## More Severe Curfew Rules Are Proposed

New measures against vandalism and loitering by youths were proposed at the Nov. 8 Council meeting. Councilman Richard Schultz told a curfew could be levied nightly, adding by youths in the Henry St. John St. George St. area with the giving out of summons. Mayor J. Thomas Cross suggested approaching the DAV post at Rosewell and George Sts. on having a sign erected in the post home roof by the city giving the required legal notice of a curfew existing in the Lindell area would avail more then putting up a sign at street level that would be a prime mark for vandals. But there were reservation about the sign on a building being only a mark for the throwing of rocks and brick bats.

There was agreement that police action could be still further stepped up against unsavory actions in automobiles and drinking in apartment houses.

A resolution was adopted by which \$30,000 in an unclassified appropriation could be applied in transfer to six salaries and wages accounts. \$1,000 to Department of Revenue, \$1,000 to Department of Finance, \$1,400 to Division of Roads, \$1,000 to Waste and Sewage Controls, \$100 to Board of Health, \$500 to Code Enforcement, \$500 to Board of Adjustment. And \$6,000 will defray the cost of other insurance premiums.

The Council seeks permission from the State Department of Community Affairs to include \$78,200 in its 1978 budget for the repair of public buildings and facilities that some of a \$285,000 grant for such purposes from the Comprehensive Employment and Training Agency (CETA) can be used to get work going before the year is out.

Business Administrator Nicholas Smolney gave assurance that the new

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## Contracts Signed For EDA Phase III Work on Schools

Contract was signed for South Amboy Board of Education Tuesday by its president, Thomas Levandoski, with the low bidders on Phase III work on the rehabilitation of schools made possible by a total \$629,000 grant from the Economic Development Administration. The contracts involved Tuesday affected \$64,348 remaining after completion of Phase I and Phase II of the project.

The contracts were with Rielolo, Belleville, the general contractor, at \$226,000, and with subcontractors Tami Getheins, Metuchen, for heating and ventilating at \$70,608, with Edison Electric for electrical work at \$16,000 and with Pizzalato, Metuchen, for plumbing at \$16,470.

Rielolo expressed confidence on signing contract that all work installing an elevator, a stairwell and remodeling lavatories to the needs of handicapped children would be finished before school reopens next September. He will open the outer wall for the elevator work in the spring when the severity of the weather diminishes, but he expects most of the other work can get under way in the winter. He is confident there will be no annoyance nor hazard to school classes when working on the building.

The board was advised by John Olexa, superintendent, Nov. 8 that George Ferman, Totowa, architect on the job had received a telephoned go-ahead on the job from EDA, assuring the work plan offered constituted an acceptable use of the monies in the federal grant. Ferman also gained approval of the State Department of Education on his drawings for the undertaking.

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## Voter Protests Zero Vote Report On Three Questions

Protest against "my vote not being counted" was registered by Ann Mulligan, a voter in the Second Ward, Second District, at the Nov. 8 Council Meeting. She cited the fact that the report of the election board in that district showed zero votes cast on public propositions No. 2, 3, 4 and No. 4 and No. 6 bond issue proposals. She declared she had voted on the public questions, so saw her vote nullified and perhaps on the voting for candidates also. She questioned what kind of truthful vote could be registered on a voting machine that works "spasmodically."

Councilman Richard Schultz, local Democratic leader, explained if a machine is jammed, such as had occurred with a voter trying to make a write-in vote for mayor, it can be gotten moving again, without being opened, but there is no way a machine can be legally opened until the polling is completed. Council President Thomas O'Brien observed a voting machine is a mechanical device and there is no guarantee such a device will not break down from fault.

Mrs. Mulligan commented this made the whole election suspect in that there had only been 32 votes difference in the voting for councilmen. In view of her protest, the Council voted to take the matter up with the Middlesex County Board of Elections.

The next day an order was obtained from Superior Court Judge David D. Furman by which the voting machine could be opened in the Second District, Second Ward, for a count of the vote on the public question. Joseph Arvay and Edward Marcinczyk, inspectors for the county board, found the machine had properly notated a vote, so the error

Susan Taskowitz, Field Representative of New Jersey Blood Services and Delores Nolan, Blood Program Director of the Central New Jersey American Red Cross Chapter presented an Achievement Award to the South Amboy Memorial Hospital and Community Mental Health Center this week in recognition of, and grateful appreciation for outstanding blood contributions especially during critical times of the year.

Francis Corridon of South Amboy, Personnel Director of the hospital who coordinated a special emergency blood drive during the 4th of July weekend and newly appointed Employee Health Supervisor Janet Ehlert of Metuchen were commended for the efforts of staff and friends who made the donation.

