Perth Amboy's Official Town Clock To Receive Face-Lift

PERTH AMBOY — The City's official town clock is getting a much-needed face-lift. The clock is located in the tower of the Simpson United Methodist Church, 331 High Street.

"This clock has been a landmark for over 130 years when people used to go shopping or go out on business and know they could simply look up at the tower and keep track of time. We are pleased to be preserving that legacy through this restora-

tion work," stated Mayor Joseph

The clock was installed in the

church's Italiante tower in 1869 when it was the tallest structure in the city. Known as "Old Faithful," the foursided clock rises nearly 90 feet above

the city and has long been the reference point by which most

nearly 100 years the clock was wound manually once a week by a designated clock winder

> until it was electrified in 1961.

Because clock is the official timekeeper of Perth Amboy, the city is responsible for its upkeep. The city

recently awarded the project to **Empire Painting Contractors of** residents set their clocks. For Clifton, at a cost of \$6,250. The

Contractors will begin the restoration by power washing the surface of the clock. All loose, peeling paint will be removed by hand and a full coat of exterior wood primer will be applied. A full coat of weather resistant paint will then be applied to the entire exterior of the clock tower and lower cornice.

Amboy Students Excel Over AP Exam

Biology students performed exceptionally well on this year's AP Biology exam. This exam is taken throughout the United States and other countries every May. The exam is scored from 1-5, with a 5 representing the Universities in the United States will give those students who do well on these exams College credit for their performance.

Students who score a 3, 4 or 5 usually qualify for course credit. Historically approximately 17 Amboy AP students scored well above the national average with 36 percent of those students taking the exam getting a grade of 5. 

Free Backyard Composting Workshops

Middlesex County residents will learn how to reduce waste and improve their soil by composting their yard waste and kitchen scraps right in their own backyards. The workshops will be held on Saturday, Sept. 29, 10:30 a.m. at the East Brunswick Library; Monday,

Oct. 1 at 6:30 p.m., the South Brunswick Municipal Building; Wednesday, Oct. 3, 6:30 p.m. at the Middlesex County Fire Training Academy in Sayreville and Tuesday, Oct. 9, 6:30 p.m. at Piscataway's John F. Kennedy Library. Pre-registration is required.

Through these classes, Middlesex County hopes to raise homeowner awareness on Residents will learn the correct way to compost and how to troubleshoot problems. Free-holder Camille Fernicola states, "By properly composting in their backyards, residents can help their environment and create a beneficial product for their plants."

The instructor for the Backyard Composting workshops will be Virginia Lamb, former recycling coordinator for Monmouth County. Ms. Lamb has extensive knowl-

edge in composting and has taught numerous composting classes, including those for Monmouth and Ocean Counties. The workshops are sponsored by the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management.

This is the second series of workshops offered by Middlesex County. Classes were previously held in May of this year. Those attendees commented that the classes were "very informative" and "well presented."

Workshop attendees may also pick up pre-purchased compost bins at the workshop. Bins available for purchase include the Handy Composter (\$5 each), Earth Machine (\$25 each), and Home Composter (\$29.99 each). Purchase of a bin is optional. Again, there is no registration charge to just attend the classes.



Jersey City Mayer Accuses Schundler Of Manipulating City Taxes

STATE—Republican gubernatorial candidate Bret Schundler is under fire from the Democrat who succeeded him as mayor of Jersey City.

Glenn Cunningham claims Schundler manipulated the property tax collection schedule to keep tax bills artificially low and boost his gubernatorial campaign.

In a letter to residents of the state's second largest city, Cunningham wrote that Schundler sharply dropped taxes in February and again in May. That, Cunningham said, is why quarterly bills have been higher since he took office on July 1.

Cunningham's aides said the owner of a home assessed at \$71,000 received bills for \$796 in February, \$735 in May and \$841 in both August and November. Cunningham also claimed that Schundler failed to set the tax levy and tax rate by June 14, as required by law.

Tom Gallagher, Schundler's former chief of staff, said they did nothing wrong.





Back-To-School Info On Adolescent Vaccines

AREA—Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield of New Jersey (Horizon BCBSNJ) wants to make sure that parents in its network are aware of the immunizations their children need at the start of a new school year.

Horizon BCBSNJ has distributed 40,000 postcards to parents

and guardians of adolescents reminding them to make an appointment with their primary care physician for children between the ages of 10 and 13 for four types of vaccines.

