

Councilman Miffed at Meeting Procedure

Citing the public had no input at a special meeting at which the city's Redevelopment Agency was named, Councilman John Ciszewski said plans for the agency should come to a halt until the public is heard.



"I'm not against the concept of Redevelopment Agency," said Ciszewski. "I do not like the way it was handled."

Ciszewski, recovering at home from major surgery, felt the public should have had the opportunity to express their concerns the

night the appointments were made public.

A large crowd was expected at last night's City council meeting to express their opinions on the issue. "This Redevelopment Agency is the biggest issue in South Amboy since the explosion," said Ciszewski.

"I am not against the commission, I am against the way the people have been treated," said Ciszewski. "The people should have the right to say what they want to say and ask the questions they want. The questions should be answered first."

"The policy was right, the procedure was wrong," he said.

Ciszewski also urges the public to attend the meetings when the plans are presented to the Planning Board.

Ciszewski said there are a series of conditions precedent to proceedings with the redevelopment plan, which he said the people should be aware of.

According to State Statute

"No agency shall proceed with a redevelopment plan unless (a) the municipality has first determined that the area to which said plan refers is blighted, which determination shall be made by the governing body of said municipality as provided by chapter 187 of the laws of 1949, or is an area in need of rehabilitation so as to prevent the exercise of blighted conditions, which determination may take into consideration the existence of blighted areas elsewhere in the municipality, deterioration of housing stock, age of housing stock, supply of and demand for housing in the municipality, and arrearage in real property taxes due on residential properties; and (b) the governing body of the municipality has first, by ordinance, approved a redevelopment plan after study and recommendation of its planning board, if any, finds that said plan provides an outline for the replanning development or redevelopment of said area sufficient to indicate: (1) its relationship to definite local objectives as to appropriate land uses, density of population and improved traffic, public transportation, public utilities, recreational and community facilities and other public improvements; (2) proposed land uses and building requirements in the area; (3) provision for the temporary and permanent relocation of persons living in such areas; by arranging for (unless already available) decent, safe and sanitary dwelling units at rents within the means of the persons displaced from said areas."

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Hospital's Tenth Tourney Tops \$18,000

South Amboy Memorial Hospital's Tenth Annual Golf Tournament held at the Colonia Country club, here, on May 19, raised \$18,000. Once again, as in all previous years, the tournament was sponsored by John "Blackie" Meszaros, of Parlin.

Commenting on the successful outcome of the 1986 tournament, Irv J. Diamond, chief executive officer of the hospital, said, "Celebrating the tenth anniversary of the hospital's golf outing was made all the more meaningful by the dedication of John Meszaros and the presence of so many loyal and devoted supporters of South Amboy Memorial Hospital."

The hospital tournament, in which 124 golfers participated, began at 11:30 a.m. with a shotgun start. Refreshments were available on the course and souvenir Polaroid photos were given to each player. The outing concluded with

an open bar with hot and cold hors d'oeuvres and a prime rib dinner during which awards were presented. The winner of the Mayor's Trophy was Mike Klimchak, of Sayreville, with a score of 74, followed by second place winner, Jodie McCloud, of Spring Lake. Prizes were also awarded for low calloway, closest to the pin and longest drive.

Mr. Meszaros was aided in the planning and organization of the 1986 tournament by a committee composed of John R. Everitt, Esq., of South Amboy, 1986 Golf committee Chairman and a member of the hospital Board of Governors, John F. Lettis, of Sayreville, Treasurer of the hospital Board, Irv J. Diamond, of Ocean Township, Chief Executive Officer of the hospital, Howard Tune, of Woodbridge, the hospital's Materials Manager and Deborah J. Smith, of Red Bank, the hospital's Director

of Public Relations and Marketing.

As in previous years, the mayors of the three municipalities comprising South Amboy Memorial Hospital's primary service area acted as honorary co-chairmen for the tournament: J. Thomas Cross, Mayor of South Amboy; John B. McCormack, Mayor of Sayreville and Russell J. Assarello, Mayor of Old Bridge. Mr. Meszaros was also assisted by his sons, Mel, Alan and John Jr. and by Terry Sergento, Gerri Kenny and Steve Garbarsack who helped with setup and refreshments.

