Ordinance on Sale and Exhibiting of Obscene Literature, Pictures, etc. Passed on First Reading by City Council

Mayor O'Leary affixed his signature to an ordinance sponsored by the Shade Tree Commission of the city, thus enacting it into law. The ordinance provides for the control, planting, protection and improvement of shade trees and shrubbery upon public highways, parks and public places within the city limits. It sets forth all acts that are forbidden by persons or a firm regarding the use of shrubbery and shade trees without the written permission of the Shade Tree Commission. Any violation of the ordinance will bring on a fine up to \$100 for each offense.

Meanwhile, another very important ordinance was passed on first reading by the council. It is one which prohibits the presence of illustrated "comic" books, magazines, pictures and publications of an obscene nature within the city that tend to deprave the morals, suggest lewd thoughts or excite sensual desires of those who come in contact with them. The ordinance makes it unlawful to sell, offer for sale, attempt to sell, exhibit or give away any such item or items, and sets forth the penalty of imprisonment up to ninety days, a fine not to exceed \$200, or both. The ordinance will come up for public hearing and final passage at the Sept. 18th meeting of the council.

At the suggestion of Councilman Charmello, members of the council and spectators present offered a moment of silence in respect to the recent passing of William Nehrkorn, former Councilman, Mayor and County Sheriff. Charmello also asked that a resolution of condolence be sent to the family.

The council received a letter from the Rotary Club stating their approval of request by Acting Postmaster George Stader for a ten minute parking limit in the vicinity of the Post Office on Broadway. The club also went on record as being highly in favor of the city providing a baseball field for the Little League. Councilman Vanderveer expressed his thanks to the Rotary Club for bringing up the matter, and with regard to the ball field, he stated that "it is already in the planning stage, and action would be forthcoming soon."

Councilman Jankowski brought up the subject of the continuation of Fourth Street, the disposition of the Fourth Street school and the smoke and soot nuisance present within the city. He stressed the fact that he had received many complaints from citizens and hoped the three matters could be given urgent consideration.

With regard to the continuation of Fourth Street, he informed the council that as soon as the Veteran's Housing development were vacated, the grading and continuation of the street would begin. He became indignant about the school building, and asked that it not be held off any longer. At the suggestion of Mayor O'Leary, it was decided that it definitely be decided upon at the next business meeting, and a time limit of 60 days be set for replies when it is advertised.

On the smoke and soot nuisance, he added that he himself was present one evening in the

vicinity of Dohaney Homes when a train was pulling out from the station after changing engines, and when the train was not more than fifty feet from the station, an enormous amount of soot was blowing about the area. He also said that complaints were again being heard from people regarding the blowing of tubes at the Jersey Central Power and Light Company. Jankowski pleaded for immediate action on these items, and was assured that they would be taken up at the next business meeting.

The council granted Albert DeLuca, proprietor of the Amboy Fuel Company, permission to erect a 15,000 gallon fuel oil storage tank adjoining his property on Route 35. They also accepted the transfer of Flenary Retail License No. C-4 from Ernest Angellio to Kelly's Sportsman's Inn, pending investigation by the Chief of Police.

An emergency resolution was adopted appropriating the sum of \$1,050 for the printing of bonds and advertising expense with regard to the sale of the bonds for the construction of the addition to Harold G. Hoffman High School, which was not provided for in the budget.

On the recommendation of Councilman Howley, a motion was passed by the council allowing the city to enter into a maintenance contract with the Ward LaFrance Truck Company at a cost of \$120. The contract would provide maintenance service and inspections on the three Ward LaFrance fire trucks in use in the city.

Councilman Charmello asked Council President Wisniewski what negotiations the city had made with regard to the sale of the homes in the veteran's housing project. He said that people had borrowed money and started paying on the loans, as well still paying rent which was causing a hardship on them. Wisniewski informed him that letters were in the mail to those people concerned, and a meeting was to be held Thursday night with the tenants.

Mayor O'Leary, in his remarks to the council, informed them that, with regard to the air pollution condition in the city, a service in Washington was available to municipalities whereby they would render research and technical assistance to overcome the problem. He asked that the City Solicitor and City Clerk contact them to look into the matter, as it may prove worthy.

The Mayor also asked Councilman Howley, chairman of the fire committee, to have an Underwriter Inspector called into the city to look for the possibility of lowering our insurance classification, since our protective facilities are now at a high level.

