"Our replacement program, begun during the Spring of 1956, was carried out as rapidly as the equipment became available.

"The final two K-4 Pacific type steam locomotives which remained available for active use until last week have been sent to Camden, N. J., in the Philadelphia Region, for storage. Train operations in the New York Region of the Pennsylvania Railroad are now 100 per cent electrified or dieselized."

Mr. Roeper added a note of appreciation to E. Donald Sterner, Chairman, and members of the Monmouth County Planning Board for their interest and ecoperation in the project. "Your studies of the residential growth and potential industrial development of Monmouth County have been essential to us in formulating our own plans for the railroad's future progress," he said.

Mr. Storner, in commenting on the announcement, said "Monmouth County, one of the fastest growing sections of the metropolitan area, welcomes the diesel locomotives and congratulates the Pennsylvania Railroad for spending this transition, which should inevitably bring with it better service for all of our communities.

"The coal-burning steamers served us well-through many decades. We mourn but not regret their passing, looking forward as we do to the many advantages their successors have in efficiency, economy, performance and reliability."

DELIVERY

In bowling it is of the utmost importance to choose a comfortable, relaxed starting position. The weight of the ball should be supported in the left hand and the ball itself should be held somewhere between the waist and chin, but being relaxed and natural is the most important element in the stance or in any part of the delivery for that

Always start at the same distance from the foul line and approach the line with a three, four or five step delivery depending upon which seems most comfortable to you. I advise beginners to try a three step approach; with practice they will have no trouble developing a four or five step delivery.

The main thing to do is to coordinate feet and arms. Start with a slow step, and quicken! the pace gradually. Be rhythmic, graceful. Don't run, Avoid the hop, skip and jump approach.

Such a man was Daniel C. Chase. He worked as night watch; an of steamboats at the Delaware and Raritan canal terminal in New York City, was assistant towing agent freight clerk, se**sistant train dispa**tcher, towing agent, and general agent of the Formsylvania Railroad, superintendent of steam towing and shipping agent, and had charge of lighterage business.

Mr. Chase became an authority on admiralty law and laws mourning harbors, pilois and tow-boats. With all these activition he found time to invent and patent a system of de igns for cleamboat stacks includings the famous Keystone.

In his public career, he was Vice-President of the First National Bank and was an organizer and first president of the Raritan River Railroad. The Petith Amboy Dock Co. and the Raritan Drydock Co. were formed by him and he served as their president at the same time.

In politics Mr. Chase was elected Freeholder and State Senater. During his term as Senator, in 1887, he introduced the bill creating the Borough of South Amboy.

He was mayor for five terms. Surely a full life, spent in hard work, and useful public service.

Mr. Alfred T. Kerr attended schools in Bordentown and South Amboy, and spent three years in the Model School in Trenton; graduating in 1887. He, like Mr. Chase began his career in modest positions. First, he worked in the Pennsylvania Rainbd Freight Office, was shop clerk, assistant coal premium clerk of the United Railroad of New Jersey, fireman, and dealer in painte and glass.

In 1908 be became tax collector; in 1909 Freecholder which effice he retained for eight years. In 1916 he was elected mayor and held that post during World War I and the Morgan Explosion.

The Water Work and Harold G. Hoffman High School were started during his administration. Mr. Kerr was active in helping establish the Sou h Amboy Memorial Hospital and is remembered for his talents as a musician.

County Judge Klemmer Kalteissen paid tribute to Andrew N. Kvist on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of Mr. Kvist's vervice as chief naturalization officert. Said he, "He is truly a public servant of whom the county can be justly proud."



Ten Commandemnts of Gunning Reiterated

With the opening of the anmusl upland game season on Saturday, the State Division of Fish and Game, Department of Conservation and Economic Development, today reiterated the ten commandments of gun safety in the interest of keeping hunting a safe sport.

In addition to knowing how to bandle a gun and how to operate it safely, the Division urged hunters to help prevent forest and grase fires while on hunting trips. Because of last summer's drought and the lack of adequate rain since tht time. the Division of Fish and Game emphasized the forests and fields are dry and could become ignited by a carelessly thrown Highted cigarette or ofgar or by a neglected camp fire.

Safety follow:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a londed gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.

2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.

3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from Chamber before firing.

4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.

6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid horseplay while handling a gun.

7. Unattended guns should be

unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults. 8. Never climb a tree or fence

or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, he sure your backstop is adequate. 10. Avoid alcoholic drinks

before or during shooting. Report all violations to a Fah and Game Warden at once. The ten commandments of

hunting were prepared by the Sporting Arms and Ammuition Manufacturers' Institute to insure continual pleasure from the sport of hunting.
