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KLEIN FINDS PATTEN DODGING POLLUTION ISSUE

"I will use my Congressional prestige to help lead the fight to end the Byrne State Income Tax. A Congressman has the power to influence much of what happens both in and outside Washington, and Patten's failure to use that ability is short changing the people in our district." This promise was made to a meeting of local supporters by Charles Wiley, Republican candidate for Congress. "I'm proud to have fought against the state income tax - even though they did finally beat us." Wiley, led the fight against the tax after founding the organization S. T. O. P. in 1974. "At least you've been able to spend your own money for the past two years - instead of giving it to Governor Byrne."

He called the new income tax a "rip-off" of the middle class. "The Working men and women in this district are among the worst hit."

Wiley told a reporter that he is asking the voters to compare his achievements to those of his opponent, 71 year old Edward Patten. "While I was fighting to keep the long cold hand of the tax collector out of your pocket, Ed was voting for even more government spending-including a \$2,000 pay raise for himself, plus an escalator clause that protects him from inflation - which has to lead to inflation for the rest of us, more taxes, or both."

Wiley conceded that "Patten has done countless favors during a public career that began before most of us were born. But

he's changed with age and no longer serves the best interests of the country or the district. Now he votes with Bells Absug and the Democratic radicals most of the time. It's not that he's radical himself. It's simply because he's always been a follower instead of a leader, and a new breed has taken over leadership in Congress - and he goes along with them."

Many local people have taken part in protest movements organized by Wiley against the state income tax, forced school busing to achieve "racial balance" and other causes. He lives in Sayreville.

CROSS

Cross started out in politics in 1963 as a Democratic County Executive Committee member and was treasurer of the organization for eight years. He has served for 11 years on the South Amboy Planning Board, four years as chairman. He was elected councilman at-large in 1974. He has been president of the Board of Health this year.

He is a member of Sacred Heart Church and of the Holy Name Society of that church. He is also a member of the Knights of Columbus Council No. 426. In Independence Engine & Hose Co. he has served as vice-president, trustee to the Relief Association, second lieutenant, 1st lieutenant and captain. He has been president of the South Amboy Lion Club and has filled in a number of other offices in that organization. He is now on the Board of Trustees. He served Lion International 18-D as Zone Chairman.

JANKOWSKI

Jankowski was elected to a four-year term. He was also, for two years, vice-president of the Board of Health.

He is a parishioner of St. Mary's Church and a member of its Holy Name Society. He is a member of the International Chemical Workers Union. Jankowski has been active in recreation work in the Little League and the Girls Softball League.

LEWANDOSKI

Lewandoski broke into politics as a Democratic Third Ward Committeeman and gained appointment to the Board of Public Works. With the reorganization of the city government, he sought election to the Council in 1970 and gained a four-year term. He did not seek re-election in 1974, but this year resumed public office when named interim Mayor by the Council on the resignation of William O'Leary last spring to take a county post.

LINDBLAD

SCHULTZ

INMAN

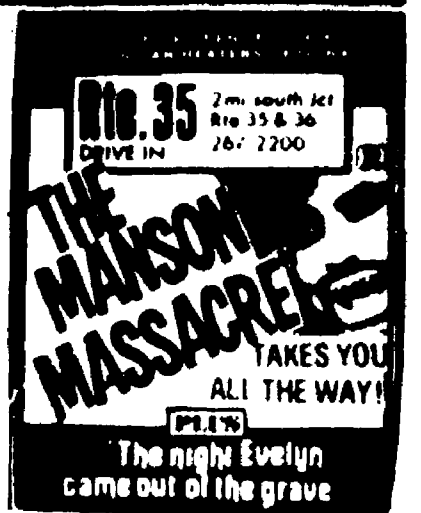
Inman was first elected to public office in 1960 when he was chosen councilman in the old Fourth Ward. When the chargeover to the present form of government came, he was elected councilman in the third ward in 1970 and was reelected for a four-year term in 1972. He became Council President. He was county GOP nominee for an Assembly post in 1971. Inman sought the mayoralty in 1974 but lost to William O'Leary, Democrat. Inman is a past president of the Board of Health and served on the Board of School Estimate. He was a councilman liaison to the Recreation Commission.

