

Dohaney and Zdanewicz Answer Republican Charges At Mass Meeting Wednesday

Dohaney Says Mason Has Put Hukom Into Politics Instead Of Taking It Out—Zdanewicz Produces Letter Written To Council Warning Of Disaster As Result Of Budget Framed By Republicans

WALCZAK POINTS TO GOOD CONDITION OF FINANCES

Another series of attacks on Republican leader Chas. T. Mason by Democratic Municipal Chairman Dohaney and Councilman-at-Large John Zdanewicz at the city wide mass meeting and "John Zdanewicz Night" sponsored by the Sacred Heart Parish Club Wednesday evening. The affair took place in the Sacred Heart Hall.

"We have gained at least five hundred votes for the Democratic Party during the past week because of the untrue and fantastic stories at the opposition," declared Dohaney as he referred to a speech made by Charles T. Mason, the Republican candidate for Mayor at a gathering last week. "The time has come to take hukom out of politics, but instead he has put it in," Dohaney added. "This city has always been known for voting from the top to the bottom of the Democratic ticket, and I am sure it will do so again," he said.

Termining the recent declarations of Mason "assine charges," Zdanewicz declared Mason had taken credit for the street improvement program here, whereas the improvements were started by the Democrats in 1937 and, he added, the Republican councilmen voted against a continuation of local WPA projects.

Referring to charges made by the Republicans about the financial situation in the city, Zdanewicz said that in 1931 and 1932, during the peak of the depression, numerous municipalities were forced to borrow from banks because of the fact that tax payments were slow. Unpaid taxes, which the people were unable to prevent, Zdanewicz said, were responsible for the \$100,000 debt Mason declared the city was confronted with when he took office as Mayor. Defending the issuance of bonds for the payment of notes, Zdanewicz commented, "any sane man would have done just that."

Recalling Mason had declared the Republicans were responsible for the elimination of the Street Commissioner and City Engineer jobs, as a means of saving money for the taxpayers, Zdanewicz asserted the City Engineer job had been abolished because "Mason did not have the vote to get a Republican job."

Producing a letter written by State Budget Commissioner Darby with regard to the budget made up by the Republicans, Zdanewicz read the following quotation, "I note surplus revenue has been appropriated in the amount of \$30,000. This is 80 percent of the estimated \$33,600 surplus on hand. The use of the surplus in the above amount to support the 1936 budget may seriously interfere with the orderly functioning of your municipality and while the department has no jurisdiction over the use of surplus in any municipality, you may find yourselves with ample appropriations, but with insufficient cash to pay bills and no legal method of procuring cash." "If you turn this city over to the Republicans, they'll put this city in a hole again," he said in conclusion.

Councilman Walczak, chairman of the meeting, declared South Amboy is one of the few municipalities in the state that is able at present. Continued on Page Four

Hon. Thomas F. Gleason, Mayor, South Amboy, N. J.

Dear Mayor Gleason:

By your letter of October 28, 1938, you direct me, as City Treasurer, to furnish you with "a clear and concise statement of all facts surrounding the item of \$12,896.00 appropriated in the 1937 budget, so that the people can no longer be misled."

Pursuant to your order, I wish to advise that I have made a thorough examination of the books, records, resolutions and correspondence and have refreshed my memory of the

