Student Involvement In Sympathy With Teachers Job Actions

About 50 Hoffman High School students walked out of school for about a quarter of an hour Monday to demonstrate their support for the teachers of the district in their current negotiations with the Board of Education for a new contract.

Mrs. Joanne O'Brien, the South Amboy Education Association (S.A.E.A.) president, noted that not much progress was made in a meeting with board negotiators at a joint meeting last Friday to break the impasse that was declared September 20th.

Meanwhile, a Mr. Hammer was selected by both the S.A.E.A. and the board to function as a fact finder to try to bring both parties around to an agreement.

Mr. John S. Oleksa, school superintendent, said that a meeting between the two groups is in the process of being set up to try to break the stalemate.

The S.A.E.A., which represents 77 employees, has been working without a contract since July 1st, the contractual date for the 1984-1985 school year.

Mr. James Reilly, chairman of the board's negotiating team, has disclosed that an 8% increase has been offered the teachers for the present year and an additional 8% in the subsequent year. He asserted that the board is facing financial constraints which makes bargaining with the teachers difficult.

The teachers at first were seeking a 10% salary increase for both years, but have since increased their salary demands to 11.75% to attain equity with salaries paid in other county districts, according to Mrs. O'Brien. They maintain that they are 24th on a scale of pay in the 25-district county school system.

"Teachers Deserve Better"

Most of the students in the walkout had their educational careers in mind to complement their support for the teachers.

Lilliana Molina declared that no one stops to realize how the students are affected. The teachers, she said, put in much time engaging in clubs and other activities with the pupils and that few people realize or

appreciate what they do. "They really care about us in and out of class," she added. "They deserve better pay. They do an excellent job," she maintained.

Charles "Chip" Hackett stated that teachers should be given credit for conducting themselves in a professional manner so that their educations are not disrupted by strikes as in other districts. "They show much concern for the students, which we appreciate," he said.

Bill Hausell explained that the reason for the walkout was to impress upon the public that the students are in full support of and in sympathy with the teachers.

Nadina Puccio showed concern for the sports program which, she said, she didn't want to see disrupted. "What affects the teachers," she said, "affects us."

Amy Petrosky stated that they are taught to stand up for what they believe. "The reason we are involved," she declared, "is that the issue is vital to our future."

Ed Baranowski and Randy Stratton had similar comments. "We want our community to show interest and to become involved. We want the people to take notice that we, as students, also have opinions."

Randy and Lilliana added that the teachers do not get paid for the many little things they do for the students that give them confidence in their school performance and that make school life more pleasant and easier for them. "Teachers are not the school! The Board of Education is not the school! We, the students, are the school! Without us there would be no school and there would be no jobs or positions!" they echoed.

Wednesday there were more teachers absent than normally which one teacher ascribed to a flu sickness now prevalent.

One issue at stake is the confusion over the teacher pay scale guide. Although there are supposedly eighteen steps to the guide, which the administration has offered to reduce to twelve over a four-year period, one teacher asserts she is all alone on the 26th step and another stated she is on the 21st step.

Court News

In municipal court last week, presided by Judge Joseph Hoffman, Scott F. Nemeth of Liberty St. pleaded guilty to speeding 55 m.p.h. in a 30 m.p.h. zone, as charged by Ptl. Bernard Mackiel, and was fined \$60 and \$15.

Samuel N. O'Bryan, Piedmont Dr., Old Bridge pleaded guilty to opening a bottle of beer in a motor vehicle on Broadway, given a summons by Sgt. Kenneth Szatkowski and was assessed \$200 and \$10 costs.

Alan Ewart, Crescent Ave., Jackson, was charged with simple assault by Capt. James Holovacko and was fined \$200 and \$25.

Ralph R. Pavero of Englishtown was given a summons by Ptl. Steve Pavich for a parking violation on Catherine St. and was fined \$10 and \$10.

In municipal court Tuesday, Oct. 17, presided by Judge Thomas Dominecki, Michael Matarangolo and Mark Matarangolo of David St. were charged with possession and consumption of an alcoholic beverage while in a motor vehicle on a city street, as charged by Ptl. William Houseman and Thomas Brinamen. They pleaded guilty and were fined \$50 and \$10 costs each.

