

NEW POLICE CARS, RADIO BEEPERS, PRESENT NEED

Capt. James Tedesco, city police, cautioned the Council Monday the situation on police cars and radio communications needs prompt attention.

The captain reported that complaints were mounting from the officers on patrol about the conditions of the cars. These complaints are shown to be warranted, Tedesco averred, by the amount of work being done on the vehicles. He said repair bills were coming in at the rate of several hundred dollars per week.

On the score of replacing the cars, Tedesco explained that is done by filing a statement of need with State Police. The state government then includes it in its mass accumulation of statements of needs from the State Police and police departments throughout the state that the cars can be purchased in gross number at a much better price than the individual municipality could get.

But there is a hitch, now, Tedesco warned. Since President Carter put his energy crisis program into effect, the police captain explained, the auto manufacturers are retooling for compact and virtually no more police cars are being made. He feared it could be too late for the city to obtain the standard size high-powered vehicles desirable for police work.

Councilman Richard Schultz wanted to know why the administration had not moved on getting new cars as soon as the budget was adopted in March instead of waiting until May, with several thousand dollars in repairs to worn out cars accumulating in the interim. But Mayor J. Thomas Cross explained it was policy not to replace cars until they at least had a year's wear on them. But he advised Tedesco to move the matter with the state.

Capt. Tedesco then brought up the matter of replacement of the police radio system. He estimated it would cost several hundred a car needlessly to move sets from car to car when this could be saved by putting the sets into the seating provided for them in new cars.

Mayor Cross explained that the Council was investigating the purchase of portable beepers such as are used by Perth Amboy police. He explained these could displace the plechtron system, put in use two years ago in which a fire or emergency call is carried into a fireman's home but has limited value when he is away at work daytime or out socially in the evening.

The mayor related it had been explained by a sales representative that beepers could be obtained that firemen, police and first aid men could carry attached to their undershirts which would sound calls to duty to them anywhere within several miles from City Hall so long as there would be a masthead mounting of suitable placement for the dispersing of calls on the air waves.

An advantage explained by the sales representative

is that the beepers could be put in an "alert" bracket for two-way communication when a call to duty comes, otherwise could be kept in a "monitoring" bracket to pick up whatever is being broadcast. The monitoring is said to be a big saving of power needed.

The mayor said the real problem of what to do about beepers and what kind of beepers to get is the matter of frequencies and wave lengths. He admitted the police were now on a band in which there is much CB and other clutter. But it is not clear how beepers should be obtained conditioned to either VHF or UHF frequencies. The mayor was of the opinion that the firemen, getting fewer calls, could be kept on a less select band than the police and first aid men, called much more often. However, the mayor admitted it was only a surmise on his part, not a professional opinion.

Capt. Tedesco was of the opinion that so long as a good deal of money had to go into the purchase of the beepers, for 180 firemen in addition to the police and first aid men, it would be advisable to bring in an electronics specialist of repute to guide the choice.

It was recalled that a figure of \$1,500 had been set for such guidance when the matter was up for consideration by the 1976 Council. But Mayor Cross explained nothing could be done about it then as the beepers had been perfected after the 1976 budget was adopted, so there were no funds. But the Mayor agreed it looked like a proper expenditure.

A third concern of Tedesco's was to get a telephone pay station in front of city hall, not a booth but one of the open jacket phones. The police captain explained that the police wanted this so that there would be no more persons involved in municipal court cases coming down to call lawyers and witnesses on the police department phone.

Councilman Schultz would have none of a public phone being placed on the lawn in front of city hall. He called it disfigurement of the vista to be hoped for when the veteran's monument goes in and there is a refinement of the landscaping.

Mayor Cross said the phone could go in the basement way open entrance to the police department. Tedesco found this undesirable in that it would invite gatherings in the area of the youthful associates of offenders in court and peepings-in through the panels along the entrance door to see what was going on in police headquarters when one of their companions is brought in. It was finally decided that way out of this would be to replace the present glass in the panels with one-way glass, through which the police could look out but nobody could look in.

"Since it is a mini-drive," he added, "the Red Cross will send only as many personnel as needed to handle the pre-registered donors."

There are no dietary restrictions for prospective donors.

