"Families in New Jersey deserve to know if their children are threatened by a dangerous predator living in their neighborhood," said Senator Vitale (D-Middlesex), a member of the Senate Task Force on Internet Access to Sex Offender Registration. "This Internet reg-

own research instead of relying on others to notify them. The people of New Jersey spoke at the polls last November and this law is our answer."

The new law creates a system for making information about sex-offenders who have been found to pose a risk to the general public available over the Internet. Records about all offenders classified as "highrisk," and certain offenders classified as "moderate risk" would be accessible by the general public. The information istry will let parents do their will include the offender's

name, address, photograph, information about his vehicle. and a brief description of his crime.

"The registry will still give parents information about sex offenders who live near their homes, but unlike the current community notification program it will also let them research offenders who may live near the places their children play or go to school," said Senator Vitale. "After the ballot measure passed the Senate Task Force worked hard to draft a fair and balanced law. The bottom

line is that this will protect the children of New Jersey."

The law institutes criminal penalties for any use of the online information to commit a crime or to deny offenders access to insurance, loans, housing, or other goods or services. It also creates the Internet Registry Advisory Council, made up of nominees from the Governor, Senate President and Speaker of the General Assembly, to oversee the implementation and operations of the Internet registry.

Public Urged To Take Advantage Of NJ SAVER **Rebate Deadline Extension**

John S. Wisniewski and Assemblywoman Arline Friscia urged the residents of the 19th District who have not filed this year's NJ SAVER property tax rebate to take advantage of the extended deadline July 31.

New Jersey's director of taxation extended the original dead-

SAYREVILLE—Senator line from July 2 to July 31. Aphave yet to file for their SAVER rebate checks, which are scheduled to be mailed in early September.

> "It is only right that the State extend the deadline for NJ SAVER applicants, homeowners are certainly entitled to a rebate on the taxes they have paid and

they deserve additional time to Joseph F. Vitale, Assemblyman proximately 300,000 taxpayers apply for the rebate," said Senator Vitale, "My office is available to assist anyone having difficulty with this program."

The SAVER program began in 1999 in a bipartisan effort to help homeowners offset their school property tax bills.

The SAVER program was planned to be phased in over five years, with this year's average check set at \$360. But the legislature recently voted to speed-up the SAVER program, increasing this year's check to roughly \$500.

Senator Vitale, Assemblyman Wisniewski and Assemblywoman Frisca were among the lawmakers who supported the move to accelerate the SAVER rebates, providing more property tax relief faster.

"With a simple phone call homeowners can take about \$500 off of their property taxes," said Assemblyman Wisniewski. "I urge residents to take full advantage of this tax break. I am pleased to be able to bring this relief to the taxpayers of New Jersey."

Hotline Offers Travel Advice For People With HIV/AIDS

AREA — As summer reaches its midpoint, more and more people begin taking the trips they planned for all year. Traveling, particularly to underdeveloped countries, may pose a risk for illness. Bacteria. viruses and parasites can make a healthy person very sick. However, if you are immunocompromised, you can become severely ill or even die. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) offers several tips for travelers to lower medical risks for infections and for general protection.

 Before traveling, consult your doctor. He or she may be able to provide useful information, may know of places where

certain illnesses can be a problem, may know of doctors in the area that treat people with HIV. or may advise you on vaccinations you may need for the region you will visit or other precautions. Tuberculosis (TB) is common worldwide, so your doctor may advise you to get a TB test upon return. Remember to take all prescribed medications.

• Be prepared. Common problems for example, traveler's diarrhea, can occur. Make sure you have appropriate medications for this problem, bring enough of your regular medications in case you cannot refill prescriptions overseas or you get "stuck" in a certain area and cannot get to a pharmacy. Be aware that some medications may need to be refrigerated. In some areas insect borne diseases can be a problem. Bring a supply of insect repellent that contains "DEET."

· Check medical restrictions. If you are leaving the country for an extended trip, make sure you know if the country you are visiting has special health rules for visitors. These rules can include vaccinations that may not be safe for HIV-infected people to take. Make sure all medical insurance is up to date and take proof of insurance when you travel. Know your insurance plan; some things may not be covered overseas.

 Food and drink. Food and water may contain bacteria, viruses or parasites that can make you sick. Do not eat raw fruit or vegetables that you do not peel yourself. Do not eat raw or undercooked seafood or meat, unpasteurized dairy products or anything from a street vendor. Do not drink tap water, drinks made with tap water, or ice made from tap water or unpasteurized milk. Foods that are generally safe include steaming hot foods, bottled drinks, hot coffee or tea, wine, beer. If your doctor has you on a special diet, stick to it.

