

Mayor Defends Redevelopment Agency

Mayor J. Thomas Cross addressed a full house of concerned residents at last week's City Council meeting and said the Redevelopment Agency is a good idea for the city and said he is disappointed by some negative sentiment regarding the agency.

"We've been working on this for four years. I've mentioned it many times in my New Year's Day speech. I've talked about development of the landfill. I've worked on it. I've been to Trenton many times to try to clear the title to the property. Here we are taking a step to try to do something with the landfill and we have people that are trying to stop it. I think that is a shame," said Cross.

Cross said the delay in developing the landfill is primarily because of unclear title to the property. "We've never owned clear title to the property," said Cross. "Everybody here knew that. They knew it as soon as they took office."

Cross added that by publicizing the title problems would only cause more trouble for the city, citing the city may have been challenged.

The mayor said it is the prerogative of the people opposed to the Agency to do so. "That's what this world is about. There are pros and cons."

The mayor added congratulations for all involved in the redevelopment project. "I want to congratulate the people who stuck with me because they knew this was my dream. I've always wanted to do the landfill. I worked on it very hard and I'm glad to see its going to get started in my administration."

Candidates Opposed To Agency

Democratic councilman-at-large candidates Craig J. Coughlin and John T. O'Leary said they are opposed to the Redevelopment Agency and have called for the issue to be put out on referendum.

Coughlin said there is a petition process available in order for the referendum to occur.

O'Leary also discussed the possibility of an injunction preventing the agency from functioning.

"We're standing with the

"I sat here as mayor for 10 years and two years as councilman. I was elected each time with a good vote. I never squeaked in. I always got a good vote. I think I did a good job. I was always proud of everything I did."

"I tried to do everything for the best interest of the City of South Amboy, and anybody who dares to say I didn't, is a liar."

Cross said he has six more months as mayor and he intends to fulfill his term and continue doing the job to the best of his ability.

"Hopefully we'll get this commission off the ground and get it to do a good job," he said. The mayor also added the Agency is going to be highly visible. "There is going to be a public hearing on everybody who wants to come in here, there is going to be more public hearings than you are going to want to handle."

Cross said there will be public input at all these hearings. "I feel sorry for these commissioners because they are going to have to be at everyone of these public hearings and they are going to have to defend everything they do or don't do."

The mayor said any plan would then have to go to the Planning Board and said there are many checks and balances to the project so every step of the procedure is monitored and available to the public.

"I want to thank these commissioners who are going to take this time to do all this, because it will involve a lot of time and effort on their part."

"I think its going to be a great job."

Kurtz Confident Of Agency Success

Former city engineer, Frederick Kurtz, whose appointment to the Redevelopment Agency has stirred controversy among several local residents, said he was very happy with his appointment and is looking forward to working on the agency.

"I'm very happy to do it," said Kurtz. "The redevelopment agency represents the opportunity for the city of South Amboy to do something wonderful."

Kurtz, executive director of the Middlesex County Utilities Authority, served as engineer in the city for 16 years until his resignation in February of this year.

When informed of public reaction, citing his appointment as a possible conflict of interest, Kurtz said, "I don't view my involvement as a conflict. I can not perceive how it would be a conflict. He added that he would not have accepted the appointment if there were any conflict."

The appointment of Kurtz also drew negative reaction because he is no longer a city resident. Council President Bruce Richmond said residency in the city is not a requirement for a commissioner.

Because of a prior commitment, Kurtz was not available to be sworn in at the July 2 City Council meeting. Kurtz said he would contact Municipal Clerk Claire Reilly about scheduling a time to be sworn in as soon as possible.

Commissioners Sworn/Agency Questioned

Five of the six commissioners appointed to serve on the city's Redevelopment Agency were sworn in at the July 2 City Council meeting amidst questions and concerns voiced by local residents.

The resolution appointing the commissioners and the agency itself, which was created in March, were questioned by the public and two dissenting members of the council.

"I'm not against this redevelopment agency. I think it will work out very fine," said Councilman John Ciszewski. "I would like the people to know exactly where they stand, there are too many rumors circulating. If we could possibly arrange for an explanation of some type, there are many checkpoints involved if you read the law through, but the people aren't aware of this and I feel they should understand what direction we are taking."

