PROGRESSIVE FIRE CO. TO OPEN ANNUAL CARNIVAL TOMORROW NIGHT

"You Are The Mysterious Fireman" To Be Popular Slogan
In Attempt To Win Prize—Affair To Be Continued
Each Night Next Week For Benefit New Truck Fund.

Tomorrow evening will mark the opening of the block dance and carnival to be held by the Progressive Fire Company on the grounds adjoining the fire house on Bordentown avenue at Gordon street. The affair is planned to continue every night next week and coming to a grand close on next Saturday night, June 13th.

One of the main attractions is expected to be the "Mysterious Fireman." Every night someone on the grounds will be designated as that elusive person and his apprehension will secure to the person making the identification a very nice prize. The committee announces that in endeavoring to designate the Mysterious Fireman a person must walk up to the suspected individual, lay his or her hand upon his arm or shoulder and say: "You are the Mysterious Fireman." Either hand may be used in touching the suspected person, and one may stand in any position, but the correct words must be used and he must be touched at the same time. If the method of address is correct there will be no attempt at an evasion on the part of the fireman, if he is the proper one. If he is not, or if there is a mistake in the prescribed form of detection, then will follow a denial that he is the one acting as the Mysterious Fireman for that particular time. The detection of the fireman so designated will win for the detective a nice prize of either a table lamp or an emblem ring. The ring will be embellished with whatever emblem the winner desires and if it is a lamp that is desired, a choice of those on display on the lamp stand will be awarded. The committee is in hope that someone will win one of these prizes on each of the seven nights the carnival is in progress. There will probably be a different individual designated as the Mysterious Fireman each night, but it may be otherwise.

Throughout the present week members of the organization have been busily engaged in the work of building stands, fencing in the dancing

enclosure, erecting platforms for the musicians, etc. While permission was secured from the city authorities covering the closing of Gordon street, it is now learned that the street will not be entirely shut off but a space wide enough for a driveway will be left so that traffic can get to and fro through the street.

There will be music for dancing every night. The music will be furnished by the Jolly Syncopators, the same aggregation of musicians that furnished music for the anniversary entertainment of the Independence Engine & Hose Company on Monday evening of this week. The orchestra will be conducted by H. Mehrlander. The piano, which is to be used this year for the first time for dance music at the Maxville affair, will be stored in the firehouse during the time it is not in use.

The stands will be loaded with an assortment of prizes that will surpass anything used locally heretofore. There will be a number of toys featured that will be unusual. There will be scooters, three-wheel bicycles, large friction toys, life sized baby dolls, etc. One stand will feature sporting goods exclusively. On it will be baseball outfits, complete and other seasonal merchandise of appeal to the sporting fraternity.

Another stand will carry floor lamps somewhat similar to those used at last year's affair but they are reported to be much more handsome, and incidentally more expensive to the fire company than ever. This year three will be none of the small, so-called consolation prizes used. One of the big prizes will go on every play, if all or the numbers are taken. This means the abandonment of the "Star" being the only winner idea of distributing the merchandise.

The blanket stand is expected to be more attractive than ever. The location of it has been changed so that it faces Bordentown avenue and can thus be seen from afar. Another stand displaying "Felix", the

FIREMEN CELEBRATE 35TH ANNIVERSARY

Independence Engine Company Has Banquet and Entertainment.

Monday evening, June 1st was a night in the history of Independence Engine and Hose Company long to be remembered.

The event was the celebration of the 35th anniversary of the company's organization and a housewarming in their new home which had long been awaited. The Mayor and Council, all of the active members, and the ex-members of the company who were in a great way responsible for the success of the company since its organization were in attendance.

The meeting was called to order by President J. B. Woodward, who expressed his genuine pleasure at the wonderful turnout, and expressed the thanks of the company to the Mayor and Council for their cooperation with him and the organization in endeavoring to promote good feeling among the various fire companies in the city.

Past Secretary N. N. Pears read a very carefully prepared history of the company, dating from its organization in 1890 up to the present time, which proved very interesting to the older members who helped make it, and to the younger fellows in learning what they had to do to keep up the work of the old time fire fighters.

Remarks were also made by Councilmen Connors, Mullane, Downs and Kvist, all of whom commended the company for their untiring efforts in behalf of the people of the city.

Ex-Councilman James W. Hackett and Billy Masterson, an old time member and resident, expressed their pleasure at being present and being able to renew old time acquaintances.

Supper was served during the evening by Miss B. Heath, our local restaurateur, and the members of the company with their guests expressed to her a particular tribute as to the quality, quantity and service of the refreshments.

Secretary John A. Conlogue, acted as chairman of the party, and in recalling the history of the company as read by Mr. Pearce, noted that a great deal of the success and present efficiency of the company was due to the untiring efforts of Pres. J. B. Woodward, who has acted in that capacity for about thirty years. His interest in the fire department and this lesson of service to the community to be learned from his record is well to be studied by the younger firemen of today.

In all of his work he was ably assisted by N. N. Pearce, who for thirty years acted as his secretary. Mr. Pearce has compiled a complete record of all the firemen in this city, which has proved to be of very great value in assisting the Firemen's Relief Association in their work.

P. R. R. TRAIN HELD UP BY DERAILMENT

On Wednesday afternoon the P. R. R. train due at the local station at 2:14, tied up traffic on the north-bound track near the P. R. R. junction for several hours, due to a derailment of the rear trucks of the baggage car. The trucks jumped the curve in the vicinity of the concrete over-head bridge, and it was not until the train had almost reached the station that it was stopped. The many passengers that this train always carries were transferred to train No. 2506 coming in from Camden about 2:25 P. M. No one was injured, although one woman fainted, which is thought to have been caused by the extreme heat of the afternoon.

NO G. A. R. MEN IN MEMORIAL PARADE

Last Survivor Too Sick To Leave His Bed—Fine Services For Dead.

On last Saturday, Memorial Day, the American Legion conducted its memorial exercises in an extremely impressive manner, under the chairmanship of Charles Boll.

The local Post had as its Memorial parade guests the South Amboy Boy Scout Troop No. 1, the Mayor and Council, the crew of the U. S. S. Breck, Protection Engine Company, Enterprise Hook and Ladder Company, Progressive Fire Company, and Mechanicsville Hose Company, as well as many relatives of deceased soldiers.

After visiting Christ Church cemetery where the services were under the direction of Rev. E. C. Kennedy, of Christ Church, the parade continued to the City Hall where Mr. Harold McCullough, of Bayonne, delivered a patriotic address. Mayor Harold G. Hoffman also addressed the gathering, and the South Amboy Choral Society rendered several patriotic numbers. Mrs. Ada Piersol Cozzens, director of the Choral Society, rendered the National Anthem as a solo. The addresses and the singing were well prepared and were received by the audience with much enthusiasm.

The services at the City Hall followed the regular Legion ritual, including the reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Past Commander Leonard, the regular prayer by Commander Stults, and the plea for a surcease from war by Past Commander Sonlogue.

The path was then toward St. Mary's cemetery where the Rev. Dr. E. C. Griffin gave the blessing, the Protection Engine Company members placed a wreath on the grave of Martin B. Bailey, who was formerly a member of that Company.

The cemetery of Sacred Heart church was visited, where the regular Legion Services were conducted, following which prayer was offered and blessing given by the Pastor of Sacred Heart Parish.

The Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion entertained the crew of the U. S. S. Breck, both on Friday preceding the Memorial Exercises, and also following the pilgrimage to the various cemeteries.

A saddening feature of the exercises was the fact that this is the first Memorial Day since the World War, at which no member of the G. A. R. was present, and participating with the American Legion. Comrade Thomas Muldoon, the last survivor of the G. A. R. in this city, was ill in bed on Saturday and was unable to participate in the exercises as he has also done, but he has the best wishes of the townspeople for his speedy recovery, and the hope that on many Memorial Days of the future he will be seen in his never to be forgotten uniform participating in the annual services, with the soldiers of the later war and later generation.

MANY INSPECT DESTROYER HERE

Officers And Crew Praise Hospitality Of South Amboyans.