Samuel Nemeth was also charged with consumption of an alcoholic beverage on John St. and Broadway by Ptl. William Cheeseman and was fined \$40 and \$10 on a plea of guilty.

Patrick H. McNeal of David St. had the same charge, plea and fine, consumption of an alcoholic

Kenneth J. Nash, age 19, of Hemlock Dr., Parlin, was fined \$75 and \$10 on a charge of interfering with an arrest by Sgt. Szatkowski and assessed \$100 and \$10 with a suspended 60-day jail term, and a year probation, for possession of marijuana under 25 grams.

Ronald J. Nash, also of Hemlock Dr., was fined \$75 and \$10 on a charge by Ptl. George Kern for the same offense, possession of marijuana, and administered a suspended 60-day jail term and one year probation.

Ronald Nash was also issued summonses by Ptl. Gerald Pizzillo for careless driving, \$50 fine, \$10 costs, opening an alcoholic beverage in a vehicle, \$200 and \$10; possession of marijuana, \$50 and \$10; no license in his possession and no car insurance, \$10 and \$10 each, pleading guilty to all but the last two charges.

Allen Lukenheimer, Roosevelt Ave., Laurence Harbor, pleaded guilty to driving while having his license suspended and was fined \$300 and \$10, driving an unregistered vehicle, \$30 and \$10 and no car insurance, \$100 and \$10, as charged by Sgt. Szatkowski.

Terrance Bolger, John St., was charged by Ptl. Bernard Mackiel with creating a hazardous and physically dangerous condition on a public street, kicking in a rear door patrol car window, damage under \$500, and was fined \$75 and \$10, made to pay the city restitution of \$50.

Sodium-Based Street Lighting On Tap

City business administrator Nicholas Smolney disclosed at Monday's Mayor and Council business meeting that the city streets will, in the near future, obtain sodium-activated street lights throughout the city.

Some of the main streets already have this type of street lighting, including Broadway, Bordentown Ave., Main St., and Stevens Ave.

The remaining streets have mercury-based lighting which are due for conversion to sodium-based street lights. These, he said, will be phased in within the next three years.

The conversion is an economy measure for both the Jersey Central Power and Light Co. and for the city as sodium-based lighting requires less fuel to generate this type of lighting. South Amboy, Mr. Smolney noted, stands to save about \$8,000 annually from the conversion.

The annual street lighting expenditure by the city is in excess of \$100,000, Smolney said.

Bordentown Ave. Bridge May Be Eliminated

If their plan is approved, Conrail may build a grade crossing at the Jernee Mill Road - Bordentown Ave intersection which will eliminate their railroad tracks running through South Amboy.

This plan is now under study by Sayreville Municipal Borough and by South Amboy Mayor J. Thomas Cross intimated that should this plan be approved, it will eliminate the Feltus St. trestle by George St. and enable the city to straighten out the Pine Ave. street at the railroad crossing near George and Leffert Sts. Construction could begin in spring, 1985.

Also, it would negate the necessity of replacing the Bordentown Ave. bridge with a new bridge. The site of the present bridge will merely be filled in with materials to maintain the roadway. Estimated project cost is \$1,050,500, of which 75% would be federal funds, 15% railroad funds, and 10% state funds.

Tavern License Hearing Postponed

Because of a lack of a quorum, the City Council had to postpone a hearing on the reopening of the "My Wife's Place" tavern on Route 35 under new ownership.

The transfer of the liquor license, which has not been in operation for over a year, previously held by JoDal Corp., will be decided at a hearing on a date yet to be set. Complaints against the tavern have been made which requires a hearing before a transfer of ownership can be made.

Antelope, Inc., trading as Freckles, hopes to acquire the franchise.

Postponement of the hearing came about when Mrs. Erma Brown

disqualified herself as a council member voting on the issue, having an interest in Brown's Liquor Store. Two members, Councilman Bruce R. Richmond and Council President Tom O'Brien, were the other governing body members present. Councilmen Frank Tarallo and Sylvester Attardi, it was reported, were called out to their places of employment.

