Sayreville To Challenge Methadone Clinic

Casper P. Boehm, Sayreville Borough Attorney, announced that he will file a lawsuit on behalf of the borough to seek redress against a methadone clinic being located on outer Main Street near its border.

A Florham Park pharmacist, Gerhard Bass, obtained approval from the South Amboy Planning Board to construct the clinic at that site at its February 27th special meeting.

A public hearing on the matter was held in January by the Planning Board at which only a few residents appeared.

At the special meeting in February, Bass was granted approval to construct the clinic if he could obtain county and state clearances regarding soil conservation, sewerage and drainage, and other subdivision changes.

Since outer Main Street is a county road, he was required, also, to seek approvals from the Middlesex County Planning Board and from the state represented by the Freehold Soil Conservation District agency as to dirt removal and drainage matters.

Bass was expected to begin the construction of the clinic facility on a 40,000 square foot lot this spring or summer opposite the Chevalier industrial site.

He was in litigation with the City of South Amboy for a period of four years, seeking to establish his clinic originally at 124 North Broadway, a vacant former confectionary store.

Planning Board Chairman Wilbur Schmidt stated following the February meeting that the position of the board in granting the approval was the only proper one for the board to take in view of the law.

Opposition to the Main Street site has come principally from the Melrose Improvement Association. Residents of Scott Avenue and Laurie Street would be in the near vicinity of the proposed clinic which plans to treat about 150 patients a week.

Sale of Waterworks, Incinerator Council Topics

Mayor J. Thomas Cross stated that purchase of the South Amboy water supply system by Middlesex Water Company is "the safest bet we have."

This statement was in response to questions raised about the sale of the waterworks by Kathryn Sager, a resident of Cedar Street, at the recent City Council meeting.

"Our present water supply comes from the Old Bridge Sands and Farrington Sands," the mayor said.

"We are at the lower end of the water supply strata which supplies potable water to neighboring communities. That is why our water has such a high iron content," he continued.

"We dug a water well about four years ago and obtained only 200 gallons of it from the well instead of the 500 we expected."

"Here is a way for us to have water. We may not have it ten years from now."

"If someone spills something at our waterworks, we may have to shut down and be without water. I wouldn't want to tell our people that we don't have any water."

Mrs. Sager inquired about Middlesex Water Company's water source.

Business Administrator answered that Middlesex water company has rights to obtain potable water from the Delaware and Raritan Canal.

Water a High Priority

Delaware and Raritan Canal is a major source of surface water in Central Jersey. Smolney added. It was remarked that Middlesex Water Company can also purchase water from Elizabethtown Water Company.

The mayor added that water is a high priority in this area and that other municipalities, such as Sayreville and Old Bridge have water problems.

A 2.9 mile pipeline connecting the Middlesex Water Company with East

Brunswick's water supply system was started April 22nd.

Sayreville is presently seeking to construct a pipeline segment from the Middlesex Water Company's Carl J. Olsen treatment facility in Edison to the Sayreville-Old Bridge border at a cost of \$8 or \$9 million.

Sayreville Borough Clerk Margaret Hahn, on behalf of Sayreville officials, notified the Old Bridge Municipal Utilities Authority that the borough anticipates proceeding with the proposed pipeline with or without Old Bridge's participation after June 10th.

Perth Amboy, which obtains water from the Runyon Watershed in Old Bridge, may also be a participant.

Purchase of Transmission Lines

Mayor Cross declared that Middlesex Water Company desires to acquire the water transmission line that crosses the Raritan River and other groundwater lines.

The local water supply has diminished. The mayor declared that there isn't as much of a groundwater supply as originally thought to be.

Furthermore, there is also the danger of groundwater contamination from salt water intrusion, he added.

Groundwater diversion restrictions expected to be mandated by the state has also been stated as a reason for seeking a guaranteed water supply source for South Amboy.

In answer to another question by Mrs. Sager regarding possible water rate increases should Middlesex Water Company acquire the city's waterworks, the Mayor declared that Middlesex would have to apply to the Public Utilities Board requesting water price increases and that such price increases would also have to be charged to other municipalities served by Middlesex.

Fire Code Being Legislated

Mayor J. Thomas Cross and members of the city governing body are in the process of legislating a new fire safety code for the city.

An ordinance is being introduced which will create a local Division of Fire Prevention within the South Amboy Fire Department.

The division will be headed by a director who will be assigned a staff to help him in enforcing the regulations of the code.