"I know we're not going to agree with everybody 100 percent, but let's look for the best interest for the town so we can look back 10 years from now and have it a little easier than what it is now."

Councilwoman Erma Brown agreed with Ciszewski that not enough information about the agency has been presented. "I have no question about their qualifications," said Mrs. Brown, "but I didn't feel I had enough information."

Mrs. Brown added the commissioners of the agency are charged with the most important piece of legislation to come into town in the past 25 years.

"I've been asking questions for four or five months and I'm still not fully informed," said Mrs. Brown, "so the commissioners have a tremendous job ahead of them. They are also going to have some people like me looking right over their shoulders."

The agency is designed to plan for the development for the vacant 85-acre waterfront property. The commissioners - Andrew Maf-

kovich, appointed to a four-year term; Richard O'Connor appointed to a three-year term; Janice Tedesco for two years and Kevin Meszaros for one year were all sworn in along with Leslie Lentz, the mayor's appointment who will serve a five-year term.

Fred Kurtz, former city engineer and currently Executive Director of the Middlesex County Utilities Authority, was unavailable to be sworn in at last week's meeting but is likely to be sworn in separately in the near future.

Mayor J. Thomas Cross said plans to develop the waterfront have been discussed for four years, but points out that only recently did the city have clear title to the land.

Clark Convery, City Director of Law, explained the problems the city has had with the title to the waterfront property.

"When this project started in 1982," explained Convery, "the mayor and council advised me to search the property through a title company to see if there was any 'clouds' (an interest in the property in the past)."

"We found that some of the families failed to deed the property to the city, some of the families died off, they still had title to the property," Convery said all the problems had to be clarified before and action could be taken. He said recently all the major problems cleared.

Council Petitioned

At the meeting the mayor and council were presented with a petition containing over 750 signatures, calling for the abolishment of the redevelopment agency.

The appointment of Kurtz to the agency was also questioned during the two-hour public forum. Residents questioned whether Kurtz' position with the MCUA constituted a conflict of interest. Also the fact Kurtz is not a South Amboy resident was also a point of opposition to his

appointment.

Council President Bruce Richmond said there is no conflict of interest with Kurtz' appointment. "I think one of the main reasons his name was considered is because of his expertise that he has with the city and his involvement."

Richmond said the council was not restricted to residents of South Amboy. "You are not restricted by the law to have only residents," he said.

John T. O'Leary, democratic candidate for councilman-at-large, said the taxpayers of the city lose out on public bid by having a redevelopment agency work with one developer to plan the waterfront development.

"Those properties may be worth 8 to 10 million dollars," said O'Leary. "they go out on public bid, you can end up with 25 to 30 million dollars."

O'Leary and running mate for council, Craig J. Coughlin are opposed to the agency, saying the city can benefit more through auction. They also favor a balanced approach to the waterfront development which would include a city owned marina, corporate office complex, recreation area and some housing.

Point of fact: There is a lot of talk in town regarding a "lame duck" administration. To call Mayor J. Thomas Cross a "lame duck" is not accurate. Historically, the term "lame duck" refers to a candidate shot down in an attempt to seek re-election, that is the origin of the term. Mayor Cross declined to run again, making him a "retiring" or "outgoing" mayor. This information was provided from the highly recommended text "History of the United States" by Nevins and Commander.

Another term which has been bandied about is "blight." This term really comes into play when discussing the city's Redevelopment Agency. According to state statute, the term blighted area shall mean an area in any municipality wherein there exists any one of the following conditions:

- The general quality of buildings used as dwelling accommodations therein are substandard, unsafe, insanitary, dilapidated, or obsolescent, or possess any such characteristics, or are so lacking in light, air, or space, as to be conducive to unwholesome living.
- The discontinuance of the use of buildings previously used for manufacturing or industrial purposes, the abandonment of such buildings or the same being allowed to fall into so great a state of disrepair as to be untenable.
- Unimproved vacant land, which has remained so for a period of ten years prior to the determination hereinafter referred to, and which land by reason of its location, or remoteness from developed sections or portions of such municipality, or lack of means of access to such other parts thereof, or topography, or nature of the soil, is not likely to be developed through the instrumentality of private capital.
- Areas (including slum areas) with buildings or improvements which by reason of dilapidation, obsolescence, overcrowding, faulty arrangement or design, lack of ventilation, light and sanitary facilities, excessive land coverage, deleterious land use or absolute layout, or any combination of these or other factors, are detrimental to the safety, health, morals or welfare of the community.
- A growing or total lack of proper utilization of areas caused by the condition of the title, diverse ownership of the real property therein and other conditions, resulting in a stagnant and unproductive condition of land potentially useful and valuable for contributing to and serving the public health, safety and welfare.