WILEY PLEDGES FIGHT ON BYRNE STATE INCOME TAX

This part of New Jersey is now known as Cancer Alley. Industrial pollution means that we have the 2nd highest cancer rate in the nation. 28,000 people die of this horrible disease each year in our state.

Yet, this doesn't seem to concern the incumbent Congressman Patten.

Not long ago he sided with his "buddy" Leon Hess of Hess Oil, against Woodbridge residents who were concerned about pollution dangers to health.

Patten has voted against funding for clean water programs (10-8-68). He opposed setting strict safety standards for atomic reactors-like the one that had an explosion in Washington recently.

And of course, Patten said absolutely nothing when Edison residents were struggling to close the Kila-Buc dump which was releasing cancer and other disease causing agents into our air, soil and drinking water.

Patten Blocks More Health Care Funding

Not only has Patten voted against protecting N. J. residents from environmental hazards, he has voted against improving our health care system.

He voted against the Burke Amendment to HR 10081 which would have appropriated \$64 million for children's health care in state institutions (1973).

He voted against the Conti and Yates Amendment to HR 10081 which would have funded \$230 million to needed health care programs.

The Klein for Congress Campaign is concerned that the health of families that work and live in New Jersey be protected to the greatest extent possible. Patten has proven too many times that he does not care.

