ANNUAL LEGION JUBILEE AND CARNIVAL STARTS MONDAY NIGHT

Will Continue Until Monday, July 5th—Jamesburg Boys' Band To Be Feature Of Opening Night—Celebration To Close With Madri Gras.

The annual American Legion Jubilee and Carnival will open Monday evening on the Legion grounds on David street, and continue until Monday evening, July 5th. This year's carnival, it is said, will be the biggest ever held by the local Post, and the opening night will be featured by music by the Jamesburg Reform School Boys Band. On the closing night, a big Madri Gras will be a feature.

The rides will consist of a merry-go-round, ferris wheel and Venetian swings. This part of the carnival will be in charge of John A. Conlogue. Music for the dancing which will be a feature nightly, will be furnished by the Hollywood Seven Piece Orchestra.

South Amboy played a big part in yesterday's Victory Bridge Celebration. With notables from all over the State in attendance, and with thousands of visitors from all parts of the country the great span between this city and Perth Amboy was dedicated with appropriate exercises.

The big event of the day was the parade, which started at South Amboy. The line formed on Stevens avenue, with General Hugh Scott as the Grand Marshal. Following General Scott came Governor A. Harry Moore and a retinue of State and city officials. The honor place in the line went to Luke A. Lovely Post No. 62, of this city, named after the first Jersey boy to be killed while fighting with United States troops in France. Commander John C. Boll had reason to feel proud of his nationally attired members, of whom over eighty-five participated in the event. They were headed by the colors with a military guard, and a firing squad of eight soldiers under the command of Chris Mulrain. The Post followed, its members attired in white trousers, dark coats and natty American Legion overseas caps.

There were many detachments of military and naval troops, both including regular army detachments from Sandy Hook, under Colonel Price, and detachments of the New Jersey National Guard and Naval militia. Many bands were in line, and the civic organizations that participated made an especially fine showing. South Amboy had reason to feel proud of two of its organizations—the Polish-American Citizen's Club and the Italo-American Citizen's Club. These organizations made a splendid appearance and made a fine addition to the parade.

South Amboy's fire laddies, too, turned out strong. The local delegation of firemen were led by Chief Freeman and his assistants. The Independence, Protection, Mechanicsville and Enterprise had members in line, followed by the Seldon and the two Mack trucks. The members certainly presented a fine appearance in their new uniforms. The Boy Scouts of Troop No. 1 led by Tracey Dill and the Girl Scouts of Mechanicsville also participated.

Camp Taylor is a real vacation home for a boy who loves life in the open. It is situated about fifty miles from Middlesex County near High Bridge, N. J. Beautifully located in the mountains, looking out over Lake Solitude, it has all the natural beauty and healthful surroundings of a Maine Camp. The bane of many New Jersey camps, mosquitoes is not a problem at Taylor as this region is free from those pests. Four counties have united in making this Camp one of the finest in the State and according to state standards Camp Taylor ranks among the highest three.

This is the twelfth season for Taylor and each year has marked a steady growth and improvements in equipment and program. The Camp opens Tuesday, June 29th for boys

Kaustine chemical sanitation system and the fact that there are no flies or mosquitoes make it an ideal place for a boy's vacation. An expert swimming director will teach each boy to swim if he does not already know how. An efficient life-saving crew is always on the job to supervise the swimming which is only allowed at stated periods, as is also the boating.

Parents and friends will be welcomed in camp on special visiting days, but Sunday is kept for a day of rest and parents are requested not to visit on this day. Camp Taylor is reached by the Central Railroad of New Jersey, through Bound Brook, Somerville, Whitehouse and the Rockaway Branch of the Central through Dover, Wharton and Kenil. Automobiles may reach the camp by New Brunswick, Bound Brook, Somerville, Whitehouse, Clinton through High Bridge. A registration fee of one dollar is charged each boy and the

places and shall bear interest at such rate as may be provided by resolution of the Common Council, shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer and attested by the City Clerk under the seal of the City, and if coupons for the payment of interest be attached they shall be executed by the facsimile signature of the City Treasurer.