· Animal droppings. In many countries animals roam

freely. Animals may leave droppings on beaches or other areas; always wear shoes and protective clothing, sit on a towel or blanket to avoid direct contact with possibly contaminated areas. Swimming can make you sick if you swallow the water. Never swim in water that might contain animal waste or sewage. Only swim in "protected" areas.

• Prevent. Take the same precautions that you take at home to prevent giving HIV to others.

AREA — Did you know that each year more than 100,000 poisoning exposures occur in New Jersey homes and more than half of the victims are children age six and under? Just a few minutes - and a few important steps may prevent most of these occurrences and thousands of frantic trips to the emergency room.

That's why, for the second year in a row, the N.J. Poison Information and Education System is teaming up with Merck-Medco Managed Care to produce an educational program to help educate children and their parents about the dangers of poisons in the home. The program features Stop-and-Think Sam, a cartoon character who walks first-grade students through a series of exercises that take place in a typical home. Last year, the program helped educate nearly 30,000 New Jersey first-graders and their parents. This year, the program will reach more than 60,000 first-graders.

Here are some important tips from the program that can help keep you and your family safe at home:

Poison Safety Tips

- Spend a few minutes moving non-food items to high, locked cabinets out of the reach of chil-

- Never refer to medicine as "candy" because they often look alike and children can get them
- Avoid taking medicine in front of children, since youngsters tend to imitate grown-ups.
- Always leave chemical products and medications in their original containers.
- Use child-resistant packaging properly by closing the container securely after use. Remember, child-resistant does not mean childproof.
- Keep foods and household products separated.
- In case of a poisoning emergency, call 1-800-POISON1.



Portable Alcohol Broath **Test Bill Passes Assembly**

STATE—The Assembly has passed legislation sponsored by Assemblyman Peter J. Barnes Jr. that would enable police to utilize portable breath testing devices as a tool for establishing probable cause against suspected drunken drivers.

"In 1999 alone, more than 290 people died on the New Jersey roadways as a result of drunk drivers," said Barnes (D-Middlesex). "By enabling police to use a portable screening test on motorists who they suspect to be under the influence of alcohol, we help save lives and ensure safe travel."

The Barnes measure (A-2893) would require drivers who may be under the influence of alcohol to submit themselves to a portable breath-screening test at the scene of a motor vehicle stop if the officer thinks the motorists may have been drinking.

The portable device would test a motorist's breath and provide police with a digital reading of the driver's blood alcohol concentration (BAC). Depending on the results of the test, the officer would then determine whether the motorists should be taken to police headquarters for further testing.

Barnes-a retired Special Agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation-said these portable tests would give officers a solid basis for determining whether a motorists is under the influence of alcohol and should be removed from the road.

"Far too many lives have been lost because of drunk drivers," said Barnes. "New Jersey should do everything in its power to catch drunk drivers and remove them from our roadways. Enabling police to administer roadside alcohol screening tests should help reduce the number of alcohol-related deaths in New Jersey."

The measure was approved 73 to 1 and now goes to the Senate for further consideration.





Abstinence Bill Clears Sonato Education Committee

STATE - The Senate Education Committee released legislation recently that would require the teaching of abstinence in education programs on sex and AIDS. The bills, S-868 and A-792, are now poised for a vote before the full Senate.

NJSBA, along with a score of other education associations. educators and family life education instructors, testified in opposition to the measures. NJSBA cited the removal of the local board of education's discretion over the specific content of the district's family life curriculum if this legislation was enacted.

Opponents of the measure argued that the development of curriculum, no matter what the subject or program goal, should take into consideration the individual district's student body.

In addition, NJSBA opposes this legislation because it represents a state mandate without state funding, which if enacted, may be costly for school districts and local taxpayers.

Faced with the type of opposition generated by NJSBA and others, the Senate Education Committee released the bills without a favorable recommendation to the full Senate.

Endangered Siberian Tiger Cub Saved

AREA — Just over two months ago, a tiny Siberian tiger cub was born at the Six Flags Wild Safari animal park, Jack-son. Despite the fact that this rare and amazing birth marked a milestone in the battle to save this endangered species, this cub's mom abandoned her sickly little boy.

