S.A. Rotary Club Seeks Candidates

Joseph Sumaki, president of the Rotary Club of South Amboy, has announced that the club is seeking young men and women in the local area as candidates for Rotary Foundation educational awards for study abroad in 1973-74.

Four types of educational awards are offered by the Foundation: Graduate Fellowships, for those between the ages of 20 and 28, with a bachelor's degree or equivalent; Undergraduate Scholarships, for those 18 to 24 with a minimum of two years of university level work; Technical Training awards, for those 21 to 35 with a secondary education and at least two years' working experience; and, Awards to Teachers of the Handicapped, for those 21 to 35 who have been engaged as fulltime teachers of the mentally, physically or educationally handicapped for at least two years at the time of application.

Each award covers round-trip transportation, educational and living expenses for one academic year, and, if necessary, funds for intensive language training. The Rotary Foundation is a non-profit organization supported by contributions from Rotarians and Rotary clubs in 149 different countries. Since 1947, the Foundation has awarded more than US \$12 million for its various programs, and more than 4,700 young men and women have gone to countries other than their own for a year of study.

PLANNING BOARD RECEIVES PLANS

At the Wednesday night meeting of the South Amboy Planning Board, a letter received from the McCormack Sand Company stated that their plot plans were available for review. The plans were supposed to have been sent to the Planning Board prior to last week's meeting, however, according to Vernon Tice, the board never received them. He asked that a reply be sent to James Convery of the McCormack Sand Co., stating that they never received the plot plans.

The Allied Factors Corp., also wrote to the Planning Board requesting that a 90-day extension be granted to file a deed description. The extension is needed for Public Utilities Commission approval. The extension was granted.

The Planning Board also received a letter from the Board of Adjustment concerning the rezoning of an area from a residential district to a business district. The Board decided to reserve their opinion until the next meeting so they can receive the advice of their attorney, Mr. Ray and their consultant, Mr. Carr.

An invitation was received from the Middlesex County Planning Board to attend a meeting where seminars will be held to explain the application procedures for state grants for Green Acres programs. The letter also requested the names and addresses of community recreational and environmental protection commissioners. Mr. Vernon Tice requested that the letter be held until the proper officials could be contacted.

Mr. George Cattano of the Planning Board criticized board attorney, John Ray who he said, "has not been attending the board meetings." He also stated that, "Ray did not attend meetings regularly last year either and as a salaried member of the board, he should be the first one at every meeting." The Planning Board meetings are held once a month. Mr. Tice replied that the attorney had been told about attendance once before, and a letter will be sent to him reminding him of his duties to the board.

A letter was also read from the Planning Board consultant, Carr, updating the board of current events of the Middlesex County Storm Drainage Plant.

O'Leary Endorsed For Freeholder

At a meeting of the South Amboy Democratic Committee, at John's Halfway House last Friday night, Municipal Democratic Leader, Richard Schultz, announced the committee's decision to endorse Mayor William O'Leary as their candidate for Middlesex County Freeholder.

The office is currently held by a Republican, Freeholder Curry, whose term will terminate this year.

OIL REFINERY GETS LETTER OF INTENT

Wilbur Schmidt, president of the Industrial Commission remarked that the Supermarine, Inc. was given a "letter of intent" from the commission and members of the city council. The purpose of the letter is to permit the Supermarine, Inc. to make application to the state Department of Environmental Protection for evaluation relative to the established standards of pollution control.

The letter also directs the oil refinery to prepare complete financial and operational data for the city officials. It specifies that the papers be prepared in non-technical language.

Early part of this week, it was disclosed that Supermarine owes more than \$236,000 in taxes to Hoboken and Weehauken. The firm also faces a foreclosure of a \$400,000 mortgage in a suit filed by the office of U.S. attorney Herbert Stern. This money was borrowed to purchase 18 acres of waterfront property from the General Services Administration in 1969.

Supermarine was unsuccessful last year in locating a low-sulfur fuel oil refinery on a 40.3 tract on the Hoboken-Weehauken line. Environmentalist group in Hudson County opposed the company's location in that area.

The offices of Supermarine, Inc. are located at 270 Park Avenue, New York City. In search for data about the firm's report or made three stops there during business hours on a

AUXILIARY GIFT PROVIDES TREATMENT FOR INFANT'S DISEASE

Funds for the purchase of a special light for treatment of Hyperbilirubinemia, a disease of the newborn, have been donated to South Amboy Memorial Hospital by members of the hospital's Women's Auxiliary. The light will be used for safe photo therapy which has been found effective against the disease.

