

St. Mary's High School To Operate Under Diocese

Most Rev. Theodore E. McCarrick, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Metuchen, at a meeting of pastors and principals March 25, at St. Pius X High School, Piscataway announced that the Diocese will assume the administration of St. Mary High School, South Amboy, in September 1987.

With the agreement of Magr. John L. Gerety, pastor of St. Mary Parish, South Amboy, who is responsible for the administration of the school, and of Sister Mary Raphael, RSM, superior general of the Sisters of Mercy who staff the school, the Bishop said he was taking this step to insure that "this important institution will not only survive, but will continue to play a significant part in the life of the community."

The Bishop commented on the great contribution to St. Mary's High School that has been made over the years by the pastors of St. Mary's and the priests who served there. He attributed much of the past success of the school to the dedication of the Sisters of Mercy and of all the members of the high school's faculty, both religious and lay. Bishop McCarrick said he counted on their continued support to maintain and enrich the education offered to the students.

St. Mary's High School has been running at a deficit for nearly 30 years. The diocese will relieve the financial pressures from St. Mary's parish. A diocese-run school could attract more students from neighboring communities, which could help keep tuition from increasing.

The announcement of the diocese planning to run the school, is viewed as a reprieve for St. Mary's. Five years ago, St. Mary's in Perth Amboy closed due to a decline in enrollment.

Magr. Gerety said, "I am pleased and gratified that the Bishop has announced that the diocese is prepared to take responsibility for the school and that this announcement has been made far in advance of the effective date so that a smooth transition from parish to diocesan administration may be made."

"By his action, the Bishop has insured that this historic school, St. Mary High School, will continue to be a strong influence in Catholic education."

"I believe," he continued, "that the people of St. Mary Parish will especially appreciate two things: that the parish, by the Bishop's action, will be relieved of the substantial financial responsibility for a school which is called parochial, but which in fact is regional, since only 15 percent of the school population are members of the parish, and secondly, that this act expresses the Bishop's continuing strong support not only for Catholic education, but also for St. Mary's High School as a center of Catholic education and influence in this part of Middlesex County."

The Sisters of Mercy will continue to make policy and staffing decisions at the school.

Sayreville Approves Budget First Tax Rate In 15 Years

On March 26, the Sayreville Borough Council approved its 1986 budget, which calls for the first municipal tax in the borough in 15 years.

The tax rate will stand at nine cents for each \$100 of assessed valuation.

Sayreville, like South Amboy is suffering from a loss in gross receipt revenues paid to the municipalities. South Amboy lost about \$325,000 in gross receipt money over last year, causing the city to have its first tax rate in 5 years.

At the time Mayor J. Thomas Cross urged citizens to write to Governor Kean and his staff and tell them to stop playing with gross receipts.

South Amboy will have its public hearing on the 1986 budget on April 16.

Drug Awareness Important To Control Abuse Crime Prevention Program Outlined

The South Amboy Teenage Drug and Alcohol Abuse Committee has done a great community service to the City of South Amboy by publicizing the substance control problem that exists in South Amboy and many other communities across the country.

Already the South Amboy Committee is receiving letters from other towns about starting similar programs.

Through the cooperation of the South Amboy Police Department and through the LINKS programs at the city's high schools, the problem of substance abuse is being recognized and steps are being taken to reduce this nationwide problem.

The South Amboy Citizen, through the cooperation of the Middlesex Somerset Tel-Med Consortium, would like to assist the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Committee by providing information to the community regarding drugs

and alcohol and the affects these substances have on people.

Tel-Med is a free phone health information program operated by the consortium in Middlesex and Somerset Counties. The system's coordinator, Jake Defort, who also happens to be the Citizen's Associate Editor, is providing to the Citizen, scripts of the Tel-Med tapes which will be printed verbatim to increase public awareness of the drugs themselves. These scripts used by Tel-Med are written by physicians and have been approved by the New Jersey Medical Society. The purpose is to just increase the public's awareness about the problem. Each week a different topic will be recognized.

