

# Gumbs Inducted Into Collegiate Athletic Hall Of Fame

PERTH AMBOY—Jeffrey D. Gumbs, Director of Perth Amboy's Department of Human Services, has been inducted into the Delaware State University Athletic Hall of Fame in honor of his extraordinary achievements in collegiate basketball. Director Gumbs, who also serves as Perth Amboy's Director of Recreation, was a member of th DSU's men's basketball team from 1978–1982.

As a walk-on in 1978, his outstanding play immediately impressed the university and earned him a full athletic scholarship. He went on to score more than 900 points in his collegiate career and ranks among DSU's all-time leaders in assists and steals. In the

1980-81 season, he was named to the All-MEAC (Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference) Second Team. He lead the DCU Hornets in steals and assists during both the 1980-81 and 1981-82 seasons. During the 1980-81 season he also finished second in team scoring with 13.4 points.

Director Gumbs went on to graduate DSU in 1982 with a B.A. in Social Work and Sociology. Currently, he oversees the largest department in the city, which indicates the offices of recreation, welfare, housing, aging, public information and vital statistics. He is a 1978 graduate of Perth Amboy High School and he resides in town with his wife, Rose and son, Jeffrey, Jr.

# Layoffs At Local Ford Facility

EDISON—Ford Motor Co. is expected to eliminate one of two production shifts at its pickup-truck plant in Edison, effective, Feb. 4 and lay off 600 hourly employees and an unspecified number of salaried workers.

Other cost-cutting plans the automaker is expected to announce include: the elimination of matching contributions on 401 (k) plans for its 45,000 U.S. salaried employees for an indefinite period. The company presently adds 60 cents in Ford stock for every dollar contributed to 401 (k) funds. The increase of health-care premiums and prescription-drug copayments for U.S. salaried workers.

U.S. salaried retirees will begin making monthly contributions to their health-care plans in June 2002. No salary increases for Ford's top 2,200 executives worldwide in 2002. Ford plans to rely more on stock options to compensate top mangers.

Chairman and Chief Executive William Clay Ford, Jr., called the moves painful and said more actions are to come in a series of necessary steps to improve performance.

Ford also is expected to warn investors of deeper fourth-quarter losses. The automaker forecasts a loss of about 35 cents a share or an estimated \$630 million, according to insiders and other company documents.

### Pelzman Is Top Choice To Replace McGreevey

WOODBRIDGE-Democrats are united in their support of Councilman Frank Pelzman as successor to Mayor McGreevey when McGreevey takes office as governor on Jan. 15.

McGreevey had two years left of his four-year mayoral term. Because McGreevey is Democrat, his party gets to submit a list of names to the council, who

will pick a replacement to serve until a special election can be held in November 2002.

Pelzman, 67, who is from the Avenel section of Woodbridge, has emerged as the front runner. Pelzman has represented the town's third ward for 14 years.

Other top choices, including Second Ward Councilman Richard Dalina and Fifth Ward Councilman Robert Luban, have

said that they were not interested in succeeding McGreevey.

Luban said, "Serving as an appointed mayor doesn't appeal to me at all. I'm more interested in the general election in which the people decide.

Councilwoman-at-Large Caroline Erlich said that the council "unanimously" supports "The field has been Pelzman. narrowed to one," she said.

# The Youngest Democrat

STATE—One-day-old Jacqueline Matos McGreevey slept peacefully in her mother's arms, oblivious to the crowd of journalists surrounding her at St. Peter's Medical Center on Saturday afternoon.

Mayor Jim McGreevey and his wife, Dina Matos McGreevey, introduced their first child Saturday, praising the doctors who cared for Matos McGreevey during a complicated pregnancy and delivered the baby weeks before full term.

At 4 pounds, 5 ounces, and 16 1/4 inches, Jacqueline was delivered by Caesarean section at 7:13 a.m. on Friday. She was named after McGreevey's father, Jack, the governor-elect said.

Doctors said that the newborn was healthy, and that her mother would be able to leave the hospital in a few days once she recovers from surgery.