Exposure to the light over a period of several days reduces the amount of bilirubin in the infant's blood serum. Placed under the light by physician's order at a distance of approximately 18 inches, the infant is exposed almost continuously until the bilirubin level drops. Treatment requires maximum skin exposure, with the infant's eyes covered, and the patient's position changed every two to three hours. The treatment does not interfere with routine infant care - i.e., the baby may be removed from the light and taken to the mother for feeding or may be cared for in other ways when necessary. Simple 20 watt "Day Light" fluorescent tubes totaling 160 watts are used, with tubes changed after every 200 hours of use.

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GOVERNOR'S OFFICIALS

Governor William T. Cahill installed the 1972 officers of the New Jersey Association of Chinese Holders at the State House Thursday, headed by President George J. Orlowski of Perth Amboy.

The County Optional Charter Act is only a beginning, he declared. "A consolidation of services is demanded to keep pace with the needs of our changing society." Vice Presidents installed were: W. Dealman of Bergenfield, Somerset County; Charles L. Scarpa, Vineland, Cumberland; Harry Harrison Jr., Ocean Grove, Monmouth and Gilbert W. Lugassy, Trenton, Mercer and Kenneth V. Myers, of Milford in Hunterdon as treasurer. Mr. Orlowski succeeded Ocean Freeholder George F. Maclin of Pt. Pleasant Beach, who presented him with the Association's traditional "Golden Gavel".

"Our biggest problem is taxes," President Orlowski said. "People must be protected against the loss of their homes. Taxes must be related to the ability to pay and tied realistically to the economy of the whole state. We look to the Governor and Legislature to bring about a prompt change in the prohibitive tax structure based almost solely on property. Your place in the history of our State may well be determined by taxation."

Other officers installed included: Jack Lamping of Toms River, Ocean County as Secretary; Harvey L. Stern, Trenton, Mercer as Counselor and Dr. John Henry Heister, of Atlantic City in Atlantic County as Chaplain. Mr. Orlowski is the 32nd President. The Association was founded in 1921.

The Voting members met January 24th in The Holiday Inn, Trenton for a discussion of the Federal wage-price guidelines and consumerism with Charles Irwin, director of the State Office of Consumer Protection. On January 31st, Community Affairs Commissioner Lawrence F. Kramer will speak before a luncheon meeting of the Association in Trenton. Other who will appear before the weekly discussion sessions in February will be the new Commissioner of Institutions & Agencies, Robert Clifford and the President of Rutgers - The State University, Dr. Edward J. Bloustein.

Vice President Dealman will appear before the U.S. Senate Finance Committee January 26th in Washington to present testimony in favor of adoption of H.R. 1, the reform measure on welfare, which has already passed the House. The Association's legislative conference will be held February 14 in the State Museum in Trenton.

The Drop-In Center, a student-organized community center at Rutgers University, has survived its first year and is trying to secure funds to insure the continuation of its services.

The storefront center in downtown Newark at 55 Central Avenue, is a referral service to those seeking help with legal, medical and psychological problems. It also provides information on planned parenthood, abortion, draft counseling, drug referral and counseling, employment, welfare, housing and social services.

The center has a 24-hour rap-line -- with the telephone (201) 622-2313 -- so that a maximum number of people will be able to get help. Some of the counselors have spent hours with potential suicides or very lonesome persons.

Although the center started as an extension of the Rutgers Student Volunteer Program, the Drop-In Center is now an independent organization with a full-time paid director and minimum supervision by the University.

It is the only student-run centralized counseling service in Northern New Jersey, and its services are available to the student body as well as the community at large.

Advising the center from the University are Assistant Dean of Students Adele Adlerstein and faculty members Dr. Arlene Tucker and Mrs. Wynetta Bryant.

Mrs. Adlerstein has been trying to obtain state or federal funding for the center. Through the efforts of Rutgers Vice President Malcolm D. Talbot, private funding is also being sought for the center.

Currently, there are 22 work-study and 10 volunteers working at the center on rotating shifts, 24 hours a day, Monday through Saturday.

The working staff decides the center's policy, according to Drug Counselor-Director David McLaury, a 1971 graduate of Rutgers Newark College of Arts and Sciences.

"Staff sensitivity to each other and their caring about the problems of the community are culminated in the work they do," he says.

