New Parish Gyna to Honor Native Clergyman



Monsignor John M. Wilus will be honored Sunday, December 1st, at 1:30 P.M. when a new gymnasium at St. Cecilia's Church Parish will be dedicated in his honor.

Most Reverend Theodore E. McCarriek, Bishop of the Diocese of Trenton, is to officiate at the formal dedication of the 60-by-112-foot gymnasium. The reception will take place at St. Cecilia's school hall at 45 Wilus Way.

Many church officials, parishioners, friends and relatives are expected to be present at the ceremony.

Msgr. Wilus assumed the pastorate of St. Cecilia's Parish January 18, 1946, and served in that office for 35 years. He was elevated to the rank of papal chamberlain February 4, 1967.

He retired at age 70 in October, 1981, the year that the Diocese of Metuchen was organized.

During his tenure, the parish grew to be the largest in the Diocese of Trenton with the highest grammar school pupil enrollment.

A combination church and school was built there to serve the parish in 1950. An addition to the school was erected in 1961 to serve the needs of the parish children.

St. Cecilia's Church was later divided during his pastorate to form the parishes of St. John Vianney in Colonia and St. Helena's in Edison.

Msgr. Wilus, now living in retirement at age 74, is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George and Anna Wilus of Walnut Street, South Amboy.

Msgr. Wilus attended Sacred Heart Grammar School and Saint Mary's High School as well as St. Charles College and St. Mary's Seminary in Maryland, and was ordained at St. Mary's Cathedral, Trenton, May 1, 1957.

His original assignment after being ordained was Immaculate Conception Church in Somerville. Prior to becoming pastor at St. Cecilia's Church, he served at Holy Spirit Church in Axbury Park.

Local Police Teams Make Additional Drug Arrests

Members of the local police department continue to make drug arrests within the city. Several were reported by them during the past week.

Last Friday, November 15th, at approximately 9:30 P.M., while on patrol car duty, Detectives Raymond Durski and Bernard Mackiel stopped for a red light at the intersection of Main Street and Broadway.

While waiting for the traffic light to change, Detective Durski observed the driver of a vehicle directly behind the patrol car, through his rear view mirror, inserting what appeared to be a marijuana cigarette between his lips.

Upon investigating the matter, the suspicion was confirmed.

Placed under arrest were two Union Beach residents. They were identified as Michael P. Keating, age 25, and the passenger John V. Smith, age 25 also.

Both were charged with possession of a controlled dangerous substance.

A quantity of marijuana was found on the person of Smith. Both were also charged with possession and consumption of an alcoholic beverage in their motor vehicle and released on bail.

On the previous Friday, November 8th, Detective Durski came upon a parked vehicle in a prohibited area in the vicinity of the intersection of Bordentown and Pine Avenues.

His attention was drawn to the vehicle by an interior light in the car being on.

While approaching the occupants to advise them to

move the vehicle from the prohibited area, Det. Durski observed the driver David Roberts, age 18, of Main Street, stuffing a plastic bag into the front of his trousers.

Material in the plastic bag, recovered at headquarters, was identified as marijuana.

Apprehended with Roberts was Albert Olekza, age 25, of Upper Main Street.

Both were arrested on a dual charge of possession of marijuana and possession and consumption of an alcoholic beverage in a motor vehicle.

Police Sergeant William Housman and Patrolman Michael DeLucia came upon four individuals drinking beer in a motor vehicle on October 30th at about 7:30 P.M. on Elm Street.

Placed under arrest were Lee Huguenin, age 31, of North Pine Avenue; William Wanko, age 20, of Bertram Avenue; Robert Szypulski, age 20, of Main Street, and a 17-year-old male juvenile, all charged with possession and consumption of an alcoholic beverage in a motor vehicle.

In addition, Sgt. Housman charged Huguenin with possession of marijuana.

On October 21st, at approximately 11:30 P.M., Patrolman Robert Krzywdzinski, while on foot patrol on Broadway near the intersection of Augusta Street, overheard a conversation which drew his attention.

