

## SANTATION FIRM WINS CONTRACT

It will cost the city an additional \$4,900 a year for the next five years to have its refuse and garbage collected and disposed of. This was the contract agreed to between the city and Jersey Sanitation, Inc., of East Brunswick at the council meeting Tuesday.

Jersey Sanitation was the lower of two bidders for the contract. It offered to perform the work for \$324,500 over the five-year span, or for \$64,900 annually.

The successful bidder was \$15,500 under the bid of \$340,000 submitted by the firm of Peter Roselle & Sons and Fereday & Meyer Co., Inc., of Elizabeth.

Jersey Sanitation will complete its current five-year contract June 30 of this year. Under the terms of the present contract, the city pays for this service at the rate of \$60,000 a year. The new contract will go into effect July 1 and will continue until June 30, 1968.

Since insufficient money was budgeted for this account, the award of the contract is subject to the passage of an emergency resolution at the next council meeting, June 4, appropriating the additional money needed.

There were no dissenting comments from either the governing body or spectators such as followed the award of the present contract when complaints were registered of alleged collusion because of the submission of just a single bid.

Some officials and residents, from time to time, complained that competing garbage collecting firms agreed somehow not to enter one another's areas so as to guarantee an advantageous contract for themselves in their respective spheres. No situation was made in this Tuesday.

## LOCAL DISPOSAL PLANT ANNOUNCED

Because of periodic accusation from the state board of Health concerning the upkeep of the local disposal dump on outer Main Street, the city will engage a bulldozer once a week to compact the dumping area.

This step was taken in accordance with a recommendation from the state to either purchase a bulldozer for the work or to hire a private concern to carry out the directive.

To purchase a new bulldozer is out of the question, Councilman Fred Henry said, since it would run about \$18,000 or \$20,000, not to mention maintenance costs. Meanwhile, Henry said that adequate steps have been taken at the dump to correct the situation complained about by the state.

A resolution was introduced taking notice of state aid funds furnished to

the city by the state for road maintenance. The money will be used to resurface portions of Felton, John, Charles, Thompson and Catherine Streets and Bertram Avenue. The amount of aid is about \$17,000.

Another resolution granted Joseph Haiml a refund of \$44.61 on his tax payment, as recommended by the tax assessor, since he had a building to the rear of his home at 346 David Street torn down and removed from the tax rolls.

Also receiving action was an ordinance providing \$8,184.75 to be spent on improvements to the Conover Street playground and to the various firehouses in the city. Of this amount, \$4,500 is to be spent on the playground and the major portion of the balance of \$3,684.75 on the Mechanicville firehouse. The ordinance was passed on second and final readings.

A letter from the South Amboy First Aid Squad requested the city to construct a road adjacent to the ball fields at the land fill extending to the beach in the interests of safety. The letter stated that recently a patient had to be carried over soft sand a distance of several hundred feet to an ambulance during an emergency call. The matter will be taken up at the next business meeting.

Councilman John Howley disclosed that residents at Amboy Gardens, seeing city vehicles at the circle in their development, feared that the circle would be given a coating of tar. He assured them that nothing of the sort would be undertaken. Instead the city, in its beautifying program, mowed the area and planted grass and flowers.

Henry revealed that various other parts of the city would also get grass and flowers, principally geraniums and petunias. Howley also mentioned a request from Amboy Gardens for a fence enclosure of the sodded area for protection against vandalism.

John Coan, program chairman reports that blessing of the water will be held Thursday morning, May 30th with local clergy officiating.

The quota of 250 members has been filled and a waiting list is now established on a first-come, first served basis.

Harrigan stated that among the new additions to the club grounds are a patio and a new basketball court. Also new shrubbery was planted.

Albert Heim will be the pool manager for the coming season.

## Hwy. Hazards Heard At Council Meeting

A delegation of residents dwelling in the vicinity of Highway 35 and the ramp exits and entrance to Route 9 on Main Street made impassioned pleas to the mayor and council to do something about the perilous conditions that exist there at Tuesday's council meeting.