O'Leary also elaborated on the city's loss in the death of William Nehrkorn, calling it a "staggering loss" as far as the municipality was concerned.

Professor Jacob and Lucy Pomeran conduct a school for piano instructions, voice culture and singing in studios located at South Amboy and Perth Amboy. Beginning with the nucleus of a career in Poland, which expanded as they traveled through Austria, Switzerland, England and then the United States. They have taught vocations to students via an extensive range of experience in a rather wide scope of the world.

The Pomerans have both concentrated in many prominent places on the continent and in his country, and have also been associated with some of the better known conservatories. The professor confines his efforts strictly to the piano phase of music, whereas Mrs. Pomeran teaches both piano playing and singing.

The Professor has a repertoire of some 120 of his own compositions, some of which have been published and heard on radio. He has written a suite of various musical and semi-classical dedications and also a few concertos for the violin. One of his duets was acknowledged by the Royal Air Force in England. Although only eight years in

this country, the duo has progressed remarkably well in their field since music is generally known to speak for itself in a language all its own, and is soon recognized when possessed of the quality required for appreciation.

The Pomerans have become known for their annual recitals and concerts consisting usually of about fifty who attend their South Amboy and Perth Amboy studios. The Pomerans have also just aligned themselves with the South Amboy YMCA. In an endeavor to encourage an aptitude for music among young folks with aspirations to further ambitions for piano playing or singing.

The home life of the Pomerans concerns itself with a son and a daughter. The latter is apparently following in the footsteps of her parents since she has become inherently proficient with the piano and has already been presented in many features, such as radio, concerts and entertainment.

Music hath its charms and the Pomerans seem quite eligible and worthy artists capable of presenting the proper musical charms to a coterie of appreciative followers.

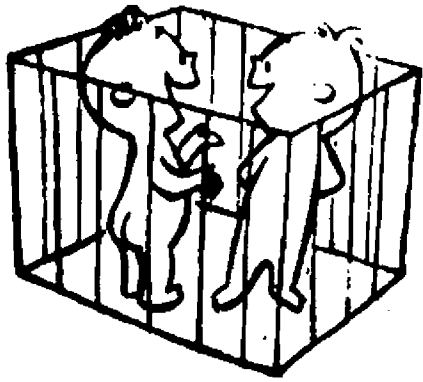

SHADE TREE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONTROL, PLANTING, PROTECTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF SHADE TREES AND SHRUBBERY UPON THE PUBLIC HIGHWAYS, PUBLIC PARKS AND PUBLIC PLACES IN THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY, NEW JERSEY.
BE IT ORDAINED: by the Shade Tree Commission:

Sec. 1. No person, firm or corporation shall do, or cause to be done, any of the following acts upon a public highway, public park or other public place within the City of South Amboy without the written permit of the Shade Tree Commission:

(a) Cut, trim, break, climb with spike, disturb the roots of, or otherwise injure, or spray with any injurious chemical, or remove any living tree or shrub, or injure, misuse or remove any structure or device placed to support or protect such tree or shrub.

(b) Fasten any rope, wire electrical attachment, sign or other device to a tree or shrub or to any guard about such tree or shrub.

(c) Close or obstruct any open space provided about the base of a tree or shrub to permit the access of air, water or fertilizer to the roots of such tree or shrub.

(d) Pile any building material, or mix any mortar or cement

within six feet of a tree or shrub.
Sec. 2. Throughout the period of erection, or repairs of any building or structure, or in the improvement or repairs of a highway, the owner thereof, or the contractor, shall place such around all nearby trees on the public highways, as shall effectually prevent injury to such trees.

Sec. 3. Every person, firm or corporation having control over any wire for the transmission of an electric current along a public highway shall at all times guard all trees through which or near which, such wires pass, against any injury from the wires or from the electric current carried by it.

Sec. 4. No person, firm or corporation shall hitch or fasten any animal to any tree or shrub upon a public highway or to any guard or support provided for the same, or shall permit any animal to bite or otherwise injure any such tree or shrub.

Sec. 5. No person, firm or corporation shall permit any brine, gas or injurious liquid or solid matter to come in contact with the stem or roots of any tree or shrub upon a public highway.

Sec. 6. No person, firm or corporation shall prevent, delay, or

interfere with any lawful work undertaken hereunder by the Shade Tree Commission, its agents or employees.

