



The Postoffice was in this store and Abraham Everett, Sr., was the Postomaster. On Main street near the old Market House Richard Flemming kept the Railroad House, a brick hotel. In the Market House which was in the middle of Main street near the present Long Branch Railroad tracks. Gottlob and Fred Straub kept a butcher shop and near by John Cozzens kept a grocery store.

The late Gottlob Straub was the dean of the business men here in South Amboy. Mr. Straub started in business in 1868.