Horizon BCBSNJ recommends the following immunizations:

- Varicella -- if the child has not previously had chicken pox or this vaccine.
- MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) if the child has not had the second dose.
- Td (tetanus, diphtheria) a booster shot is due every 10 years.
- 5 Hepatitis B Shots NJ State Law requires that all children entering sixth grade have received three Hepatitis B shots.

The adolescent postcard mailing is a Horizon BCB-SNJ program that takes place three times a year to educate its HMO and POS (point-of-service) members.

Free Screening For Peripheral Vascular Disease

AREA — Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital will join hundreds of hospitals across the country in "Legs For Life National Screening Week for Peripheral Vascular Disease (PVD) Leg Pain," a free, nationwide screening program that last year found one in four people at risk for the disease. The screening will take place on Sept. 21 from 9 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. and 1-4 p.m. Space is limited and advance appointments are required by calling 732-235-7721.

PVD, caused by blocked blood flow in the arteries of the legs, affects 10 million Americans, and is a warning sign of a potential heart attack, stroke or life-threatening aneurysm. It is typically found in people over age 50, and starts so quietly that many people think they are simply experiencing the natural effects of aging. In its earliest and most treatable stages, there are often no symptoms of PVD. However, potential for the disease can typically be assessed through a combination of life-

style factors, and comparing arm and ankle blood pressure readings. Those who are found to be at moderate or high risk of PVD are referred to their personal physician for further evaluation.

POPCORN" "The Curse of the Jade Scorpion"

A Blessing For The Funnybone

Call him the Satchel Paige of cinema comedy. Sixty-six years old and Woody Allen is still pitching winners. Singing a zany love song to the movies of his youth in "The Curse of The Jade Scorpion," the filmmaker combines and then satirizes both the film noir and screwball genres while also managing to thread a present-minded commentary through the nutty plot doings. The result is witty, wise and filled with plenty of jounce thanks to the writer-director's signature selection of background jazz tunes. But what really puts the humorous bite into "Scorpion" is Woody's by-now-familiar interpretation of a comic tradition first fostered on celluloid by Chaplin and Keaton: the schnook as hero.

Actually, add a little bit of W.C. Fields and Groucho Marx to this derivation, too. For like those delightful scoundrels, Mr. Allen's C.W. Briggs is also a bit of a cad. Otherwise, the rumpled, aging little guy is the best insurance investigator in New York, circa 1940, though no one, maybe not even he, is exactly sure how he does it. Why, just last week he cracked the famed Picasso case...found the rolled-up canvas hidden in a pawn shop telescope. "It wasn't easy. I was looking for a picture, and not all those little triangles," brags the impossibly uncultured C.W.

A disheveled portrait in sepia

and gray. Woody's diminutive sleuth could be voted mostly likely to fade into the woodwork. It might be a contributing factor to his success. "Relies on low-life street informers and probably just dumb luck," is how company president Chris Magruder (Dan Aykroyd) explains away his albeit foible-ridden, Runyonesque, top gumshoe to Betty Ann Fitzgerald. Played by Helen Hunt, she's the newly hired efficiency expert hell-bent on relieving the firm of all its dead wood. And you don't have to possess C.W.'s native intelligence or fabled intuition to figure out that he and she aren't going to get along. The zings and the barbs fly, and how.

Miss Fitzgerald has Mr. Briggs figured for a chauvinist, and technically, she's probably right. In fact, he's anathema to everything her modern woman persona stands for. But while C.W. knows

it, he could neither understand it nor ever come to grips with it. It's against his type...the unlikely comic hero is hardwired not to seek redemption, but to prevail in a world that seeks to punish him for his iconoclasm. He could never be politically correct, and especially not for the sake of acceptance.

Thus while Miss Hunt's Betty Ann is the classical foil, ostensibly playing Margaret Dumont to Mr. Allen's Groucho, she is nonetheless a much more real character than C.W. and therefore saddled with mostly straight lines. Woody, on the other hand, varies character accountability when it suits the script's Vaudeville-laced shtick, allowing him the flippant liberty, for example, to explain their differences thusly: "She thinks she has it over me because she went to Vassar and I only graduated from driving school." The inherently different plateaus from whence their characters emanate may be mistaken for a lack of chemistry, when in actuality Miss Hunt is to be commended for supplying the farce with just the right amount of adversarial concern.