Section 4. That the Common Council hereby determines and declares as follows:

(a) That the probable period of usefulness of the said improvement is forty years from the date of said bonds.

(b) That the average assessed valuation of the taxable real property (including improvements) of said City computed on the next three preceding values in the manner provided in section 12 of Chapter 252 of the laws of 1916 as amended is \$3,741,595.00.

(c) That the net debt of the City of South Amboy computed in the manner provided in said section 12 as amended is \$217,846.80.

(d) That the annual and supplemental debt statement required by said section 12 have been made and filed as therein required.

Section 5. That there be levied in each year while any of said bonds are outstanding and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes, a tax upon all the taxable property in said city sufficient to

produce the amount and the principal and interest to mature in the succeeding year.

Section 6. The City Treasurer shall have power to sell said bonds at public or private sale, to select the newspaper if he wishes to advertise said sale, fix the date of sale, prescribe the form of notice, to award the bonds, or to reject any or all bids.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect upon its publication as provided in section 2 of Chapter 252 of the Laws of 1916 as amended, together with the statement required by said section and the same shall be published in the South Amboy Citizen which is hereby declared to be the official paper of the Common Council for the year 1926.

and runs four weeks until July 27th. July 28th, the girls take over the Camp and over one hundred girls a week will use it for the following four weeks or until August 25th.

The age limit for both boys and girls is twelve years or over and many attend who have reached their nineteenth birthday.

Until this year Camp Taylor has been known as a Y. M. C. A. Camp, it being directed by the County Y. M. C. A. secretaries of Middlesex, Somerset, Hunterdon and Morris Counties. But since last October, Edward M. Dowling, Secretary for Middlesex County has given part time to the Sunday Schools of the county in his capacity as Secretary for the Middlesex County Council of Religious Education. This has opened up Camp Taylor to the Sunday Schools and churches as never before and given all these young people every opportunity to attend.

Many boys and girls from this county have already registered and especially in the girls camp there is already a waiting list over and above the capacity of the Camp.

For the information of parents who are anxious to know about the health and sanitary conditions of Camp Taylor they will be interested to know that tested pure spring water is piped into the camp and the

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE for the raising of \$17,000 by the issuing of bonds of the City of South Amboy to be known as Water Works Electrification and New Well Bonds.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of South Amboy:

Section 1. That it is necessary to raise the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars for the purpose of electrifying the water works and sinking and constructing new wells.

Section 2. That there be issued pursuant to Chapter 252, Law of 1916 of New Jersey as supplemented and amended, bonds of the City of South Amboy to be known as Water Works Electrification and New Well Bonds in the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars, or such lesser sum as upon the sale thereof in the manner provided by law shall produce that amount.

Section 3. That said bonds be in such amount and form and payable principal and interest in such manner and at such time and place or

GOOD MARKS IN STATE EFFICIENCY TESTS HERE

The results of the State Efficiency tests given to pupils of the seventh and eighth grades of the Public Schools this year were considered very good, according to the report of the Superintendent of Schools as presented to the Board of Education Wednesday evening. In a class of forty taking the examinations ten received a mark of 100 per cent in Arithmetic while in a class of fifty in Spelling, two got the same high mark.

In English from a class of fifty-four there were thirteen receiving a mark of from ninety to ninety-nine, twenty-five receiving between eighty and eighty-nine. Ten others were above seventy and but six were below the seventy mark.

In Arithmetic five registered from ninety to ninety-nine, nine made the eighty-eighty-nine mark, two received the seventy to seventy-nine rating and fourteen failed to make the passing mark.

In History, twelve pupils made the mark of ninety to ninety-nine, eighteen made a mark of eighty to eighty-nine; nineteen of the class of fifty made over seventy and only five failed to make seventy.

