McGreevey Makes It Official

WOODBRIDGE - Declaring the imperative need for accountability and responsibility for the state's highest elected official, Jim McGreevey on Monday dacy for Governor by pledging to transform a government grown increasingly removed from everyday people under the nearly-monopolistic influence of political insiders and special interests.

With a retrospective assessment of the past eight years as an era of lost opportunities fiascoes. costly Mayor McGreevey said the strength and authority of government must be restored by directly serving the needs of the people.

"Starting here and now, the days of government by the insiders and for the insiders are numbered," said McGreevey. "The only special interests in a McGreevey Administration will be the hard-working men and women who make New Jersey their home. I pledge to work as hard as you do to make sure that gives back to you as much as it asks of you."

With the Democratic nomination all but locked up. McGreevey made his candidacy for New Jersey governor official declared that he would end eight years of "corruption and coverups" in Trenton.

McGreevey, 43, made his announcement in a colorfully staged event at John F. Kennedy High School in Woodbridge, offering a campaign speech that rested on the broad and comfortofficially announced his candi- . ing language of inclusion, middle-class values and responsiveness to public needs, and without any frontal attacks on his most likely Republican opponent, Acting Gov. Donald T. DiFrancesco.

> DiFrancesco. embroiled in a potential scandal involving charges of special treatment from a developer in a failed family real cutate project, but Mr. McGreevey did not mention it.

His specific attacks on the Republicans were over the climination of the office of public advocate under Gov. Christine Todd Whitman, and he said the slowness with which the GOP administration acknowledged the existence of racial profiling amounted to a cover-up.

"People are looking for a governor who will fight for them and who will answer to them not just on Election Day but every day," McGreevey said over the frequent applause of students and supporters packed into the high school auditorium. "Never again must we let those in government forget that our mission is to serve. One would think that this is a simple proposition, but sadly it is one that has gotten lost in the marble corri-

dors of the Capitol."

"Accountability is not a new idea to me, it has been a guiding principal that I will use as a standard if I am elected governor," declared McGreevey. "The political insiders in Trenton have lost sight of the fact that government draws its strength and authority from the people. When public officials stop listening and learning from the people they serve, government

loses the credibility and cooperation needed to achieve real progress."

"The capital of New Jersey may be in Trenton, but the heart of the state is in community centers, living rooms, VFW halls classrooms," McGreevey. "Over and over I have heard people say they want a governor who will answer to them - not just on Election Day, but every day."

a list of materials currently checked out to them, find out the amount of fines owed to the library and what titles they



Makes Right Move—Finally!

STATE—Assembly Deputy Minority Conference Leader John S. Wisniewski recently cited Verizon Communications' status-quo rate filing as indisputable proof that the giant phone company's attempts to double basic calling rates last year were excessive and meritless.

"With today's rate filing, Verizon is demonstrating that it dialed the proverbial wrong number when it sought an astronomical increase last year," said Wisniewski (D-Middlesex). who was the first lawmaker to Verizon's challenge

January 2000. "In the parlance of poker, Verizon has shown all its cards and it's clear the company was trying to bluff its way to an unreasonable jackpot of a rate increase."

regulation/rate-setting plans in

Wisniewski applauded the state Board of Public Utilities for standing firm and rejecting Verizon's recent request for a deadline extension for filing a new rate plan.

"Verizon should have thought of the prospects for rejections of deadline extensions when it filed its illadvised and ill-conceived deregulation plan last year," Wisniewski said.

Wisniewski, however, stopped one step short of claiming ultimate victory in his fight on behalf of consumers.

"All concerned parties need to continue working to ensure the delivery of affordable, reliable and competitive telephone service in a rapidly changing marketplace," Wisniewski said.





Free Seminar

Two labor law attorneys will provide an overview of employment discrimination relating to age, gender, race, handicap, whistle blower, pregnancy discrimination, reduction in the workforce and equal pay for equal work. A question-and-answer period will follow the attorneys' presentations.

Speakers will include Arnold Cohen, a partner in the Newark law firm of Balk, Oxfield, Mandell & Cohen, and Richard West, an attorney with the Roseland law firm of Lum, Danzis, Drasco, Positan & Kleinberg.

Cohen concentrates his

practice in the private and public sector of labor and employment law. He is an adjunct professor at Rutgers Law School-Newark where he teaches Labor Arbitration and Labor Negotiations seminars. A founding master of the Sidney Reitman Employment Law Inn of Court, Cohen is the host of The World of Work on WDVR-FM. He holds degrees from Rutgers Law School-Newark and New York University Law School.

West specializes in all aspects of employment law and has written numerous articles on the subject, as well as participating as a presenter in numerous employment seminars. A former law clerk for the Honorable Freda L. Wolfson, a U.S. District Court judge, he is a graduate of Rutgers College and Rutgers Law School. Bill To Prevent Sports Memorabilia Fraud Wins Release

STATE—Legislation sponsored by Assemblyman Kevin O'Toole that would ensure the authenticity of certain sports collectibles was released recently from the Assembly Consumer and Regulated Professions Committee.

