

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS REJECTS FIRM'S FINAL REQUEST FOR PAYMENT

The objections to payment of a bill to Piersaj-Pine Manufacturing Co. of Oaks, Pa., for work performed at the local water treatment plant came to a head at the meeting of the board Tuesday. Action followed a letter from the firm in the form of a final request for payment.

The board members unanimously voted to counter the request by agreeing to make a final settlement of \$3,109.00. This amount has been represented by the board as a fair remuneration in view of the fact that the firm did not conform to the specifications of the work contract.

The total contract appropriation was \$27,945.00 for general revision work at the plant. A good part of this sum has already been paid for by the board and the balance remained disputable. The controversy centers around a caustic tank construction which was erected by the firm inside the plant contrary to the specifications. Board members maintain that the contract called for an exterior tank and that the firm took it upon itself to put the tank on the inside.

Notification of the board's decision is being forwarded to the firm by the board clerk. In it the board is stating that it is allowing \$500 for the work performed on the caustic tank instead of the \$1800 firm is asking for. As to the firm's request that the work be considered accepted, the board replied that as far as it is concerned the job is incomplete.

Pipe Alterations to Control Flooding

Supt. Michael Nagle was permitted his discretion in replacing an 8-inch pipe line located at the sewage disposal plant with a 12-inch length of terra cotta conveyor 110 feet long and 12-inch cast iron pipe. The new piping, to be situated between the two clarifiers and the detention chamber, is intended to give more outflow capacity to the system.

During heavy rainfalls, board member Thomas Vail explained, the 8-inch line is incapable of handling the surge of water flowing through it resulting in a flooding condition. He was apprehensive that the state would file a complaint against the city for this condition. Construction costs are expected to total \$1,660.70.

In another matter the board awarded a contract to Norman Mortel, a Sayreville engineer, to connect automatic equipment for chlorine treatment of water at the water treatment plant. The work is to cost \$235 for the equipment and \$50 for the installation.

The board voted to delay a decision on an offer to

purchase an electronic pipe locator and leak finder pending further study. It was remarked by Vail that at the moment such an instrument is not needed although it is needed very badly when the occasion arises. The offer was made by the Joseph G. Pollard Co. of New Hyde Park, N. Y., for a cost of \$395.00.

February-March Monies Reported

A report submitted by Supt. Michael Nagle gave the following figures for income and expenses for the months of February and March:

Collections made during February were \$16,272.73 and during March \$10,351.54 for a two-month total of \$26,624.27. This compares to \$14,969.17 and \$10,874.40 for February-March 1959, or a total of \$25,843.57.

Expenses during February reached \$13,000.08 and during March \$5,641.26 for a total of \$18,641.34. The totals for the corresponding periods in 1959 were \$15,025.45, \$5,990.84 and \$21,016.29.

Sewer Disposal Plant expenses for March were (wages) \$2,177.42 and (materials) \$1,354.54. For February they were \$4,553.47 and \$2,153.18 respectively.

JCP&L Co. was granted approval for removal of 474 feet of overhead conductor in the lower Main St. area. A rebate of \$7.11 was made by the firm to the board. The removal of the overhead conductor is part of JCP&L Co.'s program to improve the appearance and continuity of its service to the people.

Use of the Water Treatment Plant Park for September 9 was granted permission to the Kurtz Club.

SUPT. NAGLE DEFENDS CITY SEWAGE SYSTEM AGAINST COMPLAINTS

Several complaints and bills were presented to the Board of Public Works by local residents for damage and costs incurred from water seepage on private property. In almost all cases Supt. Michael Nagle exonerated the city system of any liability.

One complaint came from the Baranowski Market, corner of Henry St. and Pine Ave., over water entering the basement of the premises during the resurfacing of David Street.

Nagle explained that the contractor surfacing David St. hooked up to the hydrant at that corner for his water supply. In hooking up, the contractor did not turn on the hydrant to full force, so that there was "bleeding" at that hydrant and seepage into the Baranowski basement. The hydrant is operated correctly only when turned on full force.

