

Pathmark Continues Recovery

CARTERET Pathmark Stores, Inc., sold \$200 million worth of 10-year bonds in the private placement market, said sources recently. Desduer Kleinwort Wasserstein and Credit Suisse First Boston were the joint-book managers for the sale, the source said.

Pathmark is a regional supermarket headqugancred in Carteret currently operating 141 supermarkets primarily in the New York-New Jersey and Philadelphia metropolitan areas.

Pathmark emerged from bankruptcy on Sept. 19, 2000, just 60 days after filing for Chapter 11, saving 10,000 jobs.

Pathmark had hoped a purchase by Royal Ahold could fuel it with much-needed capital, but the deal fell through under anti-trust scrutiny. The firm emerged from bankruptcy as a public company with \$1 billion less debt.

Pathmark borrowed \$200 million at an interest rate of 8.75 percent by issuing bonds. known as 'senior subordinated notes' that will mature in **2012**. On Jan. 11, Pathmark announced it would issue the notes to repay indebtedness.

Pathmark said it met its fourth-quarter and full-year earnings forecast, as a higher customer count helps to offset soft sales during the holiday season. The company also reported it expects a modest increase at stores open at least a year for the quarter, ending Feb. 2.

Pathmark said it continues to expect fourth-quarter earnings per share in a range of 29 cents to 34 cents per share, and sees fiscal 2001 earnings of 80 cents to 85 cents per share.

The retailer expects earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization (EBITDA) for the fourth-quarter to be in the range of \$50 million to \$55 million. For 2001, Pathmark expects EBIT-DA in a range of \$185 million to \$190 million.

"Sales were soft during our holiday season, a trend we believe has been experienced by many of our competitors," Jim Donald, chairman and

chief executive of Pathmark, said in a press release in December, "We continued, however, to see increases in customer count despite this softness. So far, in January, we are seeing a more normal sales trend. We continue to be optimistic regarding fiscal 2002."

In the wake of the World Trade Center tragedy, Pathmark, its customers, and associates raised \$600,000 in donations which were distributed to four organizations involved in assisting families who suffered a loss on Sept. 11: The Twin Towers Fund, administered by the New York City Mayor's office, the American Red Cross, the New York State World Trade Center Fund, managed by Governor Pataki's office and the Burn Unit of Staten Island University Hospital.

Pathmark addition. donated \$100,000 worth of product to agencies and organizations, including rescue efforts in the vicinity of Ground Zero as well as local organizations such as police, fire and emergency services throughout New York and New Jersey.

One of the company's stores, Pike Slip Pathmark located in Lower Manhattan, was used as a command center by both the National Guard and the New York City Police Department from Sept. 11-28. This store was used as an immediate source for food and medical supplies, as well as a communications post.





Cryan To Vice-Chair Regulatory **Oversight Committee**

MIDDLESEX COUNTY-Assemblyman Joseph Cryan was officially appointed by Assembly Speaker Albio Sires to serve as Vice-Chairman of the Assembly Regulatory Oversight Committee recently.

Cryan, a restaurateur, is serving his first term in the General Assembly.

"In my opinion, committee oversight is an integral part of the legislative process where bills are improved in the best interest of the state and our constituents," said Cryan (D- Union). "It's an honor and a privilege to serve on a committee responsible for reviewing regulatory policy that can affect the business community and the state's economy."

In general, the Assembly Regulatory Oversight Committee will take under consideration bills dealing with departmental rules and regulations, legislative intent and regulatory affairs.

Cryan also has secured prestigious positions on both the Assembly Budget Com-mittee and the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

"These panels will have important roles to play as the Legislature attempts to address a revenue shortfall approaching \$2.5 billion," said Cryan. "We will be looking at every potential way to trim the fat and cap spending in order to improve our finances."

The Budget Committee will hold public hearings and take testimony from each department of state government before submitting an approved final state budget to the full Assembly.

The Appropriations Committee will oversee legislation "to appropriate State funds or which involves an actual or potential appropriation or expenditure of \$100,000 or more of State or other public funds."

MIDDLESEX COUNTY—The graduating class of the Middlesex County Fire Academy saluted the firefighters and police officers who lost their lives in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

The class of 80 firefighters graduated in a ceremony held on Jan. 16. It is the first class to graduate since the World Trade Center attack. The firefighters began their training in August and completed their 120 hour of training in December.

"You are the real heroes," said senior fire instructor Dave Petry to the graduates.

