Valve System for City to be Discussed by Board of Public Works

at a special meeting of the Beard of Public Works, to be held on Dec. 10, preceding the regular board mosting, there will be a discussion devoted to the program of gradual installment of anet-work of shut-off valves on mains throughout the city.

The valves according to Work Superintendent Michael Nagle, would enable his crews to shut off water in a damaged water main while repairs were made without reducing supply er pressure elsewhere. Otherwise, if a bad break did occur. the whole 40wn supply would have to be shut down.

It was proposed by Commissioner James Durgan and Thomas Vall that only enough money be asked to be added to the budget to take care of one section of the city each year. and that the program be integrated with the gradual modermination of the water treatment plant.

Vail suggested only part of the proposed \$35,000 project for improving the water treatment plant be undertaken next year so that the valving prostam can be begun. He also suggested that the raising of the Ph value of the water. which in turn would reduce the acid value might be undertaken next year, and would be sufficient for the present as there has not been any trouble with the water for some time. Other board members agreed. and compared local water with that in Atlantic City, where they had recently attended the League of Municipalities convention. Many reported that the local water tasted far better then that of Atlantic City.




College Admission Discussed at Hoffman HS

Donald H. Amick, assistant to the admission director at Rutgers' men's college discussed "College Admissions and the Offerings of the State University" yesterday at Holfman High School.

This talk was one of the series offered by admissions officers of the State University as a service to secondary schools and residents of the State of New Jersey. Part of a guidance and counseling service to supplement the high school guidance office, these programs make young people aware of the increasing complexity of college admission, and offer up-to-the-minute advice on college planning in general.

A combination of rapidly increasing population and a greater interest in higher education indicates that within the next decade several thousands. of New Jersey secondary school graduates will face a difficult problem of securing admission to the college of their choice because of increased numbers of applicants, or limited higher educational facilities in the state.




SOUTH AMBOY FIRE DEPARTMENT

On May 31st 1890, the South Amboy Fire Department was organized as a result of a fire which devasiated a block on Broadway.

An organization known as Joseph Capner's Goodwill Fire Company existed at that time. The Independence Company and the Enterprise Company were formed at Rippowan Hall, Augusta Street, the same evening (May 31st, 1890), but in the order given.

Hand drawn apparatus was used at first. Then the Protection Company was formed. In 1904 the Mechanicsville Company organised, and in 1921, the Progressive Fire Company, all equipped with modern apparatus.