Mr. Baranowski complained that the water had undermined the sidewalk adjacent to his store and that he did not hold himself responsible for any injuries that might occur from the sidewalk condition. The board resolved to hold the contractor responsible for whatever damage was done.

A second complaint was accompanied by a bill in the amount of \$40.00 for damage done to a home basement. In this case Mr. Nagle explained that frequently residents call in the water department when they find water in their cellars, blaming the condition on the sewer system.

More often than not, Mr. Nagle said, the water is the result of surface drainage and not a faulty sewer condition. Another source of malfunction, he added, is faulty home plumbing.

The City Not a Welfare State

In residents calling the water department, Mr. Nagle remarked, he is obliged to send employees to investigate lest the city have claims filed against it. Sometimes, he declared, these calls come during the night when employees sent to investigate have to be paid overtime and double-time pay. If the investigation proves that the city is not responsible for whatever condition the caller complains about, he said, the resident is liable for the costs.

"We must take a stand on this," Mr. Nagle said. "The city is not a welfare state that it has to pay for all the work its employees are called in to do. Frequently the condition is traced to home plumbing defects and not the sewer system."

Mr. Nagle also reported that now more than ever residents are dumping grease and different kinds of detergents into the sanitary system which clogs up the lines since manufacturers have not come up with solvents which will dissolve all the deposits. He said that his department is encountering much trouble on account of this practice, particularly with the city sewers.

On motion made by James Dugan, Supt. Nagle was given approval to use his discretion on calls of complaint made by residents.

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Camp Sayreville to Accept 200 Children

Mrs. F. Losyk, chairman of the Day Camp Committee of the Perth Amboy YMCA announced that both Camp Sayreville and Camp Williams have almost completed hiring their staffs for the 1960 camp season. At a meeting of the Day Camp Committee last night it was announced that Camp Williams would be restricted to 350 campers per period and Camp Sayreville to 200 a camp period. As this release appears, day camp brochures are in the process of being mailed to some 2,000 children in the Raritan Bay Area, both former campers and people who have requested applications and brochures.

Mrs. Losyk urged that people desiring to send their children to camp register them early and recommended that parents interested in more than 2 weeks if their children enjoy it register them now for additional periods. CITY TO PARTICIPATE IN CD DRILL

John Szatkowski, local civil defense and disaster commissioner announced that South Amboy will participate in a nationwide three-day civil defense drill which will be held May 3-5.

On Tuesday evening, at 6:30 o'clock the city's fire companies will participate in a water pumping drill from the Raritan Bay, which is the only source of water should the local water supply be incapacitated.

Thomas S. Dignan, acting director of Civil Defense, said the public will be required to take shelter for 15 minutes during the first day of the drill, which has been nicknamed "Operation Alert 1960."

He said all radio and television stations will go off the air for half an hour—from the time the first warning sirens sound until the all clear is heard. Instructions will be given to the public over the Conelrad Network (640 and 1240) on the radio dial.

Dignan said New Jersey may not be a target area during the pretended enemy attack, or may be hit by a number of imitation bombs.

He said pretended radioactive fallout readings will be supplied from about 4,000 communities throughout the nation.

The final two days of the exercise will be devoted to simulated evacuation activities, assessment of damages and utilization of remaining facilities. State and county civil defense control centers will be manned continuously during the 62-hour drill.

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GRADUATION PROGRAM READIED AT HOFFMAN POLIO, TUBERCULIN POLICIES SET

Senior students at Hoffman High School, according to Supt. James F. Tustin's report, are set to graduate Tuesday, June 21. Students have been measured for caps and gowns—girls for white and boys for black—and the two highest honor students have been selected to deliver the valedictory and the salutatory oration.

Included in the program is George Ruddy's three-piece orchestra and choral music under the direction of the music teacher, Miss Krakauskas. Class night is scheduled for the Friday before graduation.