Mr. Meszaros' personal interest in South Amboy Memorial Hospital began in 1973 when he supervised the iron workers during the construction of the hospital's new wing. In 1977 he organized the first South Amboy Memorial Hospital Benefit Golf Tournament and has sponsored each succeeding year's outing.

Six Named to Redevelopment Agency

After years of planning and months of narrowing down candidates, the City Council named the six commissioners for the city's Redevelopment Agency.

Named were Frederick Kurtz to a five year term, Andy Markowitz to a four year term, Richard O'Connor to a three year term, Janice Tedesco for two years and Kevin Meszaros to a one year term.

Mayor J. Thomas Cross named Lester Lentz as his selection to the agency. Lentz will serve a five year term.

The appointments were announced at a special meeting of the council and the commissioners were to be sworn in last night following the regular council meeting.

"There were a total of 24 names submitted for the commission," said Council President Bruce Richmond. "It was not an easy task, however, we have a good cross section of people."

Cross said Kurtz was appointed because he was involved with the plan from the beginning.

"Basically the reason he was appointed," said Cross, "is that he knows the start of the whole system, he was involved many years ago when we started this." Kurtz serves as Executive

Director of the Middlesex County Utilities Authority. He served as South Amboy City Engineer until February of this year.

Lentz has been a businessman in the city for over 20 years. He owns the Brave Bull Tavern and is a member of the city Planning Board. Lentz may have to resign his position on the Planning Board, because only one member of the board may serve on the agency.

Markowitz will serve as the representative from the planning board to the agency. O'Connor is a member of the city Housing Authority. Mrs. Tedesco is Comptroller at South Amboy Memorial Hospital and serves as president of the city Improvement Advisory Committee. "We feel that she will be an asset to the agency because of her expertise in finance and her knowledge of the town," said Cross.

Meszaros is a certified public accountant with a New York firm. "I think it should be noted that all the actions being done with the Redevelopment Agency will be done at public meetings and there will be hearings, the people will be involved," said Cross. "This is not a closed door policy."

Several residents in

attendance at last week's meeting, voiced dissatisfaction with the council's decision to appoint commissioners to the agency before the November election.

Democratic Councilman-at-Large candidates John T. O'Leary and Craig J. Coughlin have called for the council to wait until a new administration takes over in January.

Joanne O'Leary-Katko said last week that after two days of petitioning, she had over 800 names opposing the appointments and asking the council to rescind the Redevelopment Agency ordinance.

Cross said he had no intention of delaying a project begun many years ago until after an election. "I am the mayor," said Cross. "I will be the mayor until December 31, and I intend to do my job up until that time."

Republican party candidate for mayor, Robert Hoffman, said he hoped the council would wait until January. "I hope the individuals will cooperate with the new administration."

Republican Councilman-at-Large candidate Ken Benson was concerned about the public not having a voice at the June 25 meeting. "I think that out of common

courtesy, when elected officials have a room full of people who are obviously concerned about the business at hand, it is their duty to offer the public the opportunity to voice their concerns."

"It's not as much a matter of the individuals named but the creation of the offices by a lame duck administration that have the ability to have a profound impact on the future of this city," said Benson.

"This is not something we decided to do overnight," said Cross. "If anybody read my New Year's Day speech, it was in there for three years."

"We're doing this because I think it is good for the town, it's a step in the right direction. Overall this project will save the city tax wise, this can be anywhere from a 50 to 100 million dollar rateable."

"John Ciszewski has been aware and involved and is in total support of the action being taken here," said Richmond. "he was contacted at home, he is unable to climb steps or he would have been here."

Ciszewski, the democratic candidate for mayor is at home recuperating from surgery, said Cross contacted him several times to discuss the appointments.

Mile Square Talk

Our comment was "How does one know who has the right of way at the circle by the Amboy Cinema?"

His collector's business card claims he is a "McAddict," an International Acquisitor of McDonald's Memorabilia. That's more of a mouthful than a Big Mac.

