

## First Aid Squad Makes Report of Activities

Listing the activities of the South Amboy First Aid and Safety Squad for the month of October, Captain Harold Evans reported 83 calls answered by the squad of which 56 were emergencies and 21 fire calls. Fifty-one of the calls were local, 3 on the highway, 4 in Morgan, 1 Sayre Woods, 1 Madison Park, 2 Melrose, Laurence Harbor 4; Sayreville 8; and Parkway 3.

Evans reported 16,000 lbs. of oxygen used in the squad performance of their duties. The squad's vehicles covered 1,007 miles, requiring 592 man-hours.

Michael Szata headed the roster of the top 5 men with 52 calls to his credit; Joseph Rush was second with 44 calls, followed by Robert Kelly with 43 calls; Jack Hardy, 32 calls, and Harold Evans with 31 calls.

The squad put on a first aid demonstration for the Naval Reserves in the Perth Amboy Armory on Oct. 16th, and participated in the Civil Defense mobilization drill held in Roosevelt Park. The squad participated in the South Amboy and Morgan Halloween parades.

The highlight of the month was the purchase of a new 1957 Cadillac Ambulance to replace the 1948 vehicle which became inadequate for the squad's needs.

Evans also reported that the squad members received Asian Flu inoculations.

## Deep Cut Bridge Case to be Reargued

The State Supreme Court ordered a reargument of all points surrounding the reconstruction of the Deep Cut Bridge in Sayreville, and gave the attorneys for all participants 15 days to submit their briefs, last week.

The bridge, which carries Washington Road over the Pennsylvania Railroad's freight line near the South Amboy boundary, has been closed for reconstruction. The work is now 50 per cent complete and the span should be open soon after Jan. 1.

The Pennsylvania, which has been previously ordered to pay for rebuilding the bridge to carry modern-day traffic loads, has opposed paying all costs and its position has been opposed in the courts by the state, Sayreville, South Amboy, and Middlesex County.

The railroad has asked that the state bear 85 per cent of the costs.

## Assemblyman Kurtz is Named New Assembly Majority Leader



Assemblyman William Kurtz (D-Middlesex), who received an overwhelming majority of votes in last week's elections has been honored by his colleagues in the new Assembly to fill the important position as majority leader in the lower house.

Kurtz was selected for the important post in the new assembly during a conference in the State Capital called by Governor Robert E. Meyner and attended by cabinet members and legislative leaders.

This is Kurtz's fifth term as Assemblyman from Middlesex County. During his 1955-57 term Kurtz served as minority leader.

As an assemblyman, he was always regarded favorably by

labor and industry. His overwhelming majority in the past election when he received almost 85,000 votes in the county, leading all his running mates, is considered a personal tribute to Kurtz's popularity as a candidate.

As a majority leader, Assemblyman Kurtz will shoulder the responsibility of guiding legislation through the lower house, on its way to the Senate.

Because of the Democratic majority for the first time in a number of years, Kurtz said the Legislature should restore the \$1,600,000 for Rutgers University capital improvement appropriation cut from the current state budget by the 1957 Republican legislative majority.

## Jersey Junior Week Proclaimed, Nov. 18-23

Gov. Robert E. Meyner has proclaimed Junior Week as tribute to the Junior Membership Department of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mayor Chermello, proclaimed the week of November 18th as Junior Week in So. Amboy.

The Junior Woman's Club of South Amboy was founded in 1925, and was reactivated in 1948. Mrs. David Owens is currently serving as president of the local club.

The Junior Woman's Club of South Amboy has selected the Building Fund of the South Amboy Memorial Hospital as their contribution to the Community Achievement Contest, a state-wide project for the Junior Clubs, for 1957.

Among the other projects in which the local clubs have applied the efforts were: Talking books for the blind, mobile eye clinic, curative workshops for physically handicapped.

During World War II state service projects included Buddy Bags for the Battleship, New Jersey; and the purchase of seventeen Army field ambulances.

Aid for Navajo Indian children in the form of books, clothing and money was the project for 1954-55. Also, the Junior Women's Clubs allocated about \$10,000 for an upper extremity amputee fund.

The project in which the New Jersey Federation takes greatest pride is the establishment of N.J.C., now known as Douglass College. As early as 1911, the federation advocated higher education for women.

Almost single-handedly they worked to create this college, whose door opened in 1918, have been substantial gifts from the Federation, as have been exchange scholarships.

This year the N. J. Federation in cooperation with N. J. Broadcasters Assn. carried out extensive "Register and Vote" campaign.

## \$300 Pay Increase for School Employees

Permission was granted by the Board of Estimate last week at the Board of Education meeting to use an appropriation of \$10,000 set aside in the annual budget for the purchase and installation of a fire escape for salary raises to employees.