The board heard Mr. Tustin's recommendation to have a senior student give an address in place of the customary guest speaker. Board member Andrew Peterson received the suggestion favorably saying that more students should be made to participate in their graduation exercise. Board President Joseph Herrman declared that he felt the same way, remarking that it is a night for the students. Upon motion by Mrs. Howard Ervin, the board agreed to leave the matter to Mr. Tustin's discretion.

Mr. Tustin also reported that registration of pupils for the September school term was held April 12 and that 43 children, 14 boys and 29 girls, were enrolled. Since a new State Dept. of Education ruling limits kindergarten classes to a maximum of 25 pupils, it is planned to have two kindergarten groups, one attending a morning session and the other an afternoon session.

Polio, Tuberculin Policies

A letter in reply to an inquiry from the local board was received from the Deputy State Commissioner of Education in regard to public school polio inoculations. The letter stated that 58% of state parochial and public schools have a polio program in which 82% of the students of these schools have had three polio inoculations. Only 3% of the students, the letter stated, object to the immunization on religious grounds.

The local board, upon motion by Peterson, passed a resolution recommending that new students entering the system be encouraged to obtain inoculations on the basis of the advice of the school physician, Dr. Fazio, and the State Deputy Commissioner of Education.

Similarly, it was recommended by the superintendent to continue the past practice of requiring all school employees and all pupils, grades 9-12, to be given a patch test for tuberculosis. A 11 positive cases will be X-rayed by the X-ray Surveys of Bernardsville, N. J. at a cost of \$50 for the first 100 students and a fee of 50c for additional persons.

The date set for the X-raying is Oct. 11, 1960 and the reading of the X-rays will be done by Dr. Silk of Perth Amboy. Students of St. Mary's High School will also be extended this service.

There were 8 new pupils enrolled during the past month. The number of pupils who left during the same period was 14. Teachers rehired for the coming school term were Woodrow McCarthy, \$5,600, Mrs. Beatrice Trooskin, \$4,600, Gerard J. Anderson, \$5,300, Mrs. Muriel Sample, \$6,000, Miss Audrey C. Teich, \$6,000.

The resignation of Patrick Grimley as attendance officer was received with regret and with the thanks of the board for good and faithful service. His resignation is effective May 1.