He observed what appeared to be a drug transaction taking place.

As he approached two males engaged in the transaction, he saw one of the individuals drop two packets containing a white substance to the ground.

The substance was later identified as methamphetamine, or "speed."

Upon further investigation, additional packets of the material were found in the pockets of Jeffrey Birkle, age 25, of David Street.

Also arrested was his companion, Andrew Krajewski, age 31, of Linden.

Obtaining a search warrant, which they executed, police officers Robert Smith and Krzywdzinski, as well as Sergeant Housman and Detective Mackiel searched the residence of Birkle and found equipment there used for the packaging of metamphetamines.

As a result, Birkle was charged with possession with intent to distribute a controlled dangerous substance and incarcerated in the Adult Correction Center in North Brunswick after failure to post \$20,000 bail.

Krajewski was released after posting \$2,000 bail. On October 27th at about 10:30 P.M., Detectives Durski and Mackiel saw two individuals consuming beer in a vehicle at Krauszer's parking lot.

Arrested by them was Francis Moran, age 28, of South Broadway, and a 17-year-old female driver whom Det. Durski saw stuffing an item in her inner garments which she removed from her pocketbook.

At police headquarters, she was searched by a police matron and found to possess "Speed" and charged with possession of the drug.

Meeting Scheduled Monday on Sand Stockpiling

George Forrer of Rosewell Street received a letter from James M. Mansky, chief of the Regulatory Branch, Department of the Army, New York District, Corps of Engineers, advising him that a meeting has been set for Monday, November 25th, at 8:00 P.M., regarding a stockpiling of sand application by a local firm in his area of residence.

The letter sent to Forrer reads as follows:

"Reference is made to your request for a public meeting concerning the proposal by the Great Lakes Dredge and Dock Company to dredge sand from Ambrose Channel and stockpile this material at an upland storage facility in South Amboy, Middlesex County, New Jersey.

"This office has determined that having a meeting with the applicant and all concerned parties, instead of a public hearing, would best serve the needs of all concerned and would accomplish similar objectives in a more effective manner.

"Accordingly, a meeting has been set for November 25, 1985, at 8:00 P.M. If you wish to attend, please note that the meeting will be held in the Council Chambers of the South Amboy Town Hall, located at 140 North Broadway, South Amboy, New Jersey.

"Questions concerning this matter may be directed to Mr. George Nieves at telephone number 212-264-0184."

The letter was dated November 13, 1985 and signed by Joseph T. Seebode for James M. Mansky.

Car Struck by Train in Railroad Yard

Donald Eugene Stilo, age 22, of Raritan Avenue, Morgan, escaped injury when he attempted to make a U-turn at the Jersey Central Railroad yard off Augusta Street at about 10:00 P.M. Monday, Veterans Day, and had his car struck by a New Jersey Transit diesel engine, police report.

Stilo was driving a 1978 Chevrolet Monte Carlo when he entered the railroad yard right of way, traveled along the railroad spur of tracks and was struck by Engine No. 4109 operated by Engineer E.J. Finelli as the car was crossing the tracks.

Police state that the engine was travelling at about 5 miles per hour at the time and that the engineer did not see the vehicle as it was struck, stopping the engine only after the collision occurred.

The diesel had just completed a run and was being switched for an electric engine and was travelling west, police say.

Patrolman George Kern investigated the incident for the police department. Also investigating it is Patrick Steiner of New Jersey Transit.

Stilo, according to police, is being charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcoholic beverage. Additional charges are pending according to police.

Testimonial to be Given to James Smith



James Smith who served as a post commander at two different Veterans of Foreign Wars organizations, will be honored at a testimonial dinner at the South Amboy Boat Club on Saturday, November 23rd, starting at 7:30 P.M.

Smith served as commander of Spotswood VFW Post 4589 during the 1981-1982 calendar year and again as past commander of the South Amboy VFW Post 645 during 1984-1985.