In the wild, the law of the land is "survival of the fittest," and this fuzzy little cub certainly would have died. But thanks to the immediate action of the Six Flags Wild Safari veterinary team, the cub was rescued and taken in by 30-year nearly Veterinary Technician and Education Coordinator Karen Yuchinski.

Yuchinski, an exotic animal expert who has hand-raised many animals including kangaroos, giraffes, antelope, baboons, bear cubs and more, devoted herself to the around-the-clock care of this needy cub assuming the role of "surrogate mother." Carting him home daily for nighttime feedings, the cub rarely left her sight. After nearly eight weeks of loving care, this feisty little orange and blackstriped cat is out of danger and on his way to a long and healthy life.

Natives of Russia and Manchuria, they typically reach a length of 13 to 14 feet, and weight of approximately 650 lbs. They have a life expectancy of 16 to 22 years. The Six Flags Wild Safari features seven Siberian tigers in its tiger section, which also showcases beautiful white Bengal tigers.

According to Yuchinski, Rocky Jr. will be introduced to the general public at approximately five months of age when he will be mixed with his twin sisters, twoyear-old cubs Tatiana and Anastasia. "Rocky needs to be strong enough to defend himself during sibling horseplay," she noted.

Liberty Hall Celebrates A Day in The Life of A Victorian Household

AREA—The year is 1865. To most Americans this date signifies the end of the horrific Civil War and the year Abraham Lincoln, America's 16th President was assassinated in Washington, DC. Perhaps the date invokes visions of elegantly dressed women in wide hoop skirts, large straw bonnets, parasols and gloves. A time when the country was expanding at a rapid rate, the rules of etiquette were clearly defined and the lifestyles of both the rich and poor were very different from what we know today.

At Liberty Hall Museum, in Union, New Jersey, visitors can return to the summer of 1865 on August 11th and 12th, from 10:00 AM-4:00 PM, when the museum celebrates "A Day in the Life of a Victorian Household."

A unique perspective of the period will be presented when museum staff, in a first person theatrical style, portray members of the 1865 household and staff. Perhaps visitors will meet Colonel John Kean, who at age 51, was head of the large, prominent family consisting of he and his wife, Lucinetta Halsted Kean, and their eight children, ages 1 through 16. Their memoirs, which tell the fascinating tales of living in this large Victorian household prior to the days of running water and other modern conveniences, will entertain and delight visitors.

large estate will be shared with visitors, giving both an "upstairs/downstairs" view of the period.

Remarkable photos, representing some of the earliest forms of photography, will be on display. The artifacts and decor in the house and grounds also help revive this elegant and long ago era. The belongings of the prominent family and the tools of the household staff further enrich the tale.

After a tour of the elegant home, guests can enjoy the 19th century game of croquet on the expansive lawn, refresh with a drink of lemonade, engage in other hands-on activities and truly get into the spirit of Summer 1865.

In the United States, over 58 million households own 126 million cats and dogs. That's more than half of the

households in America. Woof! That's a lot of pets. But cats and dogs are not simply pets. They often are cherished members of our family. With so many households with so many pets it seems like a good idea to provide pet owners with useful pet health information for the summer. The New Jersey Veterinary Medical Association has compiled a list of frequently asked dog and cat questions for summer and I wanted to highlight some of those issues for you here.

Do you need sunblock for Fido? Well, believe it or not, cats and dogs can get sunburned. Light haired dogs and cats or cats with white ears are particularly susceptible. Now, you don't have to run out and get Apet sunscreen. But it's just a good idea to keep your pets indoors or out of the sun on those very sunny days. Not only can the sun burn them, dogs and cats are capable of getting heat stroke as well. If you need to run

errands, leave your pet home rather than locking him up in the car. During the summer, make sure your pet has a cool place to rest and plenty of water. And try not to overexcite your pet on those very hot days. Save the game of fetch for a cooler day or the evenings. A lot of activity on hot days could prove to be too much to handle for your pet.

Do dogs need swimming lessons? Well, if you plan on taking your dog swimming, there are a few things you should keep in mind. Dogs with short legs, like Corgis, aren't very good swimmers. On the other hand, dogs with long legs, like Golden Retrievers, are pretty good swimmers. But be careful not to take your dog swimming in dangerous places,

such as water with swift current or heavy boat traffic. And while there may be some dog beaches, there are no dog lifeguards.

If you unable to take your pet on vacation or simply decide not to, and you can't find someone to watch your pet, there are important tips to look for when choosing a boarding kennel. Ask for a tour of the kennel. Make sure the place is clean, the employees are friendly, and

make sure the workers will consult your vet should an emergency occur. If you don't know a good kennel, ask your vet to recommend one for you.

