

Valve System for City to be Discussed by Board of Public Works

At a special meeting of the Board of Public Works, to be held on Dec. 10, preceding the regular board meeting, there will be a discussion devoted to the program of gradual installation of anti-work of shut-off valves on mains throughout the city.

The valves according to Work Superintendent Michael Nagle, would enable his crews to shut off water in a damaged water main while repairs were made without reducing supply or pressure elsewhere. Otherwise, if a bad break did occur, the whole town supply would have to be shut down.

It was proposed by Commissioner James Duggan and Thomas Vall that only enough money be asked to be added to the budget to take care of one section of the city each year, and that the program be integrated with the gradual modernization of the water treatment plant.

Vall suggested only part of the proposed \$25,000 project for improving the water treatment plant be undertaken next year so that the valving program can be begun. He also suggested that the raising of the Ph value of the water, which in turn would reduce the acid value might be undertaken next year, and would be sufficient for the present as there has not been any trouble with the water for some time.

Other board members agreed, and compared local water with that in Atlantic City, where they had recently attended the League of Municipalities convention. Many reported that the local water tasted far better than that of Atlantic City.

Two South Amboyans Named for Mil. Academy by Senator Case

In an announcement made by Senator Clifford P. Case (R-N.J.), of appointment to the U. S. Military, Air Force and Merchant Marine Academies for the classes entering in the summer of 1958, it was noted that John J. Ploskonka, of 243 Walnut Street this city, was named as alternate appointee.

In addition to the appointment of a principal appointee and three alternates, Senator Case has appointed ten nominees to compete in final examinations for the class entering the U. S. Air Force Academy in 1958.

Among the ten nominees was Fred Farrell, Jr. of 146 Bertram Ave. He must compete again in the College Entrance Examination Board Test.

The Air Force will finally select twelve young men for the 1958 class from among the Case nominees and other named by New Jersey's Congressmen and Senior U. S. Senator, H. Alexander Smith.

The term of the Chief of the Department, Louis Nemeth, a member of the Independence, expires on December 31st.

Austin Stolle, a member of the Mechanicsville Hose Company was automatically advanced to the position of 1st Assistant Chief.

Bernard Mackiel, member of the Enterprise Hook & Ladder Company was elected Second Assistant Chief.

During the past month the report states, the squad participated in the Civil Defense Drill held in Highland Park in cooperation with the CD and Middlesex Hospital in New Brunswick, and gave a demonstration for the South Amboy Boat Club. They also participated in the South Amboy Santa Claus parade, and stood by at the dedication exercises of the new Saint Mary's School.

The squad members are at present taking a new First Aid course under the direction of Michael Szarga. The new course is based on the latest edition of the American Red Cross text book.

SOUTH AMBOY FIRE DEPARTMENT

On May 31st 1890, the South Amboy Fire Department was organized as a result of a fire which devastated a block on Broadway.

An organization known as Joseph Capner's Goodwill Fire Company existed at that time. The Independence Company and the Enterprise Company were formed at Rippowan Hall, Augusta Street, the same evening (May 31st, 1890), but in the order given.

Hand drawn apparatus was used at first. Then the Protection Company was formed. In 1904 the Mechanicsville Company organized, and in 1921, the Progressive Fire Company, all equipped with modern apparatus.

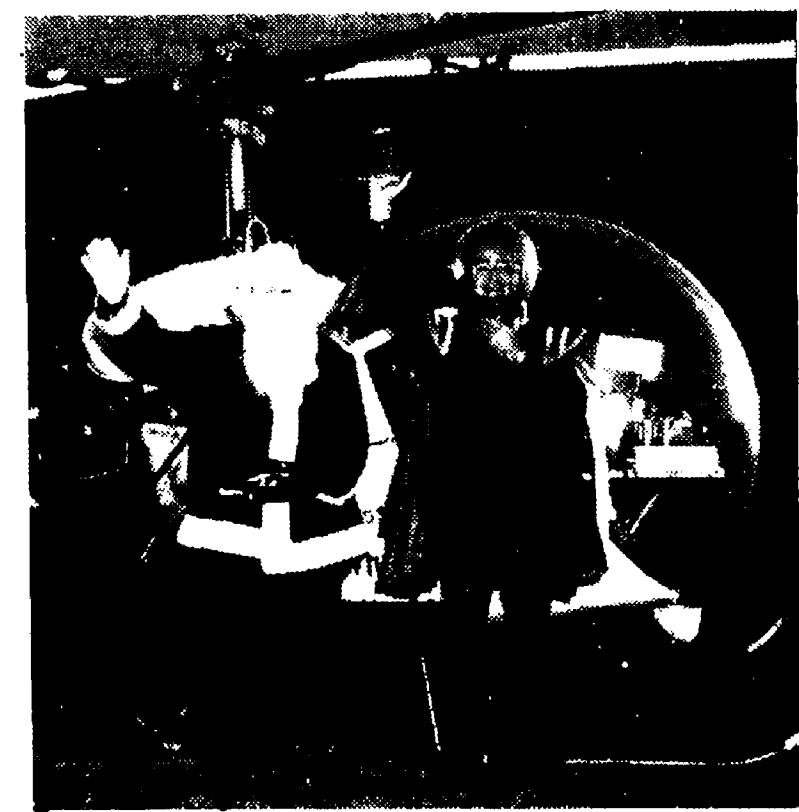