And his card used to have the McDonald's 'Golden Arches' on it, too, but the world's largest fast food chain felt their trademark was being infringed upon, and put a stop to his using the arches.

But for John S. Craig, an internationally-recognized expert and professional dealer in the field of antique and collectible cameras and images, the collecting of McDonald's and other 'fast food' restaurant items is not only fun, but historically important.

"McDonald's really changed the way America eats," he said. "It is all part of the development of the whole concept of 'Roadside America'—the gasoline station, the diner, the motel, the restaurants. The automobile changed the way Americans lived and traveled, and all the rest of it is a natural outgrowth."

Mr. Craig, who lives in Torrington, Ct. had an extensive array of McDonald's memorabilia on display at the Liberty Fair Antiques and Collectibles Expo June 23.

The base for the current fast food restaurants, Mr. Craig said, goes back to firms like White Castle and Howard Johnson's. The fascination with McDonald's, in particular, stems from a variety of reasons. First, he said, nearly all of the promotions run by the firms are regional—"you find different items in New Jersey than in Connecticut, and some totally different concepts on the West Coast."

"McDonald's has also followed the lines that most ephemera collectors feel makes good, valuable collectibles of the future—many items are paper, have good graphics, appeal to children, and are disposable."

Mr. Craig's own collection, built up over the past eight years, concentrates on the more difficult items—in-store promotions, such as the 16-inch high Ronald McDonald that was crafted from Lego blocks and used for a store display during one promotion. He also has some of the large advertising banners that hung outside the stores; the molded fiberglass Ronald McDonald head that sits on top of a helium tank, for filling balloons; and specialized pins and buttons for various promotions.

"What I particularly like," Mr. Craig said, "are things like corporate letters, catalogues, owner/operator's manuals—these things, plus the advertising items that come from the annual owner/operator's conventions."

At a show like the Liberty Fair, Mr. Craig can usually be found wearing a sport coat displaying the Golden Arches that used to belong to a store manager, or else a shirt that was custom made for him out of bright blue patterned fabric used for Hawaiian McDonald's uniforms nearly 15 years ago.

Because of Mr. Craig's dealings with photographic collectors around the world, he also has a large variety of McDonald's material from different parts of the world, including toys, games, in-store promotions, glasses and mugs.

"The collection grows almost daily," he said. He has started a computer inventory of his collection, "but I may never catch up."

Friends Of The Emerald Isle

Within the past few years, events designed to benefit the hungry, homeless, needy and many other worthy causes have made headlines all over the world. In South Amboy, a new local organization has been established which brings the meaning of sharing closer to home. The Friends of the Emerald Isle, with the support of local residents and business people, will sponsor a trip to the United States for a family of five, now living in Northern Ireland.

The group is comprised of local residents who share in the desire to assist in the project. The organization is headed by Executive Director George Seaman, Assistant Executive Director John J. Grimley, Secretary Barbara Rone and Treasurer Hugh Rone. The members of the board include: Judith Seaman, Joan Meszaros, Alice Ashton, John Hayden, Mary Hayden, Donna Hensberger, Ronald Seaman, Charles Simmons, Mary Boychuk and Rev. Daniel J. Herlihy of St. Mary's Parish.

George Seaman said the idea for this project came from "Project Children," which is a project designed to raise money to bring Catholic and Protestant children to the United States from Ireland for a six-week summer holiday. This project was begun by Pat Mulcahy, who in the 1960's left Rock Chapel County, Cork, Ireland to seek fortunes in the United States. Mulcahy moved to Greenwood Lake, N.Y. in 1973. It was there during a family discussion that the idea of Project Children was born. This project was born out of Mulcahy's frustration of being a spectator of Northern Ireland's agony and effects of violence on the children.

The Seaman's have had children stay at their home from Project Children in 1983 and 1984. Marion Nelson stayed with the Seaman's in 1983 and her brother John visited the following year.

The Friends of the Emerald Isle's main purpose is to sponsor less fortunate families from Ireland, for four weeks in the United States, to experience the American way of life. The families who are selected, are families who desperately need a boost in their lives.