Sec. 7. Any person, firm or corporation that shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine of not more

than one hundred dollars, to be determined by the Municipal Magistrate. Each twenty-four hours of continued violation of this Ordinance after a complaint is made shall constitute a separate offense.

Sec. 8. This Ordinance shall be enforced by proceedings, process, and practice in the same manner as provided by law for the enforcement of ordinances of the City Council of the City of South Amboy.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as required by law.

The local council will conduct their Prayers-for-Peace services this Thursday at St. Mary's Church, 7:30 p.m.

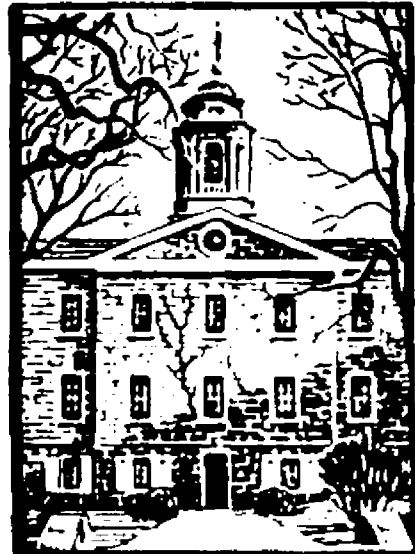

**MAKE THE HOOD BROAD ENOUGH
SO ALL MAY STAND UNDER IT!**

It may seem a trifle early to herald the coming of Brotherhood Week which is scheduled to be launched during the week of February 17th to 24th, but according to an advance letter and particularly received from Louis Seltzer, editor of The Cleveland Press, the appointments of chairmen throughout the country are being inaugurated in advance for the purpose of putting the idea over solidly.

A recent survey by the Daily News of Tucson, Arizona, brought out data that the editorial is claimed as probably being the strongest facet of most newspapers. The data denotes that 80% of men readers said that they were editorial page followers, and 72% of the women claimed the same.

Editorials can do much for Brotherhood Week, and will do a great deal for so great a humane cause. It translates into meaning that enmity should be eliminated and love for one's neighbor should prove more than just an idea.

ORDINANCE NO. 533
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE PRESENCE IN THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX AND THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY, OF ILLUSTRATED "COMIC" BOOKS, MAGAZINES, VOICE RECORDINGS, MOVING AND OTHER FILMS, PHOTOGRAPHS, PICTURES, AND PUBLICATIONS OF AN OBSCENE NATURE; PROHIBITING THE PRESENCE IN SAID CITY OF "COMIC" BOOKS, MAGAZINES, VOICE RECORDINGS, MOVING AND OTHER FILMS, PHOTOGRAPHS, PICTURES, AND PUBLICATIONS OF LIKE NATURE GIVING ILLUSTRATED ACCOUNTS OF SPECIFIED CRIMES, STATING THE PRESUMPTION RAISED UPON DISPLAY OF PROHIBITED PUBLICATIONS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF ITS PROVISIONS.

Whereas, the City of South Amboy, in the County of Middlesex and State of New Jersey, finds and determines that there is a great increase in the number and variety of illustrated "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures, and publications of the type prohibited by this ordinance being offered for sale in the said City of South Amboy; and

Whereas, many such "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures and publications are designed and formed so as to resemble closely other publications devoted in substance to matters of humor and published primarily for sale to children, in many instances being placed for sale by side with the humorous publications; and

Whereas, certain "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures and publications specified in this ordinance deal in substantial part with the subject matter of an obscene nature tending to deprave the morals of those into whose hands the publication might fall by suggesting lewd thoughts and exciting sensual desires; and

Whereas, certain of the "comic" books, magazines, voice recordings, moving and other films, photographs, pictures, and publications specified in this ordinance deal in substantial part with accounts of crime tending to incite children below the age of eighteen (18) years, being of susceptible and impressionable character, to commit crimes similar to or identical with those mentioned in this ordinance; and

Whereas, the Council of the City of South Amboy, in the County of Middlesex and State of New Jersey deems this ordinance to be necessary and proper for the good government, order and protection of persons in said City, and necessary for the preservation of the public safety and welfare of the municipality and its inhabitants.