With both officers and men expressing praise of the hospitality of South Amboy, the U. S. S. Breck, the Navy's largest destroyer, sailed out of the harbor at 10:30 last Sunday morning in charge of Lieutenant Commander John H. Macgruder, Jr., bound for Brooklyn Navy Yard.

The boat arrived here at about 4 o'clock last Friday afternoon piloted in by Captain Daniel Salmon. Owing to the size of the craft it was unable to dock at the freight pier of the P. R. R. Co., but it was brought to the coal dumper pier. Owing to the fact that there was no activity at the dumper over the week end and holiday the public was given an opportunity to inspect the boat. Officers and men courteously escorted the public through the interesting craft, and the "kiddies" especially took advantage of the officer, swarming all over the boat and being given practically free rein by the officers.

On Saturday a detachment of men, under Lieutenant J. H. Parker, participated in the parade for the Memorial Day services.

Lieutenant Commander Macgruder, in charge of the destroyer, was formerly in command of the President's yacht, the Mayflower, during the Harding administration.

On Friday evening the American Legion rooms were thrown open to the men of the destroyer, and the ladies of the Auxiliary served sandwiches, coffee, pies, and cake to the boys, who expressed themselves as being extremely pleased with the hospitality shown them.

LOCAL YOUTHS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE WHEN TRAIN SMASHES INTO TRUCK

Andrew Bulinski, Richard Ryan and Robert Leonard In Truck Hit On First Street Crossing—Wreckage Dragged With Youths In It—Train Conductor Also Hurt.

Shortly before two o'clock yesterday afternoon three local youths miraculously escaped with but minor injuries when the truck on which they were riding was struck by a locomotive on the railroad yard crossing on lower First street and dragged along the tracks for over a hundred feet. The youths were Andrew Bulinski, and Richard Ryan, of John street, and Robert Leonard, of Pine avenue. Bulinski was rushed to the offices of Dr. E. A. Meacham where an examination disclosed a bad cut on the nose and a bruised hip. The other two did not require medical attendance at the time.

The truck was a Stewart owned by James Farley, of Louisa street, and was being driven by Bulinski from the direction of the coal docks. The train was what is known as a "work train" on the New York and Long Branch Railroad and was leaving the local yards to go through the Pennsylvania yard tracks and down the hill to the Raritan River bridge. This move was required by a derrick car being too high to pass under the bridge where the P. R. R. tracks cross the N. Y. & L. B. R. R.

The locomotive was being run backward, with the cars attached to the forward end. The rear of the locomotive tank struck fairly in the middle and dragged it along the tracks for some distance. The truck was completely destroyed and the tender damaged to some extent.

Bulinski, it is said, either jumped or was thrown out when the collision took place. Leonard managed to crawl out of the wreckage as it was being pushed along the tracks but Ryan did not get out until the train had stopped. Even then he had on-

ly a slight cut on the left side of the head and on the knuckles of one hand the skin was barked. The trio were considerably shaken up, but with an exhibition of excellent self-control remained at the scene and gave statements to the police and others, seemingly not at all excited over their narrow escape. Bulinski walked up First street and meeting Officer O'Connor informed him of the accident. The officer took him to the office of Dr. Meacham.

The train conductor, George LaValle, was riding on the rear of the engine tender and he was hurt more than anyone else. A badly bruised leg and sundry cuts were sustained by him and treatment was accorded at the local hospital, to which he was rushed in an automobile.

An investigation was at once gotten under way by both the local police authorities and also by railroad officials. There is a fairly good view of the track at the crossing in the direction from which the train was coming, but the crossing is not what is commonly known as a public crossing, it is said. It could not be learned whether the locomotive whistle was sounded as a warning, nor whether the warning bell was being used at the time. There is no flagman stationed at the point and the traffic, both vehicle and railroad, is comparatively infrequent.

The local men were returning from a job of bailing the water out of a barge tied up at the local piers, it is said.

Later in the day the wreckage was carted away by workmen from Gregory's Garage. Officer Bloodgood and O'Connor made the investigation for the local police department.

FORD CAR CLIPS STREET PAINTER

While at work painting the stop marks on the pavement of Stevens avenue at First street yesterday afternoon, "Jack" Downs, assisting Contractor Rufner, was knocked over by a passing automobile. Downs was not hurt much but the autoist did not stop. Rufner boarded a following car and succeeded in overtaking the Ford touring car that struck Downs but the driver refused to return to the scene or to report the matter to the police. He said Downs got in his way and that he couldn't help striking him. Rufner had the matter reported to the local police and Chief Gleason telephoned the Keyport police. The car was stopped there and the driver taken into custody. Sergeant Quinlan went to Keyport and brought the car and driver back to the local City Hall where a severe reprimand was delivered by Sergeant Ryan. The driver was then released under a bond for later action on his case.

NEW AMUSEMENT PARK AT LAURENCE HARBOR

Laurence Harbor, the new Seaside City the nearest and most conveniently reached from this city is to have a waterfront amusement park this season that will attract crowds of the motorists and the summer sojourners at the shore. The Laurence Harbor Heights Company has decided to build a swimming pool which will cost \$100,000; a new boardwalk has been completed costing \$75,000; a new dance pavilion with a large maple floor and large porch and settees has been built costing over \$20,000, and another large building for concessions is now being erected.

To please the young folk as well as the elder ones there is being erected a merry-go-round, ferris-wheel and seaplane ride, which are expected to be in operation by the 15th of this month. These attractions are to be beautifully illuminated with hundreds of electric lights.

The dance pavilion is now in operation and is beautifully located on the waterfront. Dances are held every Wednesday and Saturday nights at present, and crowds of dance-loving couples are enjoying the new dance floor. A door prize was awarded Saturday night.

GOOD WORK IN HANDLING TRAFFIC

Last Sunday afternoon and evening, when South Amboy was bearing the brunt of the shore traffic of the week end and holiday, the situation in South Amboy was handled in a way that reflected great credit not only upon the local police, but upon the special officers who have volunteered their services in this capacity.

Traffic was sent through Stevens avenue and Broadway in single lines, and street intersections, where officers were on duty were held open. Traffic was not allowed to block the Broadway firehouse, and when the alarm was turned in on Sunday evening there was no interference with the apparatus on the way to fires. There was little or no noise from the sounding of horns and klaxons, and on every hand there was favorable comment on the way in which the situation was handled.

The marking of street intersections during the past week is expected to further facilitate the handling of traffic.

The police officers and special officers are instructed to give every consideration to the safety and convenience of local pedestrians and motorists, and the general public can do much to aid in handling this difficult situation by co-operating in every way with the officers.

South Amboy is in no way responsible for the week end traffic jams. The solution is up to the State Highway Commission and the legislature. The congestion very apparently starts in Perth Amboy and upon the narrow State Bridge.

LEWIS TAKES RAP AT "SMALL FRY"

At Rotary Club Dinner Here Last Tuesday.

The address made by Burdette G. Lewis, New Jersey State Commissioner of Institutions and Agencies, before the South Amboy Rotary Club last Tuesday noon, declaring that "small fry" go-betweens were responsible for the attitude of the Bright Legislative Investigation Committee in connection with state institutions, was widely circulated throughout the New Jersey press.

Commissioner Lewis, in his address, said:

"The record of the Department of Institutions and Agencies is entirely public and it is very clear. If I had had five minutes more I would have explained to the Legislative Investigating Committee last Wednesday that it is the 'small-fry' go-betweens who are opposed to going on with the program adopted in 1918. At that time the leaders of all parties agreed that the institutions should be taken out of log-rolling, job seeking politics and placed upon the same plane as 'Jersey Justice.' The leaders of all parties have been entirely faithful to this understanding. We have worked with them in season and out of season. We all have agreed to work for the wards of the State instead of ourselves. This is the reason for unanimity and progress.

"On the other hand, these selfish persons have complained to the leaders, whispering all sorts of stories while they never dare make public, because of their absurdity. These same individuals are trying to use the Legislative Inquiry Commission to broadcast what they themselves have never dared to speak out loud. They want to get their hands on some of the \$9,000,000 for which the people of New Jersey are taking themselves to provide proper treatment and training facilities for the wards of the State. Their mouths water for some of the \$4,000,000 expended for operating costs of State institutions, but Governor Silzer, Comptroller Bugbee, State Treasurer Read, the members of the State Board of Control and of local Boards, and of the Appropriation Committee of the Legislature have balked them.

