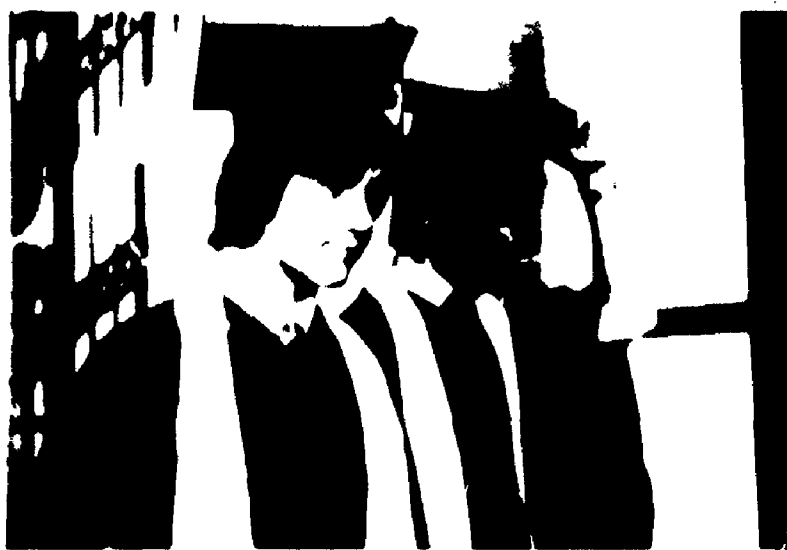
achievement in the field of Art.

Council Candidates Look Forward

With half their battle won, the other half yet to come, the two victors in the Democratic Primary are looking ahead toward a new direction in the South Amboy political scene.

"Whatever the outcome in November, the city is going to have new leadership," said John T. O'Leary, the top vote getter in the June 3 primary, who along with Craig J. Coughlin will be the democratic candidates for the two councilman-at-large seats.

"The people who are in there now are lame ducks," said Coughlin, "there will be a six month period before a new administration takes over." The two democrats said they would like to see the council working toward common goals.

Among the issues the candidates agree need to be addressed include the clean up of Broadway and action taken to reduce the drug and alcohol problem in the city. "We have to make the streets safer for the senior citizens and all the citizens in the city to enjoy," said O'Leary.

Coughlin said he would like to see strict enforcement of the city's property maintenance code. He said stricter treatment should be given to out of town landlords, especially in the Broadway area who are lax in following code guidelines.

"It's not going to be something we can clean up overnight," interjected O'Leary. "We have to start working on it and I think that over a period of time, we can do a fine job." Both candidates agree that with the help of the city's police force, the city has the capability deal with the problems on Broadway.

Looking For A Fresh Start
"We would like the mayor and council to leave as clean a slate as possible for the incoming administration," said Coughlin. Neither

candidate wants the planned Redevelop Agency named until after the election.

"We are urging the mayor and council not to appoint the Redevelopment Agency," said O'Leary. "We want them to wait and let the new administration come in and set some goals and objectives." Coughlin said the new administration should establish their own development program. "We don't think it would be fair for anyone to be saddled with a lame duck approach to development," he said.

They also urged the mayor, council and city attorney to try to prevent the Clearview Housing Development from clogging up the Pupek Road area. "If they can't prevent it, they should try to limit the number of houses they build," said Coughlin.

McCormack Sand Action Needs To Be Taken

O'Leary stated affirmative action must be taken against the McCormack Aggregates Sand Company for what he says is a heavy burden heaped upon the residents of the area. "We want the air quality cleaned up, we want the people taken care of," said O'Leary. He also said the sand hills are far too high and the city government must be more aggressive in controlling this problem.

"I don't think McCormack Sand has the right to come in to our town and place that burden upon the people," O'Leary added. He said the air quality, sand, inconveniences, the noise, low water pressure are a 24-hour problem that must be more directly addressed.

Prepare For A Change

"We would like to remind the mayor and council that they should acknowledge the mandates of the people," said Coughlin. "I think the vote was clear the people are not satisfied with what is going on. We'd like the council to do everything in their power to improve the city in the next 6 months and not to do anything to prevent any action from incoming administration from their doing what they think is in the best interest of the city."