Schultz Demands Better Action on Dogs, Nuisances

A confused picture emerged Monday from discussions on how to enforce the dog ordinance and ordinances about nuisances committed on private properties and over occupancy of a limited area of dwelling space at the monthly South Amboy Board of Health meeting. Mrs. Harold McLaughlin, a spectator from George St. initiated the matter, reporting a dog feared in the neighborhood runs loose and that the animal had sought to bite her husband when he had tried to drive it from their property. She questioned why the dog warden had not picked up the animal or ordered his owners to keep him tied.

Mrs. McLaughlin wanted to know "What is the story behind the dog ordinance? What do we do?"

Councilman Richard Schultz asked Vincent Cluffi, the health inspector, what could be done. Cluffi declared there was nothing the dog warden or he could do unless they chanced to see the animal running at large. The warden could then pick it up. If it is licensed, the owner can be notified by the warden.

Another spectator asked about a dog barking continuously. Schultz suggested the inspector could act under the Public Health Nuisance Code in the dog ordinance did not cover the situation. Schultz said Pat Vona, inspector when Schultz was mayor under the old form of government, had never hesitated to act when the peace and comfort of a neighborhood was involved.

Time Limit On Use of Ball Fields Nights

Agreement was reached between the Council and John Hulsart, recreation director, that no inning of a baseball or softball game should start after 9:45 p.m. at the landfill fields. Hulsart was asked by Councilman Richard Schultz why it was necessary to have doubleheaders that ran into after sunset hours. He was told the schedules had to be drawn to take in all those wanting to play and, for some, games starting at 8 p.m. under the lights, was the only way out.

Hulsart also questioned why the lights had been put in at all. If they were not to be used in this way, otherwise the expense became a dead loss.

The responsibility on those leaving the fields then came into question. Hulsart estimated use of the lighted field for doubleheaders might have to be extended beyond the original number of games scheduled to make up for rainouts.

Mayor J. Thomas Cross opined it might be well to hire someone for closing out the lighting and checking the locking of the rest rooms after the games are over. He felt a \$1,500 cost for the season would do it and that

Granting Variance to Divide Duplex Splits Zoning Board

South Amboy Zoning Board of Adjustment's special meeting of Apr. 27, wound up in a bitter clash between Charles Walters, chairman, and Thomas Downs, longtime member, over the propriety of a variance granted Robert McMahon, for his duplex residence, 213-215 S. Stevens Ave. whereby he can sell off each section separately as single-family dwellings. Walters was the lone "no" vote, Downs being backed 5-1 by the votes of Edward Freeman, Edward Downs, Richard Wyszowski and John Hayden. Kathy Bloodgood was absent.

McMahon, on being questioned on why he sought a variance, told of his personal problems making a quick sale imperative. Walters told him personal financial problems did not constitute reason for granting a variance, that McMahon had created such a situation on his own when he bought the property, that he could only get a variance when the zoning ordinance of the city, or some other municipal measure, confronted him with an insurmountable hardship.

PBA TO HONOR DET. DUGGAN

Retirement dinner to honor Det. John Duggan, who has served for 25 years with the South Amboy Police Department, will be held at 7 p.m. Friday, May 20, at Knights of Columbus Hall, South Amboy, under the auspices of the South Amboy PBA. Music will be by the Blue Knights. A limited number of tickets are still available and can be secured from any member of the police department or at police desk in City Hall.

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The chairman reminded McMahon he was asking the Board to create two undersized lots of 22.5 ft. front each in a zone where the zoning ordinance called for 75 ft. fronts on single family residences. Walters observed that even before dividing the property the duplex was located on an undersized 45 ft. front lot.

McMahon protested other properties near his involved the same narrow frontage and disproportion of ground square footage to the bulk size of the buildings located on them. Walters felt this unfortunate but no excuse for the Board to waive its obligation to apply the zoning ordinance as it was adopted.

Downs argued that the Board had to take a "realistic" view that regarded the 75 ft. front requirement as only applying when new houses are to go up on "virgin" soil. He feared that adhering to the letter of the zoning ordinance would tie up most of the town forever. Downs gained support for his position in an advisory from H. Thomas Carr, Perth Amboy, planning supervisor, that the complex situation warranted a liberal approach to the application.

But Walters countered this by asking James Tustin, Board attorney, if "hardship" was the only basis on which to grant a variance. Tustin had excused himself from the proceedings in that he had once had business involving the property area. But he granted the general proposition that a hardship created by the zoning ordinance alone, of which condition a buyer had obligation to inform himself about, did apply.