In Geography only eight made a mark of over ninety but twenty-three made between eighty and eighty-nine while sixteen others made over seventy. Seven failed to make seventy.

In spelling besides the two making a perfect average, fifteen made from ninety to ninety-nine, nineteen made from eighty to eighty-nine, six made over seventy and eight of the class of fifty failed to make seventy.

In writing the highest averages were from eighty to eighty-nine with fifteen pupils making these averages. Twenty-two made from seventy to seventy-nine and thirteen failed to make the passing mark.

In hygiene there was one pupil that made from ninety to ninety-nine, and seventeen each made eighty to eighty-nine and seventy to seventy-nine respectively. Fifteen made an average of less than seventy.

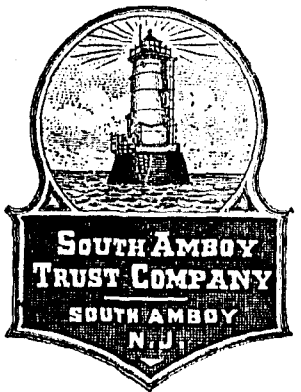

FRIDAY CHAT

Concert Hall was the first intruder on the Village Green, we say intruder from a sentimental point of view. We have no doubt that the boys who played there among the chestnut trees in 1867 considered the big building an unwelcome guest and looked upon it as an intruder of their playground.

However let us look around the neighborhood, say in 1869, two years after the building was erected. On the east side of Second street opposite Mr. P. A. Stult's house stood the town pump under a large chestnut tree. In front of Concert Hall on the Second street side, in front of the cellar door a large black oak tree stood and on this spot where it was felled. If you care to look, you will find a flag-stone. There was a co-operative store in Concert Hall and Mr. Albert Roll was the superintendent, J. M. Voorhees, V. Laird and Nelson Barkilew were the clerks. The Postoffice was in this store and Abraham Everett, Sr., was the Postmaster. On Main street near the old Market House Richard Flemming kept the Railroad House, a brick hotel. In the Market House which was in the middle of Main street near the present Long Branch Railroad tracks, Gottlob and Fred Straub kept a butcher shop and near by John Cozzens kept a grocery store.

The late Gottlob Straub was the dean of the business men here in South Amboy. Mr. Straub started in business in 1868. It is a long, long business journey from 1868 to 1926 and it is a splendid consolation when one drops his burden at the end of the road and hears a whisper within his conscience "Well done thy good and faithful servant" and we are quite sure that Gottlob Straub heard this whisper. Gottlob Straub's name can never be mentioned without a tender regard. It is a name which stands high on the scroll of South Amboy's good men.

IN THE SHADOW

THE BEGINNING

And so, fifty years have rolled around which marks the beginning of the telephone. On June 25, 1876, in the presence of Dom Pedro, Emperor of Brazil, Sir William Thompson, afterwards Lord Kelvin, of England and others at the Centennial Exhibition, Philadelphia, Professor Elisha Gray exhibited for the first time his "harmonic multiple telegraph" lately invented.

Alexander G. Bell, who was present, asked permission also to exhibit his "scientific toy", known as the Bell telephone. So says the New Jersey Calendar. Sir William Thompson spoke into the telephone Hamlet's soliloquy. At the other end of the "phone" was Professor Gray and he heard the prophetic words, "To be or not to be." For him it was not "to be."

On February 14, 1876, a caveat was issued to Gray for a new art for transmitting vocal sounds telegraphically. On the same day Alexander Graham Bell filed an application at the patent office for a patent "for the electric transmission of noises or sounds of any kind."