Thank Workers For Support

Both candidates wanted to thank the people who supported them and their ideas for the city. O'Leary credits his sister Joanne O'Leary-Katko and all the other workers for all their help. O'Leary said he and Coughlin are looking forward to working for the people of South Amboy. "We want to stand with the people, not against them."

The funds will be used as overtime for police officers involved in local D.W.I. roadblocks.

Public Hearing On Liquor License Postponed

A public hearing which would have given residents the opportunity to voice their

concerns about the transfer of a liquor license for Krauszer's was postponed last week due to a lack of a quorum.

Council President Bruce Richmond said the meeting would be rescheduled in the near future.

The council scheduled a public hearing on the transfer of the Hubbard's Cupboard liquor license to the Krauszer's convenience store, on south Broadway, when they received a petition signed by 51 residents voicing concerns over a liquor license on the site.

The petition said the residents objected to the license because it "would directly contribute to juvenile delinquency, cause loitering, littering on the street, rowdiness and the destruction of private property."

Richmond said the council needs the addresses of those who did sign the petition so they may be formally notified when the hearing will be held.

Those who have signed the petition are urged to contact Claire Reilly, city clerk, or Judy O'Connor, deputy city clerk, at City Hall.

LEGAL NOTICES

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ACQUISITION AND INSTALLATION OF VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS IN AND BY THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$228,500 THEREFOR, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$228,500 BOND OR NOTES OF THE CITY FOR FINANCING PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH AMBOY, IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the City of South Amboy, New Jersey as general improvements. For the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$228,500 including the sum of \$11,500 as the down payment required by the Local Bond Law. The down payment is now available by virtue of provision for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in one or more previously adopted budgets.

Section 2. In order to finance the cost of the improvements or purposes not covered by application of the down payment, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$218,500 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 3. (a) The improvements hereby authorized and the purposes for the financing of which the bonds are to be issued are the following: (Listed in order of Purpose or Improvement, Appropriated, and Useful Life).

a) Purchase and installation of replacement body for 1976 Seagrave Fire Truck Assigned to Independence Fire Company, \$60,000, 5 years.

b) Purchase of public works mobile equipment (Grove truck), \$100,000, 5 years.

c) Renovation of various public buildings, \$60,000, 10 years.

in and for the City of South Amboy, all as shown on and in accordance with the plans and specifications thereon on file in the office of the Clerk, which plans are hereby approved.

(b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the improvements or purposes are as stated in Section 2 hereof.

(c) The estimated cost of the improvements or purposes is equal to the amount of the appropriation herein made therefor.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer, provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8(a). The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

Section 5. The capital budget of the City of South Amboy is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. The resolution

in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services is on file with the Clerk and is available there for public inspection.

Section 6. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

(a) The purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses. They are improvements that the City may lawfully undertake as general improvements. No portion of the cost of the improvements shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.

(b) The period of usefulness of the purpose within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 6 years.

(c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the City, as defined in the Local Bond Law, is increased by the authorization of the bonds, and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$218,500 and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.

(d) An aggregate amount of not exceeding \$15,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-30 is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the purpose of improvement.

Section 7. The full faith and credit of the City are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the City, and the City shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the City for the payment of the obligations, and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

Section 8. This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

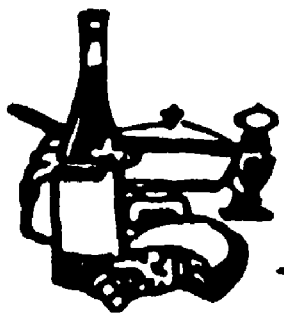

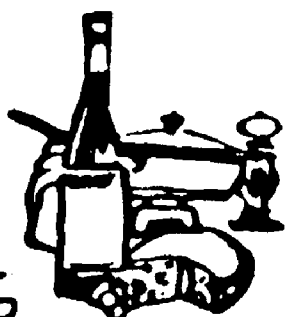


