Sayreville Man Sentenced In Mai

SAYREVILLE—A New Jersey man who shot his father to death while the two were in Maine on a hunting trip last November has been sentenced to 25 years in prison.

Alan Michalik, 35, of Sayreville, pleaded guilty Aug. 26 to murder and was sentenced on Friday in Sagadahoc County Superior Court in Bath, Maine. Defense lawyer Jeffrey Toothaker said his client decided that entering a guilty

plea was the right thing to do adding that he hoped the judge would impose the minimum sentence of 25 years. The state recommended a sentence of 35 vears. Prosecutors said Michalik shot his father, Alfred Michalik, in the back of the head after they started arguing while hunting.

The elder Michalik's body was found in a shallow grave 100 yards behind his cabin near Route 179. The

77-year-old victim owned a camp near Graham Lake eight miles east of Ellsworth, Maine and came to the state regularly to hunt and fish. Alan Michalik lived with his parents in New Jersey. The victim's body was found after his wife and daughter hadn't heard from him in several days and called a neighbor.

The neighbor found a note written by Alan Michalik that indicated he had

shot his father and buried him in the woods, according to Maine State Police. Police found Alan Michalik the next day at a motel in Ellsworth, Maine, where he confessed, said authorities.

Alan Michalik's lawyer sought to block the confession from testimony, saying the defendant was highly intoxicated at the time, but Justice Ellen Gorman denied the request.



Record Number Of Farms Approved By County Board For Preservation

MIDDLESEX COUNTY -Nine farms totaling 485 acres were granted final approval for Farmland Preservation Program by the Middlesex County Agriculture Development Board (CADB) at its meeting on Aug. 15. These farms are in Cranbury, East Brunswick, Monroe, South

Brunswick and Old Bridge. Landowners submitted offers to sell their development rights to the State Agriculture Development Committee (SADC) on Aug. 12. The price was based on two independent appraisals which were reviewed and certified by the SADC. Mayor Peter Cantu of Plainsboro

and Chairman of the CADB noted, "This is the greatest number of farms the CADB has approved in one year and reflects the outreach efforts of the Board and staff and the interest in the program by municipalities in the County."

The nine farms receiving final approval were the 130 acres Simonson Farm on Cranbury Neck Road and the 87 acre Barclay Farm on Ancil Davidson Road in Cranbury, the 29 acre Barnes Farm on Schoolhouse Road and the 44 acre Kovacs Estate Farm on Federal Road in Monroe, the 72 acres Von Thun Farm on Ridge Road, the 10 acres Farrington Farm on Davidson Mill Road and the 53 acres Seven Kay Associates Farm on Dey Road, South Brunswick, the 48 acres Warren Farm on Fresh Ponds Road in East Brunswick and the 12 acre Miller Farm on Cottrell Road,

Old Bridge. Freeholder Camille Fernicola, Freeholder liaison to the CADB stated, "I am extremely pleased with the success of the Farmland Preservation Program in Middlesex County. We now have over 3,200 acres preserved for farmland in Middlesex County. Within the next year we plan to preserve an additional 485 acres on 9 farms which might otherwise be sold for development. Preservation efforts serve to provide fresh farm produce for our citizens and to enhance the beauty of our County. These farms along with current applications could provide over 4,300 preserved acres by 2004."

Under this program, landowners may sell their development rights or easements on their farmland to the County. In exchange, the landowners agree to restrict their land to farming with a permanent restriction

placed on their deed. The landowners maintain ownership of the farm and may sell the farm but it can never be developed. The program is funded by the State, County and respective municipality.

Participating farms must be in an Agriculture Development Area (ADA). The ADA delineates those lands which are in farmland assessment and which are determined by the municipality and the CADB to be areas which have high quality soils and where the municipality and CADB would like to see farms preserved. Both the CADB and the State Agriculture Development Committee (SADC) then prioritize the applications according to such criteria as quality of soils, percentage of tillable acres, boundaries and buffers, the size of the farm, development pressure and local commitment to agriculture.

