Celebrations To The Professionals AREA—With the Fourth of July approaching, the nonprofit NFPA (National Fire Protection Association) and the Atlantic Mutual Companies suggest parents teach their children to leave fireworks to the pros, don't

touch them and leave the area if others do. In 1999, according to the National Electronic Injury Surveillance Systems (NEISS), approximately 8,500 people suffered fireworks-related injuries

severe enough to require enser-

gency room treatment-and near-

ly 40 percent of those injured

were under the age of 14.

Even sparklers can burn as hot as 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit and can cause severe contact burns and ignite clothing.

"Research indicates that children from 10-14 years of age are at the highest risk for fireworks-related injuries, with 15to 19-year-olds close behind." said Daniel H. Olmsted, senior

vice president, Personal Insurance Division. Atlantic Mutual Companies.

To help prevent fireworks injuries to children, follow the safety tips listed for injury prevention. Developed by the NFPA and available for classroom instruction, Risk Watch teaches children how to evaluate as well as avoid potentially dangerous situations.

Fireworks Safety Tips

- * Teach children about the physical dauger of Brewerks. Without using scare tactics, explain to children that fireworks are not toys and can cause serious permanent damage such as blindness, hearing loss and disfigurement, as well as result in the loss of fingers or hands.
- * Fireworks should never be touched. Children should never approach or touch any type of fireworks, or be in an area where amateurs are using fireworks. They should be

instructed to leave such areas and notify an adult, who should then contact the fire department immediately.

- * Sit back and enjoy the professional displays. The safest way to enjoy the Fourth of July is to let the pros handle the fireworks displays. Children and adults alike should give the pros plenty of room to work and adhere to all safety regulations and signs.
- * Provide alternate ways to celebrate. Give children noisemakers, hats, horns, confetti and streamers to celebrate the Fourth. This will keep them entertained and out of harms Way.
- * Set a good example. Since children often mirror adult behavior, it is important to act responsibly when dealing with fireworks and all heat sources. Don't permit your children to use any fireworks, even sparklers. Report any unautho-

rized fireworks sales, use, storage and manufacturer to police or fire departments and leave the displays to the trained professionals.

Pallone Says Cleanup Must Continue Until Site Safe

STATE—U.S. Rep. Frank Pallone, Jr. (D-NJ) stated the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) should not allow the cleanup taking place at the Superfund site along the Raritan River in Edison, known as Mound B, from being demobilized until waste samples are tested and show that the land is now safe.

Pallone also said that if the land is not deemed safe the EPA should require that the cleanup continue. Currently, according to EPA, the cleanup is scheduled for demobilization at the end of this week. and there are no plans to continue if tested samples come back with troubling results.

The New Jersey Congressman did commend EPA for listening to his suggestions and requiring Waste Management sample the waste and remove all drums from Mound B. Pallone, who was joined at a press conference at the site in March by Robert Spiegel, Executive Director of the Edison Wetlands Association, had suggested that EPA take over the clean up after Waste Management said it would remove only intact drums and would not sample the soil. Pallone reiterated these concerns in a letter to William Musynski, Regional Administrator for the EPA.

"It's encouraging to hear that al the drums are being removed from the site." Pallone said. "This was one of my major concerns, and I am glad EPA is addressing it."

"However, I am concerned that while EPA is now requiring waste sampling at Mound B, they have not developed a plan to come back for further cleanup if the samples prove to be dangerous," Pallone continued. "EPA should not allow this project to be demobilized


until the samples have come back and shown without a shadow of a doubt that the land is safe. I want a commitment from EPA that if the sampling shows that the data is problematic, a comprehensive cleanup will begin immediately."


Pallone said ensuring that the area is completely safe at the end of the cleanup is crucial, since the area will be turned into a Nature Trail where families, particularly children, will go for recreation.

The Mound B section of the Kin-Buc Landfill Superfund Site contains hundreds of buried drums of waste. Kin-Buc Landfill operated from the 1950's until 1976 and accepted over 70 million gallons of chemical waste. As a result, the area around the site, as well as the adjacent weltlands. Emonds Creek and the Raritan River were polluted, which ultimately resulted in a fishing and crabbing advisory for the Raritan River.



YOUR AREA & STATE NEWS Schundler Endersed, **Leads Cash Contest**

STATE - Jersey City Mayor Bret Schundler received the backing of seven conservative members of the State Assembly for his campaign for the Republican nomination for Governor last week.

Schundler is competing for the GOP nomination with Bob Franks, a former state and federal lawmaker who is viewed as more liberal based upon his record of supporting abortion, gay rights and gasoline taxes.

Joining Schundler at a statehouse news conference were Michael Patrick Carroll and Guy Gregg of Morris County, Guy Talarico of Bergen County, Clare Farragher of Monmouth County, and Scott Garrett of Sussex County.