It was planned to install the fire escape at the end of a hall in the original section of the John Street school building, but completion of the annex, and the providing of an exit through this area, now makes the fire escape unnecessary.

All full time employees of the system will receive a \$300 across the board increase, effective from the beginning of the present school year.

## Steam Locomotives Leave Local Scene

Diesel-electrics have now completely replaced steam locomotives in the Pennsylvania Railroad's passenger and freight service along the North Jersey Coast. It was announced today by Park M. Roeper, Regional Manager of the railroad's New York Region.

With the arrival at our So. Amboy engine house of the 17th diesel-electric locomotive unit, the fleet of motive power needed to move all of our trains over the route of the New York and Long Branch Railroad between that city where our electrification ends and Bay Head Junction is complete.

"Our replacement program, begun during the Spring of 1956, was carried out as rapidly as the equipment became available."

"The final two K-4 Pacific type steam locomotives which remained available for active use until last week have been sent to Camden, N. J. in the Philadelphia Region, for storage. Train operations in the New York Region of the Pennsylvania Railroad are now 100 per cent electrified or dieselized."

Mr. Roeper added a note of appreciation to E. Donald Storer, Chairman, and members of the Monmouth County Planning Board for their interest and cooperation in the project. "Your studies of the residential growth and potential industrial development of Monmouth County have been essential to us in formulating our own plans for the railroad's future progress," he said.

Mr. Storer, in commenting on the announcement, said "Monmouth County, one of the fastest growing sections of the metropolitan area, welcomes the diesel locomotives and congratulates the Pennsylvania Railroad for spending this transition, which should inevitably bring with it better service for all of our communities."

"The coal-burning steamers served us well through many decades. We mourn but not regret their passing, looking forward as we do to the many advantages their successors have in efficiency, economy, performance and reliability."

Class 8B is reported in first place in the drive; followed by Class 8B and Class 1C. The drive closes Dec. 8th.



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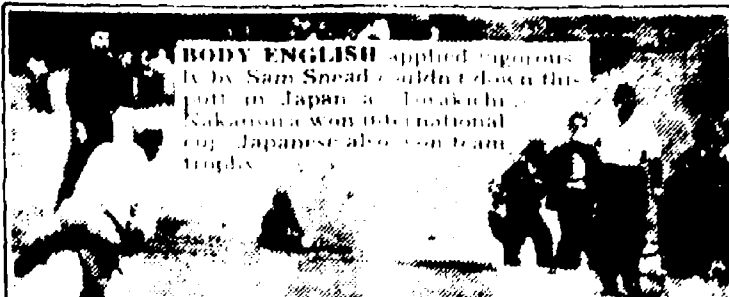

## Famous American Ships



The new nuclear cargo-passenger ship is shown here with the VANNAH, first steam powered vessel to cross any ocean. The ship for the atomic ship, first of her kind ever built, is expected to be laid on National Maritime Day, May 22, 1958, anniversary of the VANNAH sailing in 1819 on her record-making voyage. Because a new ship will give the United States a "first" in nuclear ocean transport as her predecessor did in steam, many people think she ought to bear the same famous name. It is an interesting contrast, whereas the steamer of 1819 could not carry coal enough to her use her engines all the way to Europe, this new SAVANNAH will be able to sail for three years without refueling! She will cost \$10,000,000, but be worth every penny of it if she can restore American shipping to a position of leadership on the world's oceans. The atomic ship drawing was made for *Newsweek* magazine and is used as their cover picture.)

#### DELIVERY

In bowling it is of the utmost importance to choose a comfortable, relaxed starting position. The weight of the ball should be supported in the left hand and the ball itself should be held somewhere between the waist and chin, but being relaxed and natural is the most important element in the stance or in any part of the delivery for that matter.

Always start at the same distance from the foul line and approach the line with a three, four or five step delivery depending upon which seems most comfortable to you. I advise beginners to try a three step approach; with practice they will have no trouble developing a four or five step delivery.

The main thing to do is to coordinate feet and arms. Start with a slow step, and quicken the pace gradually. Be rhythmic, graceful. Don't run. Avoid the hop, skip and jump approach.

### YEAR END TAX TIPS NUMBER 2

This is the second in a series of four articles on federal income taxes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Society of Certified Public Accountants.

By waiting until after the first of the year to decide whether to itemize your deductions or take the standard 10-per cent deduction, you run the risk of losing your greatest tax-saving opportunity.

When you are forced to take the standard deduction because your deductible expenses are less than 10-per cent of your adjusted gross income, you literally "waste" your expense deductions, for tax purposes. Don't let this happen to you every year. Plan your expense outlays so that you go over the optional 10-per cent deduction occasionally. This can be done by pyramiding two years of actual expenses into one.

