

"December 7, 1941...a date that will live in infamy..." spoken by These words, President Franklin D. Roosevelt to a joint session of Congress on the day after the United States was deliberately and unexpectedly struck by the forces of the Empire of Japan, are the words that started this nation's involvement in World War II. With these words President Roosevelt permanently moved America to the center of the world stage.

Two days before, on Saturday, Dec. 6, President Roosevelt sent a message to the Emperor of Japan in an effort to avoid war. President Roosevelt received no reply. Later, the United States began to intercept a 14-part Japanese diplomatic message. At first, only the first 13 parts were decoded. While it was clear that the Japanese were no longer interested in a peaceful solution and was planning an unknown.

On Sunday, Dec. 7, the last part of the message was received, decoded, and passed

along to the President. It said that all diplomatic relations with the United States were to be cut off. Another message said to deliver the main message to Americans at 1 p. m. What the War Department realized is that 1 p. m. corresponds to the morning hours in the Pacific. By the time they were able to send an alert to Pearl Harbor, the attack had been underway for hours. The military personnel and civilians were caught completely off guard.

American aircraft were left parked wingtip to wingtip and battleships were lined up neatly in a row. Pearl Harbor was at peace. There really was no reason to think anything else. The Japanese surprise attack cost the lives of 2,335 servicemen and 68 civilians, and wounded over 1,100 more.

Before Dec. 7, 1941 there was a feeling in this nation that America was somehow isolated from the rest of the world. That two great oceans provided an impenetrable barrier to anyone who would wish this nation harm. We were wrong.

The attacks of Sept. 11th attack, the target was have again proved that America is not isolated. So for every reason that matters, we should take the time to thank and support our many veterans

who have helped to keep us safe. Let's thank the courageous men and women who fought for our freedoms and our way of life. We owe them a great deal of gratitude.

This year marks the 61th anniversary of the surprise attack on Pearl Harbor. A serviceman who turned 18 on that day, would be 79 years old today. The men who survived that day are our grandfathers and uncles, they are our neighbors, or they live in the nearby veteran's home. Many of them have passed on. If we can, let's find these survivors and thank them for their service. Let us hear their message that the prices of our freedom is vigilance and preparedness.

Dec. 7, 1941 and Sept. 11, 2001 are two separate and distinct events. Perhaps one cannot be adequately discussed with reference to the other. But the lessons these dates teach are the same.

We may not be able to comprehend the anger that Americans felt on Dec. 7, 1941. But Sept. 11, 2001 gives us a pretty good idea.

To The Rescue: An Emergency Fund Can Help Plug The Gap

AREA—If you learned suddenly that your home needed a new roof, could you access the cash to pay for it before your possessions were drenched? What if you lost your job? Would you be able to cover your monthly bills? You could with an emergency fund, says the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants (NJSCPA). If you don't already have one, now is a great time to establish a plan for 2003.

Everyone should have some easily accessible short-time savings stashed away. Having an emergency fund means that when the unexpected happens-whether it's a job loss or an unanticipated home repairyou'll have the resources to meet your day-to-day living expenses. Without an emergency fund, you may have to resort to credit cards and could find yourself paying off debt at doubledigit interest rates for months or years to come. Or you may be forced to sell assets, such as stocks, when the market is down, resulting in a loss.

How Big An Emergency Fund Do I Need?

While CPAs generally recommend that you set aside enough money in your emergency fund to cover three to six months of living expenses, your individual circumstances may dictate that you have no more or less. Keep in mind that this recommendation doesn't equate to three to six months' of your current salary. You just need to set aside enough to cover your basic monthly expenses.

Building an emergency fund requires discipline. You may have to reduce spending to free up extra cash. The best advice is to treat your savings as you would a bill. If you determine you need \$12,000, set an affordable amount you can put away each month, without fail, until you reach your goal.

Where Do I Stash The Cash In My Emergency Fund?

There are two basic requirements: (1) your money should be in a safe investment; and (2) you should be able to access it quickly. CPAs generally suggest you use a savings account at a bank or credit union or a money market account. Money market accounts come in two types bank accounts and mutual funds.