"The fuel truck tire Saturday scared us out of our wits," Ted Lewandosky of 117 Bertram Avenue told the governing body. "Some protection ought to be given to us living in the area," he said, stating that since he was instrumental in reporting over 100 accidents to the police.

"It's usually not the fault of the motorists," he continued. "The fault lies in the way the ramps were engineered by the state Highway Department. They ought to put up signs well in advance of the ramps to warn drivers. As recently as last Friday morning a tractor-trailer jack-knifed. The state should send down some surveyors to look over the situation."

Councilman John Howley declared that he had complained of the hazards there previously and had recommended that a letter be sent to the state highwaymen to do something about it. He read excerpts from the minutes of the Sept. 4, 1962, council meeting in which he had made his complaints.

"This dangerous condition has existed there for many years," Howley said, during the 20 years he was a member of the South Amboy First Aid Squad and afterwards. He said that other members of the squad, namely Councilmen Eugene Szesko and J. Peter Rush, can testify also to this fact.

Howley then suggested that the mayor appoint a committee to study the conditions and send a delegation to make complaints to the state. Mayor Joseph Charnello, agreeing wholeheartedly, named a committee even before the meeting adjourned. He named all the councilmen and three spectators at the meeting. The committee also includes Police Chief John T. Gleason.

TERMED "USELESS"  
Named to the committee

were Lewandoski, Peter Jancola of 106 Bertram Avenue and Steve Albany of 823 Main Street. Jancola recalled that about 10 years ago the state proposed to reconstruct the area which involved the displacement of several homes, but the plan, which he called "useless," was abandoned.

Jancola recommended that "reduce" and "resume speed" signs be posted well ahead of the ramps to make motorists aware of the dangerous traffic confluence on Main Street and its ramps. Mayor Charnello declared that the exit and entrance ramps were the sharp for safety.

"Three years ago," Chief Gleason added, "warning ramp signs were requested and within three days the state promised to put up large 15 m.p.h. signs in the area. Instead, only "slow" signs have been installed," he said.

Steve Albany inquired about the disappearance of the speed signs on Main Street. "Who removed them?" he asked. To this Council President Richard J. Schultz replied that the roadway is under the jurisdiction of the state and that the city has no power over it.

"What they need there are bright electric signs such as are seen in Newark to indicate the ramps and the curves," Councilman J. Peter Rush interposed. "The motorists realize only too late that they are approaching a sharp turn. They should be warned about the condition in advance."

Rush also complained about the entrance ramp to Highway 35 from Washington Road where motorists are put in jeopardy in squeezing into the stream of fast-moving traffic. Highway vehicles, coming from the north, are on an incline which makes the situation a very precarious one.

"People are constantly being disturbed in that area by car tires screeching up the sharply-curved ramps," Howley declared. The state, in view of the numerous accidents there, ought to erect a center barrier all the way from the Raritan Street bridge to the Main Street bridge, he said.

"ACT OF GOD"  
FORESTALLED DEATH  
Schultz maintained that it

was only an "act of God" which prevented tragic deaths and injuries from the blazing fuel truck Saturday. He highly commended the Fire Department, the First Aid, the Police Department and Special Police for their prompt response and in their work to prevent a holocaust. These units were also praised by the spectators who were accompanied by their wives.

The issue next moved to the sand truck traffic flow on Bertram Avenue. The matter was raised by Lewandoski who inquired what can be done about the trucks on Bertram Avenue.

Schultz, who remained at the fire scene with Fire Chief Chester Jankowski and Assistant Chiefs Fritz Lukle and Frank Conroy until after 8 p.m. Saturday, took up the matter by saying that the city is doing all it can to control the trucks.

"Only a few renegade truck drivers abuse the rules," he declared. He mentioned that soon Bertram Avenue will receive new signs from the state designating the street as light traffic with the permissible tonnage indicated on them.

Schultz said that the latter has to be included by law. Under the previous sign designation, Chief Gleason declared that it was impossible to prosecute. With the new signs a resident can take down the license of a violating truck and turn it in for police action.

He and Councilman Howley announced that the mayor and council will request a meeting with county freeholders to urge the construction of a new bridge on Raritan Street which would be available to trucks. The present bridge limits vehicles to 15 tons. Schultz said that PUC representatives will also attend.