Assistant city attorney Thomas Downs IV advised the party seeking the tavern license transfer to appear at the next hearing with an attorney to represent them which is now a requirement in such proceedings.

Several ordinances are to be introduced for first reading at the regular council meeting to be held tonight, Thursday, at the council chamber at City Hall, starting at 8:00 p.m.

One of these ordinances will deal with an amendment to the existing property maintenance ordinance code dealing with live entertainment in local establishments.

Truck Demolished In Fire

Last Thursday, October 11th, at about 6:35 a.m., a 1979 Chevrolet pick-up truck became engulfed in flames and was completely demolished in a fireball on the ramp exit from Route 9 to Washington Road near St. Mary's cemetery.

The driver of the truck told police that he had a 100-gallon tank attached to the bed of his truck below the cab which developed a leak and dripped on the hot exhaust pipe to engulf the vehicle in a matter of minutes.

Hector DeFino, the driver, who was passing through the city from South Amboy to a destination across from the Sayre-Fisher office, where they were to excavate clay for use at city dump areas as a surface cover, in the locality where spring water was formerly obtained by motorists, said that at first he detected a small flame and some smoke and tried to awaken nearby residents to obtain water to extinguish the flame, but was unable to awaken anyone.

Meanwhile, the small flame became a huge holocaust, destroying the truck and causing traffic in the morning rush hour to back up as far as the Emma Arieth School in Parlin.

Sgt. Anthony Warn and Ptl. Thomas Brinamen responded to the fire call, which was also responded to by the local fire department.

The area was cleared out of the truck within the hour and the foam was sanded in the roadway to prevent slippery surfaces.

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Republican Council Candidates Statements

Harold W. McLaughlin

As the candidate running in the Third Ward, I, Harold McLaughlin, feel that recreation is an important part of our children's lives as well as their parents and grandparents' lives. It seems that the only organized sports that this city has to offer are baseball and softball.

I have been a little league manager for ten years. I started when I returned home from the service in 1969. I coached for eight years, left, and returned two years ago when my son's team needed a coach. In these ten years, I have seen some improvements, such as lights on one field and a refreshment stand which the Little League Managers Association built with their own funds. The "scratch field" was to be turned into a playable field for years, and has yet to be done. The one field that has lights is used for night games, but its use is restricted. I think it is time we installed lights on the girls softball field. This would enable the boys and girls to complete their season without conflict to one another and still have time for playoffs and All-Star Tournament play. Wouldn't it be nice to see an All-Star Tournament in South Amboy some day? With another lighted field and proper maintenance on our fields, this is possible.

The fields themselves were to be thatched and re-seeded at the end of the season. I haven't seen this done yet. When will it be done? I hope in time for opening day next year. Practice starts on April first.

My daughter played on a girls midget softball team for the past three years. These girls are given the barest of equipment. Their hats and shirts show up after the season has already begun. They receive a few bats, softballs, and batting helmets which have to be shared from one team to another. One item of equipment which I feel is a must is a catcher's helmet. This is not issued to the girls and I feel that it is a must for any child fielding this position. The midget league boys uniform pants and the All-Star pants and socks were purchased by the Little League Managers Association because the city feels that there is no need to uniform these children.

Whatever happened to the instructional soccer for the children? A citizen who is a soccer coach has been trying to get this clinic organized for three years but has been told that there are no fields or funds available. Now really,

what field in town is available in the morning during July and August? All that is needed are two nets, soccer balls and kids.

During the summer months, arts and crafts is a good program that does work with the younger children. This is held outdoors in our parks. Since our children do spend time in these parks, shouldn't they be cleaned up? Shouldn't we lock the parks at night so that our children can have a safe, clean place to play and not get hurt?

Couldn't the Water Works pond be stocked with fish? I have seen a number of children fishing there. The Water Works area would be a nice place for a parent or grandparent to take children for a day of fishing and fun.

During the winter months we really have nothing for the kids. Could we offer them instructional volleyball and basketball in our school gym, say on a Saturday morning for a couple of hours?

I have one final question. Why was Veteran's Field zoned residential, when, in fact, it was donated to the city for the sole purpose of recreation? Are we indeed going to lose this baseball, softball and soccer field to condos or homes?