Now therefore be it ordained and enacted by the City of South Amboy in Council assembled, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same that:

Section 1. DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future; words in the plural number include the singular number, and words in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory. The word "person" shall mean any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

Section 2. OBSCENE PUBLICATIONS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful and a violation of this ordinance for any person to sell, offer for sale, attempt to sell, exhibit, give away, keep in his possession with intent to sell or give away, or in any way furnish or attempt to furnish to any person any illustrated "comic" book, magazine, voice recordings, moving or other films, photographs, pictures or other publications which, read as a whole, is of an obscene nature.

Section 3. CERTAIN CRIME PUBLICATIONS PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful and violation of this ordinance for any person to sell, offer for sale, attempt to sell, exhibit, give away, keep in his possession with intent to sell or give away, or in any way furnish or attempt to furnish to any child under the age of eighteen (18) years any "comic" book, magazine, voice recordings, moving or other films, photographs, pictures or other publications of like nature which read as a whole, is concerned with an account of crime and which depicts, by the use of drawings, the following crimes as the same may be defined in the Revised Statutes of the State of New Jersey:

(A) administering poisonous and injurious potions.
 (B) atrocious assault and battery.
 (C) arson and other willful burning.
 (D) assault in attempting burglary.
 (E) assault to maim or disfigure.
 (F) assault with intent to commit rape.
 (G) assault with intent to commit robbery.
 (H) assault with intent to kill.
 (I) burglary.
 (J) false imprisonment.
 (K) kidnapping and abduction.
 (L) maiming, and, or disfiguring.
 (M) malicious mischief.
 (N) violence.
 (O) murder.
 (P) rape.
 (Q) robbery.
 (R) theft.
 (S) threatening or attempting to kidnap.
 (T) conspiracy to commit any of the foregoing offenses.

Section 4. INTENT WHERE TEXT IS NOT PROMINENTLY FEATURED. — It is the intent of this ordinance to include publications where the text is not prominently featured, but rather is incidental to the picture, being usually in inserts or "balloons" that indicate the words spoken by the characters.

Section 5. NEWS ACCOUNTS NOT INCLUDED. — This ordinance shall not be construed to apply to those accounts of crime which are part of the ordinary and general dissemination of news, nor to such drawings and photographs as are used to illustrate such accounts.

Section 6. HISTORICAL OR LITERARY PUBLICATIONS NOT INCLUDED. — This ordinance shall not be construed to apply to legitimate, illustrated, historical accounts of crime or crimes.

Section 7. PRESUMPTION FROM DISPLAYING. — If any publication prohibited hereunder shall be displayed in any news-stand, book store, drug store, market or other mercantile establishment where the said prohibited publication may be seen by any child under the age of eighteen (18) years visiting such establishment, such display shall be prima facie evidence that the person in charge of such establishment was then exhibiting the "crime comic" book or other prohibited publication, voice recording, photograph, picture, voice recording, moving or other film and intended to sell, offer for sale, furnish or attempt to furnish such prohibited publication to a child or children under the age of eighteen (18) years in violation of this ordinance, but it shall be competent for the defendant in any such case to show that no such intention existed.

Section 8. PENALTIES. — Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be punished either by imprisonment in the county jail or in any place provided by the municipality for the detention of prisoners, for any term not exceeding ninety days, or by fine not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00), or both, in the discretion of the court. In default of the payment of any fine imposed under this ordinance, any person convicted of a violation hereof, may in the discretion of the court by which said person was convicted, be imprisoned in the county jail or place of detention provided by the municipality, for any term not exceeding ninety days. Each day that such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder. If more than one publication prohibited hereunder shall be offered, exhibited, kept or displayed in violation of this ordinance, at the same location by the same person, the offering, exhibiting, keeping or displaying of each separate publication prohibited hereunder shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder. If two or more publications prohibited hereunder are furnished or sold at the same time by the same person, the sale or furnishing of each shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder.

Section 9. If, for any reason, any section or part of a section or provision of this ordinance shall be questioned in any court and shall be held to be unconstitutional or invalid same shall not be held to affect any other section or any part of a section or provision of this ordinance.

Section 10. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance, be, and the same are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage and publication as provided by law.

NOTICE

The above ordinance was passed on first reading at a public hearing held on Tuesday, September 4, 1956, and will be brought for a second and final reading and public hearing on Tuesday, September 18, 1956, at 5 o'clock P. M. at which time all persons having objections thereto are hereby notified to be present and present same.

