrs. M. Snover, of 162 Second street. There were also applications from Mr. H. E. Fullerton of Metuchen and Martha Greenhouse of Trenton.

The Board considered a verbal request by Harry Macholl, of Ferris street, on behalf of the American Legion, for permission to hold a carnival on the George street school grounds, some time after the close of the school term. After considerable discussion of probable damage to school buildings, unsuitability of the vicinity for the purpose, probable unfavorable reaction on the part of the public, etc., the Board finally voted to have the secretary advise Mr. Macholl that the Board did not care to establish a precedent in using the school grounds for such purposes.

The Attendance Officer reported investigating 51 cases of absenteeism and of finding only three cases of truancy, only seven cases where the pupil was absent illegally.

The report of the medical officer cited six visits; 9 pupils excluded for persistent coughs or communicable diseases. Sanitary conditions of the schools were pronounced good.

The meeting was scheduled for six o'clock in order that the members might attend the annual dinner of the Council School Boards Association, which affair was being held in Sayreville the same evening, beginning at seven p. m. The School Board session here was called to order at 6:19 and the members were already ten minutes late for the Sayreville affair when the adjournment here was taken.

Lack of Public Confidence Responsible for Present Condition He Declares in Speech Here.

"Trying To Crucify McMichael for Doing Duty" Declares Toolan

Says Claim There Is No Work for City Engineer Not Real Reason for Move.

That City Engineer A. T. McMichael will fight the efforts of the Mayor and City Council to oust him from his post was indicated this week when John E. Toolan of Perth Amboy, retained as his attorney, announced they were in position to fight to the last ditch.

"They are merely trying to crucify McMichael for doing his duty," Toolan declared. He added that the announced reason for abolishing his job because there was no work for the City Engineer to do was only a "flimsy piece of camouflage." The real reason he said was "persecute McMichael because he had been loyal to his trust and had served the people in preference to a corporation."

Trust Company Is Approved as Mortgagee by Federal Housing

May Lend Qualified Property Owners—80 Percent of Appraised Value of Property.

Announcement was made this week by the Newark Regional Office of the Federal Housing Administration that the South Amboy Trust Company has been approved as a mortgagee under the administration's plan of mutual mortgage insurance.

Under title II of the National Housing Act, any approved mortgagee may lend qualified property owners up to 80 percent of the appraised value of the property, for construction purposes, provided the amount does not exceed \$15,000.

Lions Club Here Is Well Represented at Regional Meeting

Dr. Agger of Rutgers Addressed Meeting at Hotel Pines on Monetary System.

Only when history repeats itself and the country is returned again to Republican Administration can the United States hope to attain the degree of stability and the public confidence that it lacks at present, was the declaration made by Judge Adrian Lyon at the meeting of the Hoffman Republican Club, which took place Wednesday evening in Wilhelm's Hall.

Judge Lyon declared the present lack of public confidence in the administration is responsible for the unsettled condition of business. He said because the next move at Washington cannot be anticipated and the present administration cannot be depended upon, there is a widespread anxiety and a reluctance to take the steps necessary to bring about a permanent recovery.

The present policy of spending money in large quantities, said Judge Lyon, will have its effect on every person in the country for years to come, because with the heavy burden placed on the corporations through taxation to pay for this heavy outlay now being made, prices will be sharply advanced and the ordinary citizen will have the bear the brunt.

The history of the Republican party from the days of Abraham Lincoln to the present was reviewed by Judge Lyon, who concluded by declaring the election of a Republican president was the only solution to the perplexing problems which confront the people at present.

Following the meeting a social time took place.

Mayor Suggests Board Discipline School Teacher

Says Parents Object to James Tustin's Actions at Recent Electrification Hearing

There were echoes of the comments and criticisms rather widely expressed immediately following the only Council Meeting ever held in the High School heard at the meeting of the Board of Education held Wednesday evening. These memories were awakened by the letter of Mayor Charles T. Mason to the School Board, which letter complained of the tactics used by one of the High School instructors at the public meeting when the so-called electrification ordinance was under discussion. The faculty member in question was named in the letter and the conduct termed undignified, ungentlemanly, showing an extremely radical attitude. Criticism of the ignorance of parliamentary procedure or else the deliberate attempt to incite passions was expressed; the Mayor explaining his action as being based on the number of complaints that had reached him regarding the action of the man in question. Prof. James F. Tustin, Science Teacher of the High School staff, was the faculty member that was specified.

The Mayor's letter was as follows: April 17th, 1935

The Board of Education, South Amboy, N. J.

Gentlemen:

It is with regret I feel the necessity of calling to your attention the following circumstances with respect to one of the High School Faculty. In bringing these circumstances to your attention I am actuated principally by the repeated expressions of opinion made to me by various citizens and parents of school children.

At a public meeting held in the High School Auditorium on April 2nd, Mr. James Tustin, a member of the High School faculty, conducted himself in a manner that, in my opinion and the opinion of a number of others, was undignified and ungentlemanly and showed an attitude that to me seemed extremely radical. Most boisterous attempts were made to dictate to the President of the Council methods of procedure, rules of order, etc., which indicated either his ignorance of parliamentary procedure or a deliberate attempt to incite the passions of those present. Several of our citizens and parents of children have expressed grave doubt as to the fitness of anyone exhibiting such an attitude to be in charge of children of a school age.

I do not feel that it is necessary to go into any great detail as two members of the Board of Education were present and heard all the remarks and saw the attitude of Mr. Tustin and can undoubtedly give you more details if so desired.

This matter is brought to your attention on account of the number of citizens and parents of children who have spoken to me about it, as I do not feel under these circumstances, it should go unnoticed.

The discussion that followed the reading of the letter developed that there were at least three members of the School Board who were present when the incident in question occurred during the Council session. The consensus of opinion seemed to favor doing something regarding the mayor's letter regarding the matter—but what to do was the hurdle: what the Board could do, a question. It was finally decided to receive the Mayor's letter and refer the matter to the Superintendent of Schools, the logical one to whom complaints ordinarily go, along with the teachers committee chairman for an investigation and a report at a subsequent meeting.

IMPROVEMENTS ARE MADE AT CITY PARK

New Ventilating System on 1935 Ford Engine

Innovation Provides Ventilating System Never Before Used on Auto.

At the Board of Education regular meeting Thursday evening there were present the full board, Professors Fitch, Miller and Dawson. In a communication from several teachers it was asked that in the absence of a report from the Supervising Principal the usual increase of fifty dollars be granted them.

The Council will receive bids next Tuesday evening for laying concrete wall curb on John street and laying house connections to sanitary sewer system.

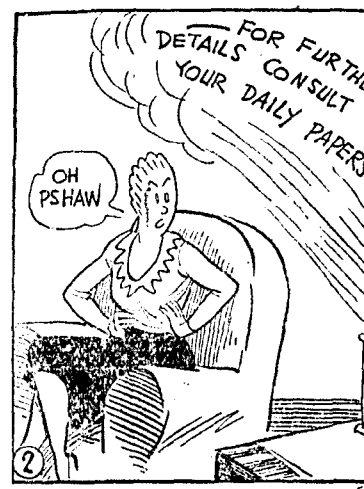