Friends Of The Emerald Isle Part 2

Last week we introduced a new organization formed by local residents with the express purpose of trying to sponsor less fortunate families from Ireland for month-long visits to the United States.

George Seaman, executive director of the organization, said their group was inspired by Project Children, which sponsors children from Northern Ireland for summer trips to the U.S.

Previously, the Seamans have hosted children from Project Children. In 1983 the Seaman's hosted 11-year old Marion Nelson and the following summer, they were visited by Marion's brother, 11-year old John Nelson. The Nelson's reside in Belfast, Northern Ireland.

Since then, the Seaman's and the Nelson's have kept in touch. It was then that George's wife, Judy, came up with the idea for sponsoring an entire family to visit the U.S.

Mrs. Seaman says the Nelson family—mother Aida, 30, father John, 37, Marion, now 14, John, now 13, and Stephen, 6 are not a wealthy family. What they have is provided to them from the government.

Mrs. Seaman also said Mr. Nelson may need surgery to correct a recurring medical problem and the family also took Mrs. Nelson's sisters 5 children because of medical problems.

"I just said to George there has to be something this family can look forward to," said Mrs. Seaman.

The Seamans enjoyed having the Nelson children visit and were sorry to see them go. "When you have the children, you don't know how it benefits them while they are here," said Mrs. Seaman, "but later on you find out how it really did effect them."

Mrs. Seaman said that after the first visit by Marion, the child did not know how to deal with her feelings. Upon returning to Belfast, Marion cut her hair. "It was she just didn't know how to handle it, she had so much freedom here and suddenly she went back," she said.

In the long run, it appeared the visit to America benefitted the children. John wrote an essay of his stay. The boy also received a citizenship award in his school and Marion won an award for raising money for the poor.

"I don't know how much poorer you can get," said Mrs. Seaman. She also recalled when the children visited, Marion slept with the covers over her head. Mrs. Seaman said that when she pulled the covers down, the girl was asleep with her fingers in her ears.

She also recalled when young John visited them, she was making English muffins for an afternoon snack and the boy was reaching for his third one. Mrs. Seaman warned him he won't have any room for his dinner to which the boy replied, "I thought this was our dinner."

The fund raiser to sponsor the Nelson family's visit to the U.S. is scheduled for September 27 at the President Park Banquet Hall in Sayreville. Tickets are priced at \$25, advertisements for a dinner booklet and additional information may be obtained by contacting the organization at 408 Ferris Street.

"Project Children sponsors children to show them Catholics and Protestants can live together," said Mr. Seaman, "we want to take that a step further by having a whole family visit."

Father Daniel J. Herlihy, associate pastor at St. Mary's Parish said the segregation of Catholics and Protestants in Northern Ireland is a government manipulation of people.

"The government is using the weapon of religion, which in fact is not the issue at all," said Father Herlihy. He said the government manipulates the people in an attempt to prove the British government is essential in Northern Ireland to prevent the Irish from killing each other in a war.

"Last summer a document was released the ministry had put together 30 years previously advising the government at the time that under no circumstances should they leave Northern Ireland, that it was too strategic a place and they should not leave," said Father Herlihy, "strategically, they (British Government) are very interested in Northern Ireland, that is really what the problem is."

The fact that Northern Ireland is only 11 miles across to Scotland is of importance to the British. "There is more to the situation than meets the eye," he said.

Until situations such as in Northern Ireland work themselves out, the people of these countries must live under duress. The image of the 11-year old girl sleeping with her fingers in her ears is a strong indication of the fear the people live under, not to mention the hardships they face like the Nelson family.

The Seamans, Father Herlihy, John J. Grimley, Hugh and Barbara Rone, Joan Meszaros, Alice Ashton, John Hayden, Mary Hayden, Donna Hensberger, Ronald Seaman, Charles Simmons, Mary Boychuk and the other volunteer members of the organization need the public's support to give a lift to a family that really needs one.

