The citizens of South Amboy pay the highest water rates of any town in the state, said Sowder. What makes it worse is that the South Amboy governing body buys the water at one price and then charges its citizens a much higher rate.

As for the quality of the water, noted Sowder, the people of Perth Amboy won't even drink the product. They buy bottled water. For the price we pay, I think we deserve better

I believe it's time to drill our own wells, and be self sufficient once again. continued Sowder. With new wells drilled, the people of South Amboy could reduce their water bills by one-half the annual rate they are currently paying. Additionally, with its own water supply, South Amboy would not be at the mercy of merchants of this invaluable commodity should severe water shortages cccur.

The Republican candidate also expressed his concern about the condition of the water mains and the water pressure. He pointed out than many people experience very low water pressure if not for the fine job done by the fire companies during the recent fire at the lumber yard on Broadway, an entire block could have been destroyed due to poor water pressure. he said.

ine goal of political candidates is to win elections. I am such a candicate.

As one of three Democratic candidates for the South Amboy City Council, I am committed to our 1984 campaign slogan "dedicated to serve the public." I am also committed to the ideals of truthfulness and integrity.

And, as a council member, Lyoted unanimously with my colleagues when we rejected the methadone clinic's appeal to overturn the

Planning Board's decision. Currently, I chair the South Amboy Neighborhood Preservation Committee. One of the Committee's main objectives is to plan, with input the cooperation of local merchants and owners, the revitalisation of Broadway. Our meetings are open to the public. I invite all residents to attend these meetings and to nak questions.

Under the present administration, the City of South Amboy has maintained a sero tax base for local services. Under existing

been diverted to Middlesex County and the local Board of Education.

I am Bruce Richmond. Councilman in the third ward here in South Amboy. I am writing this letter in response to the published comments of my opponent in the coming election on November 6th.

To begin, I would first like to state that it is indeed puzzling how my opponent can be so informed with the activities of myself or any other council member matters concerning pertaining to representing our ward and the total city in general. This process was over a number of years and throughout this period there were many people who spent many hours working on this problem both at meetings locally and with various agencies, etc. The Central Jersey Health Planning Council, in an attempt to resolve the situation, indicated and has confirmed that they will not issue a certificate for the North Broadway site. The lower Main Street site is an M-2 zone where a Clinic is a permitted use.