The arrival of summer also means the arrival of ticks and bees. If your cat or dog gets bitten by a tick, don't use petroleum jelly or alcohol or try to burn the tick out of the skin with a match. Use tweezers as close to the skin as possible and pull the tick out. Once the tick is out, use rubbing alcohol to disinfect the area. If your pet gets stung by a bee, often this won't be such a big deal.

But if you notice that your pet appears to have a swollen face, eyes or lips, they may be allergic to the bee sting. In this case you need to contact your yet immediately.

Our pets are often a significant part of our family. My daughters treat our dog Harry like a brother. It'only natural to want to do everything to make sure our pets are healthy and safe. By taking precautionary measures, we can ensure that our pets have a happy summer. Awarding Of Vietnam Medal

Dear Editor.

The New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans Affairs has announced it will issue a medal to those qualified veterans who "were on active duty in any branch of the armed services in Veitnam, Thailand, Laos or Cambodia or the contiguous waters or airspace thereof on or after December 31, 1960 and on or before May 7, 1975." This medal is also available posthumously to the surviving spouse or immediate family member who meet the necessary qualifications.

The New Jersey state legislature has announced "It is fitting and proper for this State to recognize and honor those among its residents who served proudly and those who died bravely in that conflict...because in 1973 those same individuals were often ignored or scorned for their service to their country."

Another medal being issued by the N.J. Department of Military and Veterans Affairs is

the New Jersey Distinguished Service Medal for those qualified veterans who served in a combat theater in WW1, WW2, Korea, Vietnam, Lebanon, Grenada, Panama, Persian Gulf, Somalia, Bosnia, or Haiti.

It is important to note that the qualifications for any of these medals it is necessary that the veteran was a resident of New Jersey at the time of entering military service and is now a current resident of New Jersey.

Roberto Clemente Charter School Scheduled To Open In September

PERTH AMBOY — The Board of Trustees of the Roberto Clemente Charter School is pleased to announce the opening of the school scheduled for September 5. The school has recently executed a lease for facility space to include classrooms, laboratories, cafeteria and administrative offices at the property formerly known as the Most Holy Rosary School located on Barclay Street, Perth Amboy. All necessary renovations will be completed prior to the opening of the school in September, and the school anticipates taking occupancy in the month of August, for staff training and administrative activities.

The R.C.C.S. is currently accepting applications enrollment for grades 6 and 9, the two grades to be served during the first year. Applications may be obtained by contacting the Puerto Rican Association for Human Development at 100 First Street, Perth Amboy, where the school has its tempoadministrative office. Seventy-two students will be accepted for each grade for a total of 144 students this year. Next year, grades 7 and 10 will be added. The following year grades 8 and 11 will be added and finally in year 4, grade 12 will complete the enrollment at 500 students. The first enrollment period has ended and the enrollment is now open to students from any district, although it is anticipated that the majority of interest will be from the Perth Amboy school district.

Charter Schools are public. schools, subject to the same standards of educational practice held for any public school. For example, they must meet and exceed the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards and students are tested utilizing the standard State mandated tests. However, the charter schools are independently operated by a Board of Trustees comprised of educators, parents, community leaders, entrepreneurs and others. The quality and integrity of the schools is monitored by local and state officials and the schools have interactive relations with the County Superintendent and the N.J. Department of Education through the Office of School Choice. In effect, the oversight is greater than for district schools.

Charter Schools offer a choice to parents and students; parents have the right to register their children for charter schools and the charter schools are required to accept the students who register with no screening or testing procedures prior to enrollment. If more students register within a specific enrollment period than slots allow, a lottery is held.

The R.C.C.S. will offer a smaller class size, with 18 students per classroom, and teacher

assistants are also available to further increase the ratio of adults to students and to provide one-to-one communication and assistance to students where appropriate. Students will wear the school uniform, identifying the school to the community and offering an opportunity to foster pride in the school. This program also reduces competition among students and reduces financial burden on families to provide school clothing.

The R.C.C.S. was founded by a group of individuals with diverse backgrounds, representing the community of Perth Amboy, who came together with the common belief that an excellent education is the ticket to the potential for success for its students. The current members of the board of Trustees are: Rev. Robert J. McCoy, Sr.- President, Margie A. Perez-Treasurer, Dr. Jaime Santamaria II, Manuel Seda, Ana Maria Zevallos, Robin Andjuar, Wanda Guilioghtty, Jorge Cruz and Robin Trinidad. Ms. Lydia Trinidad-Executive Director of PRAHD is a founding member and current Lead Person for the School. The Board of Trustees is currently recruiting for all staff positions; applications can be made to the Board through the office at PRAHD.