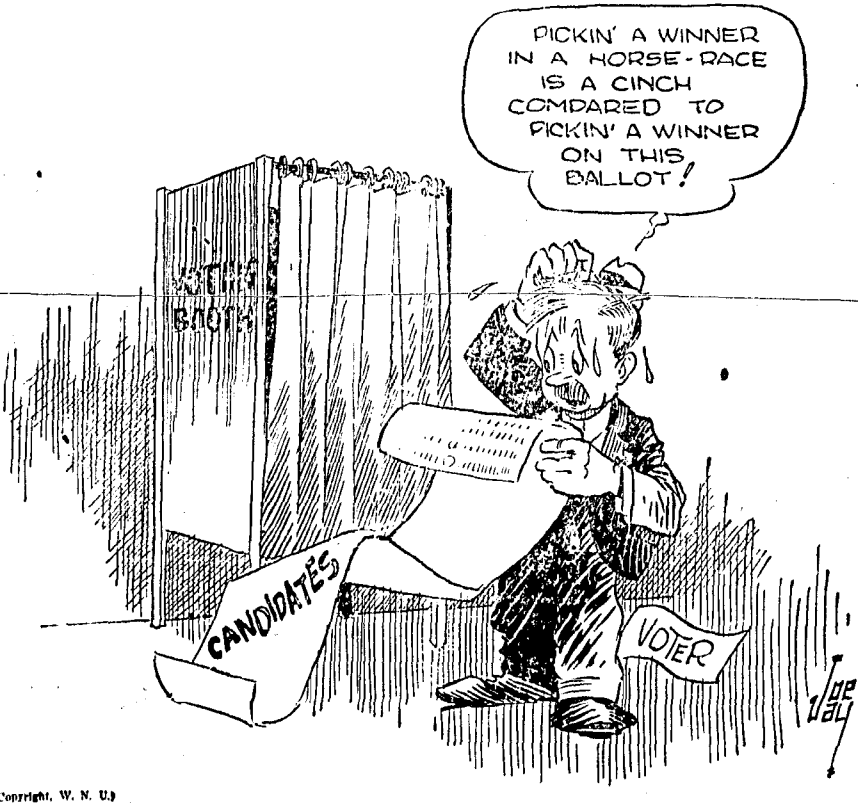

Disputed Budget Item Remains Unexplained; Mason Declared At G. O. P. Meeting Last Night

Also Discusses Plans Drawn Up for City Hall—Says New Building is Unnecessary and Asks Who Paid For Plans. Again Hits At Brief Council Sessions

Report Demolition Of a Portion Of Parlin Village Is Contemplated

According to reliable information, the "Red Village", of Parlin is doomed to obliteration. The section, comprising the northern portion of the village east of the tracks of the Raritan River Railroad, will be torn down within a short time, it is reported. Apparently this plan will be carried out to reduce the taxes and upkeep of the DuPont Company, which, it is said, amounts in the neighborhood of \$40,000. Most of the property is owned by the Crossman Company, miners of clay and sand.

In order to carry out the company's policy of having executives and others subject to emergency call, living on the premises, the company is reported to be planning some radical changes, which will force the movement of many tenants now residing in other sections of the company's property, in order that these quarters may be taken over by some of those forced to move because of the demolition of these homes.

Last night the local Republicans brought their campaign to a close with a well attended meeting held in Wilhelm's Hall, when Municipal Chairman Charles T. Mason was the principal speaker.

Following out his previous statements concerning the subject, Mason made the now famous and much disputed 1937 municipal budget item of \$12,896 the principal axis around which his discussion revolved. He declared the Democrats although they had made several attempts to do so have been unable to offer an explanation of the \$12,896 item that was satisfactory. "They have talked about it," he said, "but they have not told you what became of it. In their endeavors to fix the responsibility they go back to 1935. We are almost in 1939 now, they could have moved up to 1937 and explained that \$12,896."

A side issue was injected in the discussion, when Mason recalled that plans had been drawn for a new City Hall. "Do you folks know elaborate plans were drawn up for a new city hall, he asked, 'they are getting classy, that old building is not good enough for them. I am wondering who was paid for those plans. You may look for a new city hall in 1939 or an addition to it if the Democrats go into office. There is no necessity for that. What do they want it for, they don't meet there. They could meet on any street corner for the four minute sessions, such as they did last Tuesday night."

Mason too, again accused the Democrats of using WPA as a means of furthering their political ambitions, and declared that the objections voiced were not against WPA as such, since it was a recognized fact that it was needed, but against the use of it for political purposes.

Candidate for Councilman-at-Large John D. Larkin also criticized the Democrats for their spending proclivities and after declaring the construction of an incinerator was also a topic which had been frequently discussed said, "If you put the Democrats back in office in January, you can expect to pay for an incinerating plant."

Urging the members of the party to turn out a large vote for their Mayoralty candidate in the coming election, Benjamin M. Kass declared Mason had been the outstanding figure in the campaign. "Ganging up" on Mason, Kass added, "They trotted out all their heavy artillery, all their big guns, and fired away. For all the harm they have done him they might just as well have been shooting through bean-blowers. When they have been pinned down to telling the truth, there is not much they could say."

As the spokesman for the county ticket, Joseph M. DeHart, Assembly candidate, talked on the proposed legislative program that has been outlined. Assembly candidates John M. Gavin and George Kantra also spoke.