The first is the series addresses cocaine abuse.

"Drug abuse has been present in many societies, both ancient and modern. One abused drug that has

become very popular recently has been cocaine. Cocaine comes from the leaves of the coca shrub. The natives in the Andes of South America have chewed the leaves of this plant for thousands of years. The Inca Indians of Peru used these leaves during religious ceremonies. Over 100 years ago, cocaine was chemically removed from the leaves of the Coca shrubs by a German chemist. Since that time it has been used in various ways throughout our society. Today, it is one of the most popular abused drugs.

"Cocaine is also called coke, flake, snow, lady, and too to mention just a few. It is usually snuffed through the nose or injected into a vein. When used socially as a pleasure producing drug, users report that they feel confident, powerful, and excited. It produces a feeling of well-being, elation and happiness. It may also cause the user to see or hear things that are not really present. The human body, however, soon becomes tolerant to the drug—that is it takes more and more cocaine to produce the good feelings. Therefore, the user must increase his or her dose to get the same effect. Though cocaine is not thought to be physically addicting, signs of withdrawal do appear when the use of the drug is stopped. Such signs include sleeping for long periods of time, agitation and serious mental depression. The depression is sometimes serious enough to cause suicide. A person who has used the drug for some time may soon take cocaine just to avoid the terrible depression. Prolonged periods of regular cocaine use may cause the user to become paranoid and cause personality changes.

"Cocaine, besides affecting the mind, has a strong effect on the body also. It causes a person to breathe faster. It increases

Representatives from Southland Corporation, parent company of 7-Eleven stores, presented their crime prevention program to the mayor and council at a special meeting March 31. Last month the City Council delayed introducing an ordinance which would require late night businesses to have more than one employee from 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. on duty in the store to hear the Southland presentation.

Joseph Notarnicola, a legislative affairs manager for Southland Corp. said the company's commitment to community involvement and the sharing of this very effective program has been applauded and honored by many local and state governments.

Notarnicola and Robert Quigley, Southland Corp.'s Loss Prevention Manager, Northeast Division, made the presentation to the council.

Quigley said Southland has long been operating "several hundred Citgo-Quik Mart stations as well as over 3000 7-Eleven stores with gasoline."

Quigley said Southland's decision to investigate a crime prevention program developed from the concern of customer and clerk injuries that were taking place. "The money we were losing in these robberies," said Quigley, "was insignificant."

Southland then came in touch with Ray Johnson, an expert in crime prevention. "Ray is a very interesting expert," said Quigley. "Ray is an ex-convict. He spent 25 of his first 46 years behind bars for armed robbery. He was paroled several years earlier and was then working with the Western Behavioral Scientific Research Institute (WBSI)."

WBSI studied criminal behavior in an effort to develop a preventative program. Part of the program was to ask Ray Johnson and other ex-cons what make a store attractive to potential robbers.

Information gathered was put into the Southland program for crime prevention. The employees were educated in robbery procedure and the stores

were redesigned to make them less attractive to would be crooks.

Two Clerks Not A Factor

The proposed South Amboy Ordinance, similar to the ones adopted in Old Bridge and Sayreville would require a second overnight employee. Southland research says a second employee does not deter a potential thief.

Among the changes in 7-Eleven stores themselves,

"Thousands of additional lights light up parking lots," said Quigley. "Gondolas were lowered to prevent people from lurking unnoticed in the store, counter magazine racks were also lowered. Also moving the entire sales counter closer to the window was done to create a fish bowl effect."

"This was done to make the employee visible from the street and also put the robber on stage and allows the police to be able to see what is going on in the store, and allows the employee to see what is going on outside the store."

Southland incorporated their findings in 3-day clerk training and their 15 day management training programs.