For example, assume that you expect to have an adjusted gross income of \$7,000 for this year and actual deductible expenses of about \$800—or \$100 less than what you would be entitled to deduct if you took the standard 10-per cent deduction. Not included in your actual expense estimate, however, is \$250 in state taxes and \$100 in home-loan interest charges that will have to be paid in 1958 but which can be paid in advance.

#### Beat the Standard Deduction

If you act quickly and pay these expenses before December 31, you can bring your total allowable deductions for 1957 up to \$950. By itemizing deductions this year and taking the standard deduction next year—when your actual expenses should be somewhat less because of what you have prepaid—your total deductions for both years will be approximately \$1,650. Had you taken the standard 10-per cent deduction in both years, the total would be only about \$1,400.

A salaried worker who has difficulty finding enough deductions to make itemization worthwhile might consider currying the pyramid plan one step further. He could set up a system of "lending" and "borrowing" year-end items that would make it possible for him to throw three years of deductible expenses into one.

#### Timing Deductions

You can begin your own three-year pyramid by postponing payment on as much 1957 deductible expense as possible and planning to take the standard deduction on this year's return. The expenses you have postponed or "loaned" will increase your 1958 deductions, and in the final months of 1958 you can "borrow" from 1959 by speeding-up the payment of deductible items.

As a result of your pyramiding, you maximize your expenses for 1958 (when you should be able to

## Footnotes to Raritan Bay History

Cont'd from last week.

Such a man was Daniel C. Chase. He worked as night watchman of steamboats at the Delaware and Raritan canal terminal in New York City, was assistant towing agent, freight clerk, assistant train dispatcher, towing agent, and general agent of the Pennsylvania Railroad, superintendent of steam towing and shipping agent, and had charge of lighterage business.

Mr. Chase became an authority on admiralty law and laws concerning harbors, pilots and tow-boats. With all these activities he found time to invent and patent a system of designs for steamboat stacks including the famous Keystone.

In his public career, he was Vice-President of the First National Bank and was an organizer and first president of the Raritan River Railroad. The Perth Amboy Dock Co. and the Raritan Drydock Co. were formed by him and he served as their president at the same time.

In politics Mr. Chase was elected Freeholder and State Senator. During his term as Senator, in 1887, he introduced the bill creating the Borough of South Amboy.

He was mayor for five terms. Surely a full life, spent in hard work, and useful public service.

Mr. Alfred T. Kerr attended schools in Bordentown and South Amboy, and spent three years in the Model School in Trenton, graduating in 1887. He, like Mr. Chase began his career in modest positions. First, he worked in the Pennsylvania Railroad Freight Office, was shop clerk, assistant coal premium clerk of the United Railroad of New Jersey, fireman, and dealer in paints and glass.

In 1908 he became tax collector; in 1909 Freeholder which office he retained for eight years. In 1916 he was elected mayor and held that post during World War I and the Morgan Explosion.

The Water Work and Harold G. Hoffman High School were started during his administration. Mr. Kerr was active in helping establish the South Amboy Memorial Hospital and is remembered for his talents as a musician.

County Judge Klemmer Kallisen paid tribute to Andrew N. Kvist on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of Mr. Kvist's service as chief naturalization officer. Said he, "He is truly a public servant of whom the county can be justly proud."

His record began shortly after his service in World War I when he became mayor. Then for a quarter of a century, he "put in motion and completed the machinery for the admittance to citizenship of at least 20,000 aliens" and issued 15,000 or more first papers.