The organization is sponsoring their first annual fund raiser dinner dance to be held Saturday, September 27 at the President Park Banquet Hall, Sayreville, N.J.

"What started the organization," said George, "is we've talked to the Nelson's (the parents of the children who stayed with the Seaman's through the Project Children program) by phone once a month, a via written correspondence."

Judy Seaman said the family is having a rather difficult situation recently. She points out the fact Mr. Nelson has been unable to work because of a series of operations he has needed for a hip condition since 1968. Mrs. Seaman said she happened upon the idea of sponsoring a trip to the U.S. to give the Nelson's and families in similar situations, something to look forward to.

The organization is, needless to say, non-profit, and is aiming toward raising funds to provide transportation for the family to the U.S.

The family, once here, will stay with local families, the children will stay with the Seamans in their Portia Street home, while John and

Ada Nelson will stay with John and Mary Hayden in their Leffert Street home.

"Getting in a little deeper," said George, "Project Children's outlook is to bring the children over and show them that protestants and catholics can live together, with no fighting or animosity."

"What happens when kids go back to their own separate ways, and they really can't associate with each other?"

George said Project Children is the pilot for the organization they have started. "We like to deal with the families as a whole," he said.

He added the families visits to America might help clear up some of the misconceptions held about Americans. "The children are going home and they are telling their parents about America, some of the things are true and some are false," he said.

Since the Project Program began over 10 years ago, over 3,000 children have visited the country from Ireland.

Although the Nelson family live in Belfast, Northern Ireland, the organization is out to benefit families from all of Ireland. George said the families from the North would benefit the most from the program.

"We're trying to raise at least \$2,500 to get the family over here," said George, "overall we'd like to come close to \$5,000, any monies left over would go toward next year's project."

The organization hopes by bringing a family over may help change the way of thinking. "We're not looking for sympathy for Ireland, we're just looking for support," said George.

The September 27 dinner will have an open bar, with music provided by a DJ. Entertainment will be provided by the Berry family, three girls that do the Irish dances. "They have won over 70 trophies for their dancing," said George.

If all goes well, the organization hopes to bring the Nelsons over in the summer of 1987.

Nothing Is Easy

Father Herlihy said obtaining a visa for an entire family is a very difficult task. "The government might be a little hesitant to give a visa because the family might stay in our country," said Herlihy. "It's not to suggest they won't do so but they may be a little hesitant."

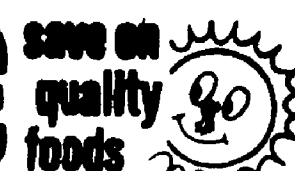

Madison Township Historical Society

At the Headwaters, which has been out of print for two years, contains a great deal of information about Old Bridge Twp. and surrounding areas. The territory that was to become Old Bridge was once part of Perth Amboy. As time went on, the land was divided again and again until the present boundaries were established in 1889 under the name Madison Twp. The area was renamed Old Bridge in 1976.

The history of Old Bridge is in many ways typical of the pattern of development followed by many central Jersey areas, yet it is also a unique entity. The township's location on the shores of Raritan Bay, its key position in the state as a rail and water transportation hub, and the huge deposits of top grade clay to be found there all contributed to Old Bridge's special place in the history of New Jersey.

The book contains information on early inns, the area's part in the Revolution, the brisk trade carried on by water and rail, local churches, old mills and the local school system. There are many lists of marriage records and other information that have created a great deal of interest among those attempting to trace the history of families originating in Central Jersey.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Citizens

I am writing this letter to express my opinions on the recent appointment by lame duck Mayor J. Thomas Cross of the Redevelopment Agency. This agency is charged with the responsibility of developing any and all parcels of land within the City of South Amboy. The ordinance gives this commission awesome authority and autonomy. I feel that the appointment of this agency should have been put off until a new government administration takes office in January 1987.

Unless you have lived under a rock for the last twenty years, you should know that things in South Amboy are done by association or "click". The committee, appointed by the Mayor and Council, is obviously in Mayor Cross' "click". They will do as Mayor Cross wishes even after he is out of office.