Again, the fund raiser is September 27. At the dance the organization will also be holding a raffle and are in need of prizes. They are asking the support of merchants and the public to make the event a success.

Council Favors Agency For Control

Convery said the purpose of the agency is to sit down with the developer and negotiate what is best for the town. Convery said if one developer doesn't offer what the city wants, they can then go to the next plan, where if a public auction were allowed, the city would have no control over what goes in.

Richmond said it will be up to the commissioners to evaluate what the impact of any plans will be on the town. "In evaluating proposals, they are going to have to determine what is best for the city of South Amboy."

Richmond also said there will be a public hearing to determine the exact parcel of land to be developed.

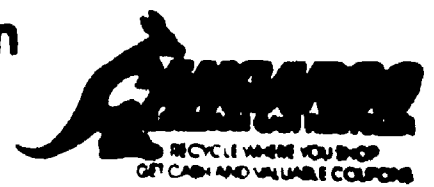

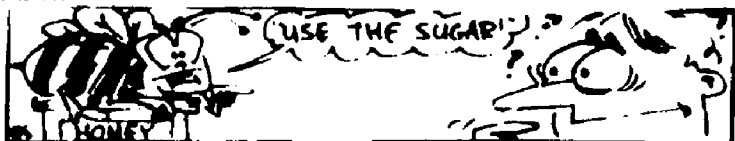

It is obvious that Mayor Cross chose to ignore the petition handed to him at the July 2nd Council Meeting by Jo Ann Katko in reference to the peoples displeasure about the appointment of a Redevelopment Agency.

With the exception of Mr. Meszaros, who should serve as a commissioner, this body of people will all be wearing two hats as Mayor Cross does now. Mr. Markowitz is currently on our Planning Board, as is Mr. Lentz. Mr. O'Connor is on our Housing Board and Mrs. Tedesco is on the Broadway IMPAC Board. Mr. Kurtz is the Chairman of the Middlesex County Utilities Authority, which will soon control our sewer and water needs and which will also be empowered by our County Freeholders to select a suitable site for a Resource Recovery Plant.

This is a direct affront to the people who signed this petition. Mayor Cross had made it known that he is the Mayor until December 31, 1986, and that he will do as he pleases until that date. This has become evident to me not only on a local level but on a County level as well. I say this because I have read where the Freeholders are about to empower the Middlesex County Utilities Authority to select a site for a Resource Recovery Plant and also plans are being set forth to have the M.C.U.A. handle all of our water needs. It seems that if Mayor Cross fails to gain something on the local level that Freeholder Cross will obtain it on the County level.

Regrettably the Mayor has chosen to ignore the petition to rescind the Redevelopment Agency Ordinance until after January 1, 1987. The manner in which the Commission was selected would cause any rational person to make this request. A committee of this nature should be neutral with regards to political preference.

In closing, I ask Mayor Cross to show courage and wisdom in his final months as our Chief Executive in South Amboy, by bending to the wishes of the people and not to the wishes of certain individuals who do not care about our Pleasant Little City.

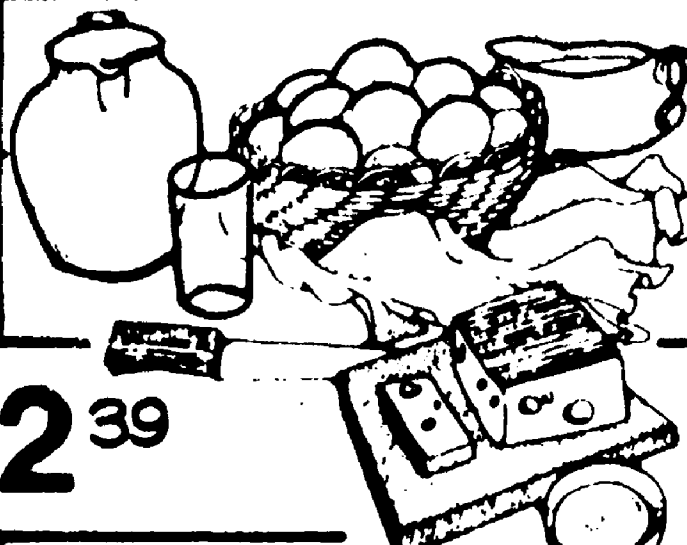