Other speakers during the evening were: Council candidates, Roy Benett and Patrick Grimley; Wm. C. Wilson, candidate for Sheriff; Chester A. Newton and Freeholder candidates, Clarence R. Davis and R. Maitland Vanderbergh.

The number of voters in this city has increased wonderfully the past year, or else more are interested in casting their vote this Presidential election than heretofore and have had their names placed on the registry list. There are now 1984 names on the registry list, divided into election districts as follows: First district, First Ward, 500; First district, Second Ward, 436; First district, Third Ward, 476; First district, Fourth Ward, 472. Total, 1,984.

Those who receive from 25 to 34 cents per hour receive an increase of three cents per hour, and those who receive 35 to 44 cents per hour will get an increase of four cents per hour. The latter increases affect

principally the engine and train crews. Every man in the company's employ felt greatly pleased with the announcement as the increase will help out greatly on the increased cost of living.

CITY TREAS. EXPLAINS DISPUTED BUDGET ITEM

visits I had with Walter R. Darby, State Auditor, and herewith furnish you with the following report:

In 1934 the Common Council authorized the issuance of an emergency note in the amount of \$2,000 for the purchase of an ambulance. There is no question that this item was created legally and was in the nature of an emergency note dated September 20, 1934.

Consequently, the bookkeeping item would appear as follows:

Debit: Emergency Revenue (deferred asset) \$2,000; Credit, Emergency Appropriation—Ambulance, (cost val. as of Sept. 1934) \$2,000.

As far as this particular transaction is concerned, the City borrowed \$2,000 by note, to purchase an ambulance. It received the ambulance and owed at that time \$2,000.

In 1935, \$104.00 of this Emergency Revenue was raised in the Budget thereby reducing the amount of this deferred asset from \$2,000.00 to \$1,896, and the note was likewise reduced by the payment of \$104.00 on March 22, 1935.

The Council by resolution in March, 1935, authorized the issuance of an emergency note in the

sum of \$5,000 and again in December, 1935, a note for \$6,000, both of which notes were issued for Poor Relief. This created additional deferred assets of Emergency Revenue. Consequently, after the issuance of these two notes for Relief and the setting up of Emergency Revenues, the three items would appear as follows:

Emergency Revenues (Deferred Assets)

Ambulance (1934) \$1,896.00

Poor Relief (1935) 5,000.00

Poor Relief (1935) 6,000.00

On April 1, 1936, the City of So. Amboy, pursuant to Chapter 233 of the Laws of 1934, authorized the issuance of \$13,000 worth of Refunding Bonds for the purpose of paying the emergency notes. These Bonds were delivered on May 1, 1936 to the holders of the emergency notes. At this point, I must direct your attention to the fact that the issuance of these Refunding Bonds did not pay off this created indebtedness, but merely changed the form of the obligation so that where the city was obliged to pay under emergency notes at a short maturity, the period of time was extended and the city was enabled to pay over a longer period of time. The result of that was that the city, instead of being obliged to pay off the emergency notes within the following year, received extended time within which to pay, and could pay off a definite amount each year, which amount had to be included as a mandatory budget item, in succeeding years.

That brings us to the condition at the close of 1936, where the city still owed the \$12,896, even though bonds were issued and the notes were picked up.

My understanding of municipal account is such that any Emergency Revenue account can only be closed out by actual payment through appropriation in the budget and raised directly through taxation.

At the close of the city's books December 31, 1936, a very significant entry was made by the then City Auditor which is probably the cause of all this misunderstanding.

An examination of the close of the books will show that the Emergency Revenue account was closed out by a contra journal entry to Notes Payable Account. This could not legally be the fact because this item of \$12,896.00 was not at that time raised through taxation, nor in the form of a budget appropriation. The result was to reduce the balance of Surplus Revenue remaining at the close of 1936.

Hence, we have this situation. The Statement of Liabilities as submitted to the State Auditor at the close of 1935 showed Emergency Revenues due at \$12,896. The Statement of Liabilities at the close of 1936, as submitted to the State Auditor, failed to show that very same item since it had been incorrectly written off by a journal entry. So that, on February 13, 1937, the office of the State Auditor directed,

by letter, the insertion of Emergency Revenue in the amount of \$12,896 as an item of deferred charge to be set up.

The Common Council in 1937, from its 1936 report, did not include the deferred charge of \$12,896 in its budget because same had been incorrectly written off, and its proposed budget was then returned by the State Auditor's office for the purpose of including this item as a deferred charge in its budget. This had to be done.