Before joining the center, staffers undergo intensive training during a two-week seminar, in which they familiarize themselves with those social agencies relevant to their counseling areas and which will offer the most help to prospective clients.

Guest lecturers from various social, medical and legal agencies advise the center workers on available services provided by their respective agencies.

The center has paid its bills so far from private grants and contributions which included an initial \$2,500 from the Rutgers Student Senate, \$5,000 from the Wallace-Eljabar Fund, Inc., of East Orange and \$1,000 each from the Prudential Insurance Company and the Rutgers University Drug Education program.

Contributions of \$500 have come from New Jersey Bell, the Howard Savings Institutions and the Carteret Savings and Loan Association, all of Newark.

McLaury hopes that a substantial federal, state or private grant will be forthcoming, so that the group could devote all its efforts to working within the community.

"When we started," McLaury said, "many people thought we were just a bunch of radical students 'doing our thing' for a month or two. Our survival and success--we've helped over 2,000 people during the past year--contradicts that attitude."

COMMUNICATIONS TRAINERS AT STATE POLICE STATIONS

Colonel D. B. Kelly, State Police Superintendent, announced that forty-one civilian Communications Operators have been assigned to State Police stations as trainees under the Federal Emergency Employment Act. Governor Cahill approved sixty-two such positions and the remaining twenty-one will be filled by the end of January.

The civilian operators will undergo a 6-month training program geared to prepare them to handle telephone, radio, teletype and computer communications and maintain the appropriate logs and records in the process. This will free the station troopers, who have traditionally shared this responsibility, for full-time police patrol duty.

The trainees will work during daylight hours in the initial stage of training, but will soon assume communication duties around the clock. They will ultimately man com-centers at fifteen stations throughout the State servicing state and municipal police with computerized police information in the NCIC and SCIC systems.

Colonel Kelly said, "Citizens who are used to telephoning State Police stations and speaking with troopers will undoubtedly be the first to notice the change. They should be assured that civilian operators will be thoroughly trained to handle their communications and that they may also speak to the State Police Stations commander on request."

Section 3. Be it further ordained that James V. Higgins Esq. be and is hereby appointed to hold the office of City Prosecutor for the term of one (1) year beginning January 1st, 1972.
Section 4. And be it further ordained that all ordinances and/or sections of ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed.
Section 5. And be it further ordained that this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval and publication as required by law.

REPORT HEARS

DOMINICK F. RINALDI, New Jersey District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service reminded aliens in New Jersey today that Monday is the deadline for filing address report forms as required under provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act.
The Immigration official urged aliens who have not yet filed their address reports to do so immediately to avoid possible penalties.
Mr. Rinaldi said the law requires that every alien except those having diplomatic status and representatives of certain international organizations must file the address report during January of each year at the nearest Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service office.
Mr. Rinaldi said an estimated 260,000 aliens in this State have filed address reports so far this January. A total of 250,000 filed address reports in New Jersey last year. Reports for 1972 are expected to total near 270,000.