Both have relatively low yields, but high liquidity, and both typically pay more interest or dividends than savings accounts because they are considered less transaction-oriented. It's important to know that money market mutual funds are not insured, but since they invest in highly liquid, safe securities, they are considered relatively risk-free by most planners.

You may have to meet a minimum balance requirement to open your money market account or mutual fund, and you may be limited to only a few free checks each month. If you decide to go this route, look for a money market account or fund with a high interest or dividend rate, low fees, and check writing features. Some even provoke an ATM card, which may or may not be good, depending on how disciplined you are. Remember, your emergency fund should exist for things like unemployment, medical bills, or a new furnace-not a weekend at the beach.

What's In It For Me?

Saving money on your own is seldom as much fun as spending it, but like most other things, it becomes easier over time. The peace of mind that comes from knowing you have the financial resources to carry you through roughtimes can be worth the sacrifices you make now. And remember, should you have to tap the money in your fund for an emergency, repay it as soon as you can.

CPAs Highlight Commitment To Ethics In Continuing Education Program

ROSELAND—Certified public accountants are unique among major professions in their emphasis on continuing education. In January, they will have a new required course, "New Jersey Law & Ethics."

"This is a very positive, proactive step that has been taken by the New Jersey State Board of Accountancy," says Howard Bookbinder, CPA, of Fair Lawn, who will serve as one of the instructors for the new course. Every CPA licensed in New Jersey is required to earn 120 hours of additional education credit every three years.

"It's the equivalent of spending one week every year going to school, just to maintain your professional standing," Bookbinder says. Starting in January, four of those credits now will have to be a state board approved law and ethics course.

"The new course will review the laws and regulations that affect CPAs, placing special emphasis on ethics. When I earned my CPA, this was part of the exam," says Bookbinder who has been practicing CPA in New Jersey for more than 40 years. "Now, I understand that material on ethics is not included in the test.

"This is a profession that has been built on fundamental principles of independence, objectivity and integrity," Bookbinder says. "We are determined to bring that back to the forefront in light of the current media frenzy, recognizing that for 99 percent of


my colleagues, it has never been otherwise.


"Continuing education is a core value of our profession," says James Hardenberg, CPA, a certified association executive who oversees educational programs conducted by the New Jersey Society of CPAs. "For as long as we can recall, CPAs have been investing their time and energy in education, whether it was required or not. The new land and ethics course will help reinforce our commitment to our professional standards."

Of the 120 CPE credits required for license renewal in the 2003-05 reporting period, 72 must be in technical subjects (including 24 in accounting and auditing for those in public practice) and four in New Jersey Law 7 Ethics.

The remaining 44 credits can be used for personal/pro-

fessional development subject matter, excluding marketing and practice development programs, which do not qualify for New Jersey credit.









"You can't fight City Hall." So goes the chant of the wise guys. Perhaps I was a fool in not heeding this time honored advice. I took on Mayor Vas in a legal tussle. This Bond is Not Enough

You plunks yer money down and you gets what you paid for. It is what it is. More of the same. No more, no less. The same ol', same ol'. The same old soup. Business as usual. In other words, the James Bond 007 tradition lives on with "Die Another Day." And that's a good thing. After twenty films in forty years, there is something heartening about the immutability of Albert "Cubby" Broccoli's dynastic spy series.

Those who portray him may come and go. But it matters not. Because even comparing the Bonds has by now become a part of being a fan: i.e.- The young Sean Connery was best. Roger Moore was too tidy. Male supermodel George Lazenby ("On Her Majesty's Secret Service"-1969) was a one-hit wonder that we're still trying to figure out. Ooh, and let's not forget the forgettable Timothy Dalton, who made the mistake of trying to clean up Bond's act. All of which brings us to Pierce Brosnan, the current Mr. Bond. He's no great shakes, but at least he gives you an honest day's work. Even with the passing of Mr. Broccoli in 1996, the recipe for success remains the same: First you start with the aforementioned secret agent...the one with the license to kill. Add a megalomaniacal villain hell-bent on taking over or destroying the world (either ambition will do). Add a drop-dead sexy woman (she can either be a villain or an ally, or, there can be one of each...sort of a literary allusion. And don't worry; part of James's unique talent is sorting out which is which). Then add a formulaic plot. It needn't have any truly novel twists, but it must be able to accommodate the following key ingredients: plenty of sexual innuendo, travelogue-quality scenery, oodles of special effects and gadgetry, and more derringdo than you could possibly fit in one film.