The O'Toole bill, A-2477, would require dealers who sell autographed sports memorabilia to provide the purchaser with a certificate indicating the authenticity of the autograph on any item sold for \$50 or more.

Under this legislation, the certificate of authenticity would include: a description of the collectible and the name of the sports personality who autographed the item; the selling price; the date and place when the sports personality autographed the collectible, and how the collectible and the edition is numbered, along with the size of the edition.

"Collecting sports memorabilia has become a very popular hobby nationwide that has translated into big business for dealers who sell memorabilia," said O'Toole, R-Essex, Union. "Unfortunately, there are some unscrupulous dealers who sell

fraudulent items at outrageous prices to unsuspecting collectors.

"The purpose of my legislation is to protect the public against scam artists who sell fraudulent merchandise," continued O'Toole. "Consumers should have some recourse in cases where they have been sold phony memorabilia."

Dealers who knowingly provide a certificate containing false information would be liable to the purchaser for three times the amount of the item plus interest from the date of the sale.

Violators also would be liable to claim for damages by the purchaser and to additional penalties under the Consumer Fraud Act.

"Dealers would have to think twice about trying to take advantage of collectors," stated O'Toole. "We need to give consumers peace of mind that what they are buying is indeed the real thing. This bill is an important step towards accomplishing that goal."

The O'Toole bill was released by a committee vote of 6-0 and now heads to the full Assembly for consideration.

Vitale Hate Crimes Bill Advances In Senate

state—The Senate recently approved a "hate crime" bill, sponsored by Senator Joseph F. Vitale, D-Middlesex, to restore a New Jersey statute which had been declared unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court.

The Senate approved the measure, S-1897, by a vote of 37 to 0 and forwarded it to the Assembly.

"This important bill restores a principle to our justice system which sanctions stronger punishment for crimes motivated by a victim's race, gender, religion or sexual orientation," said Senator Vitale.

The Democratic lawmaker said the measure responds to the U.S. Supreme Court ruling by requiring that any such determination about a hate or bias crime be made by a jury and not just by a sentencing judge.

"A jury must find beyond a reasonable doubt that hatred or bias was the motivating factor in a crime being committed," Senator Vitale said. In most cases, penalties would be one degree higher than the most serious underlying offense.

New Jersey's 1990 hate crimes law was overturned last June based on the case of a Vineland man having 12 added to his sentence by a judge after being found guilty of firing bullets at the house of an African-American neighbor. The nation's highest court held that hate crimes should be determined by the principle of "beyond a reasonable doubt," which is stronger than the "preponderance of the evidence" used against the Vineland man.

"Crimes deserve heightened punishment if they are motivated by hatred and prejudice and bigotry. New Jersey needs a law on its books to make it clear there will be a heavier price to pay if a crime is committed because of a victim's race, color, religion, gender, handicap, sexual orientation or ethnicity.

"It's important to make it clear what we cherish as the values of our society and this makes it unmistakable that bias or hate crimes are intolerable," Senator Vitale said.

Underlying crimes which could be committed under the hate crimes provision include robbery, assault, car jacking, criminal mischief and terroristic threats.

Iron-Friend Or Foe?

(NAPSA)— It saved Popeye. Will it work for you? Will a shot of iron boost your energy?

That's iron's job. It helps produce red blood cells which in turn carry oxygen throughout the body. In fact, iron plays a major role in determining how much oxygen is available to the brain, the muscles and the heart. Without enough iron, less oxygen is delivered to cells and the result is a sagging sense of stamina.

Iron also plays a role in converting food into energy, it helps muscles contract and it keeps the immune system strong to fight off illnesses. Diets low in iron can slow the intellectual and physical development of children, decrease alertness and increase a person's susceptibiliiv to colds and infections.

Too Much of a Good Thing? On the flip side of iron's benefits, however, is the concern that too much of it may increase heart disease risk for some people with the genetic disorder known as hemochromatosis. This disorder is an inherited condition that causes the body to absorb too much iron from

food. Approximately one out of every 300 people carries the gene that causes an overabsorption of iron. For these people, iron may play a role in heart disease risk. For those who do not have this gene, iron is not thought to be a problem. A blood test or a thorough family history can tell you whether or not you have hemochromato-

Many people do not get enough iron

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. iron deficiency anemia (low levels of iron in the body) is the most common nutritional deficiency in this country. Children

between the ages of one and two, adolescent girls and women between the ages of 20 and 49 are the groups most likely to miss out on enough of the essential mineral. Dieters, strict vegetarians and athletes also are more apt to get insufficient amounts in their diets.

The bottom line

Iron is critical to many important functions in the body, and it is an essential part of a healthful diet. The Food Guide Pyramid outlines the best approach for getting the necessary amount of iron your body needs each day:

A Great Start Toward Total Nutrition

Children need six to 10 milligrams a day; women require 15 milligrams (double if pregnant) and men need 10 milligrams. If you are one of the many who may not get enough iron in your diet, be sure to choose foods rich in iron. (See Table)





Energized by Campbell's success, CBS Television offered the young singer his own TV show; in January, 1969, The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour

debuted and immediately soured to number one, making its star a household name. For the next three years, fifty million people watched the show each week. hailed as one of the best musical variety programs of its era. Glen also made his feature film debut in True Grit with John Wayne and recorded the title song for the film. In the 1970's and 1980's, Campbell continued his string of #1 hits, including "Rhinestone Cowboy" (1975), "Southern Nights (1977), "Still Within The Sound Of My Voice" (1987) and his duet with Steve Wariner, "The Hand That Rocks The Cradle" (1988).

