The school's opening is planned for March 7 with classes to be held at Harold G. Hoffman High School. The brochures will be distributed during the week of February 14 and mail registrations may be made after that date to James Croddick, Director of the Adult School.

In person registration will be held Wednesday, February 23, and Thursday, February 24, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in the Hoffman Auditorium.

Among the planned courses for the spring semester are Ceramics, Oil Painting, Shorthand, Typing, General Shop, Home Nursing, Landscaping, Sewing, Conversational Polish, Modern Math for Parents, Physical Fitness, Public Speaking and Ballroom Dancing.

Prosecutor Commends Local Police Dept.

A letter from Middlesex County Prosecutor Edward J. Dolan commending the South Amboy Police Department was received and read by Mayor Richard J. Schultz at Tuesday's Council meeting.

The letter referred particularly to work done by the Department in investigating the murder of Joseph Wolyniec, Broadway, that occurred on December 27.

Addressed to Mayor Schultz, the letter said, "On December 27, 1965, a vicious crime was committed in your city. As a result of this crime detectives from my office together with the members of your police department, particularly John T. Duggan, worked diligently practically around the clock to solve this murder. As a result three persons were arrested for this crime."

"I personally wish to commend your police department under the command of Chief Edward O'Leary and I particularly wish to commend the outstanding assistance and performance to duty displayed by Patrolman John T. Duggan who worked side by side with members of my staff to bring this case to a satisfactory conclusion. I am very pleased with the cooperation between your police department and my office and I am sure that this fine cooperation will continue throughout the years."

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HENRY TO HEAD LOCAL HEART FUND

Henry is assistant Traffic Manager at Personal Products, New Brunswick and is President of the City Council. He has served as Heart chairman for the past 6 years. He and his family are communicants of St. Mary's Church.

Volunteers will call on their neighbors during the month of February. Henry's duties will be that of assembling a group of district captains to coordinate activities of the volunteers. The volunteers will serve a dual purpose. They will distribute information telling how to safeguard the lives and hearts of all members of a family. They will also receive Heart Fund contributions.

Proceeds of the drive are used to support research, education, and community services of the Middlesex County Heart Association, the only voluntary health agency here devoted exclusively to combatting diseases of the heart and circulation, which are responsible for more than half of all deaths in this country.

In accepting his chairmanship Henry stated, "The slogan of the 1966 Heart Fund Campaign is 'Give ... So More Will Live.' I urge the people of South Amboy to be generous when their neighbor calls upon you for a contribution to the Heart Fund."

Council Expresses Concern Over Possible Loss of Tax Revenue

At the regular meeting of the City Council, Fred Henry, Council President announced that he had written letters to Assemblymen C. Edward Grabel, Norman Lanzman, Guido J. Briggiani, Joseph C. Doran, and Senator John A. Lynch requesting their support and cooperation in defeating a bill introduced by Assemblyman Vito A. Albanese, D-Bergen. The bill, if passed, will divide the franchise and gross receipts taxes with the county. The county tax receipts will increase while the municipalities revenue will diminish accordingly. The City of South Amboy received almost one-half million dollars in 1965 for gross receipt taxes from the Jersey Central Power and Light Company which maintain a power station here. According to Henry, this figure approximates 63% of our total tax revenue. Any change in this tax receipt structure would result in a tremendous financial loss to this municipality.

Mayor Richard Schultz, commenting on the matter, stated that South Amboy cannot afford to share, divide or lose any of the tax receipts from Jersey Central to the county. He further commended Councilman Henry for taking the initiative on this serious problem.

Mayor Schultz expressed his gratitude to the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of the city for assisting in the transporting of the books from the old library site to the new library

quarters now located on Stevens Ave. and Second St.

Councilman John Connors reported that he directed the city photographer to take pictures of the damaged bulkhead which is located behind the local sewage disposal plant. Last week's storm practically demolished the bulkhead. He requested that a letter be sent to Congressman Edward J. Patten requesting state and federal aid for its repair and improvement.

Councilman Joseph Lusk made a request that the police enforce the law of light traffic only on Bertram Ave. With regard to the inclement weather we are having, he stated that the snow removal job is quite an expensive one and he urged all residents to try and keep all vehicles off the streets so that the plowing machines can do a more thorough job.

Confirmation in the form of a letter was received and read at the regular council meeting regarding the closing of Heide's Tavern Inc., 506 Washington Ave., South Amboy, N. J. Effective February 1, 1966 the local tavern will be closed for thirty days.