"The present program of the small fry is to break up the Department by transferring the Division of Architecture and Construction, handling the \$9,000,000, to some other Department. They know they might not succeed in raking off any of the funds in the proposed new Department or in the Department of Labor, but there is a chance. They recognize they could not fare worse than at present. As preliminary to this transfer, they are trying to persuade the Legislative Committee to send persons in the guise of auditors to the institutions to check up every bill. Ostensibly they are to find if they can save any money; really with the hope either of establishing political control of State institutions at once, or at least of breaking down the cohesion of the Department, which is essential in any business enterprise. If our Superintendents can be made to feel that they cannot get a bill paid unless they do what is told them 'on the quiet' by some of these so-called auditors, one can see how quickly the cohesion of the State Department will be broken up. Cohesion saves money: fighting wastes money.

"There is no necessity for additional audit control in the Department of Institution and Agencies. Every request is reviewed not less than six times before the Department can get a dollar and then its expenditure is reviewed from four to seven times before it can be expended. There is a constant careful review. Moreover, during the first year of our operation, we employed one of the best Public Accountants in the country to establish a complete modern system of accounting; second, to make a study of every position in every institution and agency of the Department including the Central Office; third, of each assignment to

duty of each and every person and thus to eliminate all duplication of work. This study was followed by a check-up of every paper report of the Department with a view to eliminating any possible wasted effort or wasted time. The whole accounting system was reviewed at the end of three years for any possible discrepancies. In the fourth place, the Central Office in its relations to the institutions was studied for possible duplication of effort and a national firm of accountants placed a valuation upon each piece of work the Department was undertaking.

"All these reports are available to the Legislative Committee. They serve as a basis for every budget request and for every budget review of the Department.

"The people of small vision who are whispering to the Legislative Committee show their inability to make a case against the Department by advising the Committee to make a long study by auditors before the responsible heads of the Department are put on the stand to testify. Why keep responsible officials off the stand if the 'small fry' can furnish the Committee with any ammunition that is worth while?

"The Department of Institution and Agencies has made a tremendous record of real economy and real efficiency. It is handicapped by old-fashioned institutions, which are slowly being modernized, by poor salaries for very responsible positions, which are being increased too slowly. Crime is growing in New Jersey and our State Prison releases prisoners into the community too soon, because there isn't room enough to keep them for a long enough training period. We wonder how long we must keep urging the building of an intermediate reformatory so that we can take the young men out of the prison and keep them at Rahway, and give the present young men at Rahway more modern training, such as would restore them along approved lines as self-supporting members of the community."

LOCAL FIREMEN BATTLE WITH MORGAN FLAMES

Local firemen played an important part in preventing the spread of a fire which destroyed the garage building at the former Morgan Loading Plant yesterday morning. 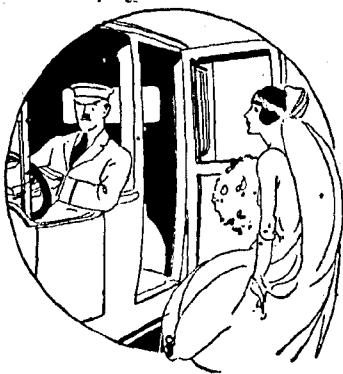

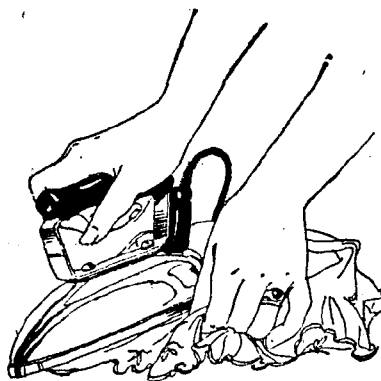

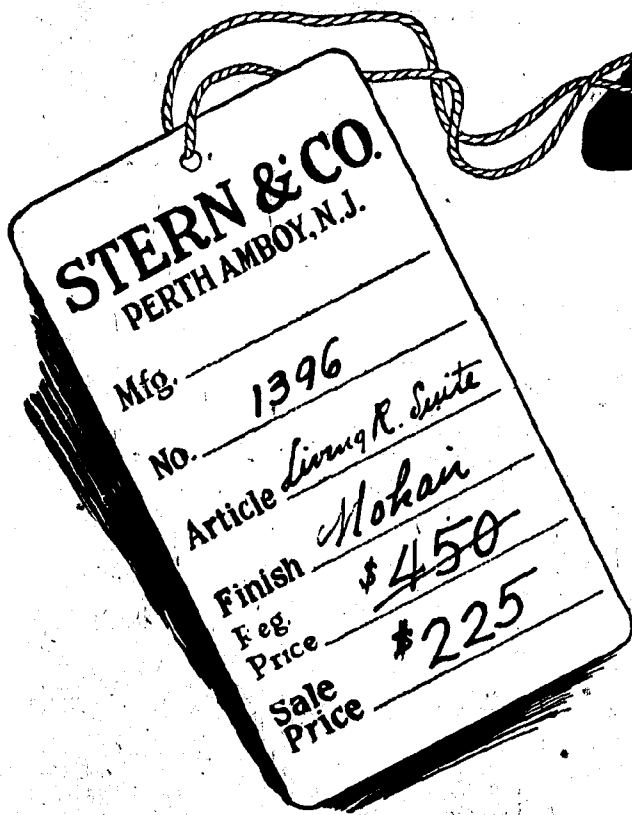

STATE HIGHWAY GIVES OUT MAP

Trenton, N. J., June 5th—Newly designed to include all the roads improved during the past year, the 1925 map issued by the New Jersey State Highway Commission is now ready for distribution.

The careful attention given by the Highway Commission to the preparation of this publication for the convenience of automobilists has won general commendation and several motor clubs have written the Board that it is the most serviceable work of this nature that has ever been done.

Names of additional municipalities have been included in the 1925 map and the paved roads in counties and townships, as well as State routes, have been clearly designated. A succinct description of the routes has been interpolated and a clever selection made of views on the State highways. One of these is an airplane picture showing the progress on the \$4,000,000 Victory bridge under construction by the Highway Commission between Perth Amboy and South Amboy on Route 4. Photographs of signs adopted to show danger zones at crossings and curves have also been introduced. Of especial interest to many is the reproduction of a map of the State as it appeared in 1778 before the site of the now celebrated Atlantic City and other settlements were designated under their names.

WATSON'S RADIO RECALLS EARLY TELEPHONE DAYS

Man Who Assisted Dr. Bell in
Experiments Is Enthusiast
Over System's Growth.

Thomas A. Watson, the man who made the first telephone in the world, who assisted Alexander Graham Bell in his earliest experiments and who heard the first complete sentence ever transmitted over a telephone line, has perhaps as keen a personal interest in the development of radio as any man now living. Always interested in scientific and mechanical inventions, he was one of the first to have a radio set installed in his home. The impressions that radio has made on the man who was associated with Alexander Graham Bell in the invention of the telephone are of special interest. Referring to the wonders of radio and its fascinating interest, Mr. Watson says:

"As I sit in my study and listen to voices and music that come to me through the ether from far away places, my mind goes back to that hot summer day when Prof. Bell and I were thrilled by the first, feeble sound ever transmitted electrically—a sound from which the great Bell System has developed."

"Wonderful as the radio is, there is to me nothing in it more astounding than the everyday work of the Bell System—the transmitting of 46,000,000 telephone calls each day straight to the individual desired, regardless of time, distance or location. That is the stupendous achievement accomplished by telephone engineers."

"It is just fifty years ago next June when, working with Alexander Graham Bell, I happened to snap a little piece of steel clock spring near the end of an electro-magnet. It was apparently a trivial action on my part. Thousands of steel springs had been snapped and made to vibrate before that without any noticeable result. But that, particular snap, although it was not a good shot, has been sounding around the world ever since and its effect will last as long as mankind exists."