With this, Walters asked for a resolution to deny the variance, but it was refused him. Downs then gained the measure to approve the variance. Walters stormed against the action as a "disgrace" to the Board in its sworn obligation to uphold the zoning ordinance. From there on out his exchange with Downs mounted.

Donald Astarita, 100 N. Stevens Ave., withdrew his application to put ten instead of seven sleeping units in his property near Second St. It had been strongly contested at an Apr. 13 hearing by Leslie Batchelor, living next door.

THE CITIZEN

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ORDINANCE NO. 904

AN ORDINANCE DESIGNATING A THROUGH STREET IN THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY AS A THROUGH STREET.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Governing Body of the City of South Amboy, in the County of Middlesex, and State of New Jersey: **SECTION 1.** The following street, a roadway is hereby designated as a through street (STREET) signs shall be installed at the west end of each street:

(c) No person shall buy an existing dwelling without first installing an approved smoke and fire detection device.

(d) Any smoke and fire detection device which is to be installed in an existing dwelling must have a self-contained power source and must be approved by underwriter's laboratory.

Husband, Wife, From SA Candidates in Primary

No contests of any kind locally developed in filings for county executive posts in either Democratic or Republican ranks in South Amboy at the Apr. 29 deadline for filing for places on the ballot in the June 7 primary. And there are no municipal offices up for voting upon this year in the Nov. 8 general election.

But South Amboy voters have only to look at the Middlesex County situation in both parties to get reason to go to the polls June 7. This wide deviation from the usual primary quiet can be traced to the filing of eleven Democrats and four Republicans as candidates for governor. Most of these aspirants seek working support in Middlesex County in the form of candidates for county offices sympathetic to the gubernatorial aspirations, who will in this way draw out a "ticket" vote in the primary.

South Amboy has an interesting connection in this, a husband-and-wife combination on the Republican side, William and Madelyn Lindblad, city residents. William Lindblad is bracketed with Robert Carlucci, New Brunswick, under a "Middlesex County Republicans for Tom Kean" banner to oppose the organization Freeholder slate of Werner Reinartz, Old Bridge, Joel Wildman, North Brunswick, and Edward Tikker, Piscataway.

Madelyn Lindblad, who lost out in the city councilmanic election last year, is one on a ticket with Joseph Britt, Woodbridge, that is unopposed on the Republican side as Assembly nominees in the 19th District. Raymond Fried, a former Sayreville councilman, heads their slate as G.O.P. State Senate nominee.

Mrs. Lindblad and Britt would have the heavy political chore on their hands in a quiet electoral year of facing longtime Democratic incumbents Mayor George Ottowski and Sayreville municipal attorney Alan Karcher. But right now Ottowski and Karcher have too much about which to be concerned in their own party to be bothered with Republicans.

And the 19th District is a Democratic hot spot. Nicholas Venezia, Middlesex County leader, has veered into the Hoffman for Governor camp. He has put up the organization slate of incumbent Democratic freeholders of John Phillips, former Old Bridge Mayor, Thomas Molyneux, Woodbridge, and Stephen Capestro, Edison, for reelection, but, in the 19th District, incumbent State Senator John J. Fay, Jr. has been passed over by the county organization for the endorsement of Lawrence S. Weiss, former Woodbridge mayorally candidate, as the senatorial nominee, running on a slate with Ottowski and Karcher.

Fay is not taking this. He has his own Assembly candidates to run with him June 7, Robert P. Bato, Woodbridge municipal councilman; and Stanley R. Marcinczyk, a Middlesex County undersheriff from Sayreville. The situation is complicated still more by John F. Karlowski, Perth Amboy, running on his own as an anti-income tax Democrat.

A South Amboy Democrat, who heads up several city civic groups, Alice Kupper, came out strongly in support of Fay this week and severely criticized the county leadership for its choice of Weiss.

EMAY ON MOTHERHOOD or DEFINITION OF A MOTHER

There is a legend that the angels in heaven have no sweeter word of endearment than that of "Mother". It has been glorified in song and story through the years. Artists have forever sought to catch and perpetuate the real meaning of mother. And someone has said that in order to do it, "They'd have to paint a woman mostly angel and some saint."