Bergen County Assembly man John Rooney, who is being challenged in the GOP primary by Talarico, had previously endorsed Schundler, along with Essex County Assemblywoman Marion Crecco.

Meanwhile, reports filed with the Election Law Enforcement Commission (ELEC) show that Schundler is leading his rival for the primary nomination in fundraising.

Schundler is on track to collect the maximum \$3.7 million in matching funds for the June 26 primary, according to ELEC staff members.

Schundler raised \$2.44 million in private contributions, compared with only \$1.15 million for Franks, according to the most recent campaign finance reports.

Neither Republican has yet collected public matching funds.

A candidate who raises \$1.9 million in private contributions qualifies for the maximum amount of public funding.

Brain Tumor Pilot Study Being Conducted

EDISON — The New Jersey joined with Hartford Hospital and Neuroscience Institute at JFK the University of Connecticut's Medical Center in Edison has Cancer Center in Hartford, Conn.

to participate in a primary brain tumor pilot study.

The study evaluates the effectiveness of treating brain tumors using chemotherapy with 5-(TG) and Thioguanine Temozolomide (TEM), both of which are oral medications. It is being facilitated by Subramanian Hariharan, M.D., director of neuro-oncology at the New Jersey Neuroscience Institute and assistant professor of neuroscience at Seton Hall University's School of Graduate Medical Education in South Orange, and Joseph Landolfi, D.O., a neuro-oncologist at the New Jersey Neuroscience Institute and also an assistant professor at Seton Hall School of

"We are very excited about this study opportunity," explains Hariharan. "By conducting this study, we are evaluating new combinations of medications while also concentrating on our patients' quality of life. Radiation treatments can extend life, but often the quality of life is poor, which is a real concern for patients."

Graduate Medical Education.

A primary brain tumor is one that originates in the brain itself and can occur at any age. Approximately 90% of primary brain tumors occur in adults, representing more than 15,000 new cases every year. They are generally classified according to the cells from which they originate or the location in which the cancer develops.

"This study evaluates both the safety and efficacy of TG and TEM when used in combination with chemotherapy. Patients in the. study have been diagnosed with malignant brain tumors and have already been treated with radiation therapy or one course of chemotherapy." notes Landolfi.

Hariharan is a graduate of the University of Kerala in India. His graduate medical education includes a residency in internal medicine at Atlantic City Medical Center; a residency in neurology at Pennsylvania Hospital in Philadelphia, and a fellowship in neuro-oncology at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Medical Center in New York City. He is board certified in neurology and internal medicine.

Landolfi earned his doctor of osteopathic medicine degree at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in Stratford. After completing his internal medicine internship at Saint Barnabas Medical Center in Livingston, Landolfi went on to complete his residency in neurology at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in Newark, acting as chief resident in his final year. Landolfi served his fellowship at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City.

I Bonds Are An Attractive Savings Option

AREA — Looking for a safe and low-cost investment that protects your savings from inflation for up to 30 years and pays about 4% more than bank savings accounts? If so, check out the U.S. Treasury Department's Bond. I Bonds are a relatively new type of U.S. savings bond that provide inflation protection. First introduced in 1998, they are sold at face value (e.g., \$50 for a \$50 I bond) and provide inflationprotected earnings for up to 30 years. Earnings are exempt from state and local taxes.

The earnings rate of I Bonds is a combination of two separate rates: a fixed rate of return (currently 3.4%) and a semiannual inflation rate. Each May 1 and November 1, the Treasury Department announces a fixed rate of return that applies to all I Bonds issued during the six-

month period beginning with the effective date of the announcement.

Twice a year — on the anniversary and semi-annual anniversary of its issue date --the earnings rate of an I Bond will change to reflect an adjustment for inflation. The fixed rate of return, the rate an I Bond earns over inflation, remains the same. For example, let's say you buy an I Bond in October. Your I Bond will grow at the earnings rate announced during the previous May. Six months later, in April, the I Bond will pick up the earnings rate announced in the previous November.

On Nov. 1, 2000, the Treasury Department announced a 6.49% earnings rate for I Bonds bought from November 2000 through April 2001. This rate will apply for the first six months after their issue. The earnings rate combines the

3.4% fixed rate with an annualized rate of inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index for Urban Consumers (CPI-U).

I Bonds are sold in denominations of \$50, \$75, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000, and \$10,000. A single owner can buy up to \$30,000 worth of I Bonds during each calendar year. I Bond earnings are added every month and interest is compounded semiannually. I Bond earnings can be deferred until the bonds are cashed in or they stop earning interest after 30 years. Investors cashing in I Bonds before five years are subject to a 3-month penalty.

