

NEW VICE CHANCELLOR

Former Governor James F. Fielder was appointed a vice chancellor Monday by Chancellor Walker. The appointment was made to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Frederic W. Stevens of Morristown. In filing announcement of the appointment Chancellor Walker instructed the secretary of state to issue a commission for signature by Governor Runyon.

Mr. Fielder is a resident of Jersey City and will be fifty-three years old on February 26 next. He was elected Governor on the Democratic ticket on November 4, 1913, and was inaugurated on January 20, 1914, for a three-year term. His Republican opponent was Edward C. Stokes.

399.47. Woodbridge received \$70,-448.12, and Perth Amboy, \$50.318.52.

SIX PASS CENSUS

TEST PERFECTLY

Francis P. Coan, Supervisor of the Census for the Third District of New Jersey, announces that of the applicants for census enumerators examined thus far only six have passed the test perfectly. Henry 194 High street, Perth Amboy; for Monmonuth County, Edwin C. Gilland, Red Bank; and for Ocean County, Alfred J. Scanlon, and William S. Turner, Lakewood; and William Henry Brown of Barne-

These six with about seventy others, whose names will be announced within the next week, have been confirmed by the Director of Census, Sam L. Rogers, for the position of enumerator of census. The actual enumeration will begin January 2nd, 1920, and will continue for two weeks in places having a population of 2,500 and over and for a places having a populatio than 2500.

Work done for the county under a eint contract with the city of Perth Amboy, for the paving of Smith street from the car barns to the city line, has been completed and was accepted by the Board of Freeholders at a meeting held December 4.

Of the contract price, five per cent. will be retained by the county as a guarantee that the road will be satisfactorily maintained for one year. The balance to be paid to Liddle & Pfeisfer, the contractors, by County Collector F. William Hilker.

A portion of the cost of this work is to be paid for by Perth Amboy, and by the resolution presented by Freeholder Clarence M. Haight, accepting the work as complete. County Collector Hilker was authorized to bill the city for their share.

LOBSTER FISHERMEN SEEK MORE CONSERVATION LAWS

Aiming to conserve New Jersey's newly developed lobster fisheries and to prevent trusts from monopolizing this infant industry, a score of lobster fishermen at Keyport and vicinster fishermen at Keyport and vicin-ity have appealed to the State Fish and Game Commission through State Protector James M. Stratton for protective legislation. The delegation ask that a bill be introduced before the next Legislature providing that every person engaged in the business of taking lobsters shall pay an annual license fee of \$10; that these licenses shall be issued only to bona fide residents of New Jersey and that each license-holder shall be limited to operating 100 lobster pots.

The lobster fishermen are especially anxious to prevent the use of nets 5 known as otter · trawls in taking lobsters and ask that these devices be outlawed. Claiming that conservation regulations that prevent the taking of small lobsters have been largely responsible for building up the lobster fisheries off the Jersey coast until more than a hundred boats were profitably operated in the industry, during the present year, the fishermen ask further that in addition to the fine for bringing ashore or 2 offering for sale under-sized lobsters, the offender's license be revoked and all his fishing equipment be confiscated by the state.

The familiar "old shoe" of the wedding in a tried token of good luck. How the custom ever originated is not certain, but it is believed by many to be a feigned attack upon the bridegroom for carrying off the bride. This idea is suggested by the early barbaric practices of capturing the bride against resistance.

Others, however, attempt to trace the hurling of the wedding shoe to the contom of the ancient whalers. Uqdspeed and good-luck were in the olden days synonymous with throwing old Wharys.

Symbol of Authority.

& Still another theory la that which allows the wedding shoe to become the symbol of authority and dominion over the bride by the husband. To receive a shoe in Biblical times indicated the conferral of ownership, just as the return of the shoe signified the relinguishing of it. In this period the father always kept the discarded shoe of his daughter as a symbol of his possession and it is believed by some that the familiar practice at modern weddings is only the persistence of the old custom in which the father threw the shoe at his new son-in-law as a sign of surrendering his proprietorahin over the bride,

Bad luck, however overtakes the unfortunate who finds out her mistake before taking off the stocking. Good luck always awaits the person who has the wisdom of putting the right stocking on first. 

After digging is completed a dressing of ground lime stone, air slacked or "agricultural" lime may be spread byer the surface at the rate of about 100 nounds to every 1,200 square feet of area. The lime corrects soil

The easiest process of all is the actual planting. Using the information given on the seed containers in regard to time, distance spart and depth, plant carefully in straight, well-prepared rows. After the plants have formed their first pair of leaves the surface of the ground should be loosened up with a boe or cultivation tool on each side of the row to allow the air to circulate through the top layer of loosdned soil and to conserve the inclature in the soil underseath. This process of cultivation should be kept up at regular intervals

greater extent in France than in any other country Closely, following the Christman feetlylifes, the celebration for the opening of the New Year vies with the earlier holiday events. Everywhere in the republic do the festivities take place, and among the places where it is the most enjoyed is in the kitchens of the home

The average bousemaid of France works for a very small salary. But also is an apt and willing servant; for she looks forward from one New Year's day to another, as then she reaps the reward for her work. It is the custom in France to make presents to all the servants of the opening of each year. This present is nearly always in cash, and it may be \$5 or \$200, depending upon the financial condition of the employer.

With such a custom in vogue there is very little trouble with servants in that country. They rarely quit their positions; they strive to please their employers and at all times look forward to the New Year. All the servants are allowed certain amounts. The junitor gets his share, and no one is forgotten.

In France the housewife does very little of the marketing. It is left to the servants. Then the servants do the bargaining. If potatoes are 10 cents per pound and the girl can get them from some marketwoman for 8 cents she reasons that the mistress should not profit by the bargaining, but that she herself should have the difference. The regular price of the potatoes being 10 cents, the servant marks them down in her book at that price and pockets the difference. This is one of the peculiarities of the French method of keeping bouse, and it has been found a real aid in keeping servants.

The housewives are aware of what is taking place, but they are satisfied to pay the regular market prices. It is the bargaining of the servants which gets them an extra allowance, but as long as the estables are up to the standard the housewife does not complain.

Then the servant who does the m keting expects New Year's gifts fr other sources. There is no special res son why she should purchase her stuffs at a certain market booth. it will be noticed that she often that very thing. When New /Year's day rolls around the owner of the market booth is supposed to make her a nice present, and the present is appreciated most if it is in cash. It really must be in cash.

Then there are the iceman, the coalman, the milkman. All of these are supposed to remember the servant girl when the new year begins, . In this manner the average servant, if she is keen witted—and the most of them are makes a snug little addition to her regular wages.

The servants very often work for only enough to clothe themselves. They must depend on what they can make by bargaining and by receiving New Year's gifts, and these "gifts" the girls usually place in a bank at interest, thus building up their doweries for their future marriages, when they may even marry the iceman, the milkman or the coalman.

There are some points about the French method of holding servants which are extremely satisfactory when compared to the American plan, but "Then," said Pride, desperately, "he there are others not quite so pleusing. that she disregards the table of her mistress. She may arrange to procure the edibles of a very low price, pocketing the difference from the market price, and the foodstuffs may not b so palatable. But if she is content with small amounts her bergainings will never be noticed.

The American servant is paid a stipulated salary, enough for her to live upon, and the bargaining is eliminated. This takes away one of the objectionable points, and the table is usually up to the standard regardless of whether the housewife or the servant does the marketing. But the French plan cer-tainly does hold the servants from one year to another, for there is always the prospect of the New Year's present. New York Post.