Jacqueline could be in the hospital as long as two weeks.

Matos McGreevey started having contractions on Nov. 3, only 30 weeks into term. When she gave birth Friday, she was 35 weeks into term. Full term is 37-42 weeks.

"The weeks before the election we were exceptionally worried and concerned. It was frightening," said McGreevey, who coasted to an easy victory on Nov. 6.

After she was admitted to the hospital on Nov. 3, Mc-Greevey tried to keep calm by talking to the doctors and measuring his wife's progress in increasingly longer intervals, first 12 hours then 24 hours, then 36 hours.

At 2 a.m., Friday, she went into labor.

At that time. McGreevey was in a waiting room at the hospital. "I was asleep on a window sill ledge," he said.

Dr. Charletta Ayers, who helped deliver Jacqueline, work up McGreevey, who was wearing boxer shorts.

She said, "Jim, it's time. Put your pants back on and put your shoe covers on." I said. "Yes, doctor."

He followed Ayers into the operating room, where he watched as his daughter took her first breath. "For any father it is a special moment," he said.

Throughout the pregnancy, Matos McGreevey remained stoic. "She suffers in silence. Not a complainer at all," said Dr. William Scorza, who delivered the baby. Advances in neonatal medicine over the

past decades have made it easier to deliver healthy premature babies," said Dr. Mark Hiatt, director of the hospital's Division of Neonatal Medicine.

Jacqueline is the first child born to New Jersey governor or governor-elect since Gov. Richard Hughes' son, Thomas, was born in 1962. She is McGreevey's second child. He has a 9-year-old daughter from a previous marriage who lives in British Columbia, Canada.

St. Peter's Medical Center delivers 17,000 babies per year. Each year, 1,700 come through the hospital's neonatal intensive care unit where Jacqueline is staying.







# Holidays Pose Challenges For People With Alzheimer's Sunrise Assisted Living Provides Tips on Helping Caregivers and Families Cope

AREA — The holidays can be a stressful time for many families, but that is especially the case if a loved one is living with Alzheimer's disease. De-

pending on how far along the disease has progressed, someone suffering from Alzheimer's may require special attention during the holiday season, said

Colleen Varnum, reminiscence coordinator and caregiver mentor at Sunrise Assisted Living of Old Tappan, N.J.

With five years' experience

caring for a family member with Alzheimer's and an additional five years as mentor to caregivers in Sunrise's Reminiscence Neighborhoods (a special, secured area for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other memory impairments in every Sunrise community), Varnum reminds families and staff members that celebrations may have to be adapted to make allowances for a person with Alzheimer's. "For a loved one with memory impairment, any change in routine can be confusing and even agitating," she explained. Varnum offers these suggestions to help families

· Keep gatherings small and simple. "Large crowds and a lot of activity can be alarming to a person with memory impairment," said Varnum.

cope:

- · Have friends and family come to you. "Even though you may have traveled to see relatives in the past, asking people to pay short visits to you in your home will better suit your loved one's needs," said Varnum.
- Monitor hydration and nutrition. Extravagant dinners and a change in eating routines may not be a good idea for a person with Alzheimer's. Depending on the progression of the disease, the person should be monitored to be sure he or she doesn't overeat or eat something that could cause illness.
- Be aware of the affect the person with Alzheimer's may have on children. People with Alzheimer's sometimes exhibit verbal outbursts for no apparent reason. Small children may not understand why grandma or grandpa is acting so different. It's best to prepare kids ahead of time and keep a close eye on interactions.
- · Involve your loved one in a familiar activity. Depending on ability level, getting a loved one involved with a familiar task - setting the table, doing prep work in the kitchen, serving dessert, etc. - helps to keep him or her busy and feeling comfortable and safe
- · Bring out photo albums and encourage the person to relive familiar memories. "If they are happy reliving past experiences, encourage them to do that," said Varnum. "Validation therapy-the primary approach that Sunrise takes with its Reminiscence Neighborhood

residents - enables people to live in whatever reality they choose without having to relive painful memories."