The ordinance will give violators of the code a right of appeal before a county board.

Guidelines for the ordinance measure have been worked out by the State Fire Safety Commission under the state Uniform Fire Safety Act.

Fined for Curfew Violations

A number of individuals had to appear before Municipal Court Judge Joseph C. Hoffman last week for violating the 9:00 P.M. curfew at the landfill.

All were assessed \$75 fines and \$25 court costs. Paying the penalties on charges brought by Patrolman Robert Krzywdzinski were:

Bonnie A. Costin, Beech Street, Fords; Robert W. Letaul, Roosevelt Avenue, Carteret; Robert G. Giordano, Leick Avenue, Carteret; Donald Snow, Jr., High Street, Carteret; Brian R. Juarez, Atlantic Street, Carteret; and Richard J. Bensen, Pershing Avenue, Carteret.

The same violation was lodged by Patrolman Bruce Richmond against Lewis F. Giordano, who also paid \$75 in fines and \$25 costs.

Captain James Holovacko signed complaints of violating the curfew against Joseph F. Yellen, Stephenville Parkway, Edison; and Robert J. Brophy, Sixth Avenue, Port Reading. In addition to the \$75 fines and \$25 court costs, they were also charged by Captain Holovacko with consumption of alcoholic beverages, for which they paid an additional \$75 and \$25 each in fines and costs.

Also charged with violating the curfew on a summons issued by Patrolman Carl Nemeth was David J. Hart, Locust Street, Carteret.

All of the defendants pleaded guilty to the charges.

Other Municipal Court Proceedings

Gaspar K. Lukas, Jr., Morningtide Avenue, Laurence Harbor, was charged by Officer Robert M. Innot of the Conrail Police Department of defiant trespass and disorderly conduct, for creating a hazardous and physically dangerous condition.

Lukas was one of two

persons riding the top of a Conrail freight train March 30th. He pleaded guilty to the charges and was fined \$50 and \$25 court costs. HE also had to pay \$25 to the state Violent Crimes Commission Board.

Charles M. Rakita, Grove Avenue, Laurence Harbor, was charged by Ptl. Krzywdzinski with consuming an alcoholic beverage on George and Rosewell Streets. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$75 and \$25 costs.

Also charged with possession and consumption of an alcoholic beverage in a motor vehicle on Bordentown Avenue by Patrolman Bernard Mackiel and pleading guilty to the charge was David F. Halti of Parker Street, Morgan, being assessed \$100 and \$25 costs.

On a summons for speeding, Halti paid an additional \$50 and \$15.

Scott W. Prusecki of Coolidge Avenue, Parlin, pleaded guilty to a summons issued by Ptl. Krzywdzinski of disregarding a stop sign, costing him \$50 and \$15. Failure to have his vehicle inspected cost him an additional \$10 and \$10 costs.

Paul Soltys of Basswood Lake, Tuckerton, was charged by State Trooper M. Downs with disregarding a red traffic light. He pleaded guilty and paid \$50 and \$15.

Harrassment of an Officer

Patrolman Carl Nemeth brought charges against Michael R. Maher of Stephens Street, Sayreville, of harrassment by acts which caused a hazardous and physically dangerous condition when he resisted arrest. He was made to pay \$50 fines and \$25 costs on each of the two counts and \$25 on each count to the state Violent Crimes Commission Board.

Stephen W. Harmon of Fifth Street, Port Reading, pleaded guilty to a summons issued by Patrolman James Wallis to operating a vehicle on Sixth Street and Stevens Avenue while his license was suspended.

Because it was a second offense, he was fined \$750 and \$15 costs and given a five-day

workhouse sentence to be carried out on weekends.

William Wanko, of Bertram Avenue, pleaded guilty to being an unlicensed driver, charged by Sergeant Lee McCabe, and was fined \$50 and \$15. He also pleaded guilty to a charge made by Patrolman Gerald Pizzillo of refusing to leave an area after repeatedly being told to do so and was made to pay \$20 and \$15 costs.

Robert Morales, of Madison Avenue, Perth Amboy, was issued a summons for reckless driving by Patrolman Robert A. Point. Pleading guilty, he was assessed \$100 and \$15 costs.

For causing damage to the truck of Kenneth Kugelman, purposely pulling off his left sideview mirror, as charged by Detective T. Popowski of Sayreville, Morales was fined \$75, \$25 costs, and \$25 to the state Violent Crimes Commission Board.