The testimonial, however, is being given primarily for the outstanding services Smith has rendered during many years of serving veterans and their widows and families in the capacity of service officer of the organizations.

In this role during the past eight years Smith had assisted others in expediting legal matters for them, preparing their application papers for veteran's benefits, hospital admittances and transfers, providing them with transportation to hospitals and medical offices and visits by family members to these institutions when requested, and advising widows on pensions they are entitled to.

He has also performed many other services of the same nature for senior citizens who do not have veteran organizational affiliations.

In order to provide for such assistance to others, Smith had to acquire competence in all the veteran rules and regulations as well as state

and federal statutes dealing with veterans, a prodigious undertaking.

Smith, at age 68, can look back to many accomplishments during his career on active duty in the United States Navy and afterwards as a veteran.

He answered the call to duty by serving as a ship's cook for which he had to pass six examinations to reach the rank of ship's cook first class during his tenure in the Navy from 1942 to 1945.

Part of this tour of duty was spent on the rugged LST's, or "Landing Ship Tanks," which hit the beaches and dropped their ramps to discharge troops in combat zones.

He served in both the European and Pacific Theatres and recalls with pensiveness such places as Oran in North Africa; Salerno in Sicily; and Pacific hot spots such as the Marshall Islands and Iwo Jima.

A native South Amboy, a former resident of South Pine Avenue, Smith recently moved to High Street in Perth Amboy, but spends much of his time serving others and associating with his fellow veterans in his home town where he lived most of his life.

He retired in 1975 from Hercules Powder Company, Parlin, as a leader after giving the company 24 years of service.

For the numerous public and social assistance he has given over the years, Smith received commendatory citations from area hospitals including the South Amboy Memorial Hospital; the Perth Amboy General Hospital; John F. Kennedy Hospital; St. Peter's Hospital; and Middlesex General Hospital.

Bill Giffin, senior vice-commander, is chairman of the dinner dance assisted by Commander Luke McCloud as co-chairman and John McCloud III, the post quartermaster.

Among the distinguished guests will be State of New Jersey VFW senior Vice Commander Otto Gollon and his wife, of North Jersey, and VFW District 8 Commander Adam J. Keszewski of Edison and his wife.

Mayor J. Thomas Cross and wife Barbara are also invited as special guests.

Police Captain Cieslarczyk Elected County President

Captain Edward Cieslarczyk of the South Amboy Police Department Traffic Safety Division was elected the new president of the Middlesex County Police Traffic Organization at their November meeting.

Cieslarczyk presently serves as the regional representative to the New Jersey Traffic Officers Association state unit.

He is also South Amboy city's representative to the Middlesex County Transportation Coordinating Committee which is an advisory group to the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders on traffic matters seeking to improve transportation facilities on roadways as well as for railroad and bus transportation routes of travel.

Cieslarczyk recently completed a ten-week course at Rutgers University for police officers on traffic engineering.

Mile Square Talk

Marathon Bus Line Co. Inc.

About 4 or 5 years ago, Marathon Bus Line Company, Inc., ran its last bus through South Amboy after being in business over a half century.

It was started on East Avenue in Perth Amboy in 1900 by Nicholas, Peter, and Kenneth Doukas and moved to South Amboy at 108 North Stevens Avenue in 1922.

The car barn they maintained there is now the Dr. Charles W. Hoffman Senior Citizens Resource Center to which it was converted about five years ago.

Prior to its purchase by Marathon, the edifice served as Tom Scully's Funeral Parlor which terminated after Tom died.

Tom lived in the building next door, on the corner of Stevens Avenue and Henry Street, the recent residence of the Lewandowski Family, which was torn down earlier this year after suffering a severe fire last year. It is now an empty lot.

The Marathon Bus Line Co. was a thriving firm for many years when bus transportation was heavily patronized and private automobiles were the luxury of the wealthy.

They were almost always filled to capacity with passengers running on established routes from Perth Amboy to South Amboy, Perth Amboy to Keyport, and Perth Amboy to Keansburg, day and night, and later to and from the Sayrewoods Shopping Center.