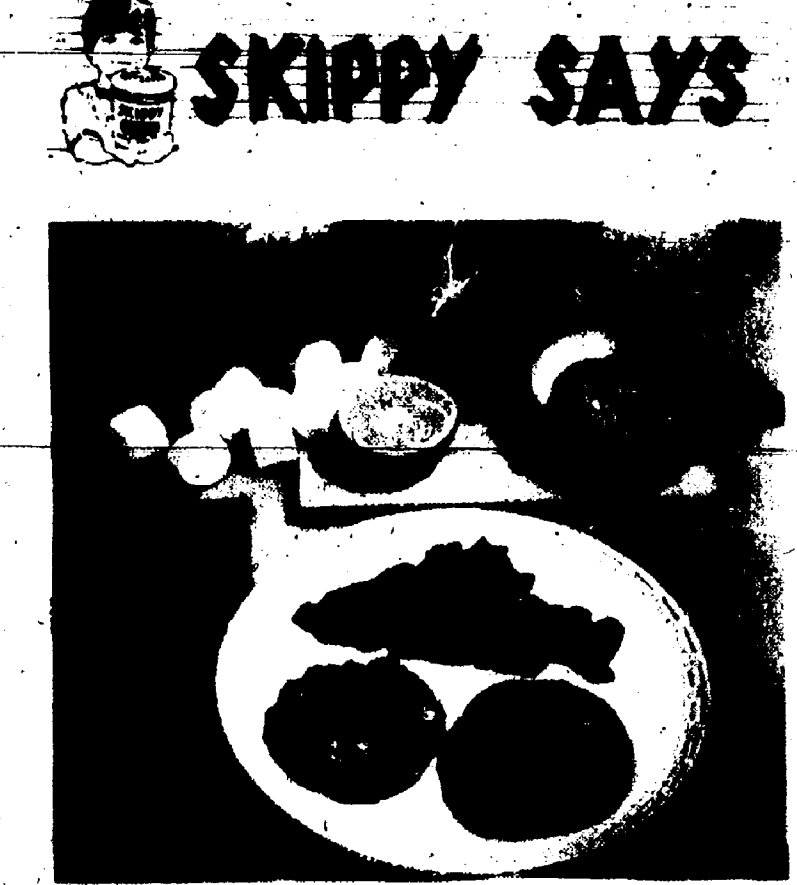
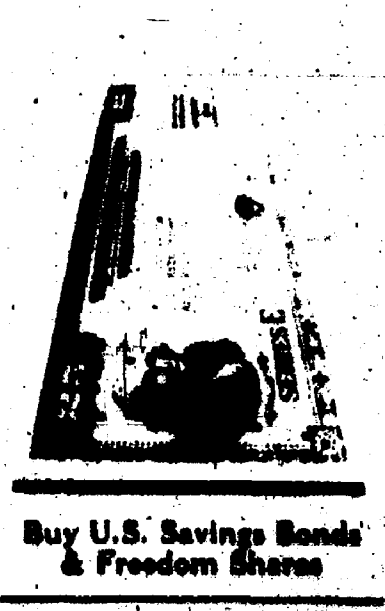

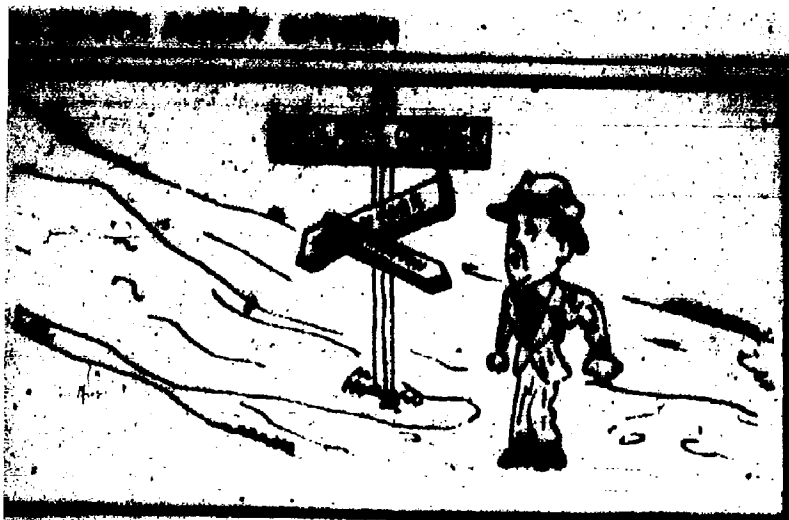

Wake Up To Peanut Butter Toast
One way to get the children in the family to eat a nutritious breakfast is to serve something they like. Nutritionists agree that everyone needs something to eat in the morning, not only to help him get going but to keep him mentally and physically alert until lunchtime. Breakfast, in fact, should provide a fourth to a third of the day's requirement for calories, protein, vitamins and minerals.
If the kids like peanut butter and jelly then let them have it for breakfast. A peanut butter and jelly sandwich with a glass of milk is an easy yet nutritionally sound breakfast whether mother prepares it or the kids get it for themselves.
Take a look at the facts. Two tablespoons Skippy peanut butter contain at least as much protein as a medium size egg or an ounce of cooked hamburger or three slices of crisp bacon or 1/4 glass of milk. NOSTALGIA - SOUTH AMBOY, N.J.

Childhood is the birthplace of nostalgia. The child is the Great Collector -- of sights, sounds, scents, tastes, and emotions that will color all his or her future life . . . it's so relaxing to go back in time, when through a child's eyes things looked so different . . . and yet they remain indelible even when you're ready to collect your social security.

Do you remember "Vina" Miller's and Nelson's cow house on John Street and Henry Street -- almost back to back. And the cows were taken to pasture in the area of Diecker's farm on Bordentown Avenue. They were driven (walked) up in the morning after milking, and returned via Bordentown Avenue and down Feltus Street in the afternoon.

