Residents Will Continue Airing Testimony At Special Meeting

Parking to be provided by Gerhard Bass was again a major issue of the discussion before the planning board when Bass gave testimony last week.

Planning board attorney Gregory Kusie confirmed there had been three changes in use during the past few years, one from a grocery store to a deli and luncheonette at 126 North Broadway. Another change occurred at 124 South Broadway, the present site of the Wizard of Ohms, and a third at 151 North Broadway, now Lore Elf Photography. Bass contended no parking specifications had been met by the three.

Council President Thomas O'Brien pointed out it was only children who patronized the Wizard of Ohms, children who did not drive cars.

The pharmacist and Union clinic owner quoted statistics saying 90% of the patients were successful on the methadone treatment program, and those in the program were monitored for thirteen different drugs each week. Despite this, Bass contends no special disposal facilities would be needed, and from the outside no one would even know the clinic is here. He also noted 85% of the Union patients are employed at regular jobs.

According to Bass there will be no sign of any type advertising the treatment center, and the only changes to be made of the present accommodations would be emergency lighting, a toilet, and partitioning.

Ms. Susan Champion, Bass' attorney, noted for the record they had communication with the planning board prior to the meeting to ask permission for three witnesses to testify. These three, said Champion, were or had been patients at the Union clinic and would.

she said, testify as to the treatment and effect on their lives.

The planning board chairperson, Ms. Alice Christina, explained the board's decision in disallowing the testimony, saying the request was not proper unless they properly identified themselves, the same as each member of the city public. Champion's request also noted the methadone patients would testify under "John Doe."

A new date for a special hearing was set for Wednesday, March 14, at 8 p.m. City Hall, Broadway. It is a continued public hearing, and all testimony will be heard before the board renders its decision.

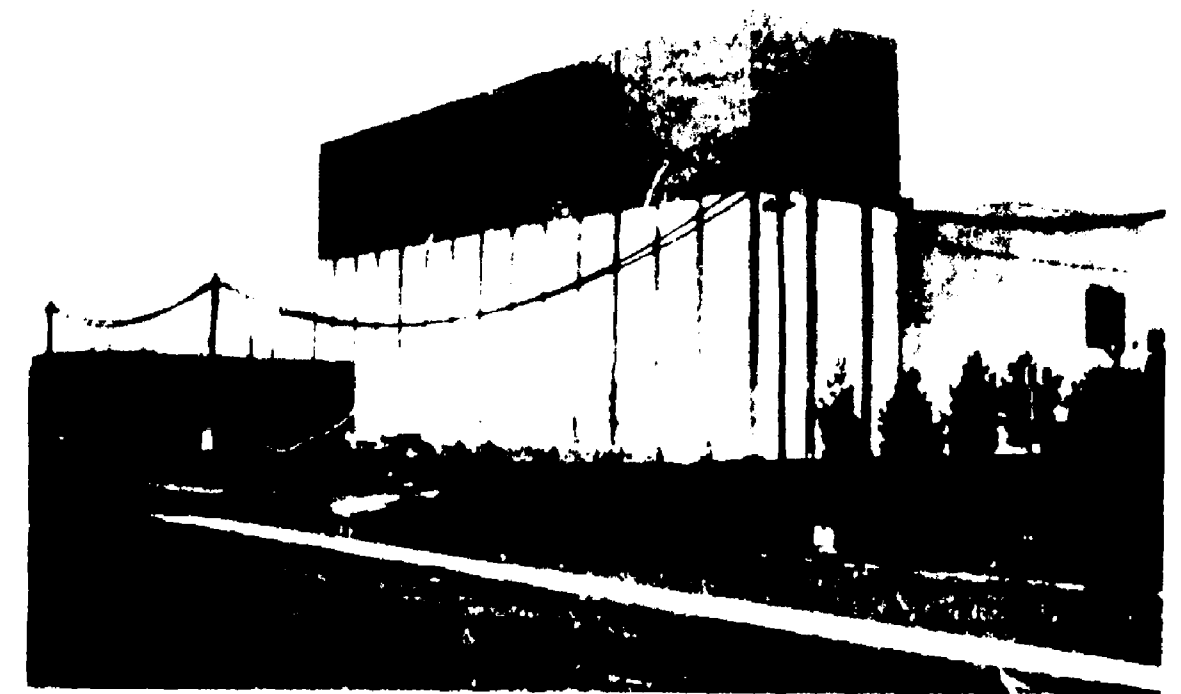
Rabies Clinic Scheduled

It is time for the annual Rabies Vaccination Clinic, according to Dog Warden William Garnett. "The continued migration of wildlife rabies from the southeast to the northeast is an indication that the State of New Jersey may be vulnerable to an outbreak within a short period of time," said Garnett.

Rabies is a disease caused by a virus and is carried primarily by foxes and skunks, he commented, however, raccoons, opossums, mink and bobcats are often infected.

This year the Clinic will be held April 5, from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the Mechanicsville Fire House and April 7 from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at the Broadway Firehouse.