Playground Vandalism Continues

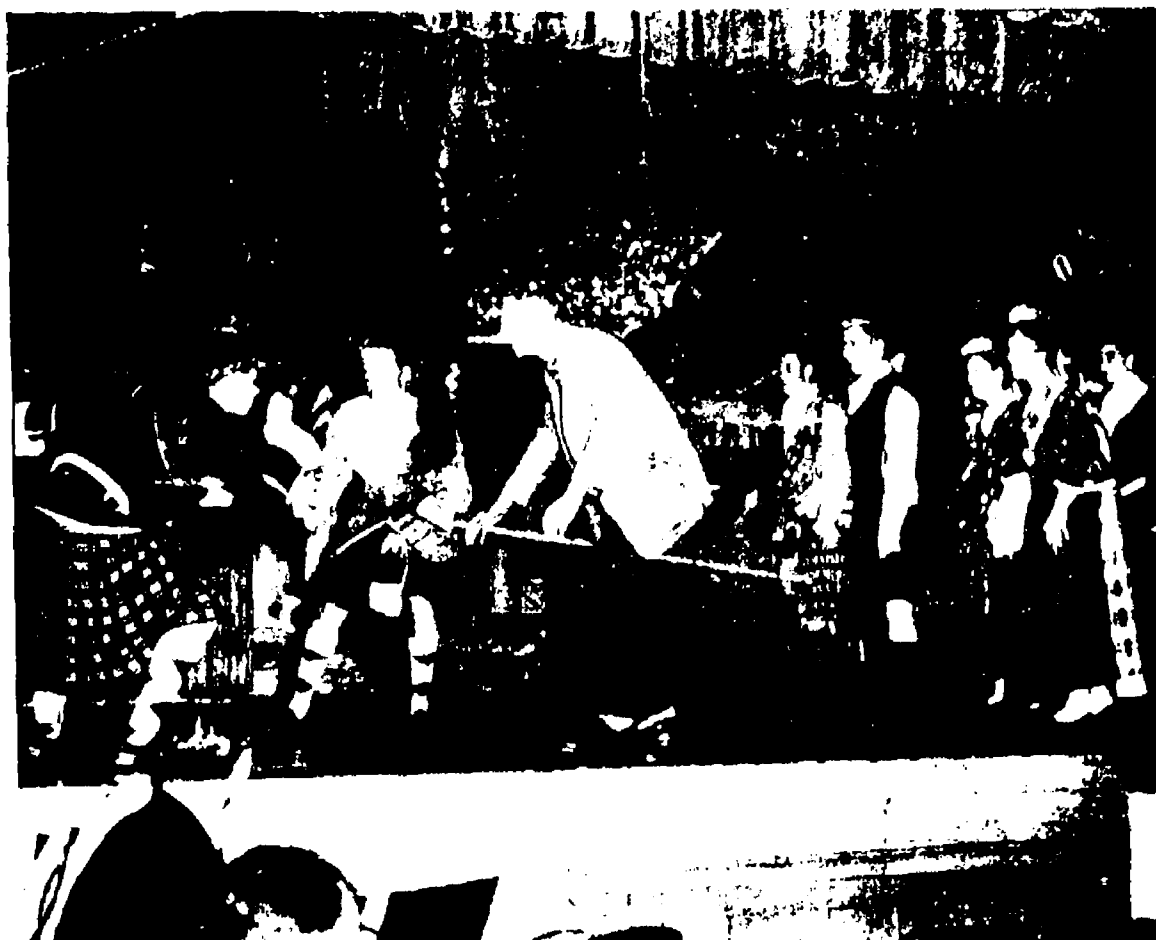
The board again heard the superintendent complain about increased juvenile vandalism within and around the school grounds. Mr. Tustin explained the manner by which students were discovered to gain entry into the school building and made some recommendations as to how entry can be thwarted.

Tustin said that four padlocks on fence gates have been broken and the chains bent out of shape by a crowbar or some other instrument. He added that grown boys have been caught on top of the annex school roof despite the efforts of the board to discourage such acts. He had a special police officer stationed in the area for three hours, he said, and reported that he was kept "quite busy" at his station.

Mrs. Ervin suggested that a high fence be erected at the kindergarten entrance from where the ascents to the roof are reportedly made. She said that such a fence will also act as an enclosure to prevent the smaller children from running out on the street. Mr. Herman and Mr. Peterson recommended that Mr. Dymond be contacted to make repairs on the fence facing City Hall. A survey of all classrooms was also asked for by Mr. Herrman to determine how many need repainting during the summer months.

Upon recommendations by Mr. Tustin the board voted to purchase 15 adjustable posture chairs for typing students at a cost of \$19.95 a chair. Mr. Tustin said that this price is \$4 below the list price. The number of chairs purchased is half of what number is needed for this class. It is intended to purchase the other half in the subsequent year.