Ferguson Fails Workers

AREA—The state AFL-ClO panned freshman Rep. Mike Ferguson in a report on the congressman's voting record and refused to endorse the politician for another term.

"Ferguson has earned a failing grade when it comes to looking out for working families," wrote Charles Wowkanech, state president of the AFL-ClO and Laurel Secretary-Treasurer Brennan. "On the most important issues of his freshman term, Mike Ferguson let working people down."

"Whether the issue was

patient protection, tax cuts or an economic stimulus following the September 11 attacks, Rep. Ferguson put the interests of big money ahead of working families," according to the labor leaders.

report also said Ferguson, 31, "voted for trade legislation that will put the USA on a 'fast track' to lower labor and environmental standards by rewarding nations that abuse workers' rights."

Overall, the organization reported that Ferguson voted against the interests of working families on four out of five key considered measures Congress last year.

"The district is more favorable, generally, to Republicans, and I've worked hard to communicate the work I've done in Washington to the people in our Ferguson district," "They've told me they think I'm doing a good job."

delegates took formal action in Atlantic City recently to endorse candidates who care about working families and unions. Ferguson was one of only three New Jersey incumbents who were denied the labor group's endorsement.

"Winning a New Jersey State AFL-CIO endorsement also earns our commitment to register union members to vote, educate union members about candidates and issues, and to mobilize union members over the summer and throughout the fall," Wowkanech said. "In this way, we will ensure that our endorsed candidates are elected on November 5, 2002."

The AFL-CIO also recently criticized Ferguson for his vote for 'Fast Track' legislation that would export American jobs and his opposition to the Morella Amendment to the Homeland Security Act.

The Morella Amendment would have protected employees who work in agencies which will become part of the new Homeland Security Department.

The amendment failed to pass by a close vote, leaving about 50,000 federal employees now under collective bargaining agreements out in the cold as their agencies are integrated with the Department of Homeland Security.







A Star is Downloaded

Parables about stardom, idol worship and egocentricism abound in "S1mOne," a delightful and whimsically cerebral comedy that delivers Al Pacino to us on a buoyant tuft of whipped cream. He is poor, poor Viktor Taransky, Hollywood director currently down on his heels.

But don't worry. The setback won't be for long. After all, this is Tinsel Town. What's the sense in failing if you're not going to dust yourself off, learn a lesson in humility (or at least pretend to) and then rise up from the ashes to laugh at everyone who laughed at you on your way down? Viktor is a survivor. However, what he doesn't know yet is that the Digital Age's deus ex machina is about to land right in his lucky, scheming hands.

Speaking to no one in particular while surveying his latest demise, he notes that this can't be happening to the filmmaker who was twice nominated for an Academy Award. "That was for short subject," reminds Catherine icily Keener as hardhearted Elaine Christian, studio boss and former wife. When his career slide began, so ended their bliss. Now, adding insult to injury, she hands him his professional walking papers. She rationalizes, "I was only keeping you on for Lainey's (their teen-aged daughter) sake." Miss Keener is splendid as the bloodless counterpoint to our starry-eyed artiste. Should any

director ever decide to cast a woman as the Sheriff of Nottingham, this is your gal.

While perhaps the lightest confection that Mr. Pacino has ever spun, and one of his few forays into fantasy unless you count his hardly cheery flirtation with the dark side ("The Devil's Advocate"-1997), be aware there is no let up in the national treasure's energy level. You can see the thespic wheels turning. And it isn't all one style. Rather, it is a giambotte of acting techniques that Pacino employs in fleshing out Viktor Taransky, who, when we first meet him, is experiencing a loss of faith in humanity, or at least in actresses. Prima donna Nicola Anders (Winona Ryder) has just walked out on his last ditch, production. do-or-die "Sunrise, Sunset."

For the most part, Pacino's mode is strictly Actor's Studio, which glibly plays like a sendup considering the fluffiness of the role. But the star obviously also delights in applying big dabs of hamminess when the instinct dictates, creating an equally lampooning effect whilst reminding that the riches-to-rags-to-riches story has noble roots in Hollywood lore. When necessary to string the whole caboodle together, he competently goes the technical route. Not surprisingly, it all works rather gloriously.