St. Patrick's Day To Be Celebrated This Sunday

The annual St. Patrick's Day Parade will be held this Sunday, March 11, beginning at 2 p.m. from the Monaghan House. The parade will then proceed down Pine Avenue to Bordentown Avenue, across Stevens Avenue to Main Street, and from there participants will march to Broadway, make a right onto Broadway and City Hall, where a short ceremony will be held. Former South Amboy Mayor Doc O'Leary will be the Master of Ceremony before City Hall.

This year's Grand Marshall of the St. Patrick's Day Parade is Alfred O'Connor.

Born and raised in South Amboy, he is the son of the late Edward and Anna Lovely O'Connor. His wife is the former Maureen Jones from Perth Amboy, and the couple has five children: Maureen, Nora, Edward, Thomas, and Sean.

Alfie attended St. Mary's Catholic Schools.

Presently, Alfie is the foreman of the streets and roads for the city, having been employed by the city for the past 25 years.

Alfie is a former president of the Irish American Club in South Amboy. He is also a member of the Knights of Columbus and a member of Saint Mary's Church, and belongs to the Exempt Enterprise Hook and Ladder Fire Company. In addition, Alfie was one of the first managers of the South Amboy Little League for twelve years.

Former Councilman and Mayor of South Amboy John D. Leonard was chosen this

year to be the St. Patrick's Day Honorary Grand Marshall.

John Leonard was born in South Amboy in 1905, raised on David Street, and graduated St. Mary's Grammar and High School. He was a four letter athlete.

A retiree from Annaconda Copper Company of the old Raritan Copper Works after 45 years, he was the national vice president of the labor union for hourly employees.

Leonard has been connected with city government since 1928, and had served for 14 years on the election board, and as councilman of the old Third Ward.

John D. Leonard was Mayor of the City of South Amboy in 1949-50. During his first year as Mayor, the Irish Flag was raised at the old city hall and has since become a tradition on St. Patrick's Day. He also served as the city's treasurer for 21 years.

A member of Protection Fire Company for 40 years, John has held the office of secretary for 37 years, and was also secretary of the Exempt Firemen for 38 years. He has held both local and county offices for the Ancient Order of Hibernians.

The son of the late Philip and Margaret Quinlan Leonard, John was married to the late Elizabeth R. Elish Leonard for 37 years. He is the brother of Mrs. James Hyson, Mrs. Joseph DeMarco, and the late Joseph Leonard.

Parade Chairman Pat Quinlan has had responses from different organizations, both from South Amboy and surrounding communities, all of them anxious to participate in this week's parade. Scheduled are four marching bands, including the Melrose Blackhawks and the Sayreville and Cedar Ridge High Schools.

Wanted: Blood Donors

The South Amboy Community Blood Bank in cooperation with the New Jersey Blood Services will hold a blood drive on Friday, March 16, 1984 at the Christ Church Hall from 5 to 9 p.m.

All those who can should participate as there is a two-fold benefit to blood donations, said Franklin D. English, one of the organizers. "When an individual donates a pint of blood he and his family is covered for a full year and eligible to receive blood from the bank."

The drive this March will be held to replace the 65 pints of blood used by Mrs. Virginia Ziola, George Street. She was recently a heart surgical patient at St. Michael's in Newark.

It should be remembered, said English, red blood cells can in no way be artificially produced -- the only means of obtaining the life-saving fluid is through donations.

Insurance A Must For Ball Players

Insurance for athletes and the lack of it was on the city council's agenda meeting Monday evening.

A representative from the Raritan Athletic Club asked the city council to approve the use of the Babe Ruth and Veterans fields on April 14 and 15 for a county-wide tournament. Keith DePre also said he has permission to use two fields at Warren Park in Woodbridge as well.

When the council and Mayor J. Thomas Cross inquired if the athletic club carried its own insurance, DePre said all the teams had been sent flyers stating all players would participate at their own risk. "They are all aware of the risk factors, and the one injury we had last year did not result in a suit," DePre said. This seventh annual event is expected to draw 32 teams with players over 18-years old.

Mayor Cross deferred to City Law Director Clark Convery, whom Cross said was well aware the city was presently being sued by a player who was using the City's playing fields at his own risk. "We have insurance, so we have

avoided this turning into a bigger problem," noted Cross.

Convery reminded the council of an ordinance dealing with the assignment of the baseball fields, and that stipulations met by vendors should also be met by other clubs.

City Administrator Nicholas Smolney said he required a half-million dollar liability insurance for the fields, and felt DePre's club should meet that amount.

Council President Thomas O'Brien suggested a meeting with field managers for their input on the use of the Babe Ruth and Veterans' fields, and agreed the insurance was a must for permission.

DePre himself was agreeable to the insurance indicating he did not believe there would be a problem should he ultimately receive the use of the two city fields.

Fear not, for a correction it still costs only \$1, with a certificate, \$4. A search is \$1 per year, and a burial permit is \$1.

These prices have been in effect since January 1982.

The South Amboy Health Officer, Karen Scott, has requested that we mention something about an unpleasant subject, namely, rats. This is the time of the year these creatures start to propagate in earnest and can be a health hazard to the entire community.

Karen has passed on the following information with regard to rats which is worth noting:

1. Rats have three basic needs -- food, water and shelter. If any of these are

taken away they will be discouraged.