The city officials discussed the situation with representatives of the Raritan River Railroad Monday at their business meeting. Also under discussion was a

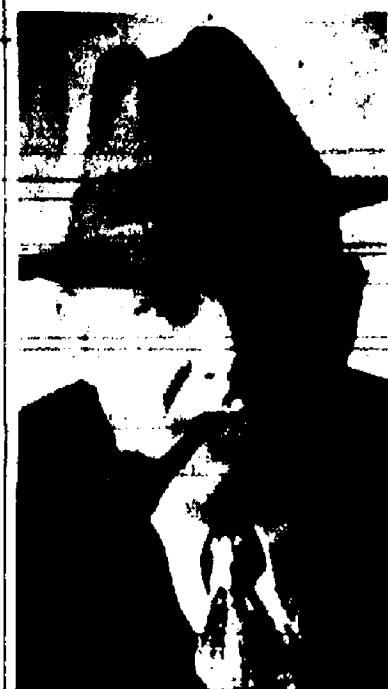
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Former Newsman  
Eulogized By Council

The mayor and members of the council expressed deep regret at the passing away of Milton C. Bloodgood, 256 Henry St., for many years the managing editor of the South Amboy Citizen and a staff writer for the Evening News.

Mr. Bloodgood was born in South Amboy, the son of the late Theodore F. and Alice Samuel Bloodgood. He was a veteran of World War I, having served in France with the U. S. Army 36th Division. He was a member of Luke A. Lovely Post, American Legion, and a former member of the South Amboy Rotary Club. He was also a member of the First Baptist Church.

The deceased, popularly known as "Wink," was honored with a moment of silence at the council meeting Tuesday following a motion for it made by Councilman John Howley. Other councilmen joined in the praise of the departed press man.



"He possessed a great love of and pride in the city throughout his life and news paper career," Mayor Joseph Charnello remarked. "He was always ready and willing to give praise to the city."

Council President Richard J. Schultz stated that Bloodgood had a vast knowledge of the history of the city which he frequently commented on and wrote about. All of the officials commended him for his services to the city as a member of various committees and particularly in Civil Defense during the war.

A letter of condolence will be sent to his family by the city. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bernice May Edwards Bloodgood; one son, Milton H. Bloodgood of Middletown and 3 grandchildren.

The Rev. Maynard Hatch, pastor of the First Baptist Church, South Amboy officiated at funeral services on Wednesday, May 22 at 11:00 A.M. at the Mason-Wilson Funeral Home. Interment was held in Christ Church Cemetery.

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## EDITORIAL

South Amboy Leads Way  
In Street Lighting

Members of the City Council and the Board of Public Works made a wise, judicious decision when they agreed to increase the illumination of city streets with new mercury-vapor type light fixtures. The small extra cost of the new lights is justified beyond measure by the convenience and the additional security such illumination provides.

The program of installing the new lights will be completed by January, 1964, Jersey Central Power & Light Company has informed. The utility firm initiated the program and then presented its plans to the city officials for their approval. It is a firm step in the direction of progress, we feel assured.

Unlighted or dimly-lighted streets are often invitations to vandalism, rowdiness, thefts and assaults, not to mention accidents for lack of adequate vision. Perpetrators of crime like to operate in substandard lighting where their actions are concealed.

Police say that almost three-fourths of the nation's crimes are committed on darkened streets. In our city we have had an occasional mugging. There have also been some thefts. Prowlers shy away from a brightly-lighted street for fear of being discovered and identified.

The cost in loss of money from thefts and assaults far exceeds the cost of the new lighting. Moreover, the incidence of complaints from residents about juveniles "cutting up" at night and disturbing neighborhoods should diminish, for youths also dread night illumination which exposes their exploits.

Greater luminosity will light up dangerous intersections and underpasses, spots which were once shrouded in the concealment of darkness. Residents from Mechanicsville will feel more secure while walking Stevens Avenue. So will residents of other areas which were previously under-lighted.

We are glad that JCP&L co. chose our city to install modernized street lighting, the first city to be so illuminated completely.