Quigley maintained having an alarm button in the store would increase the risk of injury to the clerk. Quigley said a fidgety clerk makes for a more nervous robber. The clerk feels as though he has to hit the alarm button. He starts getting nervous and his actions start slowing down. The robber now starts getting more nervous. Maybe the clerk hits the button and the robber hears the sirens, he has a hostage

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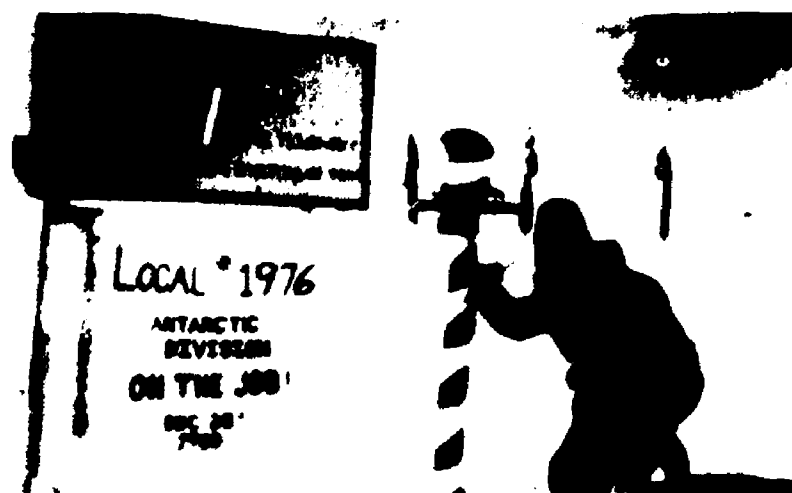

...talking with Stan Drake (part 2)

The man who painted the South Pole, Stan Drake. Sounds like a nice introduction for someone. But it is a fact, Stan Drake is the man who painted the south pole. The actual South Pole is only about 4 feet high and now sports a red and white striped motif. The old green and yellow stripes just didn't cut it anymore so Stan got his brush one morning (Christmas morning 1980 at 4 a.m.), and painted the South Pole. The actual hourly time is not unusual because he was there during the summer, which is 6 months of daylight.

Stan Drake is a private contractor. He goes where ever there is work to be done. As we said last week, he has spent time in Egypt, Israel and most of his time at the South Pole. Stan has visited the South Pole on three different assignments and is considering a fourth.

The Antarctic is not common conversation so Stan has a difficult time explaining the where's and why's of his job. "Sometimes when I come home from the Antarctic it's easier to just say I just got out of jail," Stan says, "people relate better to the jail thing rather than tell them I'm back from the Antarctic."

"When I was leaving for the ice a couple years ago, I'm talking to the guys at the union hall and I say I'm leaving and they ask where am I going. I say I'm going to Antarctica and some guy says 'what state is that in?'"

"Another guy said 'what are you going to do UP there?'"

The Antarctic may be an out of the way place, but it is perhaps the best place in the entire world to celebrate New Year's Eve. One New Year's Eve in Antarctica, Stan and his co-workers had 24 parties in one night. One must remember that all the longitude lines come together at the South Pole and to walk around the pole is to walk around the entire world, in technical sense of the word.

"All the longitudes converge at the pole, so somewhere in the world every hour, somebody's having a party. So you go out to the pole stand in one spot and have a party, an hour later move a few feet and celebrate with another part of the world and so on for the whole day."

"We were celebrating with somebody else in the world every hour," he said. This was done in a very scientific manner. Stan says they started at the Greenwich, England longitude line, where all meantime starts, and preceded to go around the world.

Also while in Antarctica, Stan joined the prestigious "300 Club." "To join you have to wait for the wind chill to get 100 degrees below zero, get into the sauna which is cranked up to 100 degrees, get all steamy and hot and from the sauna to the pole is 100 yards. You must run naked to the pole and back to join the club." So you see this 300 Club has nothing to do with bowling.

"It sounds weird to do it," Says Stan, "but you are all pumped up and warm from the sauna and you run quickly and the only part that gets cold is your feet." People who have a difficult time going from their shower to their bedroom in the winter probably would not be considered timber for the 300 Club.