The funny thing is, Viktor is

Bemoaning the recent turn of events, he maintains that it all should be "about the work"--that personality and egos have no place in the industry.

But in reality, even in failure as he packs his Bentley and prepares his exit from the studio, he is reluctant to make time for beseeching Hank (Elias Koteas), an unknown admirer and computer genius who will later prove his cinematic savior. And Hank even informs that he only has about a week to live.

The thing is, among a cast of dilettantes. Viktor is our chosen fop. He's the one we associate with, whether it's because he's a little better than all the rest, or simply because the camera happens to like him.

In any case, our faith is rewarded. Our man is soon back on top. In "S1mOne's" one little sliver of black comedy, inventor Hank dies as promised. But in his will, he bequeaths Viktor what it'll take to turn his career around: Simulation One. It's the software necessary to digitally cremotion picture actress...one that can't walk out on you. A few taps of the keys and, voila...S1mOne. A star is downloaded.

Viktor completes "Sunrise, Sunset." We are shown one brief scene... a ponderous caricature of an art film meant to conjure Bergman and Fellini. Just the sort of thing the masses would never buy, no matter how profound the purveyor.

But remember, this is the movies. So the public responds with a thunderous ovation. The lead credit merely reads Simone. Overnight the beautiful chimera is an international sensation. Viktor is redeemed. And because, for obvious reasons, Simone does the Garbo thing, shunning the limelight makes her an even greater attraction.

The uproarious adulation supplies several humorous observations about our often undiscerning need for icons, and gives director Niccol's film its finest moments of satire.

But don't get too happy. Said ebullience is followed by phase two of "S1mOne." In this act, the protagonist discovers there's much more to this Pygmalion thing than taking bows and waxing humble. In fact, we wonder if Viktor himself believes the altruistic statements he repeats ad nauseam whenever the press hounds him for details about Simone.

They are getting insistent. Allegations are made. Ugly rumors and threats fly. But one thing's for sure: Regardless of what he said he believed about egos and the arts, Viktor's newfound fame is having its way with him.

If he is not completely drunk with power, he is at least tipsy. And when he becomes aware of that truth, the introspection and attempt at remediation that follow supply the film with yet another batch of humorous deductions.

Derivative? You betcha. But in the finest sense of the term. Someone once cynically noted that while stealing from one source amounted to plagiarism, borrowing from many

sources qualified as research. And in that case filmmaker Niccol's savvy synthesis reminds of a large, superbly researched mosaic, chock full of familiar titles. You don't have to look too hard to spot "Frankenstein" (1931), "A Star is Born" (1937) and "My Fair Lady" (1964). But that's just skimming the surface. Give it a little more thought and you'll come up with others. And still, "S1mOne" definitely boasts its own identity.

This is Mr. Niccol's third dabble into the brave new hitech world of what used to be referred phony to as baloney...before it got so real that it got scary. Previously he wrote and directed the futuristic "Gattaca" (1997) and penned the screenplay for "The Truman Show" (1998). So he knows his way around terms like artificial intelligence, synthetic life, and virtual reality. Hence the happy surprise is that, in addition to his acumen at the cutting edge of what is and is not, he's also a versatile director with a fine sense of what is and is not funny. Because there's certainly nothing fake about the laughs "S1mOne" delivers. I wonder, though...you think he can tell that my clone wrote this review?

Paraskevidekatriaphobics Beware!

Paraskevidekatriaphobia Is The Fear Of Friday The 13th

Paraskevidekatriaphobics those afflicted with a morbid, irrational fear of Friday the 13th - are no doubt cringing as we strike yet another calendrical event.

The superstitious coupling of Friday the 13th with calamity is very old in western culture.

The sixth day of the week and the number 13 both have foreboding reputations dating from ancient folklore; their inevitable conjunction from one to three times a year portends more misfortune than some credulous minds can bear.

Folklorists say it's probably the most widespread superstition in America (and no doubt other parts of the world, as well). Some people won't go to work on Friday the 13th. Some won't eat in restaurants. Many wouldn't think of setting a wedding on the date.