In 1994, Glen Campbell released his tell-all autobiography, Rhinestone Cowboy, which became an instant bestseller. Other recent accolades include his command performance for the Queen of England and the release of his first greatest hits CD, The Glen Campbell Collection and a new recording of Christmas favorites. Glen now lives in Phoenix with his wife Kim and their three teenage children.



Strong Participation Highlights First Year Of Character Education Initiative

Nearly all school districts and charter schools in the state are participating in the New Jersey Character Education Partnership Initiative in its inaugural year. Announced by Governor Christine Whitman in her 2000 State-of-the-State message, the initiative is helping New Jersey educators adopt character education programs that promote positive social student behaviors and foster a caring, disciplined school climate conducive to learning.

"The Character Education Partnership has gotten off to a very successful start," said Governor Whitman. "With 99 percent of our school districts taking advantage of the opportunity to teach character education in the classroom, I am pleased to see that this program is generating support from both educators and parents. Together, they are seeking new and effective ways to promote responsibility, fairness, citizenship, caring, trustworthiness and respect among our young people."

This school year, 567 of 573 school districts and 52 of 54 charter schools have launched character education programs under this initiative.

Commissioner of Education
David Hespe attributed the immediate success and popularity of
the New Jersey Character
Education Partnership Initiative
to a strong outreach effort conducted by the Department of
Education and to widespread pub-

lic support for incorporating character education in the school curriculum.

"I commend Department of Education staff for their collective efforts in spreading the word about the Character Education Partnership Initiative and the opportunities it provides for local school districts," Commissioner Hespe said. "It is clear by the response that character education is an important goal in our schools and communities."

During the first year of the initiative, school districts and charter schools are receiving a minimum of \$4,000 in state aid to implement a character education program in at least one school building. School districts with enrollments greater than 1,358 students are receiving additional funds. This year, 1,374 schools are implementing character education activities. The goal is to have character education infused into the curriculum of every school by the end of the 2001-02 school year.

Most of the participating schools (59 percent) have selected Character Education Programs of Merit recommended by the Department of Education to serve as their program models. The most frequently used models are: Character Counts, Quest International, Social Decision Making/Program Solving, Learning for Life, and Young People's Press.

Children Act Fast...

So Do Poisons...is the lesson children, and their parents too, will be taught during National Poison Prevention Week, March 18-24. Every 30 seconds a child is accidentally poisoned. Each year, 30 children are killed by accidental poisoning from household medicines. cleaners and Additionally, more than I million calls are made each year to the poison control centers across the country. National Poison Prevention Week serves to educate children and their parents on how to avoid the dangers of household cleaners and medicines and what to do in the event of a poison emergency.

During this poison-free week, the New Jersey Poison Information & Education System (NJPIES) has asked us to poison-proof our home and to keep it that way all year long. They will tell us about general precautions for safeguarding our homes and children.

For instance, sometimes it's difficult to get children to take their medicine when they're sick. But, telling them it "tastes like candy" is dangerous because it can give them

the idea to take it when they don't need it and maybe take too much of it. Keeping cleaning agents and medicines in locked cabinets or out of the reach of children can also help to prevent a serious accident.

Poison education is vital not only to children, but also to the adults that surround them. Grandparents maybe haven't had little ones running around for years and their homes aren't quite childproof. A guide to understanding poisons, like the guide NJPIES

has created, would be useful for those who aren't used to having children in the house. Likewise, it would be useful for girl and boy scout leaders to educate their troops about the dangers of household cleaners or medicines. NJPIES created a "Babysitter's Do and Don't"

list for parents to go over with their child's care givers and to post in case of an emergency.

As a father of young children, I am fully aware how fast children can act. Children are curious by nature and are not aware of the dangers that lurk in our medicine cabinets and under our sinks. We can take precautionary measures to protect our inquisitive little friends that may save them or keep them from being very sick. It only takes a second for a child to get into trouble when our backs are turned. As they adage goes, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

NJPIES has provided my office with "Poison Proof Your Home" pamphlets, that include a guide to non-poisonous indoor/outdoor plants, refrigerator and telephone sticker sheets that list the number for a poison control center, fact sheets, and "Babysitter's Do's and Don'ts" pamphlets. I have made this literature available to you. Auto Theft Ring Busted

PERTH AMBOY — The Police concluded an eight-month investination of auto theft with the arrest Office, the NJ State Police Auto of two suspects.

Luis Diaz, 37, of Woodbridge, and Orlando Rivera, 35 of Perth Amboy were both arrested on Wednesday, Feb. 28 and charged with leading an auto theft network. conducting a fencing operation, and receiving stolen property.