Given the apparent constancy of their hatred, it would take an act of magic to break things up a bit. And so presto, no sooner said than done, an office birthday party at the Rainbow Room features Voltan, a performance hypnotist portrayed nicely by David Ogden Stiers. Naturally, both C.W. and Betty Ann are ushered on stage when he calls for volunteers. Using a jade scorpion as his trance-inducing pendulum, Voltan informs both parties that the word Madagascar will hereafter put them in a hypnotic state;

hearing the name Constantinople will convince them that they are in love with each other.

P.S.--Everyone has fun at the party, not realizing when the show is over that Voltan has neglected to de-program his subjects

Later that night, a phone call from the hypnotist orders C.W. to burglarize the Kensington manse. Made theft-proof by C.W. himself, said estate is the repository of beaucoup jewels and home to typically spoiled vamp daughter, Laura Kensington, skillfully played to type by Charlize Theron. In a sleepwalk, he completes the heist with seamless aplomb. The next day, the trance removed and back on the job, it's no wonder C.W. practically turns himself inside-out trying to solve what he believes is an inside job. Specifically, signs point to someone from his firm, and C.W. even conjectures that it could be Betty Ann. After all, she's been acting pretty strange and obviously cozying up to the boss. And she does have access to the Kensington file.

Shortly thereafter, Voltan sends the confounded detective on a second filching mission. In the meantime, just to complicate things, Betty Ann discovers the stolen gems in C.W.'s apartment. But her instincts are torn. And here's where Woody divulges the philosophical key to his story of opposites attracting and hate being inexplicably interchangeable with love:

Though she vociferously detests the "inchworm," Betty Ann can't see him as the culprit, declaring that this "cockroach" of a man isn't romantic enough to be a jewel thief. Romantic? Jewel thief? It seems Betty Ann's values are a bit askew, n'est pas? In short, doubtful as it may be, it's just remotely possible there's something attractive about C.W. Suffice it to note that the stew of classical complications is made headier by the occasional chance uttering of the aphrodisiacal

"Constantinople." It all makes for fine fun.

> Figure it for art imitating life, intentional or not. But at this juncture seeing Mr. Allen with a younger woman doesn't require much of a stretch. It's that he's having so much fun with the subject that might prove disconcerting to some. Yet the real challenge Woody recurrently faces with each new effort are the inevitable comparisons to his enviable body of work: i.e.--ls it as funny as...? How does it stack up against ...? But you'll find it's difficult to answer those questions about "The Curse of The Jade Scorpion," especially when you're still under its comic spell.

"The Curse of The Jade Scorpion," rated PG-13, is a DreamWorks SKG release directed by Woody Allen and stars Woody Allen, Helen Hunt and Dan Aykroyd.



It's that time of year again. Younger children will be getting their notebooks and backpacks ready for school. Older children will be decorating their dorm rooms and getting ready for college life. Parents are naturally worried about the safety of children no matter how old they are. It*s easy to assume that when they go off to school, our children are safe. For example, when a child climbs on the school bus for that first day of school, it's only natural for a parent to assume that the school bus is safe. That it has passed inspection and all of its parts are in working order. And when we send our children off to college, it's easy to assume that the buildings they will be living in are up to code and are reasonably equipped in the case of fire. But sometimes those assumptions are altogether incorrect.

A few years ago, when the New Jersey State Police performed random testing on school buses, many people were shocked to find that out of 121 buses, 82 buses were in such poor condition that they had to be immediately taken off the road. The inspection of these buses showed there was an average of 6.7 problems per bus. The violations included inadequate brakes, faulty steering systems, balding tires, and missing safety features.

These failures proved that the existing system of inspecting buses needed to be updated. The system needed to be changed in order to secure the safety and protection of our children. With recommendations from the Governor's School Bus Safety Task Force, I introduced legislation that would change the way school buses were inspected and maintained. This legislation, signed into law by then Governor Whitman, changed the way the state inspects school buses. No longer do buses have to go to a DMV station for inspection. Instead, inspectors come to the garages where the buses are stored. Not only that, but the new law allows the DMV to check the maintenance history and operation procedures. If any operator fails to comply with the inspections, they will be fined and the buses will be taken off the road immediately. We now have a system that works much better.