Stan also says there is a self hair trimming method in the Antarctic. "Wet your hair and then go out and stand outside for a while, they you'll be able to break off your hair, give yourself a shag haircut."

The scientists from all over the world that do research in Antarctica seem to get along rather well. "We all have the same goals, survive and do the job," Stan says. There are 16-18 countries involved in the Antarctic Treaty. The U.S. and the Soviet Union have the most bases at the pole. The U.S. has the largest base, McMurdo.

There is still a lot of work to be done at the South Pole. "They are going to build, two-three story dorms, a heavy equipment shop, a bio lab, and a whole series of modular buildings," says Stan.

"Going to the Antarctic will be just like going to some town and not another continent, there will be so much there."

Another of the places Stan has been, as we mentioned previously, are Egypt and Israel. Stan helped on the construction of two air bases in Israel under the terms of the Camp David agreement. Despite all the military unrest in the Middle East Stan says "I'd go back there is a heartbeat."

"That stuff never affected the contractors. When we worked in Israel, the Syrian-Lebanese war was going on, it was about 500 kilometers away. Every time we finished a run way, the Israeli F-16's were taking off, arming and fueling and going and they were fighting in the war. Then they would come back and go out again."

"If it ever got that close, the contractor had three 727 planes sitting on an air field in Athens, which was an hour and a half from us. They'd fly the planes in and fly us right out."

Stan is still pondering where his next job will be. Last week he received an offer to work in Moscow, the

If he turns down the position, he may spend 14-months in Antarctica being involved with some major construction that will happen at the South Pole. Another possibility is in London. Right now, Stan is thinking about how he will spend the next several months and where the best offers lie.

The Moscow project will take considerable thought. "It would be new territory for me. I've been practically everywhere between the Navy and with the overseas jobs, but I really don't know about going into the Soviet Union."

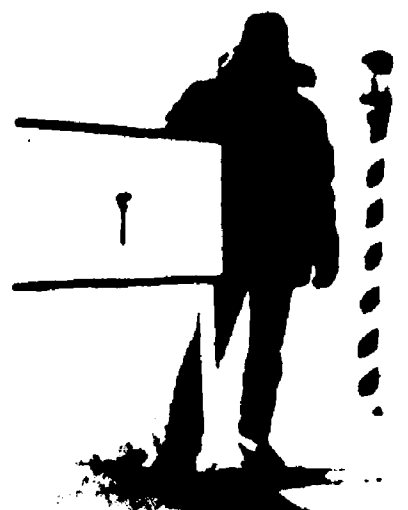
For now he is staying home and visiting with those closest to him.

He has three sons, Richard is the oldest and is employed as a leather salesman. His other two sons Steve and Danny are both in Stan's union. Steve has been to the

South Pole also, but not at the same time as his father. "I think I was in Egypt when he was in Antarctica" said Stan, "and when I went to the ice, he was somewhere else."

"It's a very enjoyable job. I doubt there is any other job where your employer can hand you a ticket and you can go all over the world."

"There is something new all the time, it's a serious job, but we have a lot of good times."

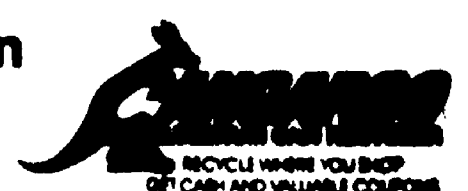

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Profile On The Board Of Education Candidates

In two weeks the votes will be in and the candidates for the Board of Education election will be decided.

On April 15, four candidates will be running for seats on the Board of Education. Three incumbents and one new comer have all announced their candidacies for the election.

Incumbents include Board president James Reilly, William McGowan, and Thomas Tice. Kenneth Benson is the only newcomer this year.

Profile On The Candidates James Reilly

Incumbent James Reilly has been on the Board of Education for the past four years, in which he has served as Board President.