Early Bus History in Area

The first buses appeared in South Amboy in or about 1918. They were scavenger buses who tried to break the

monopolies of the trolley lines owned by Public Service of Newark and Central Jersey Traction Company of Keyport, which ran through South Amboy.

The trolley companies fought tenaciously to maintain their monopolies and to protect their declining financial interests and investments. Individual bus operators, and particularly enterprising car owners who used their vehicles as taxis, cut deeply into trolley proceeds.

One of the earliest bus-operating adventurers is believed to have been "Big Red" Bill Rosenvinge of Bordentown Avenue, who ran Bill's Red Bus Line.

The Tauber Brothers also ran buses from Perth Amboy to South Amboy as did Cliff Cohen of Perth Amboy. There were others also, about six in all.

The Marathon Bus Co., however, took hold because of the vision of the Doukas family. The father, James Doukas, owned the Marathon Hotel on Smith Street (see story on Stanley (Dan Press) Cieslarczyk).

The last surviving son, Kenneth (Connie), worked the most years with the firm and presently resides on High Street, the past 45 years in retirement. He worked hard and long hours to maintain the bus line through the lean 1950's and 1960's when automobiles became easily accessible and filled the roads.

Central Jersey Traction trolley company went out of business in September, 1924. It had the Perth Amboy - South Amboy - Keyport - Keansburg - Union City route.

Public service, which had the Perth Amboy - South Amboy - Sayreville - South River - New Brunswick route, ran a few years longer.

The Busy Years of Marathon

When Marathon Bus Line Co. was in its prime years, it ran many special, charter trips as well as its regularly-serviced routes.

Starting with one or two buses, it grew to a fleet of sixteen eventually and maintained a passenger waiting station and ticket office at the Stevens Avenue car barn.

Connie Doukas formerly lived with his wife Mildred in an apartment above the car barn and graduated from St. Mary's High School, South Amboy.

A very pleasant, mild-mannered person, Connie later took in his nephews, Christopher and Peter Nicholas, as partners.

During the Great Depression years of the 1930's, the Marathon Company made a regular circuit run around Parlin, Morgan, Sayreville, South Amboy, Madison Township and Laurence Harbor picking up WPA (Workers Progress Administration) workers and transporting them to Menlo Park where Middlesex County was constructing Roosevelt Park under a federal grant to provide relief work for unemployed workers.

One of the mementoes of this time is a twenty-five-foot high monument mounted on squat legs and surrounded by a concrete circular wall to form a pool and which once contained water within the pool.

Still in existence but in a deteriorated state, the monument provides a cozy summer or spring vista for park visitors who sit on the pool wall, reading, or just relaxing, or laying in the open grass area around it, or playing games with the family around it.

Built by South Amboy Terra Cotta Co.

The monument was constructed in association with the South Amboy Terra Cotta Company which had its demise about a quarter century ago.

It can be seen after walking a short distance from the Roosevelt Park main entrance on Route 27 and along Grandview Avenue.

South Amboy Terra Cotta made the multi-colored gargoyles and sea serpents and other creature demons of the dep that are imbedded into it around its circular sides at various levels of height and is surmounted by a large globe and probably signifies the maritime importance of the county at that time.

It should be repaired and preserved as an historical site.

Marathon had many South Amboyans in their employ as bus drivers, the names of some of which are not remembered except by their families and friends.

Stanley (Dan Press) Cieslarczyk and brother Anton were two of them. Another was John Scully.

Coming to mind are others such as Patrick (Patsy) Hoover, Herb Roxbury, Joe Doyle, Tom Saunders, Jerry Crone, Al Jerome, Sam Turner, Frank Mezáros, Kip Hansell, Bill Wilson, George Evigan, Ed McKeon, Larry Keays, Joe Nowak, and Bill and Ed Rander, among others.