At the same time the \$12,896 was restored to Surplus Revenue and permission was subsequently granted to the City Council to take into its Budget as a Revenue that amount, which, in effect, resulted in purely correcting a bookkeeping entry to properly clear the item for the city's records. The result of this action did not raise one penny by taxation. No cash whatsoever was raised by its inclusion in the budget.

So that, even though this item of \$12,896 appears as a deferred charge in the 1937 budget there is no question that it was created, in part in 1934 and the balance in 1935.

The actual obligations (the bonds) that were given in substitution for the Emergency Notes are now being paid off at the rate of \$2,000 annually. This \$2,000 annually is raised each year by taxation, by its inclusion as an item of bond redemption appearing in each year's budget.

In order to finally get this controversial matter adjusted, it was necessary for the City Auditor, during the year of 1937, to prepare a revised balance sheet for the year 1936, and this was forwarded to the State Auditor's Office and was accepted by that office and approved as to the closing balance sheet as of 1936. The method of handling this item has at all times met strict compliance with the laws and statutes applicable. Many visits on my part were required to the State Auditor's Office in order to clear up the original 1936 closing balance sheet. It required a great deal of effort on my part and I feel secure and certain that it now will bear the strictest examination and scrutiny as to compliance with all the laws and statutes applicable.

The City Treasurer's office was in no way or wise responsible for any delusions that may have arisen in connection with these transactions. Be assured that the City Treasurer's office has always been and is available to any taxpayer of South Amboy for any information that he may desire regarding the finances and financial transactions of the City of South Amboy. We feel disposed to give this information regardless of party affiliations.

I beg to advise that this letter is given you in reply to your direction, which is the first such request that we have received.

to operate on a cash basis instead of waiting until 1943 when state law makes such a practice mandatory. This condition, he said, was due to the splendid management of city finances by the members of the present Democratic council. He declared that numerous attempts had been made to get street improvements in that section when Republicans were in power, but that only improvements received were the scraping of streets. He declared, the Democrats, on the other hand were responsible for the present fine condition of the streets, in that section.

City Attorney John P. McGuire, making a plea for support of the entire party ticket declared, "They will give you the best kind of government," and added, "because of the honesty, industry and efficiency of the present city government, you got the lowest honest tax rate possible this year," he added.

Mayor Thomas F. Gleason, candidate for re-election, urged a vote from the top to the bottom of the Democratic ticket declaring "Let us have a return to the practice of the old days when we voted the straight ticket."

Freeholder Anthonny J. Gadek of Perth Amboy, spoke in behalf of the county and state tickets, and discussed at length the welfare program inaugurated by the present Democratic Board of Freeholders.

Others who spoke were: Charles Hess, Second Ward Council candidate; Councilman Frank Stanton; former councilman Frank Kurzawa and Postmaster Thomas E. Downs.

A STRANGE PARALLEL

A Kentucky community closed its schools, stores and factories the other day when all its citizens and hundreds from neighboring communities celebrated the fifteenth anniversary of the opening of the world's first continuous rolling steel mill there. There were parades, banquets and other festivities as the community paid tribute to its leading industry.

Strangely, almost at the same time, the National Labor Relations Board in Washington was castigating the proprietors of the same steel mill and alleging they were guilty of unfair labor practices. The allegations had been laid before the board, not by employer and the employees. The community, after all, is made up principally of employees of the American Rolling Mill Co. If they hadn't thought well of their employer there just wouldn't have been a celebration.

In Virginia they celebrate apple and tobacco crops; in Georgia the peach crops are honored; in Iowa it is corn; in Michigan, cherries; Maine, potatoes, and so on down the line. This tribute to an industry is a new one, however, but it is a healthy sign. As the editor of the newspaper in the steel town declared:

"It is about time the people of this country begin to realize that we all harvest a crop from industry just as we do from the soil."

HOME BUILDING IS NEWS

In a recent issue, the magazine Life published a handsome housing portfolio that should come as "news" to millions of American families.

The purpose of the portfolio is to point out that these families can build and buy far better homes than they now rent without increasing their housing budgets, with the aid of modern construction methods and long-time, low-interest mortgage loans.

Life does not simply illustrate a variety of homes, with dry-as-dust statistics concerning costs. Instead it takes four actual families, one each in the \$2,000, \$3,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000 income groups, and discusses their housing needs, wants and ambitions. As it says, it "invited them to make their individual housing problems a laboratory test tube."