I bonds provide peace of mind about the impact of inflation on the value of savings. For example, if inflation averages just 2.5%, in just 10 years it will take \$1.28 to equal today's dollar. In the rare event that the CPI-U goes down so

the decline is greater than the fixed rate, I Bonds will not decrease in value. Instead, the value of the bond will be maintained until the earnings rate again produces an increase in value: Thus, I Bonds protect investors' purchasing power from deflation as well as infla-

Information about I Bonds is available on the web site www. savingsbonds.gov. The web site includes a "Savings Bond Calculator" to find out what your bonds are worth and what they're earning. You can also download the free "Savings Bond Wizard" to keep track of your savings bond portfolio. The Wizard is a free computer program that helps investors keep an inventory of savings bond holdings and determine their current value.

Information is also available by mail from the Bureau of Public Debt, Savings Bond

Office, **Operations** Parkersburg, WV 26106-1328, or by phone by calling 1-800-4US-BOND (1-800-487-2663). You can order I Bonds at most banks or through employer-sponsored payroll savings plans. Most banks also serve as paying agents to redeem I Bonds. If they redeem EE bonds, they redeem I Bonds as well.

Inflation-indexed fixed-income investments are a nice compliment to stocks or growth mutual funds in an investor's portfolio. They reduce portfolio volatility while providing an inflation hedge. I Bonds are available in a variety of denominations and are appropriate for five- to 30-year financial goals.

Identity Theft-Advice For You And Your Employees

AREA — Here's a tip for employers. Whether you em- if their Social Security card is job, suggest that they put the ploy hundreds of people of just a few, if an employee is the victim of identity theft, it affects your business' productivity. Theft of Social Security numbers is a primary way to steal a person's identity. Here is information to help your employees protect their Social Security number.

If an employee thinks someone is misusing his or her Social Security number, he or she should call the Social Security Fraud Hotline at 1-800-269-0271. They should also file a report with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) Identity Theft Hotline by calling 1-877-IDTHEFT (1-877-438-4338).

The FTC tracks complaints and will refer your employee's victim complaint to the appropriate law enforcement agency to investigate and prosecute identity thieves.

In addition to the help employees can receive by contacting the fraud hotlines, Social Security can:

 help correct their earnings record, if it is incorrect;

• issue a replacement card,

• determine whether they need a new Social Security number; and

• give information on how to contact each credit bureau and creditor to remove incorrect information from their credit record. (Social Security cannot fix credit records.)

Your employees can help prevent theft of their identity by keeping their numbers and cards safe. Once they provide their Social Security number to you when they start their card in a safe place and not carry it with them. In return, you should assure them that you will safeguard all their personal information.

It's a dream come true, if vou're a thirteen-year-old boy. Video game heroine Lara Croft. rich and classy but equally sassy, comes to life in "Tomb Raider," fleshed out, so to speak, by Angelina Jolie, Arms and legs whirling in a ballet of martial arts wonderment, her big, shiny, automatic pistols rattat-tatting with feverish intensity, she's just the gal to escort you across the Styx from childhood to teen-agery. You're no sissy if vou like her. She is way cool and kicks major league, well, you get the drift.

But this film's attraction is like those high-pitched whistles that only dogs can discern. Except in this case it's solely adolescents who hear the call of "Tomb Raiders." Loaded down with explanatory lore ad nause-



am and suffocated by plot convolutions galore, the whole megillah is lost on the rest of us. We just don't get it. And really don't want to, in a been there, done that sort of way. In fact, if you're an adult, a miscued

drenching in this special effectsladen rite of puberty will have you searching the dictionary for something stronger than boredom to describe the excruciating experience. The French ennui is too polite a description for so tedious an assault on the senses. You never realized that the second hand on your Indiglo watch moved that slowly.

In all fairness, there is a story here. Not much of one and not a very original one, but one just the same. The same goes for the historical development of Lara Croft, a derivative affair at best. Actually Lady Croft, with an 83-room mansion in the English countryside to prove the pedigree, her road to video game stardom is an amalgam paved with the biography of almost every comic-book superhero who ever donned a cape. But lose the cape. After all, it's the 21st century. This no-nonsense femme fatale for the younger set is into Catwoman basic black. the Prada look. And she has no time for secret identities either Besides, with the pendulum swung to the right these days. there's no need to hide her high birth as well as her agenda behind mask and costume.

One thing, though. Her glare.

Miss Jolie adopts an almost leering smile. It's difficult to decide if said look is a slightly sadistic reflection of her joy as she renders pain unto the enemy, or whether the inscrutable expression has far more

drastic implications. I've seen that look before and I've always run away. And I'm a lot older than thirteen. But in reminding of Mona Lisa, the attractive actress' glower suggests that maybe we're better off not knowing what da Vinci's mysterious lady was

thinking after all.
In keeping with the

Age of Selfishness, Lara's goal to save the world from destruction at the hands of Manfred Powell, a powerful intriguer and would-be dictator, is merely a lucky byproduct of her real objective. And for this contemporary Antigone, that is to preserve the family name and redeem the reputation of her dear old pater, Lord Croft (reallife dad John Voight in a rather smarmy cameo). A simple memorial on the lavish estate informs that he is "missing in the field." To wit: If you're really rich, Egypt and all the rest of antiquity is merely the field. Nice work if you can get it.