Mayor Schultz appealed to local citizens, especially those who have fire hydrants on their property or near their property to keep them clear of snow, in event of fire.

In other business, the council issued a resolution naming February 6th through 12th as National Dental Week. Transfer of funds approved by council were: \$250 to Board of Health, \$530 to Streets Dept., \$140 to Traffic Lights & Traffic Control, and \$600 to Municipal Ct. and Police Account.

Following the lead of our first lady, Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, who has said that beautifying America begins at home, National Garden Bureau's new slide program shows first a number of homes that have been made lovely by their owners. This is one of them. For details read the accompanying article.

In line with the beautification program sponsored by President Lyndon B. Johnson, National Garden Bureau, the educational service of the garden seed industry, offers a new program, "Plant Seeds To Make America Beautiful."

This is a collection of 35mm kodachrome slides showing how people in their homes, places of business and communities have used annual flowers to enhance the landscape. It is sent, complete with script, to any organization, for the price of postage and insurance both ways.

"Newest Flower Fashions," a 35mm kodachrome slide presentation of new flowers, including the 1966 All-America Selections winners, now is available in a 1966 edition. It, too, has a script to complete it.

Other current slide (with script) programs are "See What Seeds Can Do For You," "First Steps In Arranging Annual Flowers" and

"Ideas For Making Your Garden Gay." There are also two current quiz programs: "Show Off Your Knowledge of Annual Flowers" and "Mix 'N Match Vegetables and Their Flowers." A certificate for seeds and seed prizes are awarded to the three highest winners each time one of these quiz programs is used.

Organizations which have borrowed National Garden Bureau programs during the past year include garden clubs, senior and junior, women's and men's, 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts and Camp Fire Girls, horticultural societies and county agents, libraries, church flower guilds, Lion, Kiwanis and Rotary luncheon groups and many types of community organizations.

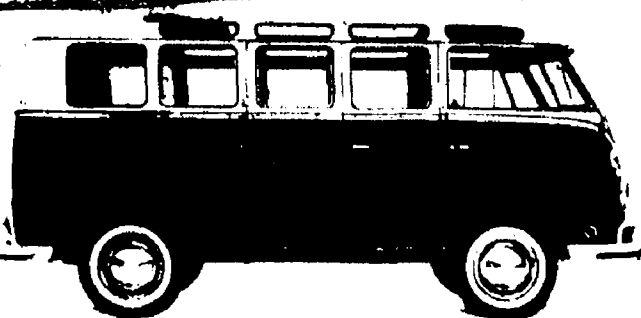

Federal Tax Facts

Employed women and widowers may deduct up to \$900 in child care expenses for certain dependents on their 1965 Federal income tax returns if they itemize their deductions. The expenses for the care of certain disabled dependents may also be deducted.

Costs for the care of these dependents are deductible if the care permits the taxpayer to be gainfully employed or to seek employment.

The deduction may be taken by a woman, whether single, married, widowed, divorced or deserted. A man is eligible only if he is widowed, divorced, legally separated from his wife, or if his wife is incapacitated or institutionalized.

Those expenses are deductible for two types of dependents: (1) Children under 13, and (2) someone who is physically or mentally incapable of caring for himself, regardless of age. The disability may be temporary or permanent.

The requirements which must be met to claim this deduction are:

1. The deduction may not exceed \$600 in the case of one dependent or \$900 in the case of two or more dependents.

2. Married women must file a joint return with their husbands and reduce the deduction by the amount that their combined adjusted gross income exceeds \$6,000. This rule does not apply, however, if the husband is incapable of self-support due to mental or physical cause.

3. Deductions are not allowed for the care of anyone whom the taxpayer is not entitled to claim as a dependent.

4. If the person receiving the payments performs other duties, only the part paid for child care may be deducted.

Document No. 5052, Child Care, which furnishes more detailed information on this subject, may be obtained by writing to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service.