George Beck of Perth Amboy, later of South Amboy, and Joe DeMarco were the car barn bus mechanics. Joe Sikorski was the interior bus carpenter and maintenance man.

Since Marathon played such an important role in the history and development of South Amboy, it would be helpful if resident of the city who have personal knowledge of it and pictures could pool their resources through the Sadie Pope Dowdell Public Library.

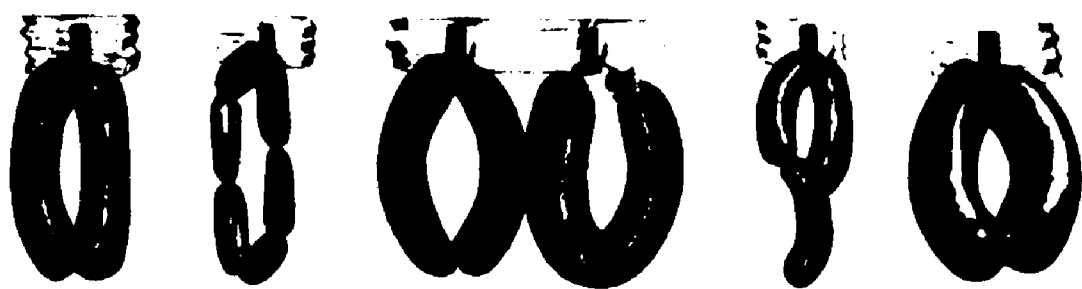

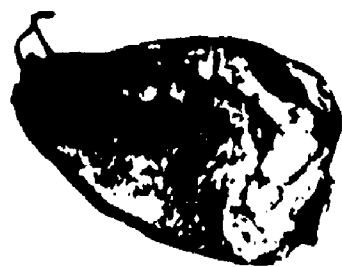

The Heart Association urges citizens of New Jersey to support this critical need. One never knows when the individual who needs blood will be him, her or a member of the family.

Help is needed to save the lives of those who require surgery or other medical care involving blood transfusions. I repeat that the American Heart Association urges all adult citizens who are in good health to respond now to this need. Information about blood donor services and collection locations can be obtained from local hospitals.

Court Proceedings

City Magistrate Joseph C. Hoffman presided over the following case hearings in Municipal Court last Thursday:

Stanley "Dan Press" Cieslarczyk was one of those kind of guys who could develop friendships easily. He had a knack for warming up to people and for people warming up to him.

As a Marathon bus driver for many years, he had daily opportunities for expressing this special talent, and he rode the crest of popularity not only with his passengers, but with many of his friends and acquaintances in South Amboy proper and particularly in Mechanicsville where brothers Anton and Felix (Chuck), and other members of the family, had origins and roots during the past several generations.

Memories of individuals who have served the public during their lifetimes gradually fade away and are retained chiefly by the loved ones they left behind and a few close friends. The memory of Dan, however,

survives tenaciously among the large circle of friends he had accumulated and who survive him.

Dan was born on Fourette Street, off Scott Avenue, just over the South Amboy borderline, where Melrose starts, on May 2, 1904, the second of a line of brothers. Brother Leon still occupies the homestead.

He was the son of the late John and Stella Wleczorek Cieslarczyk and grew up in a close-knit family environment that included, in addition to Anton and Felix, brothers Frank and Theodore of South River, sister Jeannie Mroczkowski, wife of Joseph, residents of Fifth Street, brother Al and wife Helen of David Street, and the late Sophie Drudzinaki of Melrose. Bertha, who died in 1979, also lived on Fourette Street.

His parents and brothers and sisters, and his neighborhood pals, played an

important role in nurturing the growing friendly personality of Dan which he lavished on his bus passengers over the years.

Drove the Perth Amboy-Keansburg Route

Driving a bus came naturally to Dan. He could be seen wheeling his bus in and out of South Amboy, waving and nodding to friends on the city streets as he maneuvered his bus, coming out of Perth Amboy's lower Smith Street, up Main Street to Stevens Avenue, then to Bordentown Avenue and on to Pine Avenue to continue his journey to Keansburg and its boardwalk resort.