Couldn't we give our children just a little bit more? Can we offer them something that will give them the incentive to lead a productive life and contribute to South Amboy when they become adults? Maybe a few more will stay here instead of being so anxious to "get out." I believe the youth of today are South Amboy's tomorrow.

We have serious rush hour traffic problems which are more chronic in the early morning hours, said Francis A. Januszak, Republican candidate for Councilman First Ward. Between the hours of 6:30 a.m. and 8:30 a.m., it is difficult to leave our city in order to reach our destinations, he noted. The problem lies with the motorists leaving the major highways and entering South Amboy on our main roads. This is causing congestion and hazardous conditions on many side streets throughout the city. Some motorists who exit US 9 onto Main Street, do not observe the speed limit, the school zones, the traffic lights or the stop signs, declared the candidate. The corner of Main Street and Feltus Street, for example, is becoming a regular and

continuing hazard for the elderly attending morning services and for children reporting to school.

The most recent incident, reported Januszak, occurred when a school crossing guard and a child being escorted across the street were almost struck down by a motorist, who, ignoring the traffic light, continued through the intersection. A police officer saw this happening, gave chase, and subdued the violator. Januszak said that if the Governing Body insists on having a police officer regularly stationed at the corner of Main Street and Stevens Avenue, why not at the corner of Main Street and Feltus Street during these morning hours? Januszak felt it would have a greater effect on the motorist entering the City, reduce these dangerous conditions, and possibly discourage some motorists from using our streets as "short cuts."

There is a desperate need for a traffic light at the intersection of Raritan Street and Ridgeway Avenue, said Januszak. I realize that these are county roads and that permission is needed to install a traffic light. I think it is about time to submit an application and get a traffic light placed at this intersection. It is long overdue, said the candidate.

Januszak also foresees a problem on the lower ends of Raritan Street and Main Street when the industrial center is opened. This area, too, is going to require a traffic signal, he said.

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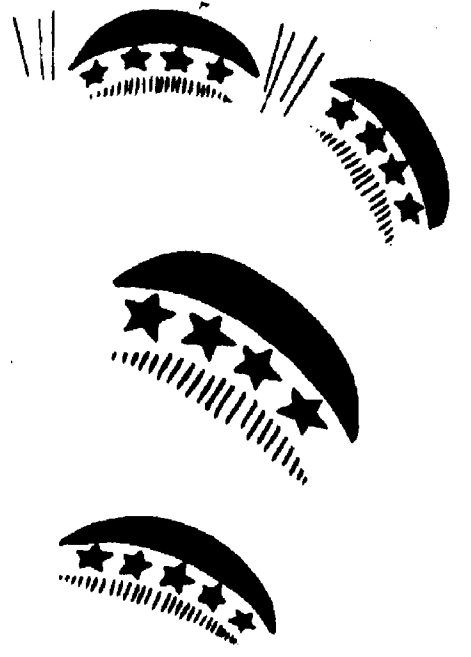

Erma Brown

The goal of political candidates is to win elections. I am such a candidate.

As one of three Democratic candidates for the South Amboy City Council, I am committed to our 1984 campaign slogan "dedicated to serve the public." I am also committed to the ideals of truthfulness and integrity.

I believe our slogan requires that I respond to the questions and concerns of all residents and taxpayers in an informed, objective and truthful way.

Therefore, I am personally, and on behalf of my constituents, both angry and amused at the less-than-truthful accusations recently made by our opponents for council. I'm angry at the lack of objectivity in their undocumented remarks, that slurs the voting public's intelligence. On the other hand, I'm amused that our opponents lack a viable platform form which to attack the current administration and therefore must resort to what amounts to slandering.

I question where, when and how, our opponents gathered their misinformation. Certainly, it cannot be from their attendance at public meetings. During my tenure on the City Council, I cannot recall being questioned at a public meeting, or privately, by any opponent.

For over 25 years, prior to my appointment on April 24, 1984 to fulfill the unexpired term in the Second Ward, I have been, and remain, a community worker and activist. To learn the facts about topics of concern to me, and often to the community at large, I attend public meetings, and I ask questions at those meetings.