Afterwards Bell was notified in writing by the patent office that his application for a patent was suspended in consequence of the filing of Professor Gray's caveat. Then Bell got busy, very busy. On February 25, 1876, the suspension of Alexander Graham Bell's patent was withdrawn and his patent was issued on March 7th, same year. And then Gray got busy, but lost out and not so badly at that. Although the courts awarded the invention to Mr. Bell, professor Gray formally admitted that "Bell was the first inventor of the telephone." It is said for making this admission Professor Gray was paid the sum of \$100,000, not so bad at that. 100,000 iron men on parade in the good old days of "thanks for the buggy ride", was a beautiful sight to see.

And so, fifty years have rolled around which marks the beginning of the telephone.

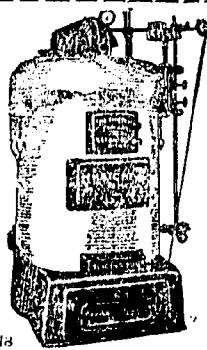

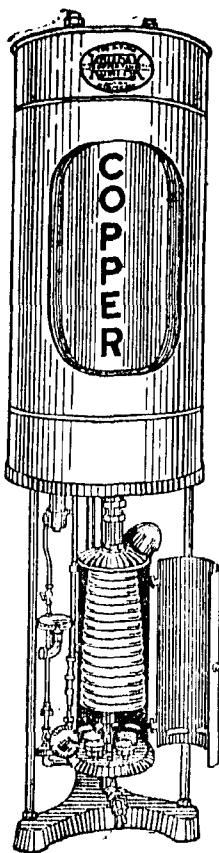

MRS. GRIEBEL'S WEEKLY LETTER TO THE WOMEN

Atlantic City, June 20, 26.
I've been sitting for hours where I can get a good view of the Boardwalk and if there is a place anywhere one sees more women per minute. I do not know it. Add to that the fact that most of them are on dress parade and you will agree with me that I should know "what's what" in the way of clothes after watching them for so long a time.

The day is fine. I'm just comfortable sitting in the sunshine; quite a few people are bathing in the ocean and some are lying on the sand in their swimming suits. It is strange, however, to see how differently folks are dressed—as to warmth I mean. There are a few fur coats, many winter coats, more spring coats and a few women wearing summer gowns with no wraps at all. But they prance merrily on, the fur coats beside the summer dresses, as happy and carefree as possible. I'm not going to tell you that all the women and girls are beautifully dressed. The Boardwalk is like Main street in any town except that there are more people. And fur coats and thin dresses, the well-dressed and those who seem to have no idea of what is the right thing to wear walk side by side.

I had some surprises. First of all I could hardly believe that there was so little navy blue worn after so much talk about its popularity. I'd say beige was the outstanding color—rosy beige and soft rose color too. Then green—the soft grey-green that is so becoming. There was a little of the yellow-green called Chartreuse but most women realize it is trying, I'm sure. Blues of a soft shade outnumbered by large numbers the navy blues, and black was worn by very many of the smartest women. There was white and grey, and quite a good deal of yellow in the way of hats and coats—the shade known as "Sunny." I think there was never a moment I could not see a scarlet hat but compared to those of soft, pastel colors, they sank into insignificance in spite of their brilliance.

Hose were off less tones—light or dark to suit the taste of the wearer. There were a few grey—mighty few—and often these were so thin that the flesh gave a pinkish tone to them. As for black, they were few and far between and then worn by a woman who was costumed in black. These, too, were so sheer that they did not look black.

The hats surprised me too for, after reading so much about large hats, I found that less than a fourth were of this type. The rest were the small, close hats we have been wearing for a couple of years. There were as many of felt as of straw. The large hats were invariably short at the back—either no brim there or turned sharply up; the sides were broad, the front a bit narrower. These hats were simply trimmed with broad satin or velvet ribbon usually with a soft bow at one side. There were many black hats worn with colored costumes but again they often matched the frock or coat, and beige, green and soft blues were noticeable. While most of the large hats were of hairbraided or some straw fiber, there were many large felt hats in pastel colors and these were like the lighter weight hats in shape, size and trimming.