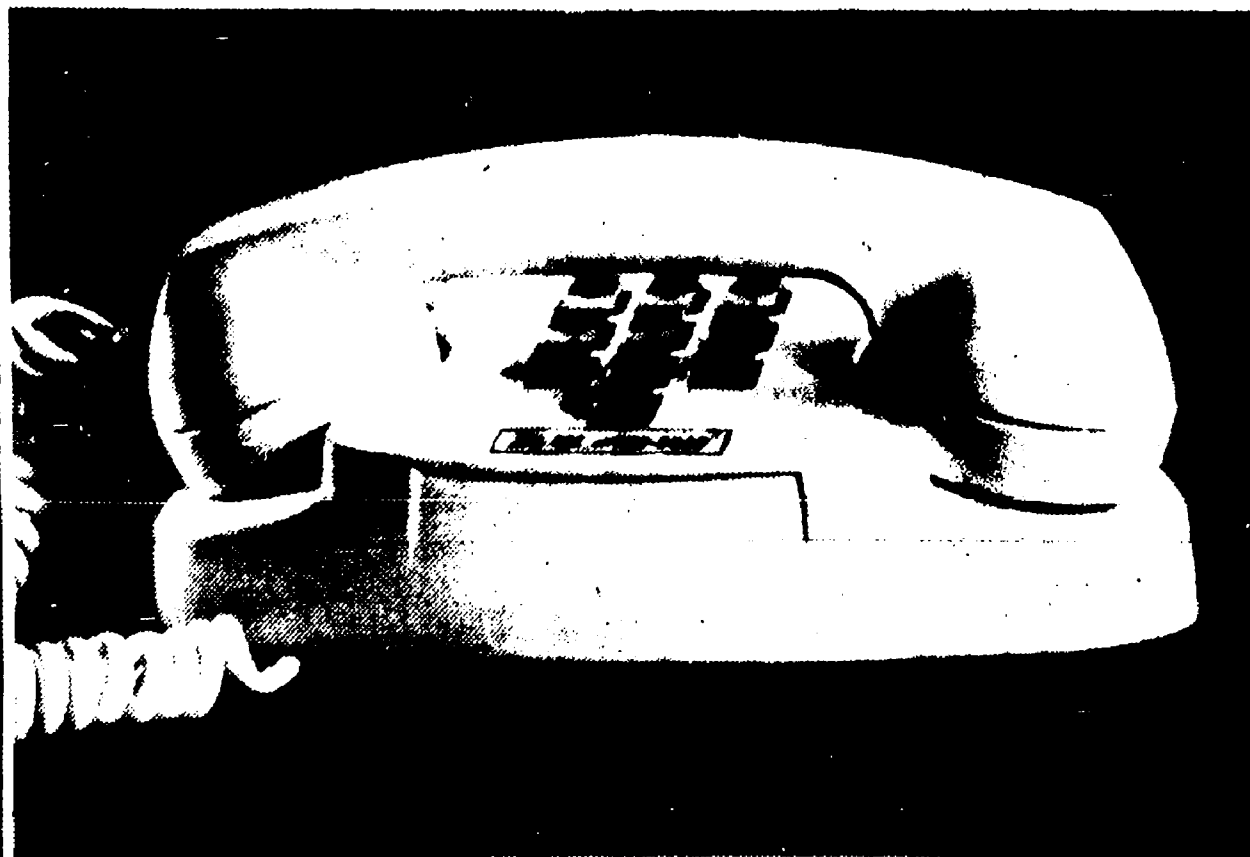

Social Security Office Helping Senior Citizens

One of the busiest places around right now is the Perth Amboy social security office where the people are taking claims and explaining the changes made in the social security law this year, William A. Fogarty, social security district manager in Perth Amboy, said today.

"There is one problem that concerns us," Fogarty stated, "and we are asking the public to help. This is: how to get in touch with persons 65 or over who do not receive social security or railroad retirement benefits. This is important because these people may be eligible for the new program of health insurance--sometimes called 'Medicare.'"

If anyone knows or is related to someone 65 or over who does not receive social security or railroad retirement benefits, please get in touch with a social security office or tell your friend to reach social security, if he has not already done so.

These individuals have until March 31, 1966, to sign up for the voluntary medical insurance if they want this protection when the program starts on July 1, 1966.

Fogarty said it is important for these people to get in touch with the district office to take advantage of the health insurance program. Although most people are able to visit the office during the day, many find it impossible to do so because of employment or home responsibilities.

Therefore, the Perth Amboy social security office at 93 Smith Street will be open from 9 a.m. to noon each Saturday for the next two months for the added convenience of residents of the area.

Job Safety Tips For Teen-agers

It's a rare teenager who doesn't earn a bit of extra pocket money by now and again taking on a spare-time job.

Baby-sitting is a number one favorite with the girls. Although babysitting is not a dangerous job, the New Jersey State Safety Council cautions that it is full of hidden hazards for the inexperienced teenager.