In pursuing this idea, it retained eight of America's foremost architects to design actual houses for these families. Two architects were assigned to each income level—one to plan a modern house, the other an up-to-date traditional house. It is pointed out that building costs in 1938 average a full ten per cent below 1936—and that it is possible, for the same amount, to build a far more efficient, attractive and livable home than you could build ten or twelve years ago.

This country needs home building on a vast scale. It needs it because so many families today live in inadequate houses, and can afford better. It needs it because residential construction provides a big answer to the recovery problem. Every dollar spent for a home creates one hour of labor for a workman. It stimulates the great heavy industries, such as metals, cement and lumber, which are now dormant. Life, and other publications which have taken an interest in this question, are performing a fine public service by dramatizing home-building to the public.

KEEP UP THE GOOD WORK

Pessimists who have doubted that the automobile accident rate can be reduced, have been happily proven wrong this year, for the rate has gone down sharply since 1937.

Apparently the public ear has finally been opened to the teachings of the safety experts. States and communities have carried on more and better prevention campaigns than in the past. The insurance industry has assumed leadership in combatting the highway slaughter and has issued invaluable books to be used in schools, by individuals and by civic authorities. In some areas there has been noticeable improvements in traffic law enforcement, and the arrest and punishment of offenders. Lastly, a start has been made in various states to make accidents impossible by constructing modern highways, without intersections, and with separated lanes that prevent head-on collisions.

We have learned that safe driving is the product of safe thinking. Relatively few drivers are congenitally reckless—and the only cure for this minority is revocation of licenses. Most drivers who cause accidents are simply thoughtless and ignorant. They do not realize the chances they take until a calamity occurs, or the messages of the workers in the accident prevention field reach them and awaken them to their errors.

Now the country must fight all the harder to keep the accident rate down—and to reduce it further. A good start has been made. And the interest and co-operation of everyone is needed if this good record is to be continued.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

New Approach to Farm Problem
New Jersey farmers will be gratified if Secretary Wallace's latest plans work out. He hopes to market an abundance of agricultural products at prices that will repay the farmers something more than cost of production. The Secretary of Agriculture has been giving serious thought to the demands of American consumers for an economy of abundance rather than one of scarcity. Our farmers, always proud of the amount of produce they could raise per acre, have steadfastly upheld the idea that there were plenty of hungry mouths to eat all the produce they can grow and that effective distribution of purchasing power and effective marketing methods would make the jump from farm to consumer an easy one to take.

So now we hear that the farm program still will have due regard for the sensible and thrifty precepts of soil-building and soil conservation, but that there will be an active effort to make full domestic use of our large crops. Until now surpluses have been treated as a market depressing factor rather than as a boon to hungry people. Briefly, the secretary proposes to expand the activities of his department in an effort to pay the farmer an adequate return for his labors and enable the consumer to buy all that is produced.

Investigation shows that only a small percentage of the American people eat the proper assortment of foods. The investigation is especially significant to New Jersey because it shows that fresh vegetables, eggs, milk and fruits, of which our State raises an abundance, are lacking in the national diet of middle-income and lower income families.

So long as tax money is being expended to help agriculture, it might as well help Johnny Q. Public at the same time. It is a tremendous economic problem to determine just how subsidies shall be given and just how much, but the money to support any farm subsidy program will be more readily forthcoming if the public gets a direct benefit in the form of an abundance of food at reasonable prices. The farmer would rather sell his whole crop at a reasonable price than sell only half his crop and receive a high price, and if the Department of Agriculture can assure the farmer some profit and the housewife a basket of vegetables within the means provided by her purse, we will have the solution. It is encouraging at least, to know that the administration is working on it.

Waterfowl Refuge
During the past three years the Bureau of Biological Survey has been studying the Barnegat Bay area as a suitable location for the establishment of a Federal migratory waterfowl refuge. Now it announces its study almost completed, and that it has found sections of this area provide a suitable variety of habitat to accommodate almost all types of coastal waterfowl and other birds. It reports that a fair amount of the essential elements has survived or is reestablishing itself along the New Jersey coast and that there are protected areas for the birds during severe storms. Establishment of the refuge in this section should increase the number and

variety of birds flying over Ocean county. Revenue derived from gunning would increase since gunners would have better sport.