New Jersey Blood Services works with 20 Red Cross chapters in New Jersey to supply blood to 65 hospitals in the state. Currently, over 60,000 donors participate in the program and almost 90,000 units of blood and related components and derivatives were distributed last year. About 12,000 units of blood were collected last year in Middlesex County by the Central New Jersey Chapter of the American Red Cross and NJBs.

From its headquarters on Joyce Kilmer Avenue, NJBS provide a full range of blood services. All blood collected is typed in the laboratory and tested for hepatitis and syphilis.

"Because of the dedication of South Amboy Memorial Hospital especially during times of need, NJBS is able to provide immediate response to blood requests, while hematologist provide hospitals with 24 hour consultation service. New Jersey hospital patients benefit from such unique resources," Mrs. Taskowitz said.

## THANKSGIVING TRIP TIPS FROM POLICE CHIEF O'LEARY

For families looking forward to annual Thanksgiving trips, "over the river and through the woods to Grandmother's house we go" might be a good theme song. But according to South Amboy Police Chief Edward O'Leary it takes more than a song and a prayer to make a safe trip.

Good trip planning and winter "know-how" are two basic elements recommended by Chief O'Leary and the International Association of Chiefs of Police. The preparedness guidelines include:

- Plan a sensible schedule of driving with plenty of rest stops. Avoid heavy traffic periods.

- Have a dependable mechanic safety check your car and correct any deficiencies — the heater, defroster, system, anti freeze, tires, lights, windshield wipers and washers.

- Make sure your trunk contains such safety gear as tire chains, booster cables, a tow chain or strap, emergency warning devices, a bucket of sand and a shovel, and auxiliary lighting equipment.

In addition, Chief O'Leary pointed out that many Thanksgiving trips take motorists into areas hit by early winter storms which come on unexpectedly.

For advance warnings, the Chief recommended that motorists keep alert for National Weather Service Bulletins and be ready to abandon any part of their trip in case dangerous warnings are issued.

"With this kind of know-how," the Chief concluded, "the way to grandmother's house and back should add up to a safe, enjoyable trip."

## Ex-Cop, Now Lawyer Scores In City Court

At a special court session Monday to cover protracted matters in which Francis N. Moore, Eatontown, was defense attorney, was conducted by Municipal Court Judge Joseph C. Hoffman Monday.

Moore's attack on the evidence that his client John Francis MacArthur was conducting "the practice of bookmaking on the results of sporting contests on both ball, baseball and horseracing Oct. 17 and 18 did maintain a gambling resort by accepting horse race and sports bets," ostensibly at 122 N. Broadway, failed. Judge Hoffman decided that Middlesex County Det. James J. Dooley Jr. had shown enough for MacArthur to be remanded to the Grand Jury in \$1,000 bail.

Moore had more success in other matters. He obtained the lowering of a drunken driving charge against Larry Gaigiello Parlin to reckless driving in an accident matter investigated by Ptl Anthony Warn. May on David St. The Defendant was assessed the \$200 and \$15 fine but there was no revocation of license.

The defense attorney consented to his client, John Bauman, Parlin, pleading to drunken driving under the stipulation the defuddled state of his client on Main St. Aug. 31 showed he did not willfully and in full awareness commit the offenses of ignoring a traffic signal, leaving the scene of an accident, failing to report it, and attempting to elude Ptl Steven Pavich. Bauman paid \$200 and \$15 and lost his license 60 days. Moore contended Bauman was not coherent in making an attack on Ptl Peter Kerny and creating a disturbance at South Amboy Hospital because of a state of shock and "injury" from the accident.

John J. Falk, Parlin, on counts entered by Ptl Leo McCabe July 9 and Ptl Alvah Cox, Jr. July 16 of not being insured was able to show he only neglected to have proper proofs in his possession on that date. Moore argued to the acceptability of what was being erred.

Moore occupies a unique background to his legal practice through Monmouth and Middlesex counties in that he was a cop in New York City in the years he was studying for his L.L.D. degree.