For instance, when Jim Harrigan presented a plan for the development of the waterfront that included the construction of a new school at an approximate cost of \$3.4 million, I was in the audience; when James Inman, then a member of the City Council, vowed that a school would never be built on the waterfront during his tenure, I was in the audience and asked whether Mr. Inman considered those of us who live "below the tracks" second-class citizens and taxpayers; when Tom Downs tried to organize a Broadway merchants association, I was in the audience; when local parents fought to discontinue split sessions in the public schools, I was in the audience; and, when the majority of our community heard the Planning Board reject the location of a methadone clinic on Broadway, I was in the audience.

And, as a council member, I voted unanimously with my colleagues when we rejected the methadone clinic's appeal to overturn the Planning Board's decision.

Currently, I chair the South Amboy Neighborhood Preservation Committee. One of the Committee's main objectives is to plan, with input the cooperation of local merchants and owners, the revitalization of Broadway. Our meetings are open to the public. I invite all residents to attend these meetings and to ask questions.

Under the present administration, the City of South Amboy has maintained a zero tax base for local services. Under existing

laws, collected taxes have been diverted to Middlesex County and the local Board of Education.

South Amboy is officially 84 years old. We are no longer a "new" city in terms of our sewer, sanitary and water systems. Replacement is inevitable. As we look forward to the revitalization of our central business district and the future development of our waterfront, we will strive to maintain a zero or near-zero tax base. We will continue to actively seek state and federal grants to fund our capital improvement projects.

Good government does not exist in a vacuum. All of us -- elected officials, taxpayers and voters -- must work together for the good of the community we call "home." South Amboy is our "home." Let's continue to work together to keep South Amboy the "home" in which we want to live and work.

Bruce R. Richmond

I am Bruce Richmond, Councilman in the third ward here in South Amboy. I am writing this letter in response to the published comments of my opponent in the coming election on November 6th.

To begin, I would first like to state that it is indeed puzzling how my opponent can be so informed with the activities of myself or any other council member concerning matters pertaining to representing our ward and the total city in general. I have, during my service, yet to see either my opponent or any of his running mates at any of our Council Agenda meetings or Business meetings. It is quite obvious that he is operating on hearsay.

With regards to his comments concerning the Methadone Clinic, I must say he is sadly misinformed. His insinuation of the efforts being in vain are without a doubt questionable. The fact is that the original application was for the North Broadway location. The Council passed an ordinance pertaining to facilities of this nature. After a court challenge by the applicant, it was determined by the court that our new ordinance did not apply, and that this was a permitted use in this zone. Following this court order, the applicant appeared before the Planning Board as required by law. Our Planning Board heard the application, held hearings, and rendered its decision, which was a denial. The applicant then appealed the decision to the Council and the decision of denial by the Planning Board was upheld by the Council. This process was over a number of years and throughout this period there were many people who spent many hours working on this problem both at meetings locally and with various agencies, etc. The Central Jersey Health Planning Council, in an attempt to resolve the situation, indicated and has confirmed that they will not issue a certificate for the North Broadway site. The lower Main Street site is an M-2 zone where a clinic is a permitted use. The Central Jersey Health Planning Council suggested this as an alternative to Broadway with the stipulation that the City of South Amboy do nothing to disrupt the application if

submitted. We do expect the applicant to conform to all of our local codes and ordinances, and it will be necessary for the applicant to go through all the required legal procedures. There were, of course, numerous other events, but this basically summarizes the facts.

Your further comments concerning the decay of the town are equally disturbing. Just look around at the many improvements by residents who have spent a great deal of time and money upgrading and remodeling their homes. In addition to this, our administration acquired funds and built one of the finest Senior Citizens Centers in Middlesex County. We also have an ongoing program of renovating and improving our Fire Houses, new fire fighting equipment, expansion of our youth facilities at the ballfields, the Sixth Street park, and also plans currently underway for improvements at Veterans Field and the remodeling of the Conlogue Avenue playground. Also, there is the Broadway Reconstruction Program, establishment of a committee for the refurbishing of our downtown business area. Waterfront development to name a few of the things that have happened, are happening and will happen.