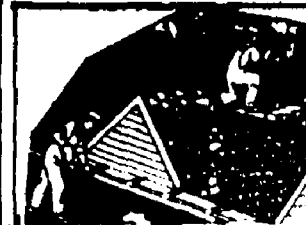

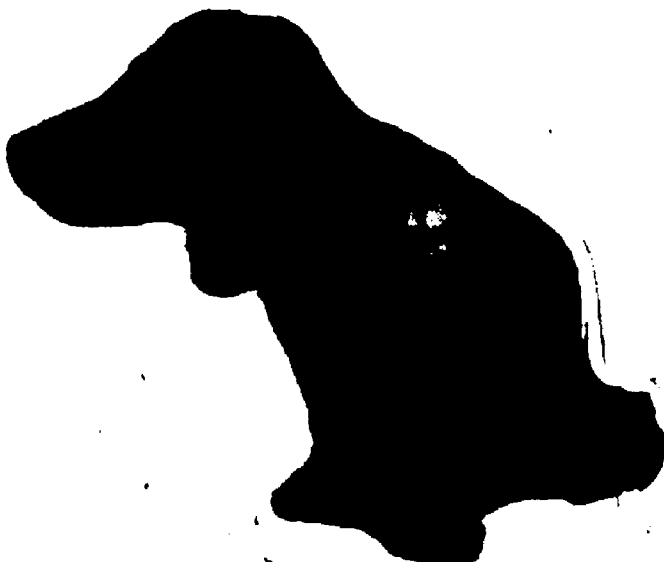

RUM CAKES POPULAR WITH HOUSEWIVES IN MANITOBA PROVINCE



While there isn't a gourmet in the world who isn't familiar with Winnipeg Goldeyes, a fish that is exclusive to the waters of Manitoba, housewives of the province pride themselves on their rum cakes as the dessert of all desserts. There's nothing quite like a Manitoba rum cake anywhere else in the world, they say.

While the Goldeyes, smoked fish, is a specialty on the Canadian National Railways' dining cars operating in the Western Provinces, the Manitoba rum cake, however, is to be had in almost any private home in the province. Here's how the Prairie Province housewives make their rum cakes:

- 1 1/2 cups butter or margarine
 - 1 1/2 cups brown sugar
 - 1 lb. dates
 - 1 cup walnuts, coarsely chopped
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 egg, well beaten
 - 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 tablespoon rum (or rum flavoring)
 - 1 cup boiling water
- Grease an angel cake or 8 x 8 x 2" pan. Cover bottom with greased wax paper. Cut up dates, chop walnuts. Cream butter and brown sugar until well blended; then add the dates and nuts to this mixture. Add the baking soda to boiling water, pour over the creamed butter, brown sugar and dates. Stir until cool. Add 1 egg, well beaten. Gradually stir in sifted flour and salt, beating until smooth. Add rum flavoring. Turn batter into prepared pan. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes at 300°F. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes. Remove from pan. Frost with rich butter icing, flavored with 1 teaspoon rum flavoring and 1/2 teaspoon mace. If desired, decorate with drained, halved maraschino cherries. FMS

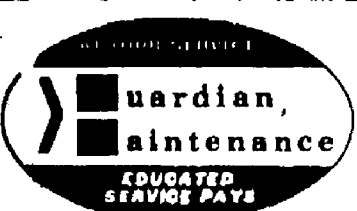

THE RUBBER INDUSTRY

In the last quarter of 1959 the rubber industry made its highest capital appropriation for any quarter in the past three years and currently backlog of capital appropriations for this industry are the highest they have been in three years.

Because of this vote of confidence in the future by the industry, we are led to believe that rubber stocks would be well worth looking at currently.

The tire industry has always been very important to rubber companies and this will continue to be so in 1960 as auto production is expected to be the second highest in history. Shipment of original tire equipment naturally correlates closely to auto production while there appears to be a continual growth in demand for replacement tires. This growth is probably attributable to the fact that there are an increasing number of cars on the road, not only because of the population growth but because of the increased number of cars owned per family. Since 1954 shipments of replacement tires have increased each year and a careful study of statistics relating to shipments of replacement tires as compared to original tires dispels the common belief that tire replacement sales decrease in years when auto production increased.

There are other interesting facets in the growth of the rubber industry. It is of interest to note that 1958 sales related to tires made up 58% of all manufactured rubber products, while 20 years later in 1958 they had dropped to only 50%. A further drop is to be expected as rubber companies diversify more into other rubber products.

Foam rubber and polyurethane are two fast-growing fields and today some of the major rubber companies are even entering into the chemical field, primarily plastics and synthetics.

We believe that any one of the big four rubber companies should qualify for investment portfolios at the present time, but we favor U. S. Rubber Co. In 1959 the company's earnings were the highest in its history and still higher earnings are looked for in 1960. Its capital expenditures program will be devoted primarily to modernization of equipment to improve its efficiency. The company has done an excellent job of maintaining a good operating ratio and the stock is selling some 15 points below its 1959 high.