The head of the agency, Mr. Fred Kurtz, is not a resident of South Amboy. As you may already know, Mr. Kurtz was in favor of the Clearview Housing project, the sale of our Waterworks, the location of a Resource Recovery Plant in South Amboy, and is also in favor of building 400-500 single family units on the Waterfront. Mr. Kurtz, as our City Engineer, also failed to stay on top of violations at our local experimental sand plant, which was recently fined \$85,000 by the D.E.P. Mr. Kurtz' ideas spell higher taxes for South Amboy.

If the 109 homes go behind Pupek Road and 500 more are built on the waterfront, you will have 600 more homes in South Amboy. This means more traffic, more police calls, more emergency calls, a greater demand for our already depleting water supply, increased sewerage rates, increased garbage pick-up rates, and the construction of at least one new school in South Amboy. Who will pay for these necessities? We will! The taxpayers of South Amboy!

Mayor Cross' administration has done nothing to attract tax payables in the form of clean industry or office complexes in South Amboy. His philosophy is to build more homes. Who will this benefit? Not the taxpayers. If this City fails to attract tax payables in the next two years, we will be faced with a severe fiscal crisis, warranting layoffs of essential service personnel such as policemen, firemen, city workers, etc. Many communities throughout the State are faced with this same problem. Educational costs are high, and with the impending passage of Gramm Rudman in the State of New Jersey are faced with the probability of losing 90 million dollars in education and the first year after passage and some 400 million the second year. These losses will be made up in property taxes.

The City of Orange, New Jersey is faced with the heart ache of laying off half the Police Force and a good percentage of the Fire Department. This is due to the lack of tax payables. If your home and property are worth \$20,000.00 in Orange, your tax rate is over \$2,200.00 per year. This type of tax rate is unacceptable, therefore necessitating the layoff actions.

The same thing will happen to South Amboy if we fail to get involved and push for viable tax bases. I give credit to Jo Ann Katko, Jack O'Leary, and Craig Coughlin for their efforts in the past few weeks in gathering more than 800 signatures on a petition to stop the appointment of a Redevelopment Agency until a new administration takes oath in January of 1987. The appointment of the Commission on June 25, 1986, by lame duck Mayor Cross is his final attempt to foist this on the people of South Amboy. I hope and pray it doesn't work. If it does we will be hard pressed to stop this madness. I will pity a new government that has to walk into such a mess this January. But, the blame will not be theirs.

In closing, I urge all citizens of South Amboy to speak out and use your influence in the next few months. Attend City Council meetings when you are able, even though they be at the untimely dinner hour of five-thirty p.m. or the normal hour of eight p.m. Voice your opinion and stop Mayor Cross from taxing us into the Poorhouse. The name Fred Kurtz, to me, means higher taxes and more misery for the citizens of South Amboy. If you don't act now, you will soon be wishing you did. More homes mean more taxes.

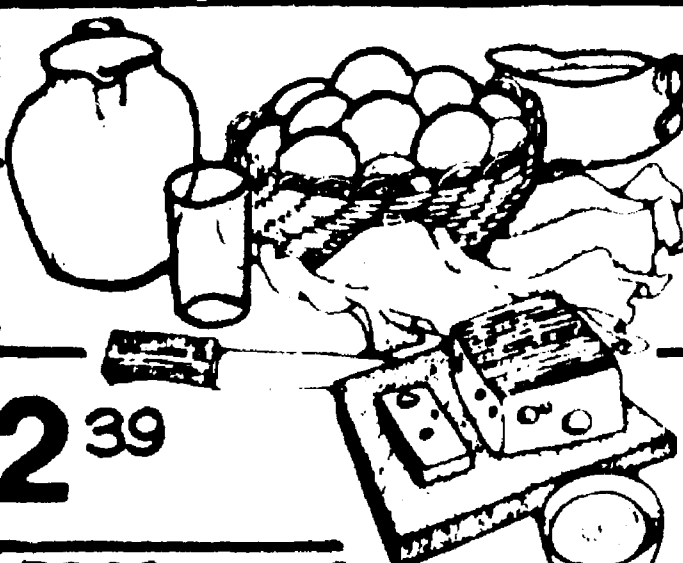