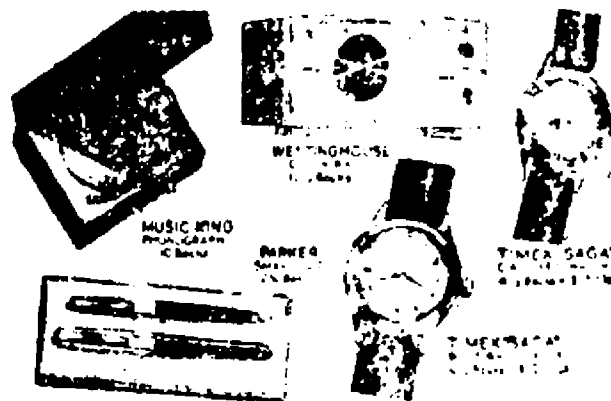

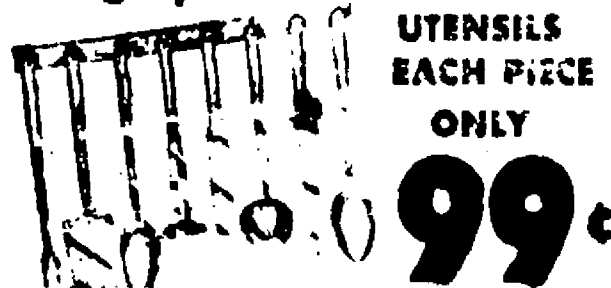

Putting My 'Knows' to the Grindstone...

TRUE HISTORIAN

Andrew N. Kvist is indeed a worthy eligible for our plaudits regarding his tireless effort towards preserving much data about happenings in and about South Amboy during past years. We are more than indebted for his magnanimous kindness in permitting us to use some of his records describing local incidents of the yesterdays. This is from a book on schools. School No. 1 and School No. 2 were respectively known as the Park School and the Earlton School. They were built back in 1872. The very first school was erected in 1853 and was known as the Christ Church School located where the present Episcopal Parish house now stands at the Corner of Broadway and Main Street.

Some of the old desks used in the beginning may still be found in the basement of the Parish House. In the late fifties or early sixties, another private school was begun in the basement of the current Presbyterian Church located in Broadway, and a Mrs. Brown was the only teacher for a class of about fifty pupils. Although the schools, at that time, were private, they were nevertheless non-sectarian. Among some of the students remembered as having been in the latter school were the late Abraham Everitt, William Bogert, N. N. Pearce. More regarding the old schools will follow from time to time.

TRYING TO KEEP UP WITH PAR

PHILATELY OFTEN A BACK-DOOR TO DATA

Blame it on stamp collecting that the hotel officials in Camden, New Jersey, claimed they were sold out for Labor Day, the date on which the new commemorative postage paying tribute to "Labor" was first issued in that city. High ranking administration officials attended the ceremonies. Stamp collectors and dealers flocked to Camden from all over the country on that day. The late Peter J. McGuire, who spent the greater part of his life in Camden was saluted with fitting tributes.

Another interesting note, just brought to light, is the early history of the Johnson and Johnson Company located in New Brunswick. During the years following the Spanish-American War in this country it was mandatory that tax stamps be placed on boxes of matches and patent medicines. This was done with revenue stamps to defray the cost of the war. Because of the revenue stamp identified with Johnson and Johnson, much of the past history is revived. The proprietary medicine business began at No. 75 Malden Lane in downtown New York. The door was two steps up from the sidewalk, and up a rickety flight of steps. A rolltop desk, two chairs and a pot-bellied wood stove comprised the furniture, and overhead hung a coal-oil lamp with a wide tin shade. It was the business of Seabury and Johnson established in 1887. It was in 1888 after some changes in the ownership of the firm that it entered New Jersey as a corporation with a manufacturing plant in New Brunswick. The stamps dating back to the early history of the firm bear an overprint with the name and trademark plainly visible on same.

