# Ordinance on Sale and Exhibiting of Obscene Literature, Pictures, etc. Passed on First Reading by City Council

Mayor O'Leary affixed his sig-Acting Atterney General. He will mature to an ordinance sponbe assigned to the State Highway sored by the Shade Tree Commission of the city, thus enacting it into law. The ordinance provides for the control, planting, protection and improvement of shade trees and shrubbery upon public highways, parks and public places within the city limits. It sets forth all acts that are forbidden by persons or a firm regarding the use of shrubbery and shade trees without the written permission of the Shade Tree Commission. Any violation of the ordinance will bring on a fine up to \$100 for each offense.

Meanwhile, another very important ordinance was passed on first reading by the council. It to one which prohibits the presence of illustrated "comic" books, magazines, pictures and publications of an obscene nature within the city that tend to deprave the morals, suggest lewd thoughts or excite sensual desires of those who come in contact with them. The ordinance makes it unlawful to sell, offer for sale, attempt to sell, exhibit or give away any such item or items, and sets forth the penalty imprisonment up to ninety days, a fine not to exceed \$200, or both. The ordinance will come up for public hearing and final not provided for in the budget. passage at the Sept. 18th meeting of the council.

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

Shade tree commission of THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONTROL, PLANT-ING, PROTECTION AND IM-PROVEMENT OF SHADE TREES AND SHRUBBERY UP-ON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS, PUBLIC PARKS AND PUBLIC PLACES IN THE CITY OF 80-UTH AMBOY, NEW JERSEY. BE IT ORDAINED: by the Shade-Tree Commission:

Sec. 1. No person, firm or corperation shall do, or cause to be done, any of the following acts upon a public highway, public park or other public place within the City of South Amboy without the written permit of the Shade Tree Commission:

(a) Cut, trim, break, climb wifir spike, disturb the roots of, br etherwise injure, or spray with any injurious chemical, or remeve any living tree or shrub, or injure, misuse or remove any structure or device placed to support or protect such tree or

shrubs. (b) Fasten any rope, wire electrical attachment, sign or other device to a tree or shrub or to any guard about such tree or shrub.

(c) Close or obstruct any open space provided about the base of s tree or shrub to permit the ac-

cess of air, water or fertiliser to the roots of such tree or shrub. (d) Pile any building material, or mig any mortar or cement

within six feet of a tree or shrub. . Sec. 2. Throughout the period of erection, or repairs of any building or structure, or in the improvement or repairs of a highway, the owner thereof, or the contractor, shall place such around all nereby trees on the publio highways, as shall effectually prevent injury to such trees.

Sec. 3. Every person, firm or corporation having control over any wire for the transmission of an electric current along a publlo highway shall at all times guard all trees through which or mear which, such wires pass, against any injury from the wires or from the electric current carried by it.

Sec. 4. No person firm or corporation shalf hitch or fasten any nimal to any tree or shrub upon apublic highway or to any guard er support provided for the same, or shall permit any animal to bite or otherwise injure any such tree

Sec. 5. No person, firm or corporation shall permit any brine. gas or injurious liquid or solid matter to come in contact with the stem or roots of any tree or shrub upon a public highway.

Sec. 4. No person, firm or cor-Foration shall provent, delay, or

interfere with any lawful work undertaken hereunder by the Shade Tree Commision, its agents or employees.

Sec. 7. Any person, firm or corperation that shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not more


Local KofC Council To Participate In Pilgrimage For Peace At Williamstown Sept. 16







It may seem a trifle early to herald the coming of Brotherheed Week which is scheduled to be launched during the week of February 17th to 24th, but according to an advance letter and particulars, received from Louis Seltzer, editor of The Cleveland Fress, the appointments of chairmen throughout the country are being inaugurated in advance for the purpose of putting the idea ever solidly.

A recent survey by the Daily News of Tucson, Arisona, brought out data that the editorial is claimed as probably being the strongest facet of most newspapers. The data denotes that 80% of men readers said that they were editorial page followers, and 72% of the women claimed the same.

ORDINANCE NO. 588 AN ORDINANCE PROHIBIT. **DIG THE PRESENCE IN THE** CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX AND THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY, OF ILLUSTRATED "COMIC" BOOKS, MAGA-BOOKS, MAGA-EINES, VOICE RECORDINGS MOVING AND OTHER FILMS, PHOTOGRAPHS, PICTURES, PICTURES, AND PUBLICATIONS OF AN OBSCENE NATURE: PROBLE BITING THE PRESENCE IN SAID CITY OF "COMIC" BOOKS, MAGAZINES, VOICE RECORDINGS, MOVING AND OTHER FILMS, PHOTO-GRAPHS. PICTURES, AND PUBLICATIONS OF LIKE NA-TURE GIVING ILLUSTRATED ACCOUNTS OF SPECIFIED CRIMES, STATING THE PRE-**SUMPTION** RAISED UPON DISPLAY OF PROHIBITED PUBLICATIONS, AND PROVID-ING PENALTIES FOR VIOLA-TIONS OF ITS PROVISIONS.