King Mitchell when asked for his opinion of gypsy life said:

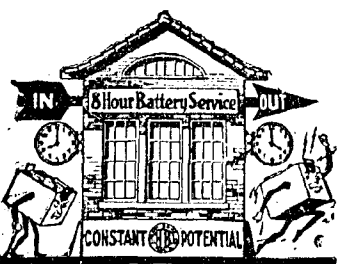

U. S. GYPSUM CO.
TO IMPROVE SERVICE

Harrison, N. J., June 18, 1926—Construction work started June 15 on a warehouse for the United States Gypsum Company at Sussex street and the Passaic river, at Harrison, which will afford improved service to builders in the 13 northeastern counties of New Jersey and Rockland County, New York.

Alongside the warehouse a modern concrete dock will be built, at which boats of the United States Gypsum Company fleet will tie up with cargoes of building materials manufactured at the company's plant at New Brighton. These materials will not be retailed, but will be distributed by truck to mason's supply and lumber dealers in Newark, Hackensack, Paterson, Passaic, Elizabeth, Perth Amboy, Rahway, the Oranges, Hoboken, Morristown, Weehawken and other cities in the counties referred to.

Only the most modern construction and equipment will go into this new distributing depot. The warehouse will be 56x208 feet in size and of permanent construction. Its framework will be steel; its curtain-walls and roof will be built of structural gypsum. Cargoes will be unloaded

from the barges by an electrically operated overhead traveling crane, and the same equipment will be used for loading dealer's trucks.

All kinds of wall-plaster and building limes, gypsum cement, fireproof wallboard, lath and sheathing lumber, fireproof tenement tile and partition tile will be among the building materials so distributed. Among the specialties will be a factory-mixed colored stucco, a plastic paint which gives texture and color-tone in one coat, patching plaster, and a plaster tinted to provide its own decoration.

DAWSON NOW IS
H. S. PRINCIPAL

Supt. Barr Had Recommended James Tustin For Position.

In the face of the recommendation of Superintendent of Schools O. O. Barr favoring James Tustin for the appointment as principal of the High School, the Board of Education Wednesday night elected James H. Dawson to that position. The appointment carried no additional salary for either of the men in question and the action of the Board was unanimous as shown by a roll call vote.

The recommendation of Mr. Barr was contained in his regular monthly report and in a verbal statement when the candidacy of Mr. Dawson for the position was brought up by Mr. Welsh, Mr. Barr stated that until a day or two prior to the meeting he was not aware that Mr. Dawson aspired to the position. He also stated that Mr. Dawson's certificate as a teacher qualified him to hold the high school principalship and that he had no doubt but that Mr. Dawson could prepare himself to teach the subjects of physics and chemistry that are usually assigned to the occupant of the position. He also admitted that if the Board wished to appoint Mr. Dawson there was no reason why they should not do so although there had been an understanding with Mr. Tustin that under circumstances he would in all likelihood be selected as the principal.

In discussing the matter the desirability of having a man to take full charge of the physical training of all of the boys of the school was dwelt upon and the possibility of having Mr. Dawson do this was considered. As it is now both Mr. Tustin and Mr. Dawson take part of this work while there is a teacher whose entire time is given to the physical training of the girls. It was thought that the boys needed individual attention as much as did the girls but it was left to the future for settlement after the assignment of Mr. Dawson's subjects to other teachers in the system had been studied and the best arrangement determined. A slight misunderstanding to the effect that Mr. Dawson was not qualified to assume the principalship was cleared up during the general discussion. It was also brought out that not so very long ago Mr. Dawson's aims were seemingly directed toward the Law and it was therefore understood that he had no desires for the principal's job that his fourteen years of service in the local schools in the opinion of the Board, entitled him to.

The position had been vacant for several years past, the Board evidently feeling that in the past perhaps the choice had been made a little too hastily. The subject was closed with no evidences of any feeling being apparent among either board members or those affected by the action of the board, all of whom were in attendance throughout the meeting.