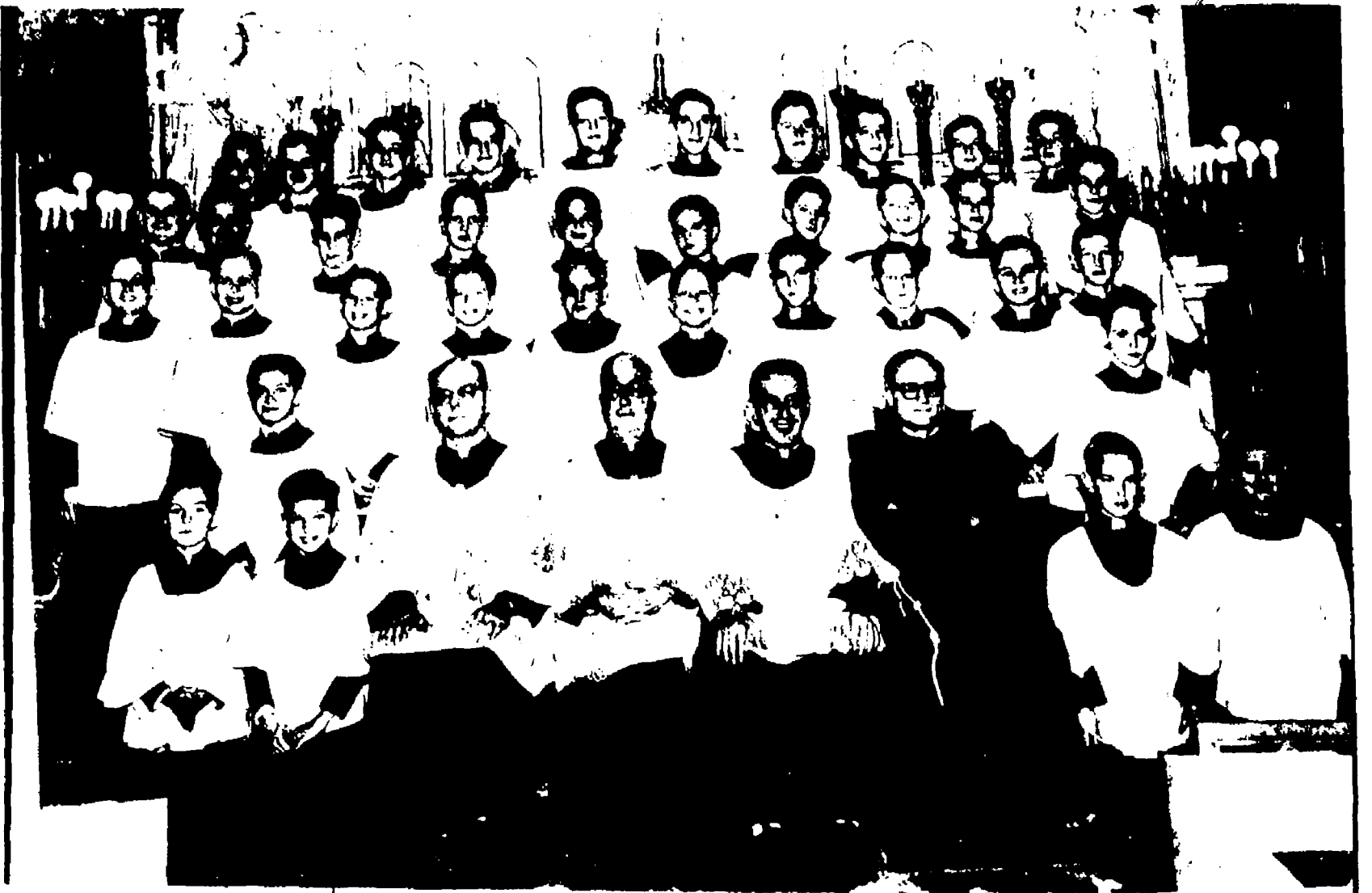

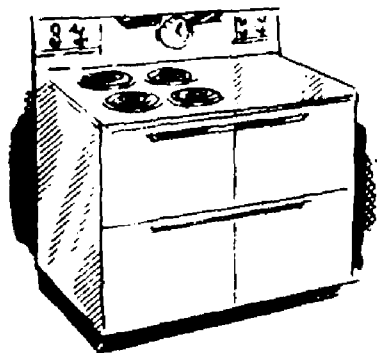

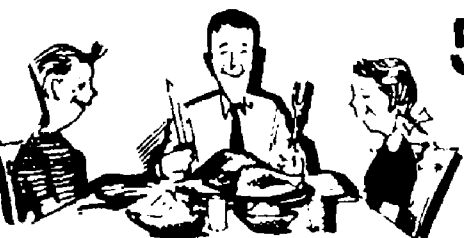

## Ten Commandments of Gunning Reiterated

With the opening of the annual upland game season on Saturday, the State Division of Fish and Game, Department of Conservation and Economic Development, today reiterated the ten commandments of gun safety in the interest of keeping hunting a safe sport.

In addition to knowing how to handle a gun and how to operate it safely, the Division urged hunters to help prevent forest and grass fires while on hunting trips. Because of last summer's drought and the lack of adequate rain since that time, the Division of Fish and Game emphasized the forests and fields are dry and could become ignited by a carelessly thrown lighted cigarette or cigar or by a neglected camp fire.

The Ten Commandments of Safety follow:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.
2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from Chamber before firing.
4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid horseplay while handling a gun.
7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backdrop is adequate.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting. Report all violations to a Fish and Game Warden at once.

The ten commandments of hunting were prepared by the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers' Institute to insure continual pleasure from the sport of hunting.