Whereas, the City of South Amboy, in the County of Middlesex and State of New Jersey finds and determines that there is a great increase in the numiber and variety of illustrated "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures, and publications of the type prohibity ed by this ordinance being offered for sale in the said City of South Amboy; and

Whereas, many such "comic" beeks, magazines, volce recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures and publications are designed and formed so as to resemble closely other publications devoted in substance to matters of humor and published primarily for sale to children, in many instances being placed for sale by side with the humorous publications; and

Whereas, certain "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures and pubiteations specified in this ordinance deal in substantial part with the subject matter of an obscene nature tending to deprays the morals of those into whose hands the publication might fall by suggesting lewd thoughts and exciting sensual desires; and

Whereas, certain of the "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures, and publications specified in this ordinance deal in substantial part with accounts of crime tending to incite children below the age susceptible and impressionable character, to commit crimes simtlar to or identical with those mentioned in this ordinance:

Whereas, the Council of the City of South Amboy, in the County of Middlesex and State of New Jersey deems this ordinance to be necessary and propar for the good government, of-der and protection of persons m said-City, and necessary for the preservation of the public safety and welfare of the municipality and its inhabitants.

Now therefore be it ordained and enacted by the City of South Amboy in Council assembled, and It is hereby enacted by the authority of the same that:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future; words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number indlude the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandato-ry and not morely directory. The word "person" shall mean any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company

or organization of any kind. Section 2. OBSCENE PUBLI-CATIONS PROHIBITED. II MAII be anlawful and a violation of this ordinance for any person to <del>sell, offer for sale, attempt to</del> sell, exhibit, give away, keep in his possession with intent to sell or give away, or in any way furnich or attempt to furnish to any person any illustrated "comic" book, magazine, voice recordings, moving or other films, photographs, pictures or other publications which, read as a

whole, is of an obscene nature. Section 3. CERTAIN CRIME PUBLICATIONS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful and violation of this ordinance for any person to sell, offer for sale, at-

tempt to sell, exhibit, give away, keep in his pessession with intent to sell or give away, or in any way furnish or attempt to furnish to any child under the age of eighteen (18) years any "comic" book, magazine, voice cording, moving or other films, photographs, pictures or other publication of like nature which read as a whole, is concerned with an account of crime and which depicts, by the use of drawings, the following crimes as Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey:

Section 6 HISTORICAL OR **PUBLICATIONS** LITERARY NOT INCLUDED. — This ordionanc shall not be construed to apply to legitimate, illustrated, historical accounts of crime or such hereunder. orimes.

Section . 7. PRESUMPTION PROM DISPLAYING. - M ANY publication prohibited hereunder shall be displayed in any news-stand, book store, drug store, market or other meros xtile establishment where the said prohibited publication may be seen by any child under the age of eighteen (18) years visiting such establishment, such display shall be prima facle evidence that the person in charge of such establishment was then exthe same may be defined in the hibiting the "erime comic" book or other prohibited publication, voice recording, photograph, nie-....(A) administering poisenous ture, voice recording, moving or other film and injended to sell, offer for sale, furnish or attempt (C) arson and other willful fication ex. to a child or chil-arning.

In default of the payment of any fine imposed under this ordinance, any person convioted of a violation hereof, may in the discretion of the court by which said person was convicted, be imprisoned in the county jail or place of detention provided by the municipality, for any term not exceeding ninety days. Each day that such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder. If more than one publication prohibited hereunder shall be offered, exhibited, kept or displayed in violation of this ordinance, at the same location by the same person, the offering, exhibiting, knepling or displaying of each separate publication prohibited hereunder shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder. If two or more publications prohibited hereun-Ger are furnished or sold at the same time by the same person. the sale or furnishing of eral

fense and shall be punishable as





# Putting My 'Knows' to the Grindstone...

TRUE HISTORIAN

Andrew N. Kvist is indeed a worthy eligible for our plaudits begarding his tircless effort towards preserving much data about happenings in and about South Amboy during past years. We are more than indebted for his magnanimous kindness in permitting us to use some of his records describing local incidents of the yesterdays. This is from a book on schools. School No. 1 and School No. 2 were respectively known as the Park School and the Raritan School. They were built back in 1872. The very first school was erected in 1853 and was known as the Christ Church School located where the present Episcopal Parish house now stands at the Corner of Broadway and Main Street.

Some of the old desks used in the beginning may still be found in the basement of the Parish House. In the late fifties or early sixties, another private school was begun in the basement of the surrent Presbyterian Church located in Broadway, and a Mrs. Brown was the only teacher for a class of about fifty pupils. Although the schools, at that time, were private, they were nevertheless non-sectarian. Among some of the students remembered se having been in the latter school were the late Abraham Everitt. William Bogert, N. N. Pearce. More regarding the old schools will follow from time to time.

PERLATELY OFTEN A BACK-DOOR TO DATA

Blame it on stamp collecting that the hotel officials in Camfien, New Jersey, claimed they were sold out for Labor Day, the date on which the new commemorative postage paying tribute to "Leber" was first issued in that city. High ranking administration officials attended the ceremonies. Stamp collectors and dealers flocked to Camden from all over the country on that day. The late Peter J. McGuire, who spent the greater part of his life in Camden was saluted with fitting tributes.

Another interesting note, just brought to light, is the early history of the Johnson and Johnson Company located in New brunswick. During the years following the Spanish-American War in this country it was mandatory that tax stamps be placed on boxes of matches and patent medicines. This was done with revenue stamps to defray the cost of the war. Because of the revenue stamp identified with Johnson and Johnson, much of the past history is revived. The proprietory medicine business began at No. 75 Maiden Lane in downtown New York. The door was two stops up from the sidewalk, and up a rickety flight of steps. A rolliep desk, two chairs and a pot-bellied wood stove comprised the furniture, and overhead hung a coal-oil lamp with a wide tin shade. It was the business of Seabury and Johnson estab-Mahed in 1867. It was in 1886 after some changes in the ownership of the firm that it entered New Jersey as a corporation with a manufacturing plant in New Brunswick. The stamps dating back to the early history of the firm bear an overprint with the name and trademark plainly visible on same.