She is the one whom the bible says "Narrow when she is in labor because her hour has come, but soon forgets her sorrow for joy that a child is born into the world." And having carried him next to her heart for so long before he was born, she continues to nurse him at her breast; to care for his every need as he grows into childhood; to teach him his prayers at her knee; to tuck him into bed and kiss him goodnight as she surrenders him to the loving care of God, until he again wakes her up at the crack of dawn with his laughter or his tears to resume her endless toil in his behalf.

Mothers come in a wide variety of colors, shapes and sizes, but one of the most unusual things about them is that there is only one of them. A many may have several wonderful sisters and brothers; hundreds of beautiful flowers; a golden sunset every evening; a magnificent rainbow after every storm; and myriads of stars may crown the heavens at night - but you can have one - and only one mother - in all the world.

A real mother likes a home that is neat and clean, but more important still one that's lived in - and where love and happiness reign supreme; a home that rings with laughter and glows with the sheer joy of living - one where the children press their noses against the window panes every evening as they wait to greet their dad as he leaps up the path that leads to the door - and the open arms of his wife and children!

When a son or daughter has to leave home to go to college (or worse still to go to war) other members of the family may break down and cry a little - but not mother! She will put up a pleasant, cheerful front as she pats them on the back and gives them a reassuring smile. It is only when they come back safe and sound and she can again hold them in her arms that she will let the torrent of hot tears well up in her eyes as her heart burns with the thankfulness for their safe return.

It has been said that all others may desert us, except our mother. Fathers have often been known to forget their vows and desert their families. Brothers and sisters sometimes drift apart. Closest friends may turn their backs upon us in adversity. But not so with mothers. If her child reaches the heights of success and glory she will stand in the shadows and glow with pride. But if her child should fall to the lowest depths of degradation and disgrace, and all have deserted them, the mother will still cling to "her boy or girl" to the bitter end - seeing in them only the beauty and sweetness and innocence and goodness with which they were endowed when first she nursed them at her breast. The poet has truly said, "There is in all this cold and hollow world no fount of deep, strong, deathless love, save that within a mother's heart."

It is all too true that frequently we are unaware of the dignity and tenderness and grandeur of this wonderful thing called "Mother-love." Not until we have grown up and bend over the cradle of our own child does a realization of it come back to us with an overwhelming flood of tender memories. And then, many times, it is too late to even try to repay our mother with a single word or a glance to convey our understanding or our thanks or appreciation.

No then let our constant prayer be that all mothers everywhere, after their years of self-abnegation and self-denial; after their years of unselfish suffering and sorrow and service will enjoy the calm comfort of life's inevitable afternoon; followed by a radiant sunset and a night of peace, contentment and tranquility.

PRATTEN IN THE HOUSE

In his April 28th address before a Joint Session of Congress, President Carter declared "war" against energy waste. Because conversion of energy is imperative, I hope that all Americans join in winning this battle. If victory is achieved, we will be able to continue to enjoy our high standard of living. But if we fail, many necessities we take for granted - from driving cars, to heating and cooling our homes and buildings - will be in jeopardy, harming every American in many ways.

The President, however, has a great "selling" job to do, since many Americans are still skeptical of an impending energy crisis. Public apathy on the energy problem is disturbing: a national survey disclosed that 45 percent of the people expressed doubt that an imminent energy crisis is real. I hope that the President's frank message to Congress helped dispel that doubt, for apathy can be as dangerous as another Middle East embargo. His speech was comprehensive and challenging and sacrifices will have to be made if his program is to succeed. My reaction to proposals he mentioned - some of them controversial and unpopular - follow:

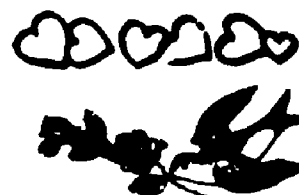
Unfortunately, a higher gasoline tax would hit lower-income groups the hardest, but would reduce consumption. Although I prefer a voluntary system which would cut consumption, I believe that a higher gasoline tax would help achieve this goal.

Natural gas prices must be reasonable, so his plan for establishing a cap price for inter and intra-state gas, appeals to me. Domestic oil prices have to be fair, so that's another important area of concern to me and to consumers, as well.

Conversion of utility plants and other facilities to the use of coal has my support and I'm pleased that in his message, a clean environment was not ignored.