The Board was in receipt of an application for any vacancy as school nurse from Miss Alice Seaman, of Perth Amboy. It was ordered that the application be received and acknowledged.

The Board also tackled the question of teacher's salaries and certain unsatisfactions relative to the distribution of bonus monies in lieu of salary increases alleged to be due. It seemed that some of the teachers were dissatisfied over the adjustment the Board had decided upon and some

misunderstood the entire question. It was carefully explained that it was the intent of the Board that each teacher who has not reached the maximum of the salaries for her position should receive an increase of one hundred dollars or such portion of it as would bring the salary up to the maximum. In addition the teacher should receive another hundred dollars for one year only. The teachers, it seemed, desired that the second hundred dollars be added to their salaries, if they had not yet reached the maximum so that they would reach the maximum just that much sooner. This the Board refused.

The secretary was instructed to procure data from the school systems of adjoining municipalities relative to the salary schedules in effect so that next year the board may be in a position to handle the question in an intelligent and fair manner.

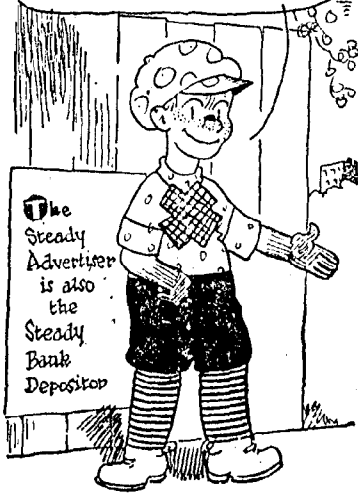
The Board also decided to abolish the teaching of French in the Junior High School classes because the results indicated that the benefits accruing were not worth the effort required and the appreciation evidently was not what it should be because the subject was dropped in the higher grades where individual electives were exercised. This move will leave the board with one surplus teacher unless the teacher in question is released, which seems probable.

three each for the plumbing and heating and ventilating and four for the electrical work. Besides the two local concerns named already, bids for the general construction were submitted by the Perth Amboy Construction Co., Gustave Jost & Son and Michael Riesz. The bids of these bidders were for \$39,800; \$44,719 and \$43,167 respectively. On the plumbing bids were submitted by G. W. Stillwell and Burns, Lane & Richardson Co., besides Mr. Monaghan. The same bidders bid on the heating and ventilating. Messrs. G. W. Ord, DeLaplaine Bros., Henry Mielke and the Victor Electric Company were bidders for the electrical work.

The bids of Henry Mielke, \$2032; for the electrical wiring; G. W. Stillwell, \$13,850, for heating and ventilating, and Mr. Monaghan for the plumbing, were accepted by the Board and the execution of contracts authorized. This was done so that work in the plumbing and heating particularly might be gotten started as soon as possible.

The Board authorized the architect to take up with the various bidders, particularly the two local concerns that were the lowest bidders, the reductions they might have to offer if certain items on which their bids were based were eliminated. In an effort to speed matters as much as practicable it was arranged that the revised figures be submitted to the Board at a meeting of the body to be held next Tuesday evening. It can then be decided whether recourse to the Board of School Estimate for additional funds is necessary and if so just how much more money will be required. Unless the revised figures loop some ten thousand dollars off the bids for the general construction, etc., it will be necessary to apply for additional funds.

The Board also authorized the return of the certified checks of the high bidders and also to reserve decision as to the acceptance or rejection of the bid of the heating people for the installation of a blower system for the boilers. The figure for this work comes to \$1,550 and the item may not be eliminated unless absolutely necessary.

In considering the eliminations the Board is giving consideration of the retaining of the present floor in the auditorium, retention of the present wardrobe closets in the various school rooms and a few other items which might come to as much as seventy-five hundred dollars.

The meeting was attended by a large number of contractors and their representatives and both the office of Superintendent of Schools Badd where the Board meets, and the corridor was well filled with these interested ones.