The milking was done by hand, bottled by hand . . . and delivered by a small hand-pushed two-wheel wagon by George and Henry Orazulski -- and Benny and Max Nebus pushed a similar cart for Nelson's . . . you could stop in at the milk house with your own container to be filled. The Millers and Nelsons seemed to be friendly competitors . . . and everyone on Feltus Street and Bordentown Avenue, the route the cows followed daily during the months they went to pasture, seemed to be most understanding, because no one ever complained about the cows "doing what comes naturally" on the streets. The limited number of cars that were on the roads, back 40 years ago always gave way to the "moo".

"Chunkie" Davis kept a small herd of cows on a field which is now Bertram Avenue and Conlogue Avenue from Thomas Street to the water tank . . . To think of it, we used to play baseball there when the cows were in for milking . . . it took an immense amount of courage to slide into a base when you played ball in a cow pasture . . . sometimes, what you thought was a base, wasn't a base at all . . . Oh, yes, "Chunkie" delivered his milk in a small horse-drawn cart similar to what the Amish use in Lancaster, except it was of a gray or khaki-colored canvas.

A speedy milk delivery service was operated by the Macedulski family . . . the family home still stands behind Komars Factory on top of the hill, on Macedulski Terrace. Adam Macedulski always kept a fast horse on the wagon, which wasn't typical of what the city milk men walked around the streets -- he always raced through the streets in town -- he was a horse-drawn "hot rod" . . . Ted "Speed" Dobrzynski was one of Adam's helpers. The Macedulski's also kept a prize bull for breeding purposes . . . Tony Carbone who kept a farm off Rt. 35 used to lead a cow behind a horse-and-wagon to Macedulski's farm to have her mated. It didn't take long for the kids to know the purpose of their trip and made sure they had a ring-side seat at the "bull pen". That was a big way of learning the story of the "Birds and the bees" via the bull and the cow.

. . . and to think that today's "sex education courses" in our schools are presented in such sterile fashion (out of a book).

In addition to the dairy business, Macedulski's raised beans and tomatoes . . . the paying rate for picking was 10 cents a basket (1/2 bushel). Frank Macedulski, who was a builder and contractor also conducted a horse trading business.

John Street, at one time was called "Goat Town" -- probably because Prasnali's kept goats for a source of milk. As goats will be goats, and don't pay no attention to property lines -- a Henry Street resident was blamed for painting one of the goats green and red, with painted horns to match.

Albanese on Pine Avenue also kept a few goats -- and a fine garden and vineyard -- it was apparent, that the goats never got a chance to get into his well-kept garden.

About that time, I remember hearing that o' Irish ditty:

Patrick McGinty, an Irishman of note,
Come into a fortune, and got himself a goat . . .
(anyone knowing the rest of it, I would certainly appreciate the words so we can publish the whole song).

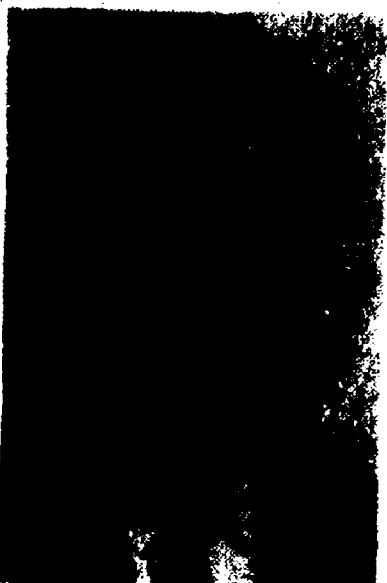

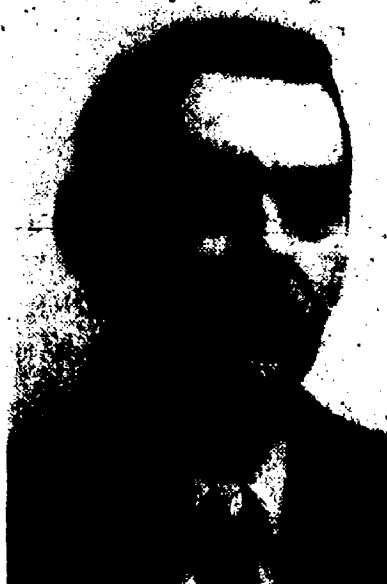

Many persons were gratified recently to read of the remarkable success achieved by the Metroliner train, which was made possible by legislation I co-sponsored in Congress.