I don't want to penalize some of the auto assembly plants in N.J., so I do have serious doubts about taxing larger cars. A more practical solution should be found.

There should be continued stress on tax incentives for converting homes and industries to solar energy and insulation work, so I was gratified that the President mentioned these. Naturally, I'm concerned about our nation's energy problems, but I think that the American people will meet this challenge if they work together.

ANNUAL POLISH FESTIVAL AT GARDEN STATE ART CENTER JUNE 5



John Cardinal Krol, Archbishop of Philadelphia, who has accepted an invitation to celebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass on the Stage of the Garden State Arts Center as a prelude to the sixth annual Polish Heritage Festival on Sunday, June 5, 1977.

A colorful stage program featuring the familiar music of leading Polish composers will climax the full day of activities scheduled for the sixth annual Polish Festival on Sunday, June 5, at the Garden State Arts Center. It was announced today by Walter Kross of Morgan, General Chairman of the event.

The stage program will begin at 7:30 p.m. with the Festival orchestra and chorus, conducted by Walter Legawiec, noted violinist, composer and conductor of Mountainside, New Jersey who will interpret works by Chopin, Elaner and Moniuszko. Legawiec will also perform as violin soloist in his own composition for violin and orchestra entitled "from Carmel", based on the depth of his impressions while residing in that California community.

We are also pleased to welcome back to our Festival the very popular Polish American Folk Dance Company of New York. Kross states, "they will perform a group of traditional Polish dances, richly dressed in costumes of many regions. As a recognition of their capabilities, this dance group has been invited to tour Poland again this summer."

"The young and gifted soprano, Sally Mitchell Motyka and tenor Tadeusz Motyka of New York will be heard in music by Chopin and some enchanting duets by Checkinski. The talented pianist Alfred Wakamunski of South River, will perform a group of Chopin piano works. The popular soprano Alina Brychowa of Berkeley Heights will offer arias from Moniuszko's opera 'Hrabina' (the Countess). At noon there will be sporting exhibitions ranging from archery to gymnastics on the Arts Center Mall. "Young New Jersey Polish American talent will begin a preliminary program on the Plaza at 12:30," continued Kross, "with Chet Kayer, popular disc jockey from WJDM, Elizabeth, as Master of Ceremonies. Kayer will present dancing by such groups as The Imperial Polka Dancers of Somerset, The High Boot Polka Dancers of Manville, the Polka Dolls of Westfield and the Polka Shamrocks of Bloomfield. Music will be performed by Max Smulewicz' Band from Hamburg, New Jersey."

"With so much to see and do," said Kross, "our Statewide Committee is encouraging New Jersey's Polish Americans to buy their tickets in advance, come early and plan to spend the afternoon and evening. Polish food will be sold and picnic facilities are available."

The Polish Festival will be the third of the 1977 Heritage Festival series to be presented at the Garden State Art Center this Spring. Profits from the Festivals are used by the Arts Center Cultural Fund.

Kross heads a statewide committee representing the Polish community of the state for staging the Festival in dedication to the heritage of New Jersey Americans of Polish origin.

Kross is a man of diverse talents. He is known as an orchestra leader, a former Sayreville councilman and as a successful business man who heads the Kross Aluminum Products Co. His civic and charitable endeavors are most numerous, but much of the work springs from his dedication as president of The Pulaski Citizens Club, Perth Amboy. He is known for his work with the March of Dimes, Mental Health, Muscular Dystrophy, Sight Conservation, Sister Kenney Foundation, Brain Injured Children, Youth Club, St. Michael's Orphan Children, and the Senior Citizens Club.

His diversity is never better shown than in his leadership of a 9-piece orchestra today after 40 years of wielding the baton from the bandmaster's platform. He is a longtime member of AFM Local 373 in Perth Amboy.

This is Kross' third promotion of the Polish Festival at the Garden State Arts Center. He effected great success with ticket sales in 1975 and 1976.

In getting Cardinal Krol to officiate at the holy services in connection with the Festival, Kross has been able to grace the occasion with the presence of one of America's foremost clergymen. The Cardinal was born John Joseph Krol in Cleveland in 1910. He was confirmed at St. John's Cathedral, Cleveland, November 1920.

After graduating from Cathedral Latin High in Cleveland, he worked for two years at a Kroger chain store in Cleveland, being promoted from meat cutter to manager of the store.