Jeffrey P. Bloodgood, Fairview Avenue, Sayreville, pleaded guilty to passing on the right, as charged by Patrolman William Cheeseman, and paid \$50 and \$10 costs. For not having his registration in his possession, he paid an additional \$10.

James W. Gallaher, Becker Drive, Parlin, pleaded guilty to careless driving, being levied a fine of \$100 and \$15 cost. He also was assessed \$200 and \$15 for having an open alcoholic beverage container in his vehicle. Patrolman James

Memorial Day was started by women of the civil war era, as early as 1863 when a group of women decorated the graves of Confederate and Union soldiers in Columbus, Mississippi. The practice was then expanded to other states and groups of women formed organizations and decorated the graves. It formally became a Memorial Day in 1868. Each year states would pass legislation recognizing the day in their state up to the present which we now call Memorial Day. When first started in 1863 the women placed fresh flowers and flags on the graves, then called Decoration Day.

Jacob Astor Buckalew was a volunteer infantryman from South Amboy who fought in the Battle of Appomattox Court House in Virginia. He was a soldier in Company "K", 14th Infantry Regiment, New Jersey Volunteers. Granddaughter Caroline, an octogenarian of 81 years, has his discharge certificate framed and adorning the wall in her home.

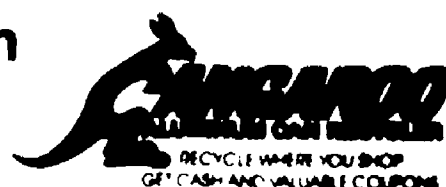

ARTICLE XII DEPARTMENT OF FIRE OF CHAPTER 5 ADMINISTRATION is hereby amended to add the following:

Division of Fire Prevention

All remaining references in Chapter 47 FIRE PREVENTION to "Chief of the Division of Fire" or "Fire Chief" are hereby changed to read "Fire Official".

WHEREAS, the Uniform Fire Safety Act, (P.L. 1983, c. 283) was enacted for the purpose of establishing a system for the enforcement of minimum fire safety standards throughout the State of New Jersey, and

WHEREAS, the Uniform Fire Safety Act authorizes municipalities to provide for local enforcement and to establish local enforcement agencies for that purpose, and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City of South Amboy to have the Uniform Fire Safety Act enforced locally, and

WHEREAS, the South Amboy Department of Fire has agreed to the plan which is set forth herein, for the administration and enforcement of the Uniform Fire Safety Code

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED by the City Council of the City of South Amboy in the County of Middlesex and State of New Jersey as follows:

SECTION 1. LOCAL ENFORCEMENT

Pursuant to Section 11 of the Uniform Fire Safety Act (P.L. 1983, c. 283), the New Jersey Uniform Fire Code shall be locally enforced in the City of South Amboy.

SECTION 2. AGENCY DESIGNATION

The local enforcing agency shall be the Division of Fire Prevention in the Department of Fire of the City of South Amboy.

SECTION 3. DUTIES

The local enforcing agency shall enforce the Uniform Fire Safety Act and the codes and regulations adopted under it in all buildings, structures, and premises within the established boundaries of the City of South Amboy, other than owner occupied one and two family dwellings, and shall faithfully comply with the requirements of the Uniform Fire Safety Act and the Uniform Fire Code.

SECTION 4. LIFE HAZARD UNITS

The local enforcing agency established by SECTION 2 of this ordinance shall carry out the periodic inspections of life hazard units required by the Uniform Fire Code on behalf of the Commissioner of Community Affairs.

SECTION 5. ORGANIZATION

The local enforcing agency established by SECTION 2 of this Ordinance shall be a part of the Department of Fire and shall be under the direct supervision and control of the Director.

SECTION 6. APPOINTMENT OF FIRE OFFICIAL

The local enforcing agency shall be under the supervision of the Fire Official who shall be appointed by the Director.

SECTION 7. INSPECTORS AND EMPLOYEES

Such inspectors and other employees as may be necessary for the local enforcing agency to properly carry out its responsibilities shall be appointed by the Director.

SECTION 8. BOARD OF APPEALS

Pursuant to Section 15 and 17 of the Uniform Fire Safety Act, any person aggrieved by any order of the local enforcing agency shall have the right to appeal to the constitution board of appeals of Middlesex County.

SECTION 9. ADOPTION

1. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances adopted prior to the date of this Ordinance, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed.
2. This Ordinance shall become effective upon final adoption after publication according to law.

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
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