Privileged to take part in the beginnings of the telephone, Thomas A. Watson now is able to watch each new step in the tremendous extension, by wire and by ether, of the range and power of the human voice. Wonderful as radio telephony is, he feels confident that far greater marvels are in store for the future.—The Telephone Review, N. Y. C.

Dill said: "This statement is given at this time for the purpose of calling attention to all commercial truck owners that the purpose of the law is to furnish the ready identity of the persons operating such vehicles for unlawful purposes, etc., and calling attention to the necessity of having the names and addresses on the trucks before the date mentioned, thereby avoiding the possibility of arrest and fines for any violation."

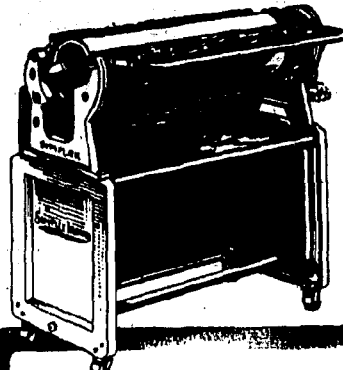

PROGRESSIVE FIRE CO. TO OPEN ANNUAL CARNIVAL TOMORROW NIGHT

"You Are The Mysterious Fireman" To Be Popular Slogan In Attempt To Win Prize—Affair To Be Continued Each Night Next Week For Benefit New Truck Fund.

Tomorrow evening will mark the opening of the block dance and carnival to be held by the Progressive Fire Company on the grounds adjoining the fire house on Bordentown avenue at Gordon street. The affair is planned to continue every night next week and coming to a grand close on next Saturday night, June 18th.

One of the main attractions is expected to be the "Mysterious Fireman." Every night someone on the grounds will be designated as that elusive person and his apprehension will secure to the person making the identification a very nice prize. The committee announces that in endeavoring to designate the Mysterious Fireman a person must walk up to the suspected individual, lay his or her hand upon his arm or shoulder and say: "You are the Mysterious Fireman." Either hand may be used in touching the suspected person, and one may stand in any position, but the correct words must be used and he must be touched at the same time. If the method of address is correct there will be no attempt at an evasion on the part of the fireman, if he is the proper one. If he is not, or if there is a mistake in the prescribed form of detection, then will follow a denial that he is the one acting as the Mysterious Fireman for that particular time. The detection of the fireman so designated will win for the detective a nice prize of either a table lamp or an emblem ring. The ring will be embellished with whatever emblem the winner desires and if it is a lamp that is desired, a choice of those on display on the lamp stand will be awarded. The committee is in hope that someone will win one of these prizes on each of the seven nights the carnival is in progress. There will probably be a different individual designated as the Mysterious Fireman each night, but it may be otherwise.

Throughout the present week members of the organization have been busily engaged in the work of building stands, fencing in the dancing

enclosure, erecting platforms for the musicians, etc. While permission was secured from the city authorities covering the closing of Gordon street, it is now learned that the street will not be entirely shut off but a space wide enough for a driveway will be left so that traffic can get to and fro through the street.

There will be music for dancing every night. The music will be furnished by the Jolly Syncopators, the same aggregation of musicians that furnished music for the anniversary entertainment of the Independence Engine & Hose Company on Monday evening of this week. The orchestra will be conducted by H. Mehrlander. The piano, which is to be used this year for the first time for dance music at the Maxville affair, will be stored in the firehouse during the time it is not in use.

The stands will be loaded with an assortment of prizes that will surpass anything used locally heretofore. There will be a number of toys featured that will be unusual. There will be scooters, three-wheel bicycles, large friction toys, life sized baby dolls, etc. One stand will feature sporting goods exclusively. On it will be baseball outfits, complete and other seasonal merchandise of appeal to the sporting fraternity.

Another stand will carry floor lamps somewhat similar to those used at last year's affair but they are reported to be much more handsome, and incidentally more expensive to the fire company than ever. This year three will be none of the small, so-called consolation prizes used. One of the big prizes will go on every play, if all or the numbers are taken. This means the abandonment of the "Star" being the only winner idea of distributing the merchandise.

The blanket stand is expected to be more attractive than ever. The location of it has been changed so that it faces Bordentown avenue and can thus be seen from afar. Another stand displaying "Felix", the

After visiting Christ Church cemetery where the services were under the direction of Rev. E. C. Kennedy, of Christ Church, the parade continued to the City Hall where Mr. Harold McCullough, of Bayonne, delivered a patriotic address. Mayor Harold G. Hoffman also addressed the gathering, and the South Amboy Choral Society rendered several patriotic numbers. Mrs. Ada Piersol Cozzens, director of the Choral Society, rendered the National Anthem as a solo. The addresses and the singing were well prepared and were received by the audience with much enthusiasm.

The services at the City Hall followed the regular Legion ritual, including the reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Past Commander Leonard, the regular prayer by Commander Stults, and the plea for a surcease from war by Past Commander Sorlogue.

The path was then toward St. Mary's cemetery where the Rev. Dr. E. C. Griffin gave the blessing, the Protection Engine Company members placed a wreath on the grave of Martin B. Bailey, who was formerly a member of that Company.

The cemetery of Sacred Heart church was visited, where the regular Legion Services were conducted, following which prayer was offered and blessing given by the Pastor of Sacred Heart Parish.

The Ladies Auxiliary of the American Legion entertained the crew of the U. S. S. Breck, both on Friday preceding the Memorial Exercises, and also following the pilgrimage to the various cemeteries.

A saddening feature of the exercises was the fact that this is the first Memorial Day since the World War, at which no member of the G. A. R. was present, and participating with the American Legion. Comrade Thomas Muldoon, the last survivor of the G. A. R. in this city, was ill in bed on Saturday and was unable to participate in the exercises as he has also done, but he has the best wishes of the townspeople for his speedy recovery, and the hope that on many Memorial Days of the future he will be seen in his never to be forgotten uniform participating in the annual services, with the soldiers of the later war and later generation.

MANY INSPECT DESTROYER HERE

Officers And Crew Praise Hospitality Of South Amboys.

With both officers and men expressing praise of the hospitality of South Amboy, the U. S. S. Breck, the Navy's largest destroyer, sailed out of the harbor at 10:30 last Sunday morning in charge of Lieutenant Commander John H. Macgruder, Jr., bound for Brooklyn Navy Yard.

The boat arrived here at about 4 o'clock last Friday afternoon piloted in by Captain Daniel Salmon. Owing to the size of the craft it was unable to dock at the freight pier of the P. R. R. Co., but it was brought to the coal dumper pier. Owing to the fact that there was no activity at the dumper over the week end and holiday the public was given an opportunity to inspect the boat. Officers and men courteously escorted the public through the interesting craft, and the "kiddies" especially took advantage of the officer, swarming all over the boat and being given practically free rein by the officers.

On Saturday a detachment of men, under Lieutenant J. H. Parker, participated in the parade for the Memorial Day services.

Lieutenant Commander Macgruder, in charge of the destroyer, was formerly in command of the President's yacht, the Mayflower, during the Harding administration.

On Friday evening the American Legion rooms were thrown open to the men of the destroyer, and the ladies of the Auxiliary served sandwiches, coffee, pies, and cake to the boys, who expressed themselves as being extremely pleased with the hospitality shown them.

LOCAL YOUTHS HAVE NARROW ESCAPE WHEN TRAIN SMASHES INTO TRUCK

Andrew Bulinski, Richard Ryan and Robert Leonard In Truck Hit On First Street Crossing—Wreckage Dragged With Youths In It—Train Conductor Also Hurt.

Shortly before two o'clock yesterday afternoon three local youths miraculously escaped with but minor injuries when the truck on which they were riding was struck by a locomotive on the railroad yard crossing on lower First street and dragged along the tracks for over a hundred feet. The youths were Andrew Bulinski, and Richard Ryan, of John street, and Robert Leonard, of Pine avenue. Bulinski was rushed to the offices of Dr. E. A. Meacham where an examination disclosed a bad cut on the nose and a bruised hip. The other two did not require medical attendance at the time.