Teens REBEL **Against Tobacco**

AREA — Two Regional Summits welcomed, informed and motivated more than 500 members of REBEL (Reaching Everyone By Exposing Lies), New Jersey's youth anti-tobacco movement, the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) announced recently. New recruits joined with experienced REBEL leaders in spirited all-day sessions at The Ocean Place Conference Resort in Long Branch.

"These summits are a great opportunity for New Jersey's young people to learn about the hazards of smoking as well as how to take on the tobacco industry," said acting Governor Donald DiFrancesco. "Armed with enthusiasm, creativity and the new knowledge they have gained, teens are now building their own youth anti-tobacco movement. They will help create a generation united against tobacco."

states to receive the first grants awarded by the American Legacy Foundation (Legacy) in recognition of the state's youth

tobacco use research and program planning developed by DHSS. Legacy is the national, independent, public health foundation established under the Master Settlement Agreement.

At the Regional Summits, REBEL teens united in a common goal to be 5.000 strong by year-end. "We have already done a lot, but think what we can do with 5,000 members!" said Joe Italiano, 15, of Hardyston, to the cheers of REBEL participants at the northern New Jersey closing ceremonies. "It is up to us to get our friends involved and I know we can do it." To meet the objectives of the rapidly growing movement, participants learned advocacy skills and how to develop community-based action plans. In innovative workshops, they practiced creative ways to deliver their messages to their friends, families and communities.

These Regional Summits are New Jersey was one of 12 the first in a series using funds from the American Legacy Foundation grant. Teens from northern New Jersey attended the summit on May 12 and teens

from southern New Jersey attended their summit on May 19.

According to recent surveys conducted by DHSS, nearly 27.6 percent of high school students and 10.5 percent of middle school students had smoked cigarettes in the last month. Preventing teens from starting to smoke is important, since more than 80 percent of adults who smoke had their first cigarette before they turned 18. Among

New Jersey smokers, one third will die prematurely from smoking-related diseases. REBEL's mission is to successfully break this cycle and eliminate the single most preventable cause of death and disease in New Jersey.

REBEL is just one of many initiatives sponsored by DHSS and funded with money from the Master Tobacco Settlement Agreement between 46 states and the tobacco industry. New

Jersey is one of only 15 states that are directing a substantial portion of these funds-\$30 million-toward smoking prevention and cessation.

New Jersey's Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program is designed to reduce the sickness, disability and death among New Jerseyans associated with the use of tobacco and exposure to environmental tobacco smoke.

Federal Ruling On Fen Contraceptives **Bolsters Insurance Mandate Bill**

STATE—In a landmark court ruling on the issue of gender equity in prescription drug coverage, a federal judge in Seattle has ruled that employers must include contraceptives for women in their employee health insurance plans.

In the wake of the ruling, Assemblymen Reed Gusciora and Neil M. Cohen said the Legislature should follow the lead of the U.S. District Court's decision and pass the bill they are sponsoring to ensure fairness and equity in health insurance policies across the state.

"As population figures spiral higher and higher, it's sound public policy to ensure that women have the ability to protect themselves against unwanted pregnancies," said Gusciora (D-Mercer).

U.S. District Judge Robert S. Lasnik recently ruled that the Bartell Drug Company-a family-owned drug store chain in

Seattle-discriminated against women when it excluded prescription contraceptives from its employee health plan.

The class-action lawsuitfiled last July by a 27-year-old woman who works for the pharmaceutical company-said the health insurance coverage violated the Pregnancy Discrimination Act by paying for all the basic health care needs of male employees while leaving female employees to pay for contraception.

Gusciora and Cohen said the adoption of their measure (A-180/A-2167) is a surefire way to establish a greater sense of fairness in health coverage for women in New Jersey because it would require insurers to provide coverage for female prescription contraceptives.

"It is a horrendous double standard-New Jersey endorses anti-impotency pills for men but denies women access to contraceptives," said Assembly Deputy Minority Leader Neil M. Cohen (D-Union), alluding to how state insurers cover the costs of the impotence drug Viagra but deny women coverage for contraceptives.

The Gusciora/Cohen measure has already been released by two Assembly Committees and is awaiting consideration by the Assembly.