2. Each one eats about seventeen pounds of garbage each year, so all garbage must be kept in tight fitting containers. Also, keep dog food, water and droppings out of the yard because they will consume them.

3. Keep foliage and high grass cut short on your property. Also, plug all openings in your house and outbuilding foundations. Keep dog houses, woodpiles etc. at least ten inches off the ground.

Additional information about rats is that they can swim a river, climb a brick wall, jump eight feet, crawl through openings the size of a quarter and gnaw through anything except steel. They can raise a family every thirty days which averages about six new ones per litter.

Between Broadway and Stevens Avenue were: Komars Old Factory, Rehfus' Fish Market, Dolan's Tin Shop, Gene Morris' Paint Store, and Stefanski's Jewelry.

There are more names coming next week.

Our fears should be quieted a bit with the news that the state has allotted \$85,000 for engineering work on the Bordentown Avenue Bridge over the Raritan River Railroad.

Also, the Victory Bridge was allotted \$448,000 for engineering work and \$5 million for repairs to the operating machinery. That's big bucks -- but it's

comforting to see some of our tax money spent in our locale. Senator Lawrence Weiss was co-sponsor of the legislation to advance the funds for the bridge repairs on 220 separate projects.

On Friday, when DuPont had dedicated its new film coating facility in Parlin, we have learned that Chester Meinzer, our former councilman was one of the engineers working on the project.

As a reward for his excellence on this facility, Chet is assigned to work on a similar project out of state.

John J. Andrzejewski, Sr. informs us that Raritan Street used to run straight down to the Raritan Bay. When trolley cars were introduced to the area, what is now Route 35 between Briggs' and Abe Korts was put in as a right-of-way by the Pennsylvania Railroad. It was known as the PRR Right-of-way. The base of Raritan Street, back about 75 years ago, according to John J., was a favorite swimming place -- the only things the boys wore for swimming was a smile.

Further recollections of Mr. Andrzejewski are that the sunken barges at the foot of Raritan Street were put to good use after World War II. John Jaworowski used the beams in the construction of his new home at the foot of Laurel Street.

John was a master mechanic of the old school. He would cut the beams to proper height on site, (some beams were about 30 ft. long and 12" square) and then put them into tow behind a model T Ford dump truck.

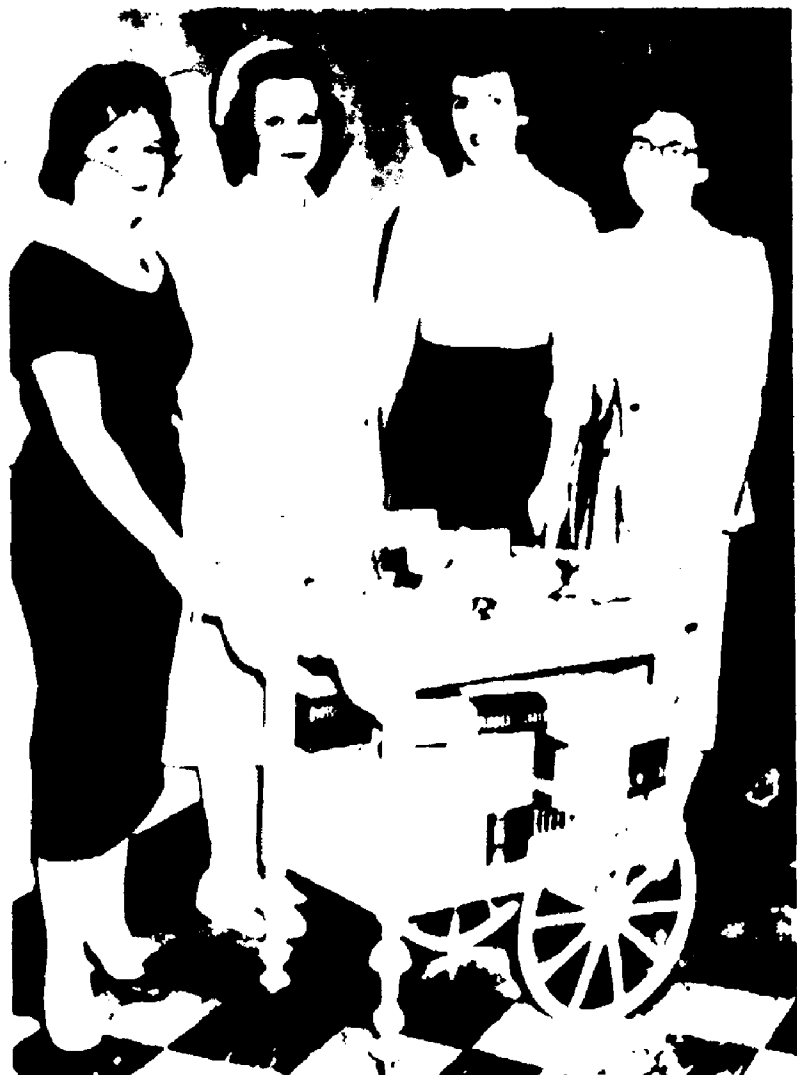
