NEW HIGH POWER LINE TO GO WITH RAIL ELECTRIFICATION

First step locally in the long awaited electrification of the Conrail North Jersey Shore R.R. from South Ambov south was taken Monday but it was not moved by the Department of Transportation or Conract officials

Jersey Central Power & Light officials met in closed conference talk with the South Amboy Mayor and Council over the need to runa new power line from the South Amboy generating plant south to Red Bank to accomodate the \$298 million. rail project. The talks were kept secret to enable JCP&L to negotiate for a right of way for the power line on a zoning override whereby applications for variances would not be needed and property owners could be approached for easements without turmoil. The Council. wa approached as one route considered would pass over the city owned landfill. recteation area.

Closing Alley Used As Gang Hangout Asked By Citizens

Closing off the alley that divides the block between First St., and Second St., at east from Broadway northwas put before the Council Tuesday by Pat Moran, a spectator who lives by it in the North Broadway area, as a means of better controlling disorders in the area. She said she had canvassed owners along the alley and had found a willingness on their part to extend their property lengths by purchasing the alley and splitting the land between them. Mrs. Moran found the alley in particular hiding out place for a youth motorcycle gang and other youths who drove cars with false inxpection strips

Mayor J. Thomas Cross advised Mrs. Moran there would be no need for the adjoining owners to buy the alley as it was apparently city owned Councilman Richard Schultz declared that if such was the case, the Council should order it closed off that very night. He also demanded police be sent into the area immediately not even waiting until the next day, to round up the illegal riders troublemakers

Mrs. Moran cautioned it would not be so easy, that she had found the local police reluctant to move against the offendors when called in Mrs. Moran said. the youths openly declare their contempt for police measures against them. blatantly announced "we got connections' that they could not be touched. She said her only inkling as to what this meant was that one or two of them are related to a powerful political figure in an adjoining municipality.

Fire-Gutted Home Raided by Vandals; Lab Equipment Stolen

Fresh stories vandalizing on the rice as summer nears stirred the indignation of the Council Monday And city police's record of incidents seared the blotter over the weekend

An incident that provoked official anger especially was perpetrated against Martin Ruszala, 236 Walnut St., Saturday night The Ruszalas had their home scorched by fire May 2 and Martin Ruszala, Jr., whose photographic laboratory was in the basement, suffered a \$150,600 loss in his equipment and business. He called police Sunday to investigate a forcible entry to the home the Ruszalas had been forced to evacuate because of the fire

Ptl Robert Point found entry had been made by forcing a locked side door. In the interior, hosehold furnishings saved in the fire had been shoved all around. the floor was littered with empty beer and wine bottles and a cassette tape recorder and recording tapes had

Council anger also arose against those who vented their spiech on a householder who watched and reported damage done to the new Towerland Park Fred Kurtz, city engineer, reported shrubs and flowers put in one day were found forn out and littering the woman's lawn the next morning In apparent "repaying" for watchfulness, vandals ran black paint demarkings on the side of her house and painted ın obscene picturings and wordings.

Kurt expressed amazement at the labor the vandals put in to get the hinges off the fence on Pupek Rd to make it collapse and how they cut a hole in the heavy mesh wire fencing. He opined they came on the scene with wire clippers and sledge hammers, a lot of trouble, as he saw it, just to vent sheer destructiveness.

TEN STREETS ON REPAVING LIST: CAN BE FUNDED THIS YEAR

The ten streets included in the \$600,000 street repaying project of the Capital Budget were listed in full by the Council Monday. Henry St., between Stevens Ave. and Broadway, has immediate priority because of a sewer collapse Then comes a portion of Raritan St., David St. Lower Conover St. Center St., a portion of Gordon St., a portion of Lower George St., Feltus St. from 5th St. to the Park: Bordentown Ave from Stevens Ave to Broadway, Louisa St., Augusta St., Prospect St.

Councilman Chester Meinzer Jr asked that Lower Louisa St. be given a much higher priority Bad Vandalism by the Frog Hollow Swim & Tennis Club has aggravated the problem

The work on Raritan St. is to be tied in with the \$2,160,000 grant for the Mechanicsville-Melrose dramage project Fred Kurtz, city engineer, reported surface water from the Shoprite center over the line in Savreville flows down past the Bergen Hill area and Walnut and Cedar St. under the railroad bridge and across Railroad Äve to Raritan St. The drain plan also takes a draining for Eulner St. in Melrose, he noted. The outfall will be from Lower Baritan St. to the bay

a variance in 90 days and the accepted condition. But Rosemary Kurtz, secretary of the South Amboy Zoning Board of Adjust, confirmed Monday no application has been received from Downs yet to get on the June 13 monthly meeting of the board, the iast regular meeting at which Downs could be heard before his 90 days allowance expires. Mrs. Kurtz notes that three applicants who could not make the May 9 meeting of the board have a priority on thre three-cases limit of the June 13 agenda of the board.

The Council concurred with Kurtz when his letter to Convery was read and gave such authorization as needed for the city attorney to act at his own discretion.

The Kurtz letter to Convery:

"In accordance with our discussion, concerning the various complaints I have received regarding the permit. captioned conducted an inspection of the premises on Thursday, May 10, 1979, with a photographer.

"The owner has caused to have the following work done, all of which is in violation of his permit conditions.

1. Installed second floor ioists and subflooring.

2. Constructed an addition to the exterior of the budiling which increases its size and changes entire rear and roof line configuration.

3. Installed copper tubing and insulated copper tubing for plumbing and heating.

4. Installed waste line plumbing for sanitary purposes

5 Added aluminum facia gutters, etc.

"The entire project is unquestionably being done to provide living quarters and, in every respect, completely violates the permit issued.

"Mr Downs' complete disregard for City Ordinances has placed my Department in a position of great stress. You must furnish me with the tools required to stop all construction and completely remove all unauthorized construction if the integrity of my department is to be maintained.

Former Administrator **Ousted in Keyport**

A former business administrator of South Amboy, Edward McLane, was dismissed from a similar position in Keyport Monday by the Council of that borough McLane had taken the Keyport position in October, 1975, three months after he left the post in South Ambov

McLane received appointment in South Amboy after the changeover in municipal Rovernment under the Faulkner Act. requiring such an official be installed He came into conflict with the majority on the city Council in 1973 74. resulting in counter suits, the Council seeking to force him out over the opposition of then Mayor William E O'Leary and McLane charging certain members of the Council at that time with malicious harassment He was fired in September, 1974, by a majority of the then Council but Mayor O'Leary took advantage of the Faulkner Act provision to reinstate him for 90 days. The suits were finally settled in an agreement by which McLane resigned July 17

The South Amboy post paid \$14,000 when McLane resigned It now pays \$23,000 The Keyport position presently pays \$21,000

McLane came into conflict in Keyport with a newly elected Mayor Leroy Bergen, Jan A but refused to resign. There was division. on the Keyport Council in the matter for some time, but this week, that body acted unanimously to let McLane



It is essential to maintain a balance between resting and doing special expercises. to help continue or restore mobility Too much exercise, or the wrong kind. can aggravate rather than help an arthritis condition. and too much rest can increase joint stiffness and

The work on the ten streets was originally allocated on a three-year basis at \$200,000 per year. But when the Feb. 23 bonding issue was moved to conserve the city's borrowing power against a school board extension of credit funding for the ten streets was all included in 1979 work, \$30,000 to come out of Capital Improvement Fund and \$500,000 from sale of bonds. It was noted this allows the streets repaving to go along as fast as desired, in that the authorization to sell bonds to finance it exists, yet the council can put it all back on the \$200,000 per year threeyear calendar.

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
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
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