Another tragic lesson we

learned too late occurred after a terrible fire swept through a Hall University Seton Dormitory killing 3 students and injuring 70 others. We think of sprinklers as commonplace. We assume that all buildings have them. But sadly there was no law in New Jersey requiring sprinklers to be installed in student dorms. A study conducted by the New Jersey Educational Facilities Authority revealed that 71% of New Jersey*s dorm rooms were without sprinklers. I worked with Democratic and Republican legislators to write legislation that requires sprinklers in every dorm room in the state of New Jersey. Naturally requiring sprinklers in dorm rooms does not make our children*s safety absolute, but it is a common sense law that will hopefully will result in never losing another student in a dorm fire.

We cannot send our children to school in bubble wrap. And we cannot stand watch outside their dorm room doors. But in situations where we can have a positive impact by changing the law, we have an obligation to act. It may sound cliche, but children are the future. We must do all that we can to protect them.

New Jersey Teaches Teens About Tobacco Marketing

You might have seen the recent news about a study from a major tobacco company that stated the financial benefits of smoking to a foreign government outweighed the health care costs and suggested that the early death of cigarette smokers is one of the positive effects of cigarette smoking.

Not surprisingly, the tobacco company didn't fool anyone with the study and was ultimately forced to issue an international apology days later. That's one instance where the propaganda didn't work.

But sometimes the propaganda does work. For decades, big tobacco coaxed and cajoled young people into thinking that smoking was ok; that it was cool; and for decades it worked. Young smokers eventually became adult smokers as big tobacco continued to regenerate its constituency by buying its new young smokers with clever marketing that focuses on youths.

But New Jersey residents know better. Smoking costs lives; smoking increases health care costs. And the statistics bear it out.

A recent report published by the Department of Health and Senior Services shows that in New Jersey, about 17 percent of all deaths are linked to smoking.

A report from the Tobacco Free Kids shows that if New Jersey achieves just one percentage point reduction in the number of smokers per year for five years, nearly \$52 million would be saved in health costs from reduced heart attacks and strokes and more than \$3.7 billion would be saved in lifetime health cost savings.

And New Jersey's young people are on their way to reversing the smoking trend under the umbrella leadership of the New Jersey Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program created through funding under the Master Tobacco Settlement.

In fact, New Jersey young people have told big tobacco in no uncertain terms that they are "Not for Sale."

This group of New Jersey youths have dubbed themselves REBEL teens, which stands for Reaching Everyone By Exposing Lies. New Jersey REBEL is a grassroots anti-smoking movement launched statewide by the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services last November. They created the name for their movement, their own goals, strategies, activities and their rallying cry—"Not for Sale."

The Not for Sale cry has been used in a media campaign and focuses on giving teens the power to break from the past and tell Big Tobacco they are not for sale. Based on the national Truth campaign, Not for Sale focuses on manipulations by tobacco companies and the importance of young people making informed decisions.

Oops, it Worked! -The year was 1996. Republicans had successfully passed the Welfare Reform Act. Liberals were enraged. Marian Wright Edelman of the Children's Defense Fund accused Clinton of hurting children. Three staff members from Health and Human Services resigned, including Wendell Primus, who predicted the law would kill a million children. Fast forward to 2001. The Center for Budget and Policy Priorities, a liberal think tank, has completed a study of census data. It finds a "sudden reversal of the longstanding trend toward single parenthood, with an 8 percent drop in single-mother families" over the past five years. The greatest changes were among poor and black and Hispanic families. The study also finds that more poor families are staying together. The authors report grudgingly acknowledge that the most intractable social problem of our age, the dissolution of the family, is being solved-thanks, in large part, to welfare reform. One of the authors of this report? Wendell Primus, the same guy who resigned in protest in 1996. He had the courage to admit what most liberals never will: "Oops, it worked!"

Bill Of Goods-The Patients' Bill of Rights sponsored by Ted Kennedy and liberal-excuse me-maverick Republican John McCain would allow patients to sue their HMOs for millions of dollars in federal and state courts. Some 25 years ago, Sen. Kennedy sponsored a bill to create HMOs. Now he sponsors a bill to sue them. Why? Because HMOs don't work! Question: Where do we get our money back after paying for a failed program for 25 years? Senstors Kennedy and McCain tell us the Patients' Bill of Rights will ensure that people get quality care from their doctors. Yet instead of having a board of doctors review medical cases, they give the power of review to a bunch of trial lawyers. Question: Who would you rather have review your medical condition-doctors or lawyers?