The truck was a Stewart owned by James Farley, of Louisa street, and was being driven by Bulinski from the direction of the coal docks. The train was what is known as a "work train" on the New York and Long Branch Railroad and was leaving the local yards to go through the Pennsylvania yard tracks and down the hill to the Raritan River bridge. This move was required by a derrick car being too high to pass under the bridge where the P. R. R. trucks cross the N. Y. & L. B. R. R.

The locomotive was being run backward, with the cars attached to the forward end. The rear of the locomotive tank struck fairly in the middle and dragged it along the tracks for some distance. The truck was completely destroyed and the tender damaged to some extent.

Bulinski, it is said, either jumped or was thrown out when the collision took place. Leonard managed to crawl out of the wreckage as it was being pushed along the tracks but Ryan did not get out until the train had stopped. Even then he had on-

ly a slight cut on the left side of the head and on the knuckles of one hand the skin was barked. The trio were considerably shaken up, but with an exhibition of excellent self-control remained at the scene and gave statements to the police and others, seemingly not at all excited over their narrow escape. Bulinski walked up First street and meeting Officer O'Connor informed him of the accident. The officer took him to the office of Dr. Meacham.

The train conductor, George LaValle, was riding on the rear of the engine tender and he was hurt more than anyone else. A badly bruised leg and sundry cuts were sustained by him and treatment was accorded at the local hospital, to which he was rushed in an automobile.

An investigation was at once gotten under way by both the local police authorities and also by railroad officials. There is a fairly good view of the track at the crossing in the direction from which the train was coming, but the crossing is not what is commonly known as a public crossing, it is said. It could not be learned whether the locomotive whistle was sounded as a warning, nor whether the warning bell was being used at the time. There is no flagman stationed at the point and the traffic, both vehicle and railroad, is comparatively infrequent.

The local men were returning from a job of bailing the water out of a barge tied up at the local piers, it is said.

Later in the day the wreckage was carted away by workmen from Gregory's Garage. Officer Bloodgood and O'Connor made the investigation for the local police department.

"One need not depart from facts to find abundant encouragement for your musical future. The latter is usually manifested to a like degree only in choruses composed of a single race, as the Welsh for example, who apparently are born with an instinct for ensemble work. 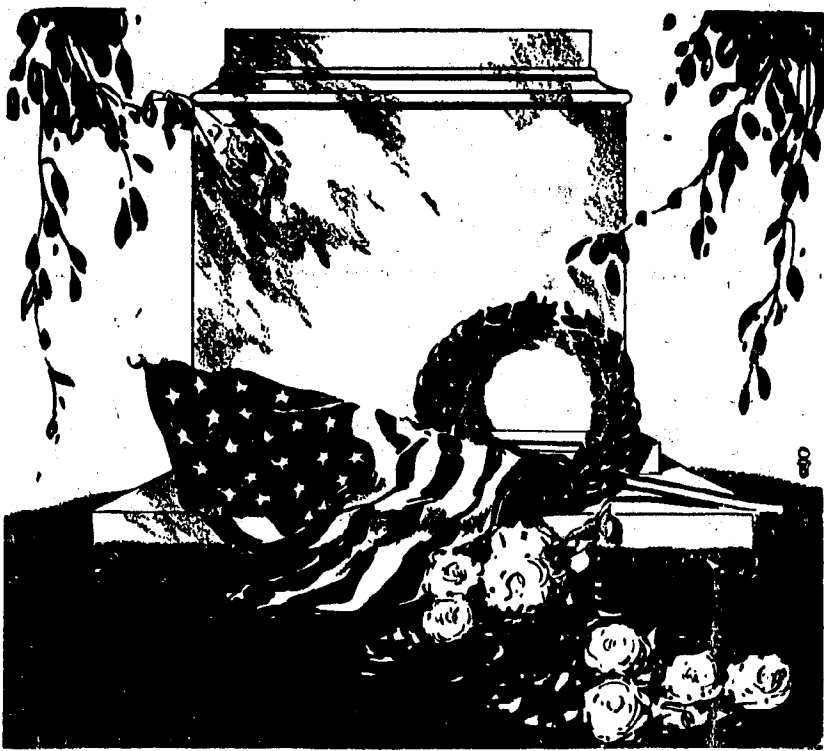

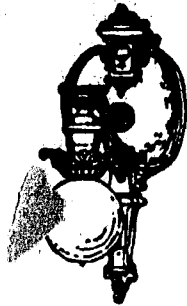

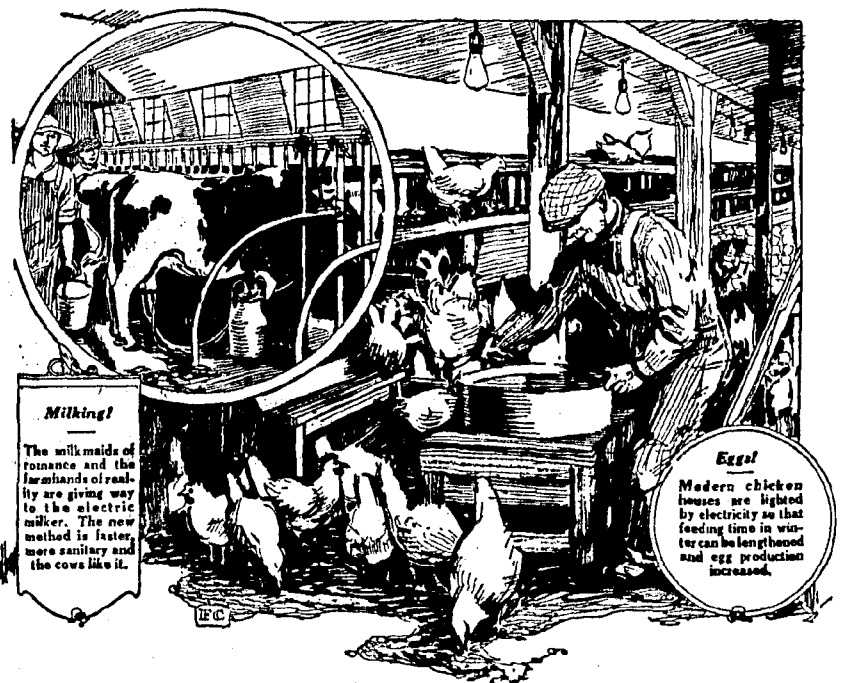

BOYS CAMP, CAMP TAYLOR
TO OPEN ON JULY 2ND

With the closing of school and the advent of hot weather comes the vacation problem which parents have been able to solve by selecting a good camp in which their boys may not only enjoy a fine outing but in which they also come into contact with a real character-building program. Almost every boy is interested in camp and parents have more and more come to realize that one or two weeks in camp does wonders for a boy after the long grind of the school year. New Jersey has many fine camps and the cost is so moderate that it is now possible for almost every boy to attend a camp for at least a week.

One of the finest of these, and according to state standards ranks among the three highest in New Jersey, is Camp Taylor, at High Bridge, in Hunterdon County. Four counties have united to make this the finest Boys' Camp in the State. The County Y. M. C. A. organizations of Middlesex, Morris, Hunterdon and Somerset counties join forces in promoting this summer camp for boys from 12 to 18 years of age. The County Secretaries of these four powerful organizations act as the directors and adult leaders of splendid character and training are provided for every tent of seven boys.

The 1925 season, which opens July 2nd, is the 11th season for Camp Taylor. It will run for 4 weeks, closing July 30. After which the girls of these four counties will use it for a four week period. Parents who have investigated many boys camps say there is no more beautiful spot than this site in the Poconos on beautiful Lake Solitude. Not only is it noted for its rare beauty but it is famous for its healthy climate and the fact that it is absolutely free from mosquitoes.

Less than fifty miles from Middlesex county, it is easy of access and transportation is reduced to a minimum. Any boy over 12 years of age may attend Camp whether he is a member of the Y. M. C. A. or not. The program is so varied that every boy may always find something to keep him interested and happy. From the bugle call in the morning until taps is blown at night there is never a dull moment.