Now take these components and shake. Never stir! And if mixed correctly, you have created the comfort food of film. An action-laden reaffirmation that some things never change. As a respite from the madding crowd of amorphous, nihilistically inclined pictures that have, for the time being, commandeered

the action segment of Filmdom, "Die Another Day" serves its purpose. That's about it. And unless you're an aficionado of the series, before long it will submerge into your memory of things Bond, blending into the big blur of exotic locales, repetitively stirring scores and the impossible predicaments that somehow have a way of working out. For truth be told, none, save for "Goldfinger" (1964), is a particularly great film. Though, some would contend that "From Russia With Love" (1963) is the standout. But in any case, there are few who will argue that any of the others represents any notable accomplishment in cine-

Mr. Brosnan, perhaps the prettiest gent to play the man who every woman wants and every man wants to be, tries to make up with looks what he lacks in machismo. But in all fairness, while we wait in vain for someone to equal Connery's 007, it's worth suggesting that in one important way, Brosnan is a Bond for today.

For although the super-sleuth has always been a little slow to change with the fad, over the years he has indeed become less the womanizer and a bit more sensitive to the fairer sex. Thus

in "Die Another Day," a more considerate James restricts himself to only two love interests. They are Halle Berry as Jinx---can't tell you who she works for; and Rosamund Pike as Miranda Frost---ditto the employer information. And to Brosnan's credit, probably bringing into the fold a new generation of Bond fan in the bargain, he manages to be politically correct without giving away the store.

Of course the villain this goround isn't restricted by any such conventions, and can be as evil as always. The rogue son of a North Korean bigwig, he plans world domination via his handydandy, one-weapon-does-it-all invention known as Icarus. Want to change the climate of a particular region and thereby ruin its economy?

Icarus is your weapon. Want to swat enemy nuclear warheads out of the sky like flies? This is your baby. Want to make the world grovel at your feet? Look no further. Icarus is all you need. Problem is, in "Die Another Day" we can't always tell who the villain is. Which brings us back to that PC stuff. Because director Lee Tamahori's plot, penned by Neal Purvis and Robert Wade, is one of conspicuous inclusion, it addresses a whole punch list of hot topics that reads like little Johnny's latest current events lesson. But while global warming and terrorism only receive lip service, gene therapy is given a starring role. And because the bad guy in this

episode can't resist a technological trick, naturally he changes his identity. No, he doesn't become Dolly the sheep. But good guess. He does become a wolf in sheep's clothing, so to speak.

It's a variation on a theme...cliched, yes, but one of drama's great old ploys all the same. The ancients used masks. Fast-forward to fifty years ago and plastic surgery is all the rage in film, like when accused wife murderer Bogart gets a back alley face change in Dark Passage (1947).

And now here we are, technology once again our greatest boon and our fiercest bane. As part of making the latest Bond contemporary, he is tossed into the age of uncertainty.

That's right. Can't tell the good guys from the bad guys. But perhaps we can recognize the metaphor as it applies to us: i.e.-can't tell the honest corporate leaders from the common thieves who would deprive your grandma Sadie of the 401K she's been depending on; or, can't tell the pious holy man from the brainwashed zealot sworn to kill you if you don't switch to his brand of praying.

Luckily, our latest Bond is well equipped to muddle through the indistinct shadows of gray

besetting mankind. He even has, courtesy of quartermaster Q (John Cleese), an Aston Martin Vanquish that can instantly become invisible, and with him in it yet. So it really wouldn't be giving away too much to inform that, by film's end, James Bond has a pretty good idea of who's wearing the black hats and who's donning the white ones. And, although it's at least twenty minutes too long, this latest spy gambit happily reminds why we go to the movies in the first place.

Sure, metaphors are dandy. I like to spot at least one a day. However, more often than not, we are drawn to the picture show to escape from the harsh realities referred to in those metaphors, and perhaps exact a little vicarious revenge in the process. But more important in an increasingly cynical world, we seek assurance that the old values of morality and courtesy are still valid and that, at least in the movies, good still wins out over evil.