Reilly is running for a four year seat in this year's election. Over the past four years that he has been on the Board of Education, Reilly said proudly that he has "never missed a meeting, whether it was due to illness, a vacation or whatever." Reilly went on to say, "We have a good working Board. We all seem to get."

The accomplishment that Reilly is most proud of is bringing the children back to South Amboy from Spotswood to attend school. "It is much safer and closer to have the children go to school in town and not have them (the children) travel over 12 miles to the Spotswood school," commented Reilly.

Also, Reilly added that he is happy with the seventh and eighth grade computer course that has been introduced to the public school, along with the typing classes being offered to the fifth and sixth grades. "There is now a full library in the elementary school, something that the Spotswood school did not have," stressed Reilly.

"The Gifted and Talented Program's expansion is another accomplishment that should be mentioned," according to Reilly. "We have now been certified by the state for another five years."

Among other things that the Board of Education has succeeded in, Reilly said that he is totally committed with the Teenage Drug and Alcohol Abuse Committee in which he is a Board representative.

James Reilly is a graduate of Saint Mary's High School in town and resides in South Amboy with his wife JoAnne and their two sons, James, 19, and Robert, 14. Reilly is presently employed at Amax Specialty Metals in Carteret as a supervisor.

What James Reilly wants to see is the continual maintenance of the public schools in South Amboy. According to Reilly, "the field that was installed last year next to the public high school is the most implemented project that the Board of Education has done!" Reilly went on to say, "I am very proud of that field and as far as I can see, it has been well used by not only the school for softball and baseball practices and recesses, but it is even being used by the community, too!"

Reilly also expressed his concern about the new housing development in South Amboy off of Pupek Road. "I am worried about the town expansion especially with these 108 homes going up."

Reilly said the reason why the taxes went up and that the insurance increased this year was because the state aid was lessened. "It is because of this that the money never increased." What Reilly would also like to see done is the improvement of the food program in the school.

"I feel very fortunate to be associated with really

dedicated people who really have the children's welfare at heart," commented McGowan on the Board. "I would like to offer the best education to the children." McGowan went on to say that he would like to expand on the computer technology, supply update curriculum for the students in science and technology, to continue the Gifted and Talented Program, and to maintain the facilities and tax costs in South Amboy.

Of the many accomplishments of the Board of Education, McGowan listed a couple things that he feels very proud of. The upgrading of the public schools was one of these things that McGowan was part of. He said, "I have been on both the appointed board and the elected board. The public school was very old and needed repair in which we had the interior remodeled." McGowan added "the work was eventually completed when the Board of Education became an elected Board."

Also, McGowan said he was glad that "the Board was able to bring the children back into a situation of being closer to the community while they attend school in town instead of going to Spotswood." He added that a computer science and technology program was being offered to the students at the public school and that the Board has been able to progress it down to the elementary school. A new addition to the elementary school and establishing special education classes has also been accomplished due to the Board.

William McGowan has lived in town for over 25 years with his wife Jeanne, and their children William Jr. and Sandra. He attended Monmouth College, where he majored in Business Administration. McGowan is employed at South Amboy City Hall in the Finance Department as Treasurer.

Dowdell Library To Raise Non-Resident Fees

Access to the Dowdell Library of South Amboy will change this summer for people living outside the city limits, based on recent decisions by the library's Board of Trustees. Beginning July 1, only people who live, work, or attend school in South Amboy will be entitled to a free library card. Anyone else who wishes to check out books from the library must either present a library card from a Middlesex County community which honors the South Amboy card, or pay \$20.00 for a one-year non-resident card.

This decision affects residents of East Brunswick, Woodbridge, South Plainfield, and Sayreville. Morgan residents have received free borrowing privileges in South Amboy for many years, even though South Amboyans have been unable to use the Sayreville Library under the same conditions.