He also drove the South Amboy-to-Keansburg terminal run, with bus station stops at Morgan, Laurence Harbor, Cliffwood and other isolated halts along the highways when bus travel was the principal means of

transportation. The automobile age was still in its infancy.

Regular daily passengers could always rely on him to pick them up at these stations to transport them safely to and from their places of employment, or on weekly shopping tours to Perth Amboy and back.

And they always got their money's worth, enjoying Dan's friendly greetings and conversations, catching up on the news and happenings, and breaking up the monotony of the trips on roads that, in the early days, were not as functional as they are today.

Fares then from Perth Amboy to South Amboy were ten cents; from Perth Amboy to Morgan, fifteen cents to Keyport, a quarter; and to Keansburg, thirty-five cents, which made bus travel economical.

Dan worked the day and night shifts alternately. Passengers waiting along the countryside, especially during the night, on cold, blizzard days, were glad to see Dan's bus roll up to pick them up and rescue them from the elements. Their greetings and conversations were earnest and warm.

Achieved a Remarkable Driving Record

The roadways between established pickup stations were rugged and treacherous with their soft, muddy shoulders and surfaces slippery in the rain, and often burdened with ice and snow.

It took an expert driver to negotiate such roads, and Dan was an expert at the wheel.

Over a span of thirty-four years, Dan was never cited for a chargeable accident, which is a remarkable feat considering the conditions when visibility was frequently obscured, roads were rutted, and the early buses he drove were, in structure and performance, far from the type of conveyances with the modern conveniences we have today.

Chassis suspensions were rigidly attached to the bodies, not hydraulically-cushioned from bumps and jolts by smooth-working shock absorbers. The bodies rode high on the chassis frames and were balloon-shaped on the sides lacking good, even balance, and making driving them cumbersome.

Spoked wheels were gigantic in size with slim rims and thin tire widths, low ply, which entered ruts and crevices easily and did not have good traction as the heavily-inflated bus tires have now. Bus engines were not high-powered.

Gearing for momentum was difficult and, if not alert, a bus driver could fracture an arm by a rapidly-spinning steering wheel from the force of the action transmitted to it through the linkage when a bus wheel caught in a pothole on the road, particularly on curves.

Dan anticipated such hazards and was always prepared for them to avert accidents or casualties day-after-day through all his years of bus driving.

John Scully, of Mechanicsville, a contemporary Marathon bus driver, one of the first to drive Marathon buses, was another excellent driver of many years who won a citation for driving buses over a million miles without an accident, fatality or injury.

Dan's principal, prevailing characteristic, though, was spreading warmth of feeling and good cheer which he communicated generously to others, who came to know him intimately and to enjoy his company always.

Brother Felix Makes First Contact

Felix, who in many ways was a prototype of Dan, opened the door to Dan's career as a bus driver by obtaining a part-time job as handyman, at age thirteen, at the Marathon Hotel which was located at 142 Smith Street, Perth Amboy, not far from High Street and the ferry slip.

"Chuck" worked mostly in the hotel lobby where there was a shoe-shining concession, a hat block and cleaning shop, and a billiard room with twelve pool tables, as well as tobacco, candy and sundry sales counters, a popular hangout where maintenance was constantly needed.

The hotel was owned and operated by James Doukas, the father of Nicholas, Peter and Kenneth Doukas. It burned to the ground in the mid 1920's. The famous Parker Hotel was located nearby, across the street.

Dan eventually came to know the Doukas family through Chuck, particularly Kenneth, the only surviving brother, known affectionately as "Connie."

Connie, living on High Street and in retirement at age 76, was associated with Marathon Bus Line Company until its termination.

Bus Company

Comes to South Amboy

While the hotel was still operating, the Doukas brothers got interested in bus transportation and started the bus firm on East Avenue, Perth Amboy. In 1922 they moved to South Amboy.

Through Chuck and his association with the Doukas brothers, whose firm was expanding, Dan became a bus driver in 1926.