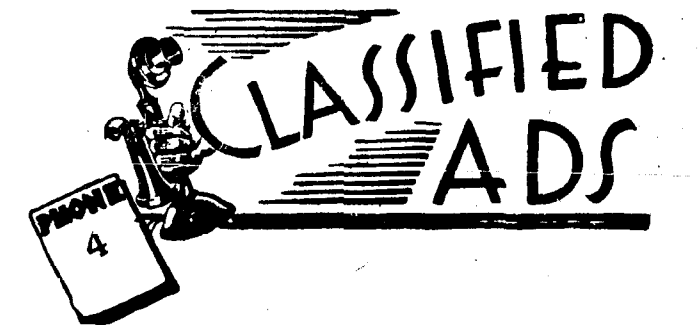

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St. Mary's School News



Was Jesus Christ God? Yes, or no? If He was God, then He is divine Truth itself, and all He said and promised is true; if not He said an impostor and Christianity is a lie. Did He, or did He not establish a visible Church? Yes, or no? If He did, it must be somewhere in the world because He said He would be with it until the end of time; if He did not, then we are wasting our time looking for it. Did He, or did He not give her a definite mission and the necessary authority to carry it out in His Name? Yes, or no? If He did not then this Church is a mere hollow pretence, a phantom without purpose or power; but if He did, then ever since His departure from this earth, she must have been, and for all time to come must be, His mouthpiece, His representative, speaking to us in His name and by His authority, so that only by hearing her can we hear Him. Did He or did He not give us any guarantee that in hearing her we should hear only the truth and never error? Yes or no? If He did not, then we cannot know when to believe her or to reject her, she is then not a true guide, not a true representative of Him who is Himself Eternal Truth, but if He did give us such a guarantee then she has never erred, cannot err now or any time in the future.

From this one can see why if the Divinity of Christ is admitted, one is forced step by step to admit the existence of His Church, her authority to speak to men in His name and the utter impossibility of error by her in proclaiming His doctrine. Thus one has arrived at that point which to many souls is a serious barrier—the indefectibility of the Church and the infallibility of her teaching. The difficulties these two heads of truth present to so many are mostly due to lack of understanding or misunderstanding occasionally they are the result of stiff-necked pride in one's own superior intelligence or one's boasted independence of spirit. People ask, "How can a Church made up of human beings, be indefectible?" According to the dictionary definition this means "not subject to defect or decay". But the Church makes no such claims for the human elements which compose her on earth. The Church like ourselves consists of a soul and a body just as a saintly human soul often exhibits a physical body which may be deformed and even repulsive, so the Church claims her indefectible character for the Divine deposit of truth which under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, constitutes her soul.

For this claim the Church has the definite promise of Christ, who said that "the gates of hell shall not prevail against her." Therefore, from this standpoint, it matters little what kind of individuals at any given time may constitute the outward or physical body of the church, she can never perish. As a matter of fact, to a Catholic, one of the outstanding evidences of the Divine Origin of our Church is her survival, not so much against the persecutions which have beset her from the outside from her birth, but the violence meanness and treachery of her own members in high and low places. No human institution could survive for nearly two thousand years the things done to Holy Mother Church by her own children. God is indeed with her.

Thus, also, in the matter of infallibility. There is no doctrine of the Church which is so much misunderstood, so much misrepresented; so frequently the cause of rejecting the Divine invitation to "Come, follow me." Discussion of this doctrine runs the gamut from the courteous and welcome questions of the sincere seeker after truth to the ridiculous and often offensively stated assertion, that we Catholics believe anything some old Italian tells us, even that the moon is made of green cheese or that the world is still flat.

Now just what is this doctrine? Simply this: that only when the Pope speaks ex cathedra, i. e., in his capacity as the head of the Church, as its Divinely appointed teacher, and only when he deals with mat-

ters of faith or morals, is he infallible. He may be, as has been the case, a very unworthy individual leading a scandalous life, and yet under these conditions he cannot speak in error, because Christ guaranteed us against that and God's guarantee is beyond argument.

As Father Martin Scott, S. J. says: "This constitutes the great comfort and security of Catholics. They know, they do not conjecture. They have certitude, not probability. They are not searching for light; they have it. That is why Catholics are so firm, so uncompromising. Truth has nothing to compromise. We do not compromise on the multiplication table. The truths of the Catholic Church are just as certain, for the Church is God speaking to His people."