4. Evidence of careful planning and preparation for instruction.

5. Recognition on the part of the staff of community needs.

RECOMMENDATIONS: The committee wishes to make the following recommendations:

1. Greater emphasis on correlation between library and English Departments.

2. Establishment of procedures to promote the organization of a coordinated and sequential program of writing.

3. Expansion of classroom activities to develop the abilities of students in oral expression.

4. Elimination of penmanship and spelling as separate subjects and inclusion of these subjects as an integral part of the language arts program.

5. Greater expansion of the remedial reading program.

6. Closer relationship between community resources and classroom work.

7. Coordination between members of the English Department and members of other subject-matter departments to improve such basic skills as reading, writing, speaking in all areas.

8. Provision for a greater number of instructional materials, such as records, film strips, and moving pictures.

9. The establishment of more student publications, especially a newspaper, and more dramatic productions, to enable students to apply learned skills.

10. Greater familiarity of teachers with the tested and performance abilities of students, especially in the field of reading.

11. Students themselves, as English projects, be led into the field of simple research to study problem areas in school life, with such projects involving reading, bibliographic research, interviewing, writing, drawing conclusions, and reporting findings.

Dear Editor:

I was very interested in reading your column in last week's CITIZEN to the effect that the City Council opens its meetings with a prayer asking God to enlighten the minds and hearts of the governing officials so that their decisions will be proper and honorable. Now I find that this is certainly a very praiseworthy gesture - one to be encouraged and cultivated on a broad scale as an effort to counteract the creeping secularism, which under one guise or another subtly tries to ban prayer and the name of God from our public councils. So as Al Smith would say - I'll set the record straight immediately by saying that I heartily endorse such procedure. However, somewhere back in my early training I was reminded that "prayer without good works is of no avail" - and so I feel that any person who claims to be the inspiration for such a noble act - who stands and asks for divine guidance, certainly takes on a grave responsibility. From here on he must display by his acts, as well as his words, that he really means to act in a "proper and honorable" way. Having asked God to help him make "proper and honorable decisions" - he must think seriously before he turns his very request into a mockery. He must be motivated by the very highest ideals of fairness and brotherhood. He must shun vindictiveness - and pure partisanship. He must resist the temptation to turn people out of their jobs, especially those who are the sole support of their families - simply because such a person belongs to another party. Christ himself has cautioned us to care for the widows and the fatherless.

Along the same vein and to reiterate what has already been said - a person who is willing to take credit for advancing the cause of holiness must make this more than an empty gesture else we have naught but hypocrisy! In my book this would entail disassociation from the type of gutter politics that was slanted against me, in particular, one week-end last November, when the good people of the Pleasant Little City, returning from their Sunday devotions were greeted by a smear sheet, full of innuendoes, half-truths, and down right slander. And so Mr. Editor - it is my humble suggestion that we should do more than just pray for guidance - we should follow through - all the way! Let our actions be a reflection of our words - let us be motivated by the ideals of brotherhood and goodwill - which is after all - "prayer in action." Let us not stop then to the vindictive act - to the gutter politics - with the excuse that it's done nationally - or it's done elsewhere. This is here - this is a small city! This is South Amboy - a town of pretty decent folks - so let us match the deed - to the words.

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## TRUCK FIRE BLACKENS WIDE AREA

An ominous billow of black smoke spiraled skyward and engulfed much of the city Saturday at 4 p.m. when a fuel tank truck scraped against the concrete ramp railing exit to Route 9 from Highway 33 and sheared two of five tank compartments of the trailer.

The fuel, said to be of high octane gasoline, a point that was disputed by some firemen because of the heavy smoke it produced, began to leak out of the tanks in a fiery inferno which blackened the bridge ramp and much of the area around it. Tractor-trailer driver, Fortune Longa, 33, 248 Webster Avenue, Jersey City, became aware of the fire at the rear of his trailer by sighting it through his rear-view mirror.

However, conscious of the hazard of his situation in the midst of week-end traffic, he propelled the vehicle for about another 700 feet to a clearing in the highway and escaped from the burning mass just before numerous minor explosions enveloped it.