McCain has made a career out of trying to get "special interest groups" out of politics. Question: Why does he want to give one of the biggest special interest groups in the country—trial lawyers—an unending supply of new cases to the tie up the federal and state courts? This isn't Patients' Bill of Rights, folks, it's the trial lawyers' Bill of Goods.

Into it second season, the ads will be running during prime time shows like "Malcolm in the Middle", "The Simpsons" and "Dark Angel" and on cable networks like MTV and Nickeodeon to capture teen viewers—and also on radio and in movie theaters before the previews and on posters near schools where teens congregate.

This new generation of young people is sharp. They are more informed than any other generation that have come before them. And, as any parent of a teenager will tell you, they don't want to be told what to do.

It's these kids who understand the facts about tobacco and tobacco company marketing. They'll hopefully have the inner strength and will power when it comes to making the right choice about tobacco usage. Because of the success in its youth movement, New Jersey is one of the few states to be awarded a three-year, \$2.2 million grant from American Legacy Foundation. As a result, nine regional youth summits will be held in the next 18 months to give more youths the opportunity to participate.

Almost 39 percent of high school students use some kind of tobacco product. If current trends continue, nearly 135,000 New Jersey teens will die of a tobacco-related disease.

While these numbers are unacceptable to me, these numbers are also unacceptable to many of our young people. There are teenagers throughout the state who are empowered to break from the past—and are Not For Sale.

IRS Seeks Volunteers

AREA — Looking for a rewarding volunteer experience? Do you like to help people? The Internal Revenue Service is seeking volunteers for its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs, IRS New Jersey spokesperson Gregg Semanick announced. The IRS is looking for volunteers to take part in VITA and TCE throughout New Jersey.

During the tax filing season, VITA and TCE volunteers, in community locations all through the state, help fill out tax returns for older taxpayers, people with disabilities, non-English speaking and other people who cannot

afford professional assistance. Some of the volunteer groups even offer free electronic tax filing. The IRS provides VITA and TCE volunteers with free instruction and all the materials needed to prepare basic income tax returns such as Forms 1040EZ, 1040A and 1040. Training is generally held during January at convenient locations.

"These are great programs that help citizens meet their tax filing obligations. In New Jersey during last filing season, over 1,100 VITA and TCE volunteers assisted 70,000 taxpayers at more than 600 volunteer sites in communities across the state," Semanick said. Who are these

volunteers? They are people just like you - members of professional organizations, college students, law and accounting students, homemakers or members of volunteer or community organizations. Although an accounting background is helpful, it is not required.

Volunteers are also needed to help in other aspects of the VITA and TCE programs such as organizing sites, instructing classes, reviewing returns prepared at the sites and publicity. If you have a skill and would like to help, VITA and TCE can find a way to involve you in the program. Local civic and fraternal organizations, educational institutions, churches and social groups can also sponsor VITA and TCE programs. Tax assis-

tance generally is provided at schools, churches, malls, libraries and other convenient neighborhood locations.

AREA — As Social Security celebrates its 66th anniversary, it's a good time to reflect on the past and the future.

Its importance to the elderly cannot be overestimated. Almost 32 million Americans receive Social Security retirement benefits. It's Time To Put The Brakes On Aggressive Driving

AREA—It does not take long to find examples of aggressive driving on our roadways. Most of us see it everyday—the road racer, the tailgater, the frequent lane changer, the red light runner. The atmosphere created by aggressive drivers is scary.

Approximately 6,335,000 crashes occur in the United States each year.* It is unknown exactly how many of those crashes are caused by aggressive driv-

ing. Estimates indicate the number to be substantial, based on the violations committed by the drivers of vehicles involved in crashes and reported by law enforcement agencies as the contributing factor of the crash. By focusing enforcement efforts and media attention on violations commonly associated with aggressive driving and encouraging voluntary compliance with traffic laws in general, the number of crashes and

injuries each year can be reduced.

Roadway congestion is considered a factor that tends to exacerbate aggressive driving behaviors. As the number of licensed drivers and registered vehicles has increased, this congestion often causes drivers to become frustrated, which, unfortunately, leads to a more aggressive, high-risk driving style.