The Council advises that any teenager who babysits should keep the following safety tips firmly in mind:

Your parents should know your employers.

Before the child's parents leave, ask where they can be reached and when they expect to be back. Get a list of emergency telephone numbers.

Get specific instructions about feeding and bathing and what time you're to put the children to bed. Ask questions about such things as how the stove works, what foods to serve or what play areas to use.

Ask what safety reminders the children need most frequently. Find out where the first aid supplies are kept.

After the parents leave, lock all outside doors. Never open them to anyone unless you are absolutely sure it is all right.

Try to keep children, especially toddlers, in sight as they play. Never leave an infant alone with a bottle or a child unattended in his bath--even for a minute.

Keep a sharp eye out for such potential hazards as matches or sharp objects left within children's reach and toys strewn around or on stairs.

Should a child be hurt seriously, don't hesitate to call the doctor, and ambulance or the police. Never try treating anything other than a minor injury yourself.

If you smell smoke or discover a fire, get the children out of the house immediately. Call the fire department from a neighbor's phone.

When the parents get back, insist that you be escorted home if it is after 10.

Garden News

Did you add a worry line to your furrowed brow, sprout a gray hair or two as you looked out the window during this winter's first snow and ice storm?

Some of your ornamental plants bowed down to the snow load didn't they?

You did just right if you gently brushed the wet, heavy snow from your evergreens to help them spring back to their natural shape.

This is the best first aid for any snow-laden plant and especially the dense ones like Japanese yew or juniper, according to Donald B. Lacey, extension home horticulture specialist at Rutgers.

But keep hands off if the next storm comes as freezing rain and puts a glaze on your trees and shrubs, he says. An ice-coated twig or branch is brittle and could snap if you handle it.

The best treatment for glazed plants is to let them alone. They received their load gradually, and will lose it gradually when the ice melts. There's a good chance they will spring back to their natural shape.

Just hope there's no strong wind to put the glazed plant into violent motion.

You can earn yourself peace of mind by protecting such vulnerable plants as Hicks yew by enclosing them in chicken wire cylinders before winter sets in. Or tie up their many branches from the inside, to keep them from drooping under a snow load.

Trees with weak crotches and brittle wood can be made more durable by cabling branches together so they support each other. Let a tree expert or nurseryman take on this job, though.

RECREATION NEWS

The response for our new Umpires' Training Course has been very gratifying and it seems the boys in our town like to call "em" as they see "em". If you have not signed up as yet, there is still room for you. . . If you're a junior or senior in one of our high schools.

It has been decided that in our Little League this coming year we will start breaking in our future umpires by letting them work these games with our regular adult umpires. It will not only give our young boys a chance for experience but will also put them in a position to earn a little money.

At the last meeting of the Recreation Commission, we unanimously passed a resolution for an influx of cold Canadian air and we are happy that our neighbors to the North cooperated so that we can keep our skating rink on Sixth St. "iced up".

The Little League managers had their January meeting and it seems that we will be adding another team to our circuit, making a total of 12. The managers and their assistants came up with some new and exciting ideas for the coming baseball season. More about this at their next meeting.

STATE TO BAND BLACK DUCKS

Hundreds of black ducks are being banded this winter by New Jersey Wildlife Managers of the Division of Fish and Game in the Department of Conservation and Economic Development.

Waterfowl banding is carried on each winter by Garden State biologists in cooperation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This winter's program will continue through most of February or until the State's wintering duck populations begin their spring migration northward.

Black duck banding on the State's Atlantic coastal marshes is being emphasized this winter at the request of the Fish and Wildlife Service and the Atlantic Waterfowl Council. Stations have been established in the Barnegat Bay, Great Bay and Cape May County wetland areas.

The black duck is the most important species for hunting along this part of the Atlantic Flyway. Biologists expect to gain valuable information about migratory patterns and dates, terminal migrants, composition of the harvest by species, sex and age, separate populations of the species and breeding grounds.

The ducks are captured in traps which are tended at least once a day and more frequently in severe or threatening weather. The wildlife managers place a circlet of light metal around the leg of each bird and set it free.

Each band is numbered, and the species, sex, date, and place banded are recorded opposite the number. This information is sent to the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, operated by the Fish and Wildlife Service at Laurel, Md., where it is fed into data-processing machines.

When a banded duck is recaptured or shot, cooperating sportsmen will send the band number, date and place found and other pertinent information to the Fish and Wildlife Service, as directed on the band.

Cooperation of hunters is vital to the success of the banding program.