But here, at a young age when all manner of secular success lay out ahead of him, he made his decision for the Cross. He entered St. Mary's College, Michigan, in 1929, then continued to rise in doctrinal studies through St. Mary's Seminary, Cleveland, Pontifical Gregorian University, Rome, where he became a Licentiate in Canon Law in 1940 and Pontifical Catholic University of America to become a Doctorate in Canon Law in 1942.

His pastorate work was at the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Cleveland, for a period before being chosen for the post-graduate work in Rome. In 1942 he became a professor of canon law at St. Mary's Seminary and chaplain at a home for the aged and for Holy Ghost Convent. He was named Defender of the Bond in a Matrimonial Tribunal in 1943. He then rose through the orders to being elected to the College of Cardinals.

About Your SOCIAL SECURITY

While it is true that most people handle their social security affairs themselves, you have a right to be represented by a person of your choice in any business you might have with the Social Security Administration.

Your representative may be an attorney or any other person you choose, such as a relative or friend. If you wish to appoint someone as your representative you must write to social security and have the appointment approved. This is done for the beneficiary's protection. A special form for this purpose is available here at any social security office.

We will work with your representative just as we would with you. Your representative may act for you on most social security matters and any notice or request sent to your representative has the same effect as if sent to you.

However, social security has certain rules for representation; designed primarily to protect people from being taken advantage of. For example, we must approve your representative's fee, and it's against the law for the representative to charge or collect an unauthorized fee.

Your representative cannot sign your application for benefits, except under very special circumstances. Also, the first check cannot be mailed to the address of the representative unless it is also your address.

A person may not represent you if he or she has ever been suspended or prohibited from representing social security claimants because of fraudulent activities, charging unauthorized fees, or otherwise violating provisions of the social security law. There are some conditions under which an employee or former employee of the Government may not represent you.

Most people who use a representative in dealing with social security do so for the purpose of appealing some decision or action. Almost any decision made on your social security claim can be appealed, and the appeal may be carried all the way to the Federal courts.

If past due benefits are payable and your representative is an attorney, the agency may pay part of your benefits directly to the attorney with your approval. Also, if the case goes to the Federal court, the court may assign a reasonable fee to your attorney from your past-due benefits.

We have a booklet here at the office called "Social Security and Your Right to Representation" that may be helpful to you if you are considering having someone represent you. the one hired could do scratch work on the fields in morning off-hours. Schultz opined that the Streets Department was not so busy but care of the fields could be assigned them.

But the mayor felt it cheaper in the long run to have a supervisor come on the area after the night games are over than to have vandals breaking into the rest rooms to steal or demolish plumbing fixtures and to be gunning out the electric lights. But Schultz recalled the contractor is still liable for the rest rooms.

Schultz still insisted the Street Department be put on the project, that four of the eight men in the department be put on the fields a few hours a day.

Fred Kurtz, city engineer, informed the Council he was approving work on the Little League field but that it would take "constant maintenance." He recommended payment of the final bill of \$3,300 to the contractor.

Thomas Kross, a spectator Tuesday, would have none of this. He called condition of the field "a disgrace" with opening of the season only four days away. His report was supported by James Beshada, another manager, so the Council voted to delete the payment from the bill list.

And Schultz call for getting city workers on the job resulted in a directive to Nicholas Smolney, the business manager, to put men on the fields to get everything playable by Saturday.

But Schultz told the managers they might have to condition the fields by their own labors next year.

The managers shot back a query if they would have a right to reserve the fields to their own purposes for the Apr. 1 - July 4 league period, even though it was city-owned property. They explained this included keeping the Hoffman High and St. Mary's baseball teams off the fields. Schultz saw no reason for this, insisting the high school teams did not tear up the fields.

Schultz also warned the managers they had better take care of things, that 12 bats "bought" by the Recreation Commission had disappeared on being supplied for use and a home plate rubber was also missing. The councilman warned that much more of this would mean the teams would have to raise their own funds for their equipment.

home rule approach of the old form of government.

Schultz doubted a dog warden was coming into town the five day per week specified in the contract. Cluffi promised he would make the warden do more than sign in, that the warden would have to account in the record for what he did.

He felt a citizen could still ask police for help on a dog problem when the warden is not in town, such as dogs let out to run at night.