Aggressive drivers create an unsafe driving environment through their

inconsiderate, self-centered driving habits. Drivers often commit violations. multiple including following too closely, changing lanes in an erratic or unsafe manner, signaling lane changes improperly, driving over the posted speed limit, and failing to obey traffic control devices. Because of these driving behaviors, hundreds of deaths. thousands of injuries and millions of dollars

of property damage occur each year and these behaviors contribute to the growing problems of hazardous traffic conditions and those criminal acts related to aggressive driving. To adequately address these unique issues, a concentrated and dedicated enforcement campaign is needed, and it must be coordinated with an intensive public awareness campaign.

In their aggressive state of mind, these drivers may not be thinking about the human beings who occupy the other vehicles around them, or that the drivers in the other vehicles could possibly be their friends, neighbors, co-workers, or family members. It is time that aggressive drivers start putting a face on the drivers in the vehicles next to them, and realize they are not alone on the roadway. The ones they hurt may be themselves or loved ones.

NHTSA Publishes List Of June 2001 Receils

AREA—The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) released a list of auto safety recalls announced in June 2001 and urged consumers to have the problems fixed promptly.

The list identifies the make and model of the vehicle or equipment involved, with a brief description on the safety problem.

NHTSA said it is publicizing the recalls to alert consumers about safety problems and encourages them to take action. Under federal law, safety problems must be remedied without cost to consumers. Currently, 72 percent of the owners of vehicles with safety problems have the recall work performed.

NHTSA said manufacturers are required to mail a recall notice to all purchasers, owners and dealers when a safety defect or noncompliance with Federal safety standards is found. The agency urges owners to wait until they receive notification from the manufacturer before contacting their dealers to schedule the repeir work. Not all vehicles of a particular make and model may be subject to the recall.

Consumers can get up-to-the-minute information on safety recall campaigns, or information on the recall history of a particular make and model of ear, truck, motorcycle, or child safety east, by calling the agency's tall-free Auto Safety Hottine at 1-225-DARH 2-DOT (4-225-327-4236) or by accessing NHTSA on the Internet at warminates decay. Union County College Offerings

The Division of Continuing Education and Community Ser-

vices will be hosting an ESL Open House on Sat., Sept. 22, on the Elizabeth and Plainfield campuses. From 9:30-11:30 a.m., interested students will have the opportunity to register in-person for courses being offered on Saturday morning and in the evening this fall.

The non-credit ESL courses being offered are: Beginning ESL Grammar, Beginning ESL Conversation, Intermediate ESL Grammar, Intermediate ESL Conversation, Advanced ESL, and American English Pronunciation. All these courses begin in October.

... If you are interested in becoming an Electronics Technician, come to Union County College. The Division of Continuing Education and Community Services has added a new certification program to its offerings, Electronics Technician. It is a six-course training program that will prepare a person to work in technical positions in the electronics industry. In this program a person will learn to troubleshoot at the board level, as well as to the component level. They will receive extensive hands-on training on real life machines. circuits, professional technical literature, and professional testing equipment. Throughout the program, when circuit-operation explanations are given, only plain English is used. Circuits similar to those examined in the program can be found in consumer products, in military equipment, in automobiles and airplanes, and many other machines in the various branches of industry making employment possibilities limitless.

There are 96 hours of coursework to be completed in this certification program. The courses are: "Introduction to Electronics", "Introduction to Testing Equipment", "Power Supply Circuits", "Signal Amplifier Circuits", "Digital Circuits", and "Mechanisms and Servo Control Circuits".

The courses for this program begin on Sept. 24 and are held on the College's Cranford campus on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6-10 p.m. throughout the semester.

The Division of Continuing Education and Community Ser-

vices at Union County College is once again offering courses for those in the Real Estate industry. All courses will be held on the College's Cranford campus at 1033 Springfield Ave. For those interested in learning about the many aspects of the Real Estate industry, "Principles of Real Estate" is being offered. Topics covered in this course include property interests, mortgages, deeds, title closing, liens, real estate law and ethics, agency relationships and real estate calculations. "Uniform Standards of Pro-

fessional Appraisal Practice", covers The Background of the Uniform Standards, the Financial Institutions Reform Recovery and Enforcement Act (FIR-REA), Preamble and Rules, Standard One, Two, Three, and Four to Ten, also the Statements on Standards. Students must also pass a final examination in this course and it begins on Nov. 27.

In addition, the course "General 1 - Introduction to Income Property Valuation", is being offered beginning on Oct. 15 and covers income property valuation, appraisal principles and process, market area, neighborhood analysis, site improvements, description analysis, income approach, compound interest and discount factors, cash flow forecasting, and investment return calculations.