Any boy who has not felt the thrill of awaking to the clear ringing call of a bugle after a refreshing night of sleep by the shore of a beautiful lake can experience it by attending Camp Taylor. After a brisk 10 minutes of calisthenics in the open under the leadership of one of the Camp Directors the cry of all in for the morning dip is given and the Lake is a mass of wildly shouting, laughing humanity for a period of five minutes. Of course there are always a few fellows who are either not fully awake as yet or else are too delicate to make the plunge and they often are gently persuaded to get acquainted with the joy of a morning swim. Next comes breakfast, and Oh, what appetites and what good things to satisfy them. No expense is spared to furnish not only the best of food but all the boys can eat and a great variety of food as well. As it is often quite cool at breakfast time, boys are encouraged to take sweaters with them to Camp, and Directors watch that no boy sits in the dining hall without the proper clothing.

Following breakfast comes the regular morning devotions, when every boy meets with the Director in charge of religious work and participates in the Bible discussions. After Chapel comes a short clean up period when every boy is pressed into service to put the Camp in order. A half hour is consumed by these tasks and then the boys are split up into various groups or classes in which they have the choice of taking up Nature Study, First Aid, Camp Craft, Radio

and other things very near to a boy's heart. Thus the morning passes pleasantly until 11 o'clock at which time the whole Camp goes in for a real swim. At 12 o'clock comes Tent Inspection, followed by dinner. For an hour after dinner rest period is observed and then the Camp is all activity again. Baseball, volley ball, hikes, archery, boating and emblem tests are some of the more outstanding afternoon features. At 4 o'clock comes the afternoon swim and a little later when the bungle blows for supper a wild hungry army descends upon the dining room and the way these boys eat is praise enough for the splendid cooking of the chefs in charge of the kitchen.

After supper comes the evening entertainment period when a great variety of entertainment is provided. One night is designated as Stunt Night and each tent of boys with their leader is expected to put on a stunt. At other times minstrel shows are hastily organized, among the boys and some nights are given over wholly to ghost stories around the camp fire. At 9:30 taps are blown and after a short period of tent devotions in which each tent leader conducts a short period of scripture reading and prayer, lights are put out and the Camp drifts into peaceful slumber.

Each day brings new delights and new friendships and it is always with regret that the boys turn their faces homeward and say good-bye to old Taylor for another year.

For the information of parents who are anxious to know about the health and sanitary conditions of Camp Taylor they will be interested to know that tested pure spring water is piped into the Camp and the Kaustine chemical sanitation system and the fact that there are no flies nor mosquitoes make it an ideal place for your boy's vacation. An expert swimming director will teach your boy to swim if he does not already know how. An efficient life saving crew is always on the job to supervise the swimming which is only allowed at stated periods as is also the boating.

Parents and friends will be welcomed in camp on the 11th, and the 25th of July. You may inspect the Camp and visit your boy. Camp Taylor is located at High Bridge, N. J. and is reached by the Central Railroad of New Jersey through Bound Brook, Somerville, Whitehouse, and the Rockaway Branch of the Central Railroad through Dover, Wharton, and Kenvil. Taxis (with reasonable rates) meet all trains. Automobiles can reach the Camp via New Brunswick, Plainfield, to Easton Highway and the new road through Flanders, Long Valley to H. Bridge.

The cost of Camp is \$9.00 a week and a boy may register for one, two, three or four weeks. Registrations should be sent in now to County Y. M. C. A. Secretary Edward M. Dowling, New Brunswick, N. J.

Preceding the opening of Camp for the boys the men of Middlesex County will hold a big get-together starting Friday, June 26 and continuing until Saturday, June 28.

Beginning on Saturday, June 27, while the men's get-together is on, there will be held a Hi-Y conference to which will be invited all Hi-Y boys of the four Counties which are connected with the Camp. The Hi-Y Conference will last until July 2nd when the Camp opens for boys.

MANAGER M'GRAW IS VERY CONSERVATIVE

Not Willing to Make Any Statement as to Final Standing of Giants.

"It is too risky a thing to pick a four consecutive-time winner of a pennant to repeat again," said Manager J. J. McGraw of the New York Giants to a representative of the Christian Science Monitor. "For that reason I shall decline to make any statement relative to the final standing of the Giants, although I will say that the club is as strong, if not stronger than last year."

This is the conservative stand taken by Manager McGraw and it is well warranted. There are too many things that might crop out in a team which has won four straight pennants, chiefly among these is overconfidence. Overconfidence in a team is nearly as detrimental as underconfidence for it makes the team play listless. However, with the leadership of McGraw as the biggest obstacle to overconfidence that one can think of, the Giants look as though they might repeat for a record for all time.

"There is one big reason why I might consider the Giants stronger this year," said McGraw, "and that is the extremely fine showing of our right-handed pitchers. Our strongest opponent will probably be Pittsburgh, but we cannot underestimate any of the clubs. It does not pay. Underestimation of other clubs gives overconfidence the chance to creep in, just as well as overestimation of one's own team's ability."

"I will continue the shifting of G. L. Kelly and William Terry from the outfield to first base, according to the pitching we face this year. Terry hit for only about .230 last season, but I expect him to improve tremendously. The veteran pitchers, A. N. Nehf and J. N. Bentley are fully as effective as a year ago."

"Norway's Nurmi" Coming to the United States

Charles Hoff, Norwegian all-around athlete and holder of the world's pole vault record, plans to come to the United States to make his home in this country, according to word received from Oslo, capital of Norway.

Hoff who was characterized during the last Olympics as the "world's greatest all-around athlete" by Head Coach Lawson Robertson of the American team, agreed to come here early in the winter for the Millrose A. A. indoor carnival. Complications in his affairs at home, however, prevented him from making the trip at that time.

Hoff, whose pole vault record is 13 feet 9 3/4 inches was unable to compete in his favorite event at the Olympics because of a heel bruise. He ran in the 800 meters, however, and was placed in the finals.

Jim Lavender Outpitched

Rube Marquard in 1912

It was Jimmy Lavender, whose name conjures up memories of lavender and old lace, of flowery dells and gentle zephyrs, who stopped Rube Marquard in his remarkable run of consecutive victories back in 1912. Frank Chance, manager of the Chicago Cubs, selected Lavender to put the quietus on the rambling Rube, because the recruit had been going like wildfire for two weeks previous. Not a run had been scored off Lavender's pitching in 30 consecutive innings. The struggle took place at Chicago on July 8, 1912, and was fast and furious for three innings. The break came in the fourth when the Cubs added two runs to their score, making it 4 to 1. Marquard wavered, broke and sprinted for the showers.

The big southpaw seemingly took the defeat calmly, but underneath a smile was a badly dented heart, for that game would have given him the absolute title. Lavender, the victor, who had struggled long to make good, suddenly found himself famous. Strange to relate, both these celebrities fell from their lofty pedestal, the victor and vanquished fell flat and failed to do anything astonishing during the remainder of that season.

On July 27 these two limelights again met in battle array; both were knocked out. After the game they shook hands and Lavender remarked that the peculiar angles of baseball were beyond all understanding.

Eighteen Steel Towers to Carry Electric Wires Across Two Rivers Tying in Three Big Power Plants



One of Steel Transmission Towers With Portion of Kearny Super-Power Station.

CROSSING the Passaic and Hackensack rivers, the Kearny yards of the Pennsylvania Railroad and the main line of the Lackawanna Railroad, a series of eighteen steel towers, some more than 200 feet high, are being constructed by Public Service in preparation for a power line completely interconnecting three big electric plants when the Kearny super-power station is completed.

The project will be known as the Essex-Kearny-Marion tie line and will harness together something

like 600,000 horsepower of electrical energy generated in these three stations to furnish power and light to the industries and residents of New Jersey.

The portion of the line which will cross the two rivers will have a minimum clearance above high tide of about 140 feet to the lowest transmission wire, necessitating towers on either side of the Passaic River about 217 feet high and 229 feet for the Hackensack River crossing. These spans are about 775 feet and 856 feet respectively.

The towers across the Pennsylvania property are 207 feet high, necessitated by future developments of the railroad which include the elevation of some of the tracks.