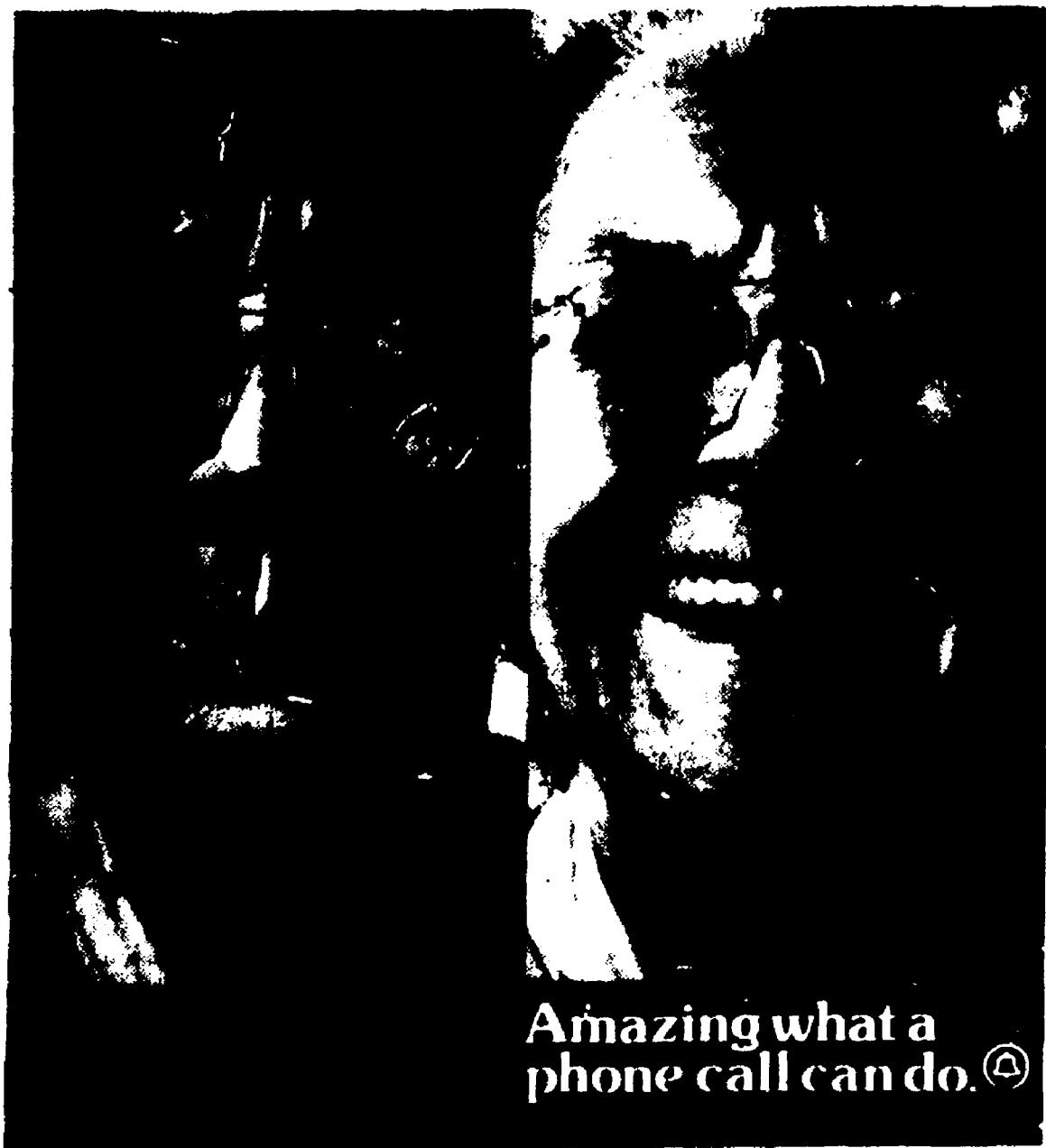

I hope and believe that the Northeast-Midwest Economic Advancement Coalition (NMEAC) I serve on will help strengthen the economy of those areas by working together to face and attack the serious economic problems of the northeast. The solutions are not easy, but we'll be active.

As a member of the Steering Committee of NMEAC, I was surprised to find that there is no official and effective organization to represent, protect and advance the economic interests of the northeast and midwest. Coalition is determined to show active participation and strong leadership. Our state and others in the area are not getting the attention they deserve, so a great deal of work must be done by NMEAC. However, we will work hard until hopes and plans are converted to achievements

You're in danger nine ways if New Jersey gets gambling casinos. 1. Spread throughout the state. Big money and smart lawyers can quickly give any city the same casino privileges as Atlantic City. There could be gambling casinos and its problem in our community. 2. "Bug" strikes your family. Compulsive gambling spreads when casinos are convenient legal and glamorous. Will the "bug" strike your spouse, child, parent or other family member. 3. Risk of corruption. Large cash flow presents an overwhelming temptation for political and official misconduct. Haven't we had enough of that in New Jersey? 4. Rising crime. FBI reports Las Vegas' crime rate (1975) 100% over New Jersey, 57.3% over Atlantic City. Why ask for this? 5. Better losses drain state. It takes \$60 million betting losses to yield \$4 million in taxes. Small Atlantic City airport and state population density mean most money will be lost by Jersey residents. Family and community economy will be hit hard. 6. Lure for undesirables. Casinos attract hustlers, loan sharks, con men, pimps, prostitutes, racketeers drifter. Do you want this in your home state? 7. "Continuous action" hurts. Unlike lottery or racetracks, casino gambling "action" is continuous. Losses are quick and heavy. Lower income losers then generate welfare and social problems throughout the state. 8. False hopes to senior citizens. Casino amendment promises benefits to senior citizens, but wording is vague and tax revenue potential is minimal. 9. Diversion from real goals. There is no "easy way out". New Jersey has the vitality and know-how to solve its economic and tax needs constructively without inviting in a whole new range of social ills with gambling casinos. ATTENTION CITY EMPLOYEES

At the conclusion of last Thursday's special meeting while Councilmen Jankowski, Inman, O'Brien and Cross were discussing a realistic way of solving the 27th pay day for city employees we thought we were all in agreement to transfer sufficient money to pay some sort of "bonus" because we are in agreement the city employees will have been paid their full salary as of Dec. 15th. However, we believe, not knowing how this disastrous situation occurred, that money was paid previously to the employees, but an error occurred to penalize all employees two weeks pay between the years 1969 to 1974 by the manipulation of monies from a following budget instead of a past budget which would actually mean the people had not received their true salary in a previous year. What upset me, and the reason for this public comment, at the conclusion of this meeting three of us agreed that all employees should receive this particular settlement, but Councilman Inman stated that he believes since there were only eleven people that the treasurer, by his examination of salary records, are the only employees entitled to from six to nine days pay. He feels only those employees (11) should be compensated for such time and all other city employees have been paid in full as of the 15th of December. With this in mind there would be immediate need of four councilmen's signatures to approve transfer of monies into the salary accounts after Nov. 15th. With Councilman Inman's opinions of the situation I see no way we can muster four votes to pass such transfer when I presume Mr. Rogers would go along with Inman and vote no on these transfers on past practice. Vote accordingly I say to you because we do need a council and mayor that has an interest in these people and what would happen if they did not receive a pay check on Dec. 30th (27th pay period).