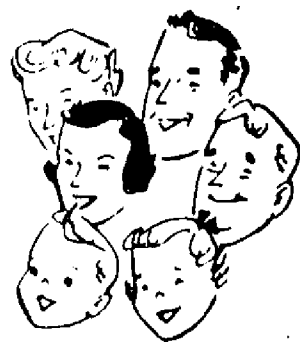

SECOND WARD—Second District

Beginning at a point in the center line of Stockton Street and the center line of Second Street; thence (1) easterly along the center line of Second Street to its easterly extremity; thence (2) by the same course produced to the shore of the Raritan Bay; thence (3) southerly along Raritan Bay to the center line of David Street; thence (4) westerly along the center line of David Street to the center line of Stevens Avenue; thence (5) northerly along the center line of Stevens Avenue to a point opposite the northerly line of Block 28; thence (6) easterly along the northerly line of Block 28 to the center line of Stockton Street; thence (7) northerly along the center line of Stockton Street to the place of beginning.

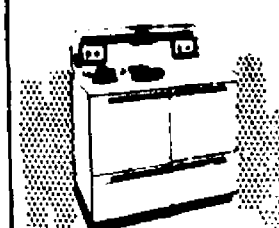

Hercules Powder Co. to Undertake New Venture

James W. Cleary, 10 Radcliffe Avenue, Highland Park, assistant manager of the Parlin plant of Hercules Powder Company, will undertake new work on methyl methacrylate in Wilmington, Delaware. Hercules recently announced plans for a plant for the manufacture of methyl methacrylate to be built by the company and Imperial Chemical Industries Ltd. of England.

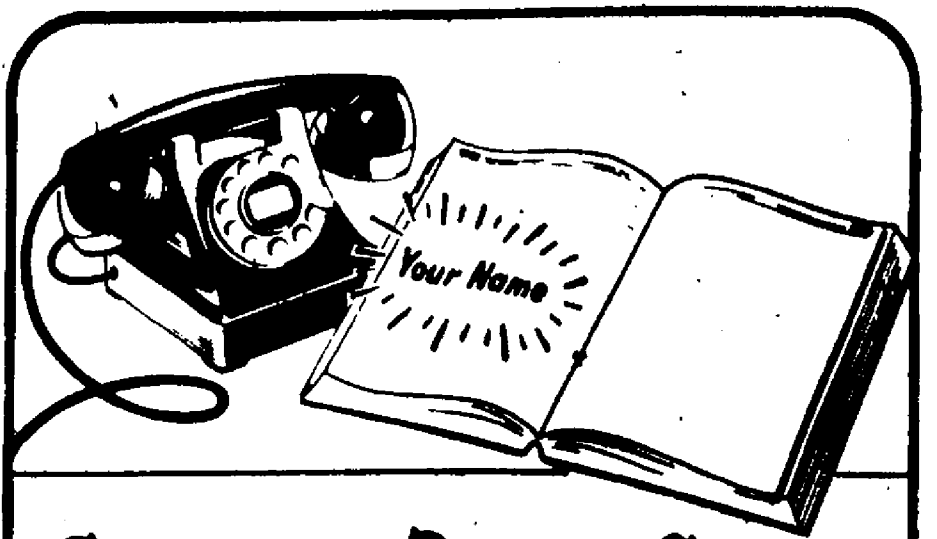

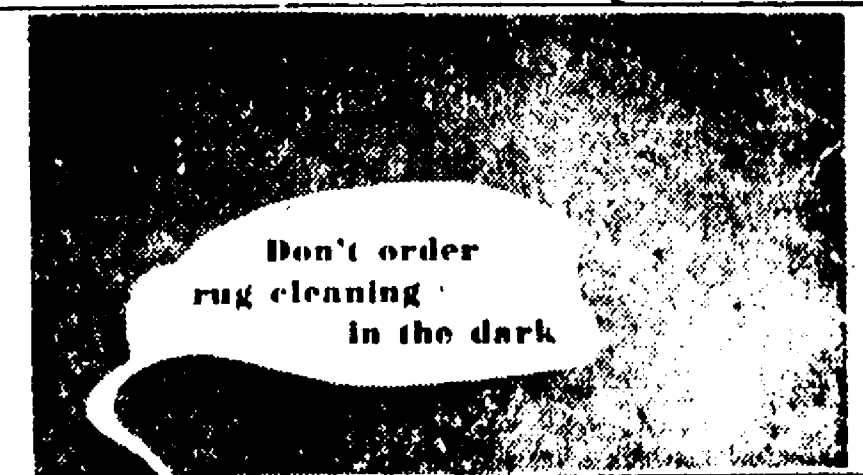

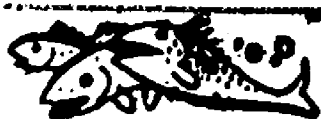