Of the other major companies we like Firestone primarily because of its Ford business, which could prove important in 1960 and also because of its foreign business. Goodrich we like because of its wide diversification into chemicals and plastics and Goodyear because of its indicated sharp upward earnings trend. For the investor seeking glamor we suggest General Tire because of its 84% holding of Aerojet, which gives it a participation in the missile propellant field. For the individual interested in speculating on the future growth of the replacement tire business *Manfield Tire & Rubber* is recommended.

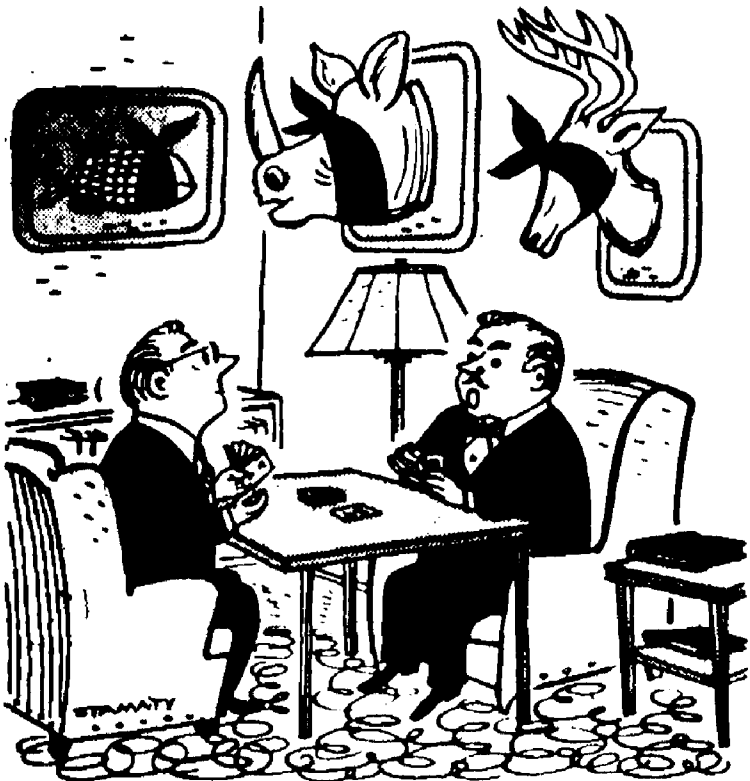

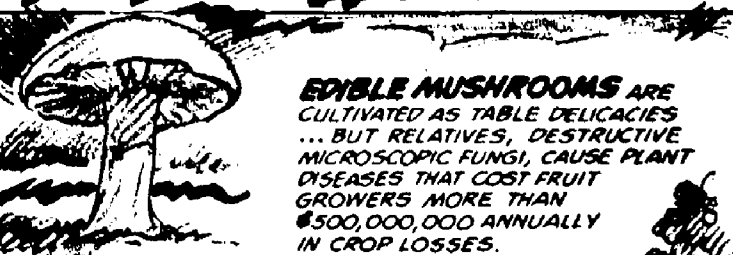
Math machine

Moon Taxi

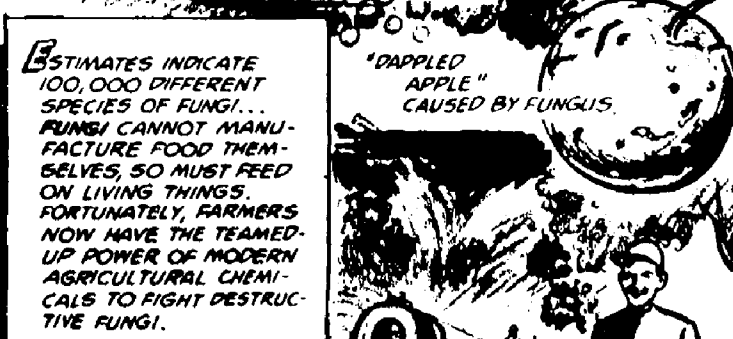