Naturally, Lara won't be successful if Mr. Powell has his way. Modestly describing himself as an attorney, the character of power-hungry Powell is the film's living contribution to lawyer jokes. After all, they make great villains in real life. So why not transfer the fact to fiction? Thus, earning the film one of its few plaudits, lain Glen as Powell is to be congratulated for that thespic accomplishment.

Of course, no film of this sort, good or bad, is without a bone of contention. Mystery writers call it the McGuffin. And in this case it's an ancient clock Lara finds in a secret room that she never knew existed. Bear in mind, she's been living in this mansion her whole life. But no matter, it goes without

saying that Manfred Powell, Esq. wants that clock. Because guess what this strange little glowing timepiece

can do. Very
good! Yes,
whomsoever
possesses the
clock controls
time, and hence
with it the
power of life
and death. "He
will be G-d,"
exclaims Powell,
the tone of his

exclaims Powell, the tone of his voice decidedly

more assertive than informative. You can't say this fellow doesn't have ambition.



Once all this gobbledygook is established, the battle between opposing camps takes place in and around the tomb where, lo and behold, resides the main whirligig. It's an elaborate, planctarium-like affair with the sort of Victorian influences you'd be more likely to expect in an H.G. Wells tale by way of Rube Goldberg. As the story goes, the contraption corresponds to the positions of the planets. Put the special clock in its place at exactly the right moment and the aforementioned command of destiny is yours. But don't mess up unless you've got 5,000 years to spare. That's how long it'll be before the planets will again be in proper alignment (the sneaking suspicion is there'll be a sequel before then).

The fighting intensifies as the witching hour nears. And in keeping with the video game that inspired the whole shebang, an endless legion of faceless bad guys pops up from every crevice like ducks in a shooting gallery. No surprise, they are promptly and vigorously dispatched by the indomitable Lara, aided and abetted only by the two or three silly young men who double as her butler, valet and techno-wiz geniuses. Yet for all the film's pretensions of cutting edge hipness, in the end director Simon West's shoot-em-up winds up back at the same stand-off that's been wrapping up action pictures since time immemorial. It's Lara vs. Powell. The traditional Good vs. Evil. The idea is right. The execution is horrible. Well, at least this time it's not decided by a Supreme Court decision.



Assemblyhan John Wienlewski'd Report From Trenton

"When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another..." That phrase is easily recognizable as the first sentence of the Declaration of Independence. They are powerful words that call to free people everywhere.

Unfortunately, the great story of how America gained its independence is too often forgotten. The signers of the Declaration of Independence were rebels. They risked everything for the ideas they believed in. How many of us are willing to do that today?

We may forget why the Declaration of Independence was necessary in order for America to gain it's own sovereignty. We forget that America was not handed it's Independence--a long and nasty war was fought for the right to live as a free people.

At the time, Great Britain was the Superpower and America was just a colonial backwater that was controlled from thousands of miles away.

America was small and had no military to speak of. There wasn't even a United States of America. Colonial America was a loose affiliation of states, much like today's European Union.

The Declaration of Independence began a series of events that we would later recognize as the beginning of a solid foundation for a great nation. What began as a group of men telling a king in so many words, "We're not gonna take it anymore," grew into a thriving democracy that has lasted over 200 years.

Taking the historical context of the Declaration into consideration, it is interesting to consider that were the Declaration written on July 4, 2001, it might not look the same. Although we still share the same principles and beliefs in the underlying message of the Declaration, if we had to rewrite it, there might be a lot of changes. America has changed and many of the things written in the Declaration of Independence just wouldn't fly today.

For example, in today's PC world "All men are created equal..." might be written, "All people are created equal, no matter their gender, race or creed." Writing that people are

"endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights..." might not fly today out of concern for atheists.

How about the statement, "That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government..." Today, that sounds like a terroristic threat.

My point here is not to advocate any re-write of the Declaration of Independence. Far from that, my goal is to encourage people to read it in the context of the times. Thomas Jefferson and the members of the Continental Congress took a big gamble on that document. It was treasonous, it was terroristic, it was outrageous. But it was right. And because of their bravery, we have the country that we do today.

The Fourth of July isn't only about fireworks and barbeques, but that is how we celebrate the holiday. But let us remember to look at the past and realize where we have been and where we are headed. We can look to the past and appreciate the sacrifices that have been made for us to enjoy our freedoms and liberties. Have a safe and happy Fourth of July!