The electric distribution department, Electric and Gas Company, prepared the specifications for the line. The towers and foundations were designed by Archbold-Brady Company. Public Service Production Company is doing the construction work.

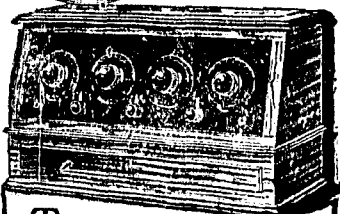

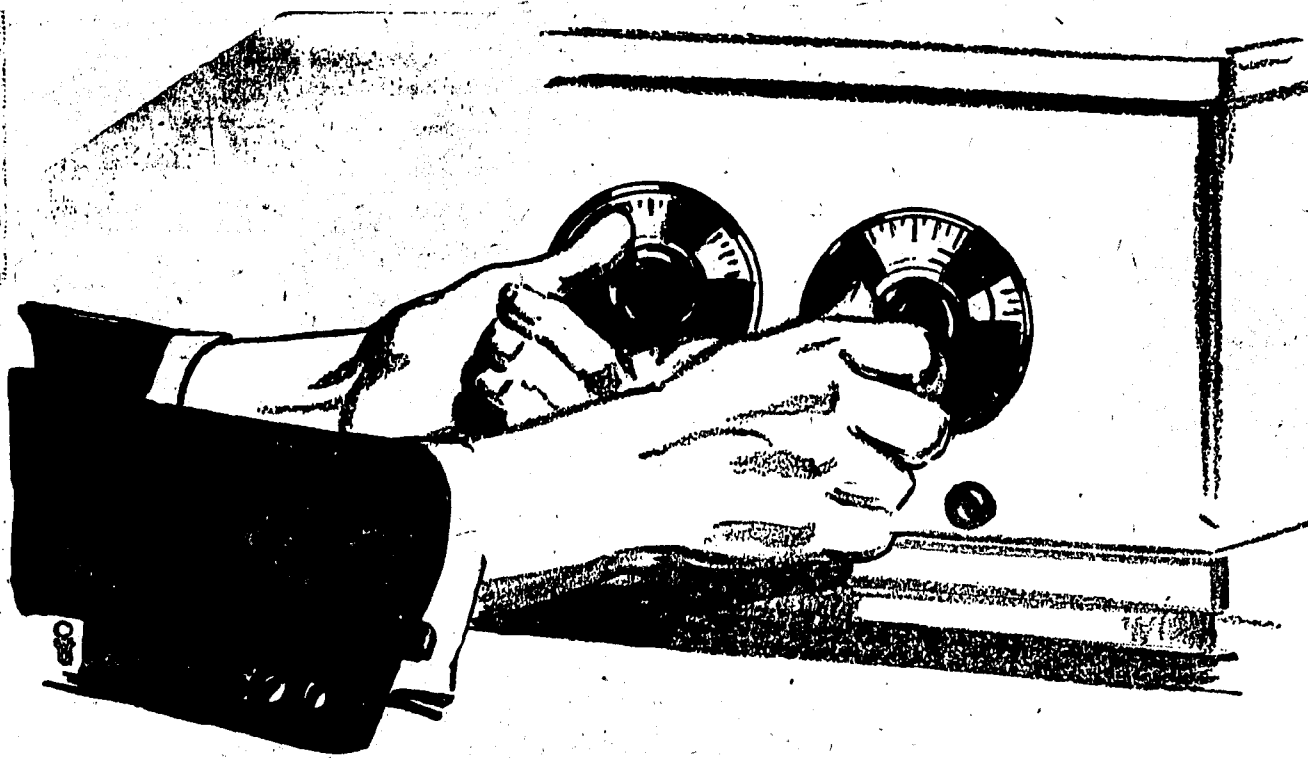

TO ADVERTISE FOR DOG CATCHER

City Clerk G. Frank Disbrow is to advertise for a dog catcher, "one that will stay out of jail until he gets the work done at least," is the specification set forth by Councilman Andrew N. Kvist at the council meeting last Tuesday evening. The city is over run with stray and homeless dogs, Mr. Kvist said, that take up a lot of room and that won't even get out of the way of people walking along the street. Last year it took two or three months to get a dog catcher, so this year by starting now it might be possible to get someone to look after the dogs before the real warm weather arrived.

Councilman Mullane thought it would be an excellent idea to get a dog warden, particularly because of the tax nuisance on dogs that nobody owned. He called attention to the fact that in the resolution adopted cancelling a large number of small tax assessments something over two-thirds were on account of dogs assessed against people that disclaimed ownership of any dog at all. Last year Arthur Murish, of Perth Amboy, held the office of "dog

warden," and worked just a few days at it here. He made over fifty dollars and then failed to do any more work. Murish has frequently gotten into trouble with the police of a number of communities, sometimes over dogs, other times because of something else. It is said that he will this year officiate as dog catcher in Perth Amboy, Woodbridge, Rahway and Keyport. He has procured an automobile for use in his work and arranged to relegate the faithful old horse and wagon to the discard. Whether or not "Art" will get the automobile trained to stop every time it comes near a dog, the way the old horse used to do, still remains to be seen.

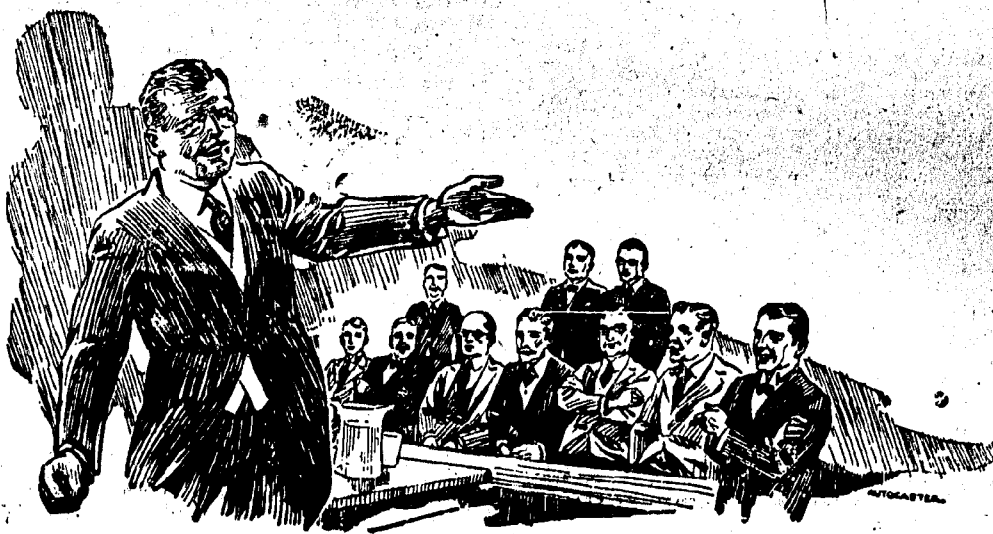

Frank Schantz has been granted a license by the Mayor and Council as a bill poster.