According to the report issued by the National Railroad Passenger Corp., 3-1/2 million passengers used the Metroliner between New York and Washington, producing a gross of \$41,500,000. In its first year of operation 3 years ago, 605,000 passengers traveled on the 100 mile-an-hour trains. The Metroliner was so impressive, the number of passengers increased by over 51% in 1970, and in 1971 rose 28%, an amazing record of success.

The Metroliner project has a definite impact on the Middlesex County area, because in October of last year, service was initiated in Middlesex County. Six stops are made every day at the Metropark Station located in Iselin in Woodbridge Township. More stops will probably be made at Iselin later, because the Metroliner is growing in popularity every day. Those who find time extremely important and

AIDS TO MOTORISTS

A total of 103,636 "aids to motorists" were extended to drivers using the New Jersey Turnpike in 1971, reaching the 100,000 level for the first time in the Turnpike's 20 years of operations.

The number was 7.5 percent more than the 96,364 aids recorded by the State Police in 1970, but it represented only 1/10 of 1 percent of 98.5 million revenue vehicles using the Turnpike last year.

Captain Joseph A. Nawrocki, commander of Troop D, who reported the figures to the Turnpike Authority, said his men on the road played the initial role in providing assistance to motorists in trouble.

DENTAL HYGIENE STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN CAPPING CEREMONY

"Freshman students of the Dental Hygiene program," said Dr. Frank M. Chambers, President of Middlesex County College, Edison, "are now ready to service school children and members of the community". The 29 students of the College's second dental hygiene class have completed their first semester and are now ready to service outsiders.

The Department of Dental Hygiene, which is part of the Division of Health Technologies, will conduct a capping ceremony to call attention to the fact that the first-year students are now prepared to provide service.

During the students' first semester of study, they learn the principles of primary and secondary prevention. Lecture and laboratory hours were directed towards teaching the student how to successfully complete an oral prophylaxis. Mannequins and class partners were used to learn instrument techniques. Their training to date prepares them to provide oral

examinations which include removal of deposits and stains and polishing of teeth, counseling in preventive dentistry with emphasis on home care and nutritional guidance.

The capping, which is sponsored by the Junior American Dental Hygiene Association, is made up of members of both dental hygiene classes, will be conducted by Mrs. Dale S. Citron, supervisor of the department. Mrs. Genia Berk, Associate Dean for Health Careers, at the Union County Technical Institute, will be guest speaker and Present Chambers and Prof. Rose M. Channing, Director of the Division of Health Technologies, will also address the students, parents, other relatives and friends who will attend.

Upon successful completion of the College's two-year program, the graduate is awarded an associate in applied science degree and is qualified to take the New Jersey State Board or the National Board examination for licensure.

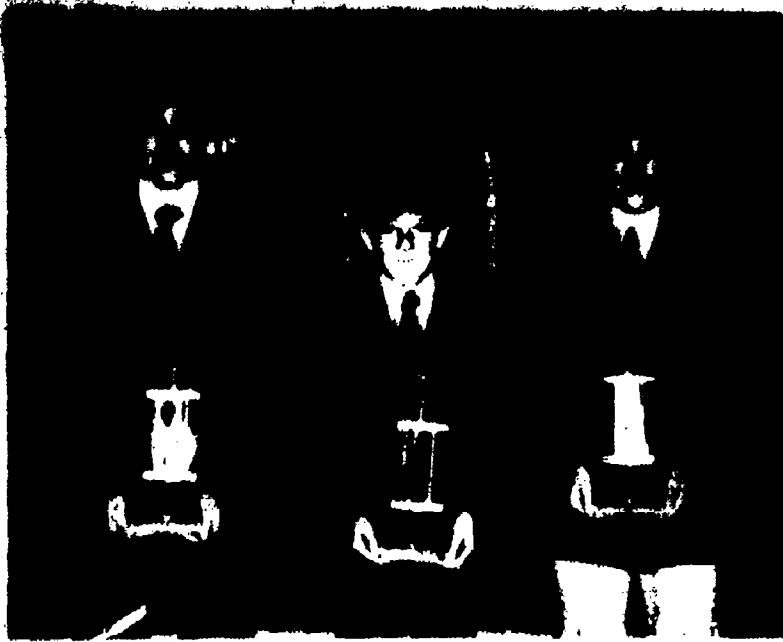