A passing motorist, Mrs. Jean Holton, 318 Henry Street, who was traveling east on Route 9 at the time, had her vehicle sprayed with flaming gasoline damaging the paint finish on her car. Within her car were Tim Holton, 5, and Anne Holton, 3. Mrs. Holton was taken to the South Amboy Memorial Hospital and treated for shock.

Protection Fire Engine Company arrived at the scene within minutes of the alarm followed by other fire companies. The fire, which began in South Amboy, was carried over the Sayreville line where the tractor-trailer came to stop in front of the home of Barney Novak on Main Street. His and other homes were sprayed with water to prevent their scorching.

Observers and witnesses said that flames from the rear of the trailer shot up to 100 feet into the sky, damaging overhead wires and disrupting telephone communications. Repairmen were on the job Sunday morning repairing blacked-out power lines.

Firemen immediately trained their hoses on the trailer to prevent the remaining three tank compartments from erupting. The lighter gasoline, burning fiercely, rode the streams of water into the sewer catch basins and continued burning underground.

A call for foamite was sent to Sun Oil Company on Augusta Street, but the plant was not in operation at the time. Finally Hercules Powder Company in Parlin was contacted, but the foamite arrived after the flames were extinguished.

On the scene also were fire vehicles from Sayreville and Madison Township. About 2,000 gallons of the fuel were transferred to another tank truck from the original tank trailer whose capacity was 5,500 gallons. The trailer and cab were completely demolished.

All along the route of the rolling truck could be seen

blackened curbing and roadway as well as singed grass and mailboxes. Sewer catch basins with their charred apertures peered weirdly catching the wondering eyes of motorists.

Near the ramp were patches of roadway where the concrete was chipped away from the intense heat. The blackened roadway began at the inclined ramp exit and continued for about four-tenths of a mile, nearly to the Parkway overhead bridge in Sayreville.

Firemen, generally were exhausted from fighting the blaze and did not leave the scene until after 6 p.m. They, first aid men and employees of Jersey Central Power & Light Company were attired in hard top helmets and disaster suits to prevent injury. Fortunately, no one sustained any injuries.

Meanwhile, much of the traffic had to be re-routed. By nightfall, the only evidence of the fire was the scorched highway, basins, bridge supports and center lane. Patrolmen Edwin Orszulski and LeRoy Kurtz organized alternate traffic streams.

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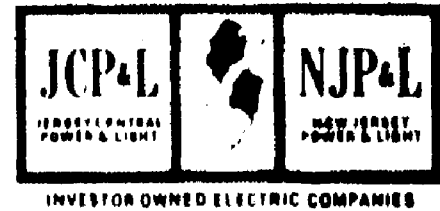

Methods of Meat Cookery

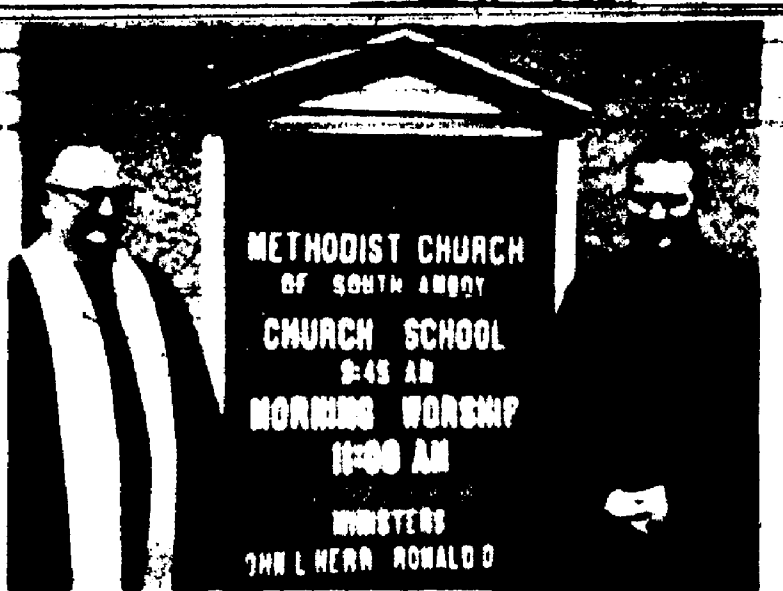

Bids were received for athletic, general school supplies, janitorial supplies and fuel, and all were referred to their respective committees for study.