Thanks to "Die Another Day," 007 lives to convey that thought in yet another century.

"Die Another Day," rated PG-13, is an MGM/UA release directed by Lee Tamahori and stars Pierce Brosnan, Halle Berry and Toby Stephens. Running time: 132 minutes

Sessions conference is being attended by more than 30,000 scientists, cardiologists, medical researchers, surgeons, other medical professionals, exhibitors and media from throughout the world.

This pioneer study examined the relationship between the feeling of being pressed for time and impatience with the development of hypertension in young urban adults. Time urgency/impatience (TUI) is a major component of so-called Type A behavior patterns. Other characteristics of Type A are competitiveness, hostility, tenseness and aggressiveness.

"Our findings indicate that TUI assessed during young adulthood is associated with increased risk of hypertension years later," says lead author

LiJing L. Yan, Ph.D., research assistant professor of preventive medicine at Northwestern University in Chicago, "In general, the stronger the feelings of impatience and time pressure, the higher the risk of developing hypertension in the long term."

Numerous studies have examined the intense traits that characterize Type A personality and their potential effects on health. But results have been inconsistent, leading some researchers to explore whether different components of Type A have different health risks.

"The TUI component of Type A is characterized by a persistent preoccupation with time and pronounced impatience," she says. "To our knowledge, this is the first

study to concentrate on the relationship between TUI and hypertension, a very common health condition and a strong risk factor for heart disease.

"In the past, more attention has been paid to the hostility component in Type A, but TUI has never been adequately examined as a separate trait, despite suggestions that it may be linked to adverse health outcomes."

"The association between TUI and development of hypertension may be mediated by a variety of lifestyle and other psychosocial factors," says Kiang Liu, Ph.D., senior author and professor of preventive medicine at Northwestern University. "The complex processes involved in the link between chronic exposure

to TUI and hypertension are not yet well understood."

He notes that more studies are needed to confirm these findings and to identify potential biological mechanisms.

"It's important to realize that these modifiable personality traits, and reducing TUI tendency may possibly decrease future health risks related to TUI," Liu says.

Other co-authors are Karen A. Matthews, Ph.D.; Martha L. Daviglus, M.D., Ph.D.; T. Freeman Ferguson, M.P.H., M.S.P.H.; and Catarina Kiefe, M.D., Ph.D.

Hospital Now Offers Left Atrial Ablation

NEW BRUNSWICK --Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, among a handful of centers in the country, now offers a less invasive technique to eliminate atrial fibrillation. Known as Left Atrial Ablation, this new procedure is more successful than current cardiology catheterbased techniques and less invasive than traditional surgical techniques. Robert Wood Johnson is one of the two cen-

ters in New Jersey that uses microwave energy to treat atrial fibrillation.

According to the American Heart Association, atrial fibrillation, found in 1-2 million Americans, occurs when the two small upper chambers of the heart, known as the atria, quiver instead of beating correctly. As a result, a blood clot may occur because the blood in the atria is not pumped out completely. A stroke may result if a part of the blood clot leaves the heart and gets stuck in an artery in the brain. Approximately 15 percent of strokes are caused this way.

The procedure, which began

transfer of electrical signals, thus preventing atrial fibrillation.

"Right now we are only doing this in conjunction with other procedures," says Dr. Mark Anderson, Director of the Minimally Invasive Cardiac Surgical Program At Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital and Associate Professor of Surgery at UMD-NJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, who performs the surgery. "This will be offered as a stand-alone procedure for atrial fibrillation in the near future using a minimally invasive technique."


Currently, six patients have undergone left atrial ablation at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital with a 100 al, there is approximately an

rhythm, which is a more efficient rhythm for the heart. Prior to the procedure, the heart's rhythm is irregular. This conversion allows the patient to be taken off many medications, the most important of which is Coumadin, a blood thinner with a possible side effect of bleeding. In addition, the patient's risk of a stroke is nearly eliminated. Left atrial ablation has been

performed with procedures including Coronary Artery Bypass Surgery (CABG) and aortic and mitral valve surgeries. The technique is suitable for anyone with chronic atrial fibrillation, meaning they have had it for more than six months and are not responding to medications, and who can endure an operation.