"It's unfortunate that we had to take this step," explained South Amboy library director Keith McCoy. "We have asked the Sayreville Library Board to cooperate, but they have refused. We feel there are advantages to reciprocal borrowing, but a one-sided arrangement does not benefit our patrons and tax payers. Perhaps the future will see greater cooperation."

Under the new policy, all out-of-county cards will expire on their renewal dates. Cards for people in non-cooperating communities will expire on June 30.

now. "Why give our clerks something else to think about than just giving up the money and getting the robber out of the store?" asks Quigley.

"Our survey show that two clerks do not prevent robberies." Our survey in Huntville said a robber will take on five or six clerks before some deterrent value was realized.

"Additionally with more than one clerk on duty, the chance of a robber being surprised or startled by a clerk, coming out of a backroom or bathroom is another consideration. The last thing you want to do is startle somebody with a gun," said Quigley.

The Huntville survey show the attractiveness level of a store to a robber as the amount of anticipated money increases. Below 50 dollars, 80 percent of robbers would definitely not rob the store. Above 90 dollars, almost all robbers would rob the store.

Quigley says low cash levels are the biggest and best protections against robberies.

According to another survey, cameras are not effective. "Our record show that cameras have no impact on robberies or our arrest rate," he said.

The Southland crime prevention program has reduced their cash loss by 73 percent, which translates to about 36 dollars per incident. Quigley emphasized that low cash expectancy is the number one deterrent to robbers.

"Since 1975 the robbery rate of 7-Eleven stores has been cut by 65 percent as of 1984," he said.

In the 211 7-Eleven stores operating in the state of New Jersey, there was a total of 7 robberies in 1985 with no injuries to employees or customers. Quigley said three of the seven robberies occurred with two clerks on duty.

The key ingredient in the 7-Eleven prevention program is the installation of drop safes in the stores. These safes are where the

the blood pressure and heart rate. It decreases a person's appetite. Large doses can cause strokes or heart attacks. People who take the drug over a period of time may suffer from malnutrition because they have neglected to eat well. If the drug is injected into a vein, the user runs the risk of liver and heart infections. Also, cocaine is often mixed or "cut" with other white powders such as soda, sugar and powdered milk. Other chemicals may be added which are dangerous. If injected into the blood stream, these chemicals may cause physical problems.

"All in all, the use of cocaine usually spells trouble. Once a person starts, he often increases his usage to the point that it is a daily experience. It is not hard to see how this could ruin a person's job and family relations. The cost in mental and physical terms is far too high for the brief period of emotional 'High.' Financially, the drug is extremely expensive! The best course to take is to never experiment with the drug. If someone you know is having problems with the drug, get him or her to a doctor. Withdrawal from cocaine may require hospitalization. Contact your doctor if you have further questions regarding cocaine."

Southland Crime Prevention Proclaim Noted Nationally

was the number one attraction in their determination to rob a particular business. Cash control and the advertisement of that fact, therefore, is the number one deterrent.

In 1982 The Southland Corporation was recognized by the National Crime Prevention Coalition as the corporation which made the greatest contribution to community crime prevention in the United States. Southland's crime prevention program is taught to law enforcement officers from the United States and Canada. This program is conducted at the National Crime Prevention Institute and taught by Southland's own Loss Prevention Professionals. The program has been recognized as a standard for crime prevention in small businesses throughout North America. Southland's commitment to community involvement and the sharing of this very effective program has been applauded and honored by many state and local governments.

Southland applauds the South Amboy Town Council for its concern over robberies and the potential for violence. We do feel however, that our time proven method of managing this problem is most effective. Southland looks forward to working with the council, sharing our knowledge and expertise in making South Amboy a safer community in which to work and live.

BUDGET MESSAGE

The City of South Amboy is not currently subject to provisions of Chapter 60, New Jersey Public Laws of 1977 as amended. These laws are more commonly known as the New Jersey Municipal Cap Law.