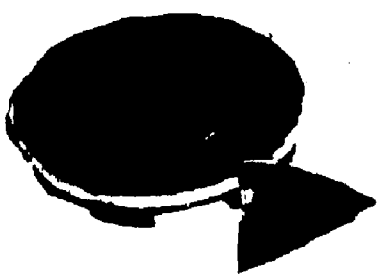
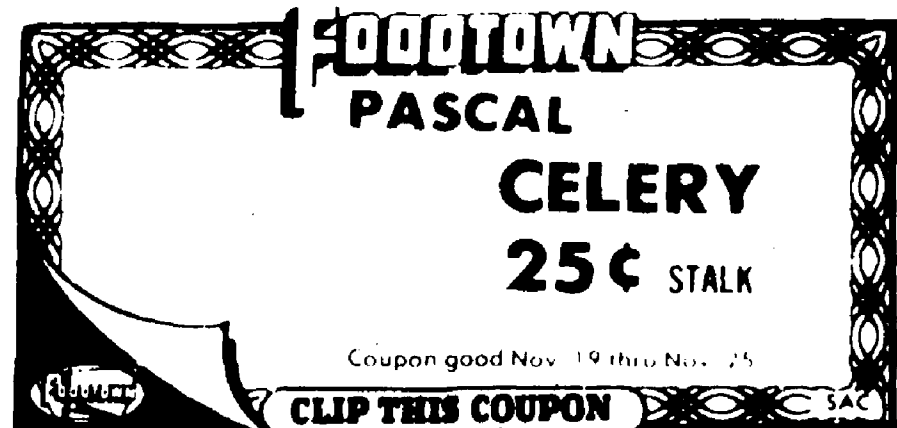

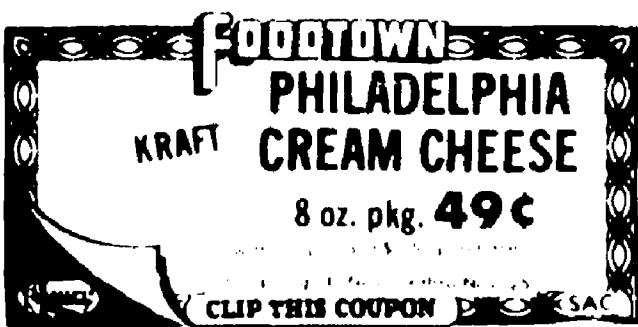

### WEISS, MHS GRAD GETS NEW CONGRESS TERM

Theodore Weiss, a Hoffman High School graduate, was reelected to Congress in the 20th District, New York City, Nov. 7, by a substantial plurality. This will be his second term, as he was first elected in 1966 on the Democratic ticket to succeed Bruce Abner, who relinquished the seat to run for the U.S. Senate.

There had been some question about Weiss' reelection because of his marked independence of action in Congress. He did not hesitate to challenge the Democratic machine in New York and Mayor Edward Koch on the Westway issue and political servants were of the opinion the lack of full organizational support could be fatal to his chances of reelection. Instead, his show of vote-drawing power has weakened the position of those pressing for the Westway.

When sworn in for his first term, Weiss had a reception in Washington for some of his Hoffman High School graduates. After leaving the South Amboy School, he graduated from Syracuse University Law School, became an assistant New York County prosecutor under the late Francis X. Hogan and then a New York City Councilman before being elected to Congress.