FOOTING THE BILL WITH TAXES

In managing our personal budget, we know that we may live within our means only by limiting our purchases to our income. Since our income is not always sufficient to provide fully everything, we would like to have, we are compelled to choose those things we most need and desire, and go without the remainder.

As taxpayers, when we buy governmental service we should realize that this same limitation is present. If we want an abundance of services, we must be prepared to pay for them in increased taxation. On the other hand, if we want lower taxes, we must expect to do without some of the luxuries that higher taxes would buy.

While new highways, improved lighting, larger public buildings, public parks, more sewerage, and many more public improvements are appealing when we think only in terms of conveniences, we must remember that we, as taxpayers, must pay for them, and everyone who receives an increase and buys commodities is a taxpayer, either directly or indirectly. Similarly, we might want to purchase many luxuries for our personal use, but we deny ourselves these things unless we are

prepared and willing to pay for them.

Heedless of the effect on taxes, many individuals press officials with requests for projects that require expenditures. Added to these demands, the incessant pressure of lobbyists for special interests, and the unabated clamor of public job-seekers constitute a continuous pressure for increased cost of government.

It is inconsistent, therefore, for us to request increased services, and at the same time to demand lower taxes. Rather we should co-operate with authorities by limiting our demands to what we are able and willing to pay for.

Fortunately, under our democratic form of government, our citizens can participate actively in public affairs. First through the ballot, selecting the men they want as officials, second, through voicing the policies they want these officials to carry out, and especially those policies which affect taxation.

That these principles are not theoretical, but extremely practical, is proved by the accomplishments of many local taxpayers' organizations throughout New Jersey, operating under the guidance of the New Jersey Taxpayers' Association.

For some time these local associations have been co-operating actively with municipal and county officials in determining spending policies, and other governmental problems.

Most authorities have shown a better willingness to co-operate with these groups. Naturally, elected public officials realize the importance of co-operation with groups of public minded citizens, since they are anxious to retain their good will.

To further the interests of economy and lower taxes, it is important to support those officials who are willing to work for curtailment of government costs and to eliminate extravagant policies.

Moreover, when officials know that prudent management of public affairs will bring voting support, they will strive to effect policies which will gain that support.

Ultimate responsibility for policies that bring about lower taxes lies with the people. When the people demand greater public expenditures, they must expect higher taxes. On the other hand, when they demand businesslike operation of all departments, when they insist upon elimination of unnecessary expenditures and a reduction of the public payroll, and promote a program of debt-reduction, then they can reasonably expect generous tax reductions.

MUNICIPAL TOPICS

NEW FEDERAL TAXES

The proposed Federal taxation of State and Municipal bonds and the salaries and wages of public employees has stirred those charged with the responsibilities of State and local government as few other suggestions emanating from Washington in many years.

Broad questions are raised by the contemplated new levies. It is not the taxation itself that is so disturbing, although this phase is grave in probable undesirable consequences. The major concern has to do with the issue of adherence to or deviation from the basic form of American government and the dominant note of the Constitution guaranteeing and reserving to the States every sovereign power not expressly delegated.

Speaking at the last annual convention of the National Association of Attorney Generals, Henry Epstein, solicitor general of the State of New York, pointed out the immutability of State and municipal bonds from Federal taxation does not exist for the benefit of the bondholders. It is a necessary incident, he remarked, to the sovereign character of the borrowing power of the states and the municipalities as creations of the state.

Nor will the bondholder suffer materially by reason of the proposed taxation. It will be the states, the municipalities and, as always, in the end, the general taxpayer. Bonds now marketed at a low interest rate, compared with other securities, because of exemption from Federal taxes, will be less attractive to investors and rates will have to be boosted to offset the levy. Higher rates mean more money to meet the charges and at this point the taxpayer will be brought into the picture since he is the source of all revenues of government.

The matter of taxing salaries and wages of public officers and workers present different aspects, but involves the same issue. As individuals public employees should pay the same taxes as anyone else. There is no argument on that point. The question is whether it should be done with the consent of the states or by the Federal Government assuming the power.

The subject is considered of such

importance it has been accorded a place of prominence on the program of the annual convention of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities at Atlantic City, November 17 and 18. Austin J. Tobin, assistant general counsel of the Port of New York Authority and secretary of the Conference of State Defense, will be the principal speaker. His address will be followed by a general discussion.