A letter was received from City Clerk John J. Triggs on behalf of the mayor and city council congratulating the school on the choice of students who served on the Youth Day committee program.

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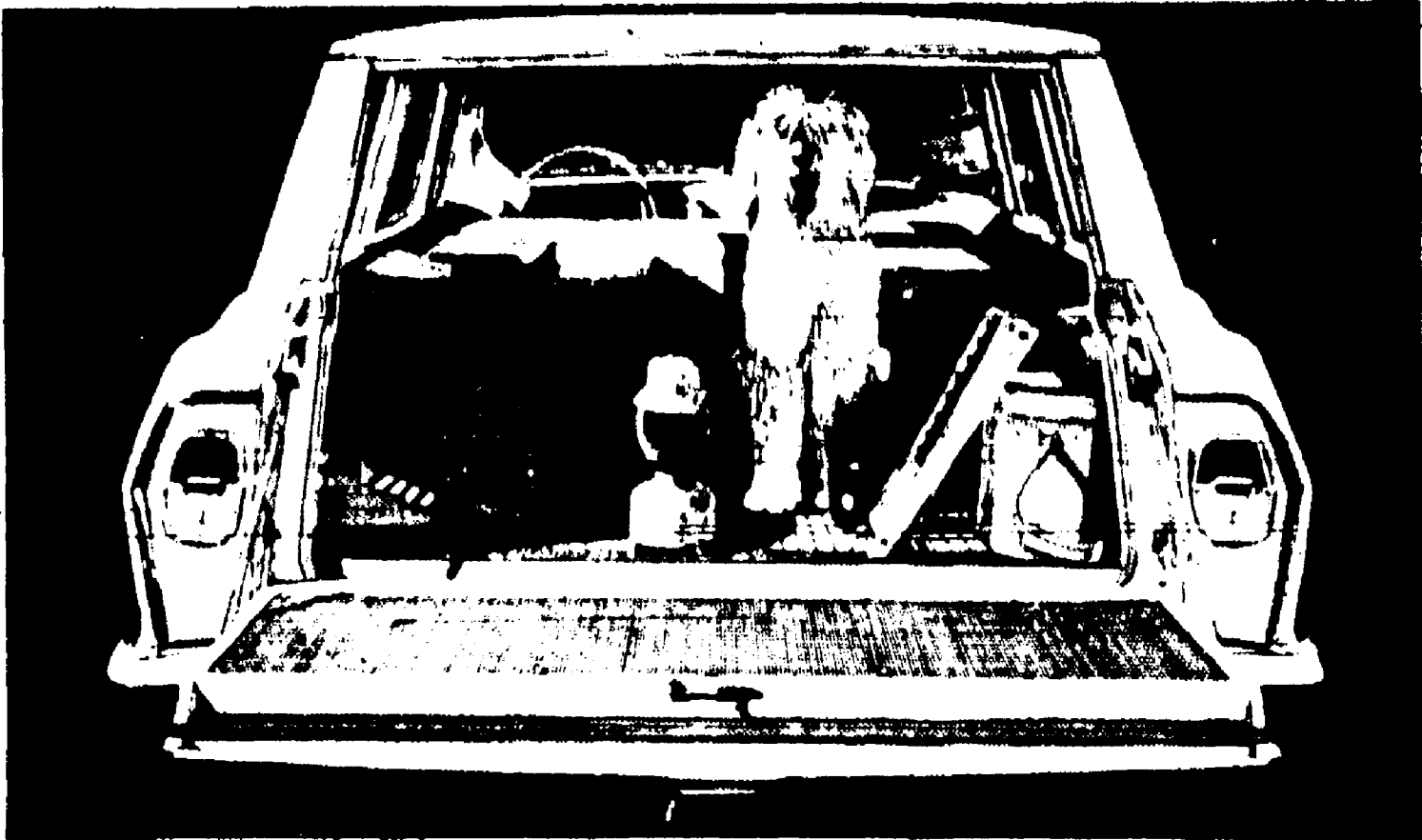
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