How many people at the dawn of the new millennium still suffer from this phobia? According to Dr. Donald Dossey, a therapist specializing in the treatment of phobias and credited with coining the term "paraskevidekatriaphobia," as many as 21 million do in the United States alone.

If that's correct, something percent eight like Americans are still in the grips of a very ancient superstition.

It is said ... If 13 people sit down to dinner together, all will die within the year. The Turks so disliked the number 13 that it was practically expunged from their vocabulary (Brewer, 1894).

Many cities do not have a 13th Street or a 13th Avenue. Many buildings don't have a 13th floor.

If you have 13 letters in your name, you will have the devil's luck (Jack the Ripper, Charles Manson, Jeffrey Dahmer, Theodore Bundy and Albert De Salvo all have 13 letters in their names).

Oftentimes, explanations of the origins of folk beliefs come off sounding like fanciful folktales themselves.

It's said, for example, that fears surrounding the number 13 are as old as the act of counting. Primitive man had only his 10 fingers and two feet to represent units, so he could not count higher than 12. What lay beyond that - "13" was an impenetrable, frightening mystery, thus a source of superstition.

In any case, despite whatever terrors the numerical unknown held for their primitive forebears, ancient civilizations were not unanimous in their dread of 13. The Chinese regarded the number as lucky, historians say, as Egyptians in the time of the pharaohs.

To the Egyptians, life was a quest for spiritual ascension which unfolded in stages - 12 in this life and a thirteenth beyond, thought to be the eternal afterlife. The number 13 therefore symbolized death not in terms of dust and decay, but as a glorious and desirable

transformation. Egyptian civilization perished, this explanation continues, but the symbolism of the number 13 lived on only to be corrupted by other cultures.


Another explanation suggests the number 13 was purposely vilified by the priests of patriarchal religions because it represented femininity. Thirteen was revered in prehistoric goddess-worshipping cultures because it corresponded to the number of lunar (menstrual) cycles in a year $(13 \times 28 = 364 \text{ days})$. As the solar calendar triumphed over the lunar with the rise of ancient civilization, so did the number 12 over the number 13.

One of the more concrete early taboos connected with the number 13 is said to have started with the Hindus, who believed that it was always unlucky for 13 people to gather in one place - say, for dinnet.

Exactly the same superstition has been attributed to the Vikings, though many scholars regard this and the accompanying mythological explanation as apocryphal. In any case, the story has been told as follows:

Twelve gods were invited to a banquet at Valhalla. Loki, the Evil One, god of mischief, had been excluded from the guest list but chose to crash the party, bringing the total to 13. True to form, Loki raised hell by inciting Hod, the blind god of winter, to attack Balder the Good, who happened to be a favorite of the gods. Hod took a spear of mistletoe offered by Loki and hurled it at Balder, killing him instantly. All of Valhalla grieved. And although one might take the moral of this story to be "Beware of uninvited guests bearing mistletoe," the Norse themselves supposedly concluded that 13 people at a dinner party is just plain bad luck.

As if to prove the point, the Bible tells us that there were exactly 13 present at the Last Supper. One of the guests went on to betray Jesus Christ, setting the stage for the crucifixion, which took place on a Friday.

half of the committee, who watched U.S. Senate Democrats vote down, on ideological grounds, President Bush's appointment of Texas Supreme Court Justice Priscilla Owen to serve on the 5th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals.

It's likely that Albin, who has never served on the bench at any level, will spend the next twenty years on the state's highest court, yet the Judiciary Committee members seemed uninterested in making an inquiries regarding his judicial philosophy.

There were no questions regarding the death penalty, same sex marriage, parental notification, Megan's Law, or Mount Laurel.

One leader of social conservatives commented that it may be time to simply stop holding hearings on key appointments, hinting that the Judiciary Committee is really nothing more than a rubber stamp to approve gubernatorial appointments.

Another pundit noted that senators can ask questions of a nominee and still vote to send their name to the full Senate.

A Republican legislator not on the committee said that asking Albin whether he would have joined in a recent Supreme Court opinion would have been a perfectly legitimate tactic.