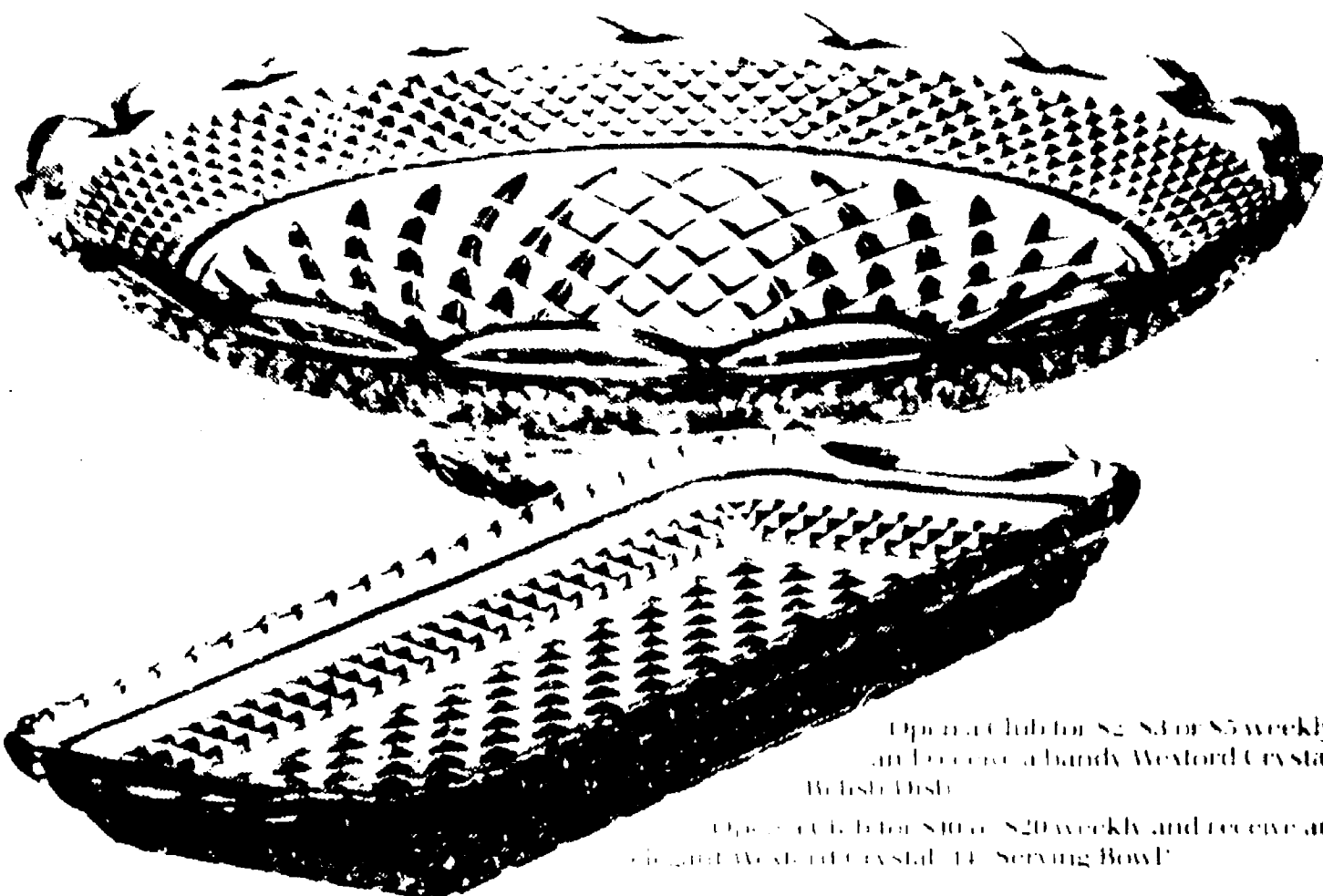

## The Now Washbasket

Are your white clothes showing signs of "little tale grey"? Fabric greying is caused by a buildup of unremoved soil and soap or detergent, an overloaded washer and wash water temperature that's not hot enough. Here's a "prescription" to help alleviate this problem.

1. Wash whites in separate loads, cottons in hot water, synthetics and blends in warm.

2. Use at least the recommended amount of detergent as per directions on the package. Increase this amount for heavily soiled items.

3. If you have hard water and/or live in a "phosphate ban" area, use a laundry additive with your detergent. These products condition the wash water and help prevent fabric greying and remove stains, thus boosting your detergent's cleaning power. However, stay away from liquid chlorine bleach. Frequent use can weaken some fabrics and cause others to fade or turn yellow over time. Many homemakers recommend using BORATEEM PLUS instead, because it's safe for laundering whites and colored clothes.

4. Some white items, if severely discolored, might be restored with a packaged color remover. Use according to label directions.

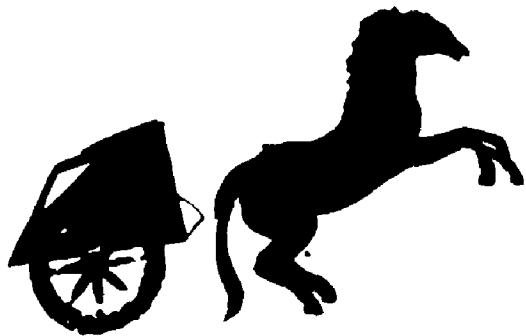

## Gleasons Gain Halt In Adoption Of Zoning Map

Adoption on final reading of the revised zoning map showing the main area of the city placed in a single family residential category was held up Nov. 8 after strong protest was registered by Edward Duschock, Perth Amboy attorney for Anna Gleason, an owner at the southwest corner of S. Pine Ave. and Letterts St. against the inclusion of the Gleason property in a light industrial zone extending in a narrow strip along Letterts St. Members of the Gleason family joined in the protest contending their property had been a secluded residence for 85 years until Sanitary Fuels Inc. now owned by Eugene and Frank Lopez had started up next door at 108 Letterts St. They contended residential character of the Gleason property had been recognized in the zoning of 1960 but had been included in a light industry zone in 1968 and now was being improperly continued in that zone.