I believe this certainly demonstrates to the Citizens of the City of South Amboy that this Mayor and Council are working with the interest of the Citizens and the City foremost in their minds. Vote Line "B" for "CONTINUED GOOD GOVERNMENT."

Some of the major issues of the First Ward were introduced during the June Primary Election. I feel very strongly on the following issues:

The heavy commuter traffic on Main Street, Cedar Street, Feltus Street, Raritan Street, and Ridgeway Avenue is caused by traffic delays on Route 35 during the morning rush hours. The blockage of the intersection of Main Street and Stevens Avenue by early morning commuters has since been curtailed by the assignment of a uniformed police officer during prime rush hours. A temporary problem remains if the officer is needed elsewhere during an emergency.

The Hole in the Wall is an eyesore in the First Ward. It is in bad need of painting and cleaning up. Steps have been taken to possibly eliminate the Hole in the Wall but the major problem, to revamp and correct the situation at this time, is funding.

Heavy trucks and bus traffic on Raritan Street cause unbelievable vibrations to the homes located on that street. Raritan Street is one of the many county roads which extend throughout our city.

Violence, lewdness, and a blatant disregard for people and their property are problems confronting citizens in the Bergen Hill section of the First Ward. This problem is caused by patrons of two taverns located near Sacred Heart Church. The City Council has closed one business for a lengthy period, while the second establishment is open awaiting an appeal hearing. Additional violations cited are awaiting hearings.

Vandalism of city park property is atrocious. Some fences are in dire need of repair, and broken glass poses potential hazards for those children and parents

using the parks. Many dollars are spent just making repairs that should never be. But, I ask you, who is responsible for this vandalism?

A serious problem in the First Ward has been brought to the attention of the City Council concerning the Raritan Street and Ridgeway Avenue intersection. A traffic study was submitted by Captain Cieslarczyk and substantiated by petitions signed by 300 concerned citizens for a traffic light at that hazardous crossing. Application has been made to correct this condition and is currently pending.

Boisterous crowds congregating at several locations and destruction of property have resulted in the assignment of Special Police to patrol weekends to lessen the loitering, noise, and unruly drinking. Several cases have been heard in municipal court as a result.

The above problems mentioned are similar to those present in all communities. However, we have to work together to correct the situations. My position, as a candidate, is to represent the people to resolve problems that occur.

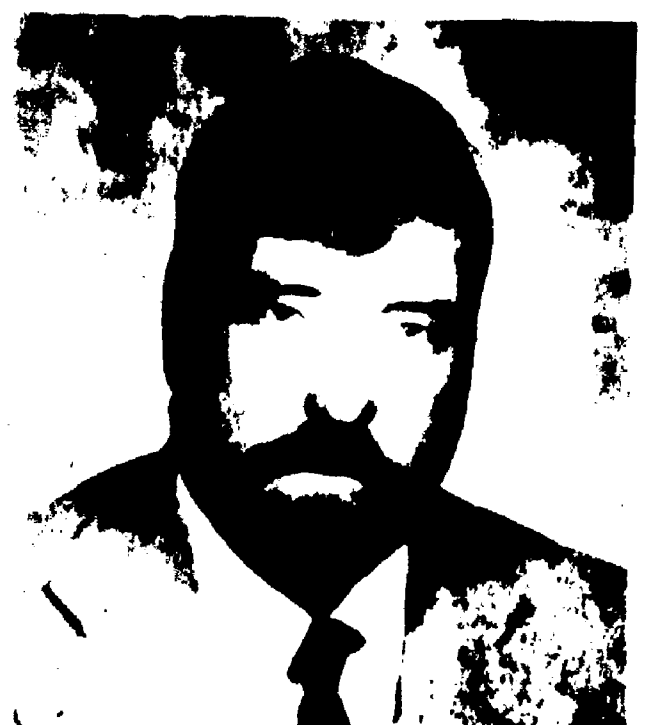

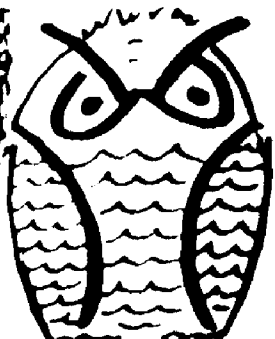