- Minimize holiday decorations that can be frightening. "Bright lights and pictures of Santa Claus faces, for example. may have no meaning to the person - he or she may not understand the connection and feel anxious," she said.
- Be a e of safety issues. - A holiday u row rug, lights, candies or a change in the furniture configuration can all pose threats to a person with memory impairment. "Hyper-vigilance is necessary when there is any change from normal routine and patterns," she explained.
  - If the person becomes agitated, try distraction or a quieter location. "Distraction by conversation or an activity can work, but if the person is too agitated, it's best to go sit in a quiet place together or leave the scene altogether," said Varnum.

"Many of our residents' families want to celebrate holidays with their loved ones because it makes the family feel better, but, in many cases, the person with Alzheimer's can't process or handle the stimulation - the coping mechanism just isn't there," said **Varnum.** "While it's important to acknowledge holidays, having realistic expectations about family celebrations is key."



#### Who Pays Social Security Taxes?

AREA — Everybody who works pays Social Security taxes, right? Not necessarily. It's more correct to say everybody who gets benefits paid Social Security taxes or had taxes paid for them by a member of the family.

In fact, about 4% of the nation's workers do not pay Social Security taxes. They are:

- federal civilian employees hired before Jan. 1, 1984 (they are covered under the old civil service retirement plan);
- railroad workers (who are covered under the railroad retirement system which is coordinated with Social Security);
- certain employees of state and local governments who are covered under a state retirement system;
- household workers and farm workers whose earnings do not meet certain minimum requirements (workers in industry and commerce are covered

regardless of the amount of earnings); and

• persons with very low net earnings from self-employment (generally less than \$400 per year).

The remainder — more than 150 million other people – pay 7.65% of their gross wages (6.2% for Social Security up to the \$80,400 wage base in 2001, and 1.45% for Medicare without a limit on earnings.



7 oliday shopping. Holiday parties. Putting up lights and decorations. Wrapping presents. Making plans with friends and family. If there is a busier time of year I certainly don't know when it is. With all this happy chaos swirling around us, it's also the time of year when home accidents happen, especially to those of us who have young children in the house. So while we are busy spreading our holiday cheer please keep these simple, common sense safety tips in mind so we can all enjoy a joyous and safe holiday season.

When buying presents it is wise to follow the age recommendations listed on the toy. The recommendation doesn't simply pertain to the suitability of the child to successfully play with and understand the toy. More importantly, it deals with the safety of the toy for that particular age group. For infants and toddlers, avoid toys with small parts, which could pose choking hazards. Also discard plastic wrapping on toys immediately after opening, before they become deadly playthings for children or for a family pet.

As you decorate the tree avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a young child to eat them. Breakable decorations and tree trimmings with small removable parts should be kept out of reach of children. Older ornaments and decorations that might be painted with lead paint should be placed high on the tree out of harms way. To our young children and family pets

trees are an irresistible delight; when children and pets are near the tree careful adult supervision is a must.

While our current weather more closely resembles April than December, the winter chill will soon be upon us. As the weather becomes colder, we need to be alerted once again to the threat of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide is an odorless and colorless gas that deprives the body of oxygen. At low levels, exposure can produce headaches, fatigue and confusion. At higher levels, it can result in an irregular heartbeat, impaired vision and death.

Sources of carbon monoxide can be found right in our home. Unvented kerosene and gas space heaters, gas water heaters, wood burning stoves, leaking chimneys and furnaces and "patched" vent pipes using tape or other substances. Steps to reduce exposure are simple and can be life saving. When using fireplaces always open flues and keep the chimney clean and have it inspected annually by a professional. Always use the correct fuel in space heaters and use them only in well ventilated areas. Most importantly, everyone should consider installing carbon monoxide detectors in the home. These moderately priced, easily installed devices can make the difference between life and death. Detectors are available in all large department and home supply stores. They make excellent family stocking stuffers.

Mr. Czajkowski formerły served as councilman for the 4th Ward in Woodbridge Township for six years.