Duschock called the delineation for Sanitary Fuels illegal spot zoning that his clients had the right to be included in the residential zoning that applied to homeowners all along S. Pine Ave. The Gleasons protested that if their home should burn down, it could not be rebuilt because it is in a sector barred to residential use. And they also pointed out that they could not sell the property without obstructing complications because it is being zoned improperly.

Clark Convery, city attorney, advised the Council there was much to what the objectors were asserting and that it applied to the Seaman home also across the railroad tracks at S. Pine Ave. and George St. Convery suggested an amendment be introduced to the zoning map and final adoption be withheld until the amendment also come up for public hearing. It is expected the amendment will be introduced at the Nov. 21 Council meeting.

Explanation was offered the Council by Duschock for the filing of a Superior Court suit by the Gleasons asking that the variance granted Sanitary Fuels Aug. 9 by the Zoning Board of Adjustment to erect a 35 ft. by 55 ft. cement block garage near the Gleason property line be set aside. Duschock acknowledged the intent of

his clients had been to appeal to the Council against the variance as provided in the Land Use ordinance. But this had to be done within 45 days of the Aug. 9 grant of variance and it required the submission of all documentary to the Council by the zoners.

Duschock noted that when the deadline approached and no documentary had been produced this need to protest the rights of his clients against default by lack of documentary, specifically a CSR (certified stenographic report) of the zoning hearings of both June 14 and Aug. 9 on the Sanitary Fuels variance, became imperative. He explained the 45 day period expired on a Sunday Sept. 24 when no legal business could be transacted, so, on the 46th day Sept. 25, he went into Superior Court. He pointed out that he had been joined by John Vail, South Amboy, as attorney for Sanitary Fuels, in a letter to the Council Oct. 17 outlining why they had referred the matter to the administrator of the courts over the lack of a CSR report that could be offered before a Superior Court judge that he would have the required verbatim account of proceedings in the zoning matter from which to bring forward his own deliberations.

Duschock contended there was derogation of the rights of the Council's position as an authority on appeal in this, that he and his clients had been presented with an unusual situation that compelled them to go beyond the relief provided in the Land Use ordinance.

Convery cautioned the Council that neither the governing body nor the zoning board could ignore the requirement to file responder to a Superior Court suit. But Convery was critical that Duschock had seen fit to go to the administrator of the courts about a matter that was still confined to the jurisdiction of the courts about a matter that was still confined to the jurisdiction of the municipal government at the time such a move was made.

Lower John Street is very important to the City of South Amboy. On a recent visit to the City, the Sites Survey Committee commented favorable on the famous Victorian houses in the area.

The purpose of the program is to obtain as much information as possible from residents of the John Street area and to have them share photographs and pictures of the Street. We have several post cards showing the area of the public schools.

Mr. Stanley Steneck, long a friend of the Library and the Historical Society, has already donated to the Library and Historical Society a framed picture of the Fourth Street School where now reside our Honorable Mayor and his mother.

South Amboyans are cordially invited to attend this meeting especially if they have something to share. If they are interested in learning more about the history of this City, they are welcome also.

The Public Library also would have the members, guests and welcome South Amboyans view all of the New Jersey Reference Collection which has been filling up during the past few years. We are very fortunate in having both of William A. Whiteheads books on Perth Amboy, our collection of the N. J. Archives has increased also.

The vote in the district on the public questioned, on zero registered proposals No. 2, No. 4 and No. 6 was found to be No. 2 Yes 75, No. 4 Yes 83, No. 6 Yes 73 and No. 6 Yes 83, No. 75 The corrected totals for the city on these proposals became No. 2, 101 against 884 yes and 1,004 no, No. 4 green Acres bonding yes 977, no 849, No. 6 flood control bonding yes 957, no 826

City Clerk Natalie Brennan stated Monday a formalized record of all the voting in the city will be received from the county board shortly. Until certified totals come in from the county Mrs. Mulligan's concern for the accuracy of votes for offices cannot be dismissed entirely, but a dropoff in the number of voters going to the polls this year to not even 3,000 against the 3,907 who voted in 1976 could explain much. There were 314 votes cast in the district for council in 1974 and 246 in 1976 against 234 this year. In 1974 312 voted for mayor, 315 in 1976 but only 231 this year. It is apparent that apathy, not error, affected the figures.

Mrs. Mulligan also did not like the use by candidates of pictures taken of them in much younger days. She called it a "misrepresentation" of the physical propensities of the candidates. But Councilman O'Brien told her a candidate could use a picture of his own choosing and that he doubted a candidate would use a picture of himself reaching so far back into his youth as to open himself to derisive comparisons.