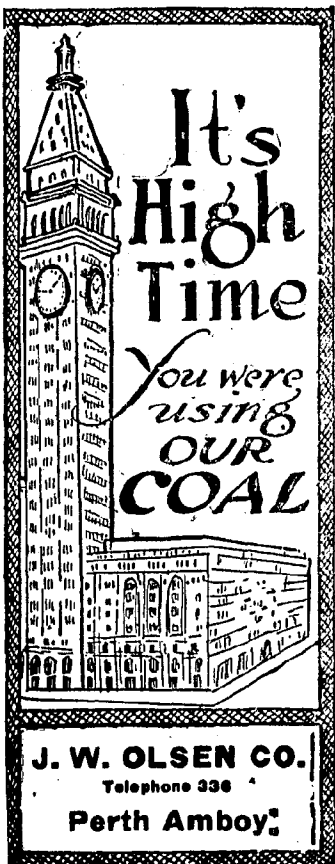

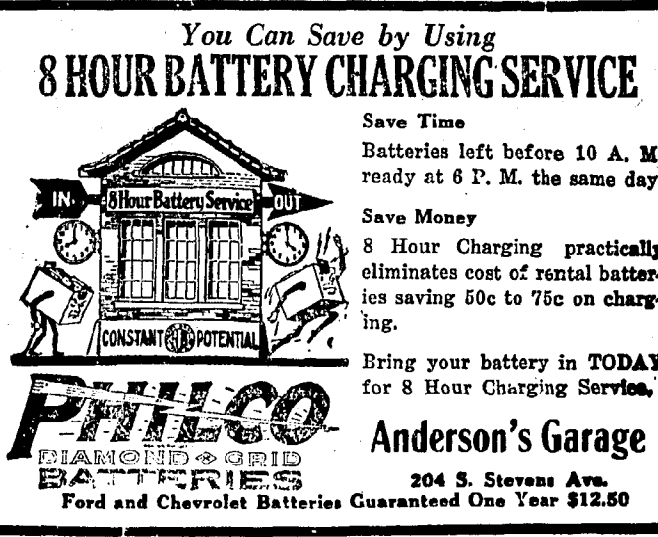

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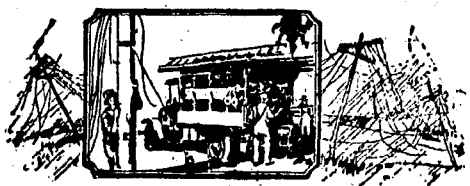

HOW DO YOU DRESS YOUR HOUSE?

Alfonso Iannelli, well known sculptor, painter, architect and Professor of Design at the Chicago Art Institute asks this question and in doing so reminds us of the care with which one's wife selects her gowns. They must be just so in texture and tone, and Professor Iannelli reminds us that if we would have a truly artistic house, every way in keeping with the period of architecture after which designed, we must dress our house with exactly the same care.

Professor Iannelli has just completed months of research on the subject of stucco. "In every great period," he says, "I have found there was a close relation between the design of the building and the texture of the walls, both inside and out. It was very easy to recognize harmony between the architectural design and wall tone and texture. And by studying the dress of the people of various periods, it was further possible to associate this harmony of texture and tone with the habits of people in different periods as regards clothing their persons."

"In ruins of ancient Greek buildings, the characteristic stucco texture is exceedingly rough, with coarse up and down marks. On the old Spanish houses of the pure type of Spanish architecture, the surface is not so rough but has wide brush marks relieved by smooth spots." In the same way, Professor Iannelli described the distinctive texture of the Italian, the early English, the mediaeval French, the California mission and the colonial types of architecture. He also stated that use of certain colors of stucco predominated in each period, variations being determined by climatic conditions, by the availability of different coloring pigments and by a realization that some tones harmonize best with certain textures.

Again, associating the costumes and homes of people of different periods, he said, "The rough-textured surfaces predominated in the middle ages when velvet and linen were worn since the coarser textured wall harmonized with them. Later on, as in the times of Louis XIV, XV, and XVI, when silks, brocades and satins pre-

dominated, walls were more highly finished and ronate. There has always been a sense of fitness of costumes and habits of the people to their architecture."

In this country we are witnessing something of a new architecture in the wide range of tone and texture shown by the many combinations of portland cement, color pigment and

colored sands which produce effects not exceeded, if equalled, by any other materials. These combinations of texture and color-tone in wall are partly responsible for the charm and beauty of many old residences in Europe.

CONGREGATION IS ANNOYED

By Throwing of Large Stone Against Door of Church.

While religious services were being conducted in the John Street Methodist church last Sunday evening some one threw a large stone against the doors of the main entrance, inflicting considerable damage thereto. It is said that had anyone happened to open the door at the instant the stone was thrown a serious injury would undoubtedly have been sustained by the one doing so. The culprit that threw the stone escaped unrecognized but the local police are still investigating and intend to bring him to justice. It is presumed to have been one of several youths that are frequently noticed loitering in the vicinity of the church.

The police intend to break up the practice of interfering with cars left standing in front of or near the church while the owners attend services and to this end are arranging to have a watch kept for the guilty ones. Apprehension of anyone will entail severe punishment, it is promised.

On several occasions recently automobiles have been tampered with during services, accessories stolen and in one instance a machine was put out of commission entirely and had to be towed away. More than once the glass in the sign that stands on the church lawn has been smashed and officials of the church are indignant over the continued depredations. They intend co-operating with the police to the end that an example may be made of the guilty persons.

WITHDRAW CHARGES AGAINST SPRAGUE

Sayreville Police Officer Appears at Hearing.

The charges recently preferred against Russell Sprague, of Bay View Manor, this city, for alleged misconduct as a member of the police department of Sayreville, Township, have been withdrawn, it is learned. The charges were preferred by Councilman Kierst, who resides in Melrose, at a meeting of the township authorities last week.

A hearing on the charges was held at Sayreville last Wednesday evening. Councilman Kierst was the chief witness. Following the completion of testimony by the complainant, the charges were withdrawn, without the defense being called on to present its case. Attorney David T. Wilentz, of Perth Amboy, represented Sprague and County Solicitor Richardson represented the borough.

Following the withdrawal of the charges, Sprague announced himself ready and willing to return to duty at any time that a reliable physician, after examining him certified that he was able to return to such duty. It was also agreed by Sprague that the borough authorities should make the selection as to the physician to make the examination.

Sprague suffered a fractured skull early in November, 1924, also sustaining a fractured shoulder blade in an accident when the motorcycle on which he was riding struck a large dog near the foot of the hill on the Parlin road. For weeks Sprague lay at the point of death in the Perth Amboy Hospital and it was a long time after the accident before the broken shoulder blade could be set properly. Dr. Frank C. Henry Jr., of Perth Amboy, declared that Sprague had been advised by him not to return to work and then when he persisted in refusing to report for duty he (Sprague) was acting under a physician's orders.

Trenton, N. J., April 18:—"New Jersey is ready to hear the appeal of The American Legion for the two greatest classes of sufferers of the World War—the disabled men and the orphans of fallen veterans," declared A. Eugene Pattison, commander of the New Jersey department of the Legion.

The American Legion campaign for a \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund for rehabilitation and child welfare, which has been going on in several states, is now under way in New Jersey. It will culminate in an intensive drive probably about the last of May.

"The American Legion wants the American public to have the opportunity of helping the Legion help the disabled veterans and the children of men who gave up their lives as a result of their service to the country," Commander Pattison said. "Rehabilitation and child welfare are the two greatest post-war problems. They are so closely related that they are almost one. What disabled father has not looked down upon the faces of dependent children with terror lest they suffer the pangs of privation which his restoration to health alone can prevent. Does not his mental anguish over the fate of little

children erect a material bar to his own reconstruction?

"There are 35,000 war orphans and many times more sick, ailing and disabled ex-service men whose lives the war blighted. We can not do too much for them—our debt can never be fully repaid. The American Legion has assumed the obligation of seeing that these two consequences of the war receive a full measure of justice, but we need the public's assistance to the limit.

"Everywhere the endowment movement has spread, it has met with a hearty reception. I know it will meet with that same response in New Jersey."

President Coolidge is chairman of the national honorary committee for the endowment fund and all members of his cabinet have endorsed it. Leading men and women of the country in all lines of endeavor are members of the national endowment fund committee.

Already the work of organizing state and local endowment fund committees has been begun. These committees will contain the names of prominent citizens and members of the Legion and Legion Auxiliary, Commander Pattison said.

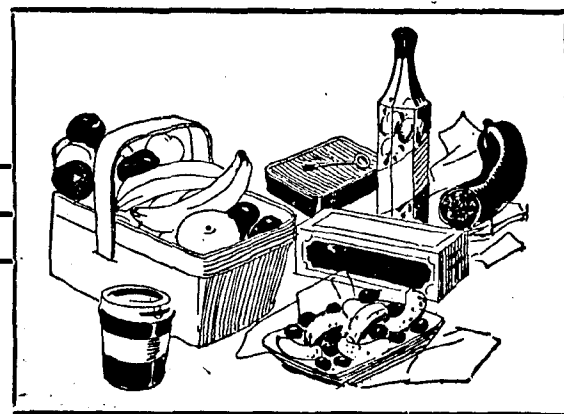