Though he was mainly a Perth Amboy-to-Keansburg driver, Dan also drove charter buses to places such as Palisades Park, New York City, Lake Hopatcong, and to summer resorts towards the south such as Asbury Park. His oldest brother Anton also drove a Marathon bus for several years.

He frequently drove St. Mary's and South Amboy High School's (later Hoffman H.S.) athletic teams to out-of-town games during off hours.

Senior citizens may remember the fleet of buses

lined up on John Street in front of the Old City Hall in the 1930's, which took youths of the city on special recreational trips, sponsored by the city, or, in later years, to Roosevelt Stadium in Jersey City, where local championship baseball teams played in state tournaments. Dan often drove one of the buses.

There were also many school graduating class trips that Dan and other drivers handled for Marathon, especially to Washington, D.C.

Dan's Death Comes as a Shock

When Dan died at age 56, on February 28, 1960, it came as a great loss to not only his family but also to his many friends.

He and his wife, the former Jean Wilczeski, a native South Amboy, lived then at 520 David Street with their children during the past twenty years.

Daughter Florence is now a resident of Forked River with husband John Larkin and family. Daughter Eleanor Przybylski, wife of Joseph, passed away (October, 1984). Son Tom lives with his mother Jean on Highland Street.

Jean and Dan were married by Rev Zenon Lesniowski (later Monsignor, at St. Stephen's Church in Perth Amboy) at Sacred Heart Church, South Amboy, in 1931. There are five grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

South Amboy lost one of its prominent members when Dan died. Brothers Anton died in 1962 and Chuck in 1983, both of whom also left their marks of prominence as South Amboy residents, owning for forty-five years Anton and Chuck's Tavern on Ridgeway Avenue and Conover Street and known for its neighborhood trade and friendly environment.

Dan gave many years of devoted service as a bus driver not only in an ordinary but also an extraordinary manner during the pioneer days of bus transportation in South Amboy and vicinity.

He is fondly recalled by Connie Doukas and by many of the friends he made on his regular routes and on the many bus tours chartered by Marathon Bus Line Company, Inc. in which he drove their buses.

And it is as it should be because of the meritorious record he maintained and the public he pleased over the span of his lifetime in and out of the bus driver's seat.

Printed above the driver's front window on a wooden panel and along the length of both sides is the name of its route "Perth Amboy-Mechanicsville-South Amboy."

The "fat-in-the-belly" buses barely made it through the Stevens Avenue-Ridgeway Avenue Hole-in-the-Wall tunnel, with just inches to spare on each side.

Most Marathon bus drivers, in those days, stopped their buses at the entrances to sight in and sometimes miscalculated, scrapping the sides of the buses because of the close clearances.

Dan drove Marathon buses for 34 years, starting in 1926, until suffering a heart attack and dying in 1960. Brother Anton (D. 1962) also drove Marathon buses for several years in his younger days before going into partnership for 45 years with brother Felix (Chuck, died 1983) of ownership of Anton and Chuck's Tavern on Ridgeway Avenue.

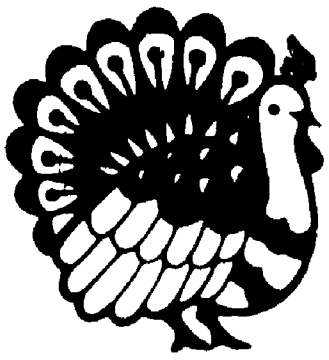

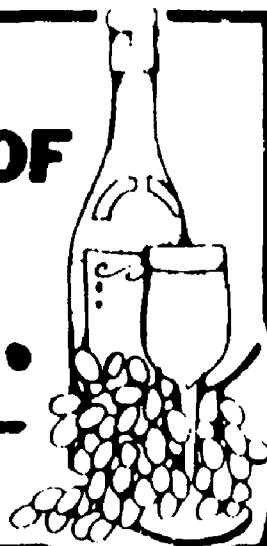