The 1986 Municipal Budget shows a municipal tax rate for the first time since 1982. It is expected that a tax rate of three cents (3¢) for municipal purposes will be assessed. Translated to dollars this amounts to \$24.00 per year or \$2.00 a month. This pays for all City Services. The balance of the tax rate is comprised of county and school taxes. Citizens wishing to have input on the county and school budgets, which require the City to collect property taxes, should contact the South Amboy Board of Education, 240 John Street, South Amboy, NJ 08879 (201-721-0247) and the County of Middlesex, County Administration Building, One John F. Kennedy Square, New Brunswick, NJ 08903 (201-745-3000) for further information on the school and county budgets.

Budget uncertainty continues for 1986 due to action of the State of New Jersey and the United States Government. Governor Thomas Kean has continued to take a portion of the available franchise and gross receipts taxes from municipalities with power generating facilities so that it could be utilized elsewhere in the Governor's Budget. Similarly, President Reagan has proposed the elimination of the Revenue Sharing Program. These funds have already been cut by approximately \$180,000.00 per year from the 1982 level.

In order to prevent these actions Citizens are urged to write both the Governor and President to protest their actions. Additionally, we urge you to write your area state and federal legislators to show your support in their efforts resisting these revenue cuts. Unless these trends are reversed, the property owner will be forced to pay higher taxes in future years.

In compliance with regulations of the Division of Local Government Services of the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs the City does receive funds for the continued employment of a full-time position of Housing Inspector in the Division of Code Enforcement. These funds are received through the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 and are appropriated by Rider in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:4-39.

Major highlights of the 1986 Municipal Budget are:

- 1) The 1986 Municipal Budget is downed by \$145,800.00 or three percent (3%) compared to the 1985 Municipal Budget.

2) The 1986 Municipal Budget has been carefully compiled to cut costs without affecting the quality of service to which the Citizens of South Amboy are accustomed. In order to accomplish this, I am asking for the full cooperation of all Departments and Divisions. The effective implementation of cost cutting will be my goal in 1986.

3) The City must continue to achieve cost savings in order to prevent increases in budget appropriations which could translate to tax increases. Replacement equipment to be purchased during the 1986 year is expected to provide cost effective operation. Persons or special interest groups who will seek to have additional activities funded by the City will find that the City does not have the necessary money. Unless programs can be shown to be cost effective with future savings, it will be difficult to justify additional expense.

4) Any increases in the 1986 Water Utility Budget are due to increased maintenance required to be performed on the existing water treatment plant and distribution system. Due to the uncertainty of ground water supplies it is necessary to find an additional safe source of water supply. If this source is not available at a reasonable cost, a public referendum will be held on the sale of the South Amboy Water Utility.

5) At the suggestion of our Auditor budget numbers have been rounded where possible.

On April 16, 1986 at a meeting of City Council to be held at 7:30 p.m. at the South Amboy Council Chambers a hearing on general revenue sharing will be held as part of the public hearing on the 1986 Municipal Budget of the City of South Amboy. The public is encouraged to exercise its rights by providing written and oral comments, by asking questions, and by otherwise participating in the budget adoption process, including, but not limited to, the relationship of general revenue sharing funds to this municipal budget. Information on the Budget, together with a true copy of the entire proposed 1986 Municipal Budget is available to the public for inspection. No civilian absentee ballot will be furnished or forwarded to any applicant unless request therefore is received not less than 7 days prior to the election, and contain the foregoing information.

VOTERS WHO ARE PERMANENTLY AND TOTALLY DISABLED SHALL, AFTER THEIR INITIAL REQUEST AND WITHOUT FURTHER ACTION ON THEIR PART, BE FORWARDED AN ABSENTEE BALLOT APPLICATION BY THE COUNTY CLERK FOR ALL FUTURE ELECTIONS IN WHICH THEY ARE ELIGIBLE TO VOTE. 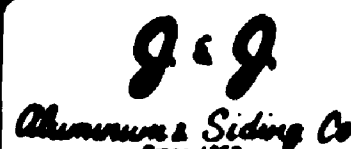