"A real hero is the person who puts others before himself and puts their heart and soul in the jobs they do," he added. Rory Zach, senior fire instructor, said that when the new semester starts next month, the new class will be even larger. He said that his conversations with fire chiefs suggest that more people are interested in becoming firefighters, perhaps because of the Sept. 11 tragedy











THE WEEK AHEAD..

"I Am Sam"

Great Acting, And A Little Ham

You'll laugh, you'll cry. But for the first few scenes in director Jessie Nelson's emotionallycharged "I Am Sam" you may be suspicious. You'll wonder whether or not Sean Penn's portrayal of a mentally challenged father desperately trying to retain custody of his seven-yearold daughter is really great. And though your reservations will soon be delightfully dispelled, you should be excused your initial cynicism.

It has long been held that any experienced actor can feign a tour-de-force given the right gimmicky part. Yet the fact is that on a major league level such roles are fraught with peril. There is a tightrope of good taste and realism to walk. Happily, keeping all his plates

spinning and his juggling clubs aloft, Mr. Penn traverses this thespic high wire whilst also imparting a flourish all his own.

Still, despite all the consciousness-raising Penn provides via his delineation of Sam Dawson's travail, there is by nature of the task a practically unavoidable helping of ham in this soulful stew. The cast is primarily made up of good and bad, with few gray characters to discern.

Now that's not to say that Sam can't tell when someone's being disingenuous with him. Quite the contrary. However, good manners often deter him from acknowledging his opinion. But when push comes to shove, the lovable character can spot a phony a mile away. In

short, his judgement is not impaired. And thus it's obvious that in creating Sam, writers Kristine Johnson and Jessie Nelson meant to impress how, despite his inability to learn beyond a first grade level, in other areas he is capable of functioning as a fully competent adult.

Only problem is, knowing exactly what those abilities are isn't the simple black and white affair that separating the cast's good guys and bad guys is. And thus when a school psychologist theorizes that Lucy Dawson (Dakota Fanning) is hesitant to learn beyond the level of her father's stunted intelligence, those powers that be decide to wrest the little gal from her natural pop for her own academic and psychological good. Richard Schiff is excellent as Turner, the state's villainous attorney.

At first blush, it doesn't look good for dad and daughter. It matters little that Sam's fathering skills, featuring an uncanny

amount of patience as their cornerstone, will shame most audience members into reassessing their own parenting techniques. His job as a helper at Starbucks will hardly afford him the kind of legal clout he'll need to keep Lucy from being placed in a foster home.

But don't give up just yet, dear reader. Bear in mind that "I Am Sam," though managing a commendable level of tension, suspense and courtroom angst, has more feel-good moments than are normally allotted to strict dramas. So it should come as no surprise when, in response to Sam's plight, director Nelson plops down the deus ex machina and out trots Michelle Pfeiffer.

She is Rita Harrison, great lawyer, terrible mother, unhappy wife and, in general, societally detached Yuppie. You know the stereotype. That's her Porsche parked over there. And although California's most successful divorce lawyer had absolutely no intentions of accepting Sam's case on a pro bono basis, she is cowed into it by a set of embarrassing circumstances. Call it repayment in kind, though, as she's in for an education. We ravenously share in ennobling enlightenment, and feast on the prospect of a triumphant underdog.

While Miss Pfciffer's hyperactive attorney is unconvincing at first, things straighten out nicely once Rita and Sam get to

sparring. But next to Mr. Penn's portrayal, the real performance of note is Dakota Fanning as Lucy, which is short for Lucy In The Sky With Diamonds. A devotee of anything to do with the Beatles, Sam Dawson has drawn on the Fab Four not only to nameand subsequently raise his daughter, but he has adopted their philosophy as the closest thing he has to a religion.

To wit, during one court scrutiny when Lucy is asked to assess her father's parenting abilities, the moppet quite confidently answers: "All you need is love." And she's perfectly touching, there and throughout the film. Perhaps even a bit too perfect, and a mite too precious. For she's an acting phenom. And that can work against you when you're a child. Because part of being a kid means to be imperfect and unstudied. Even when acting. But with young Miss Fanning strutting the boards so authoritatively, there might be a tendency for some to marvel at her precocious abilities instead of concentrating on her character. You're supposed to be sympathizing with Lucy, and not wondering if they cloned Olivier to make her.

"I Am Sam." rated PG-13. is a New Line Cinema release directed by Jessie Nelson and stars Sean Penn, Michelle Pfeiffer and Dakota Fanning. Running time: 132 minutes

Manatees spend most of their time eating, resting, and traveling and can be found along the southeast coast of the United States. A migrating species, manatees need warm water to survive and are located primarily in Florida in the winter.

There are 30 manatees in SMC's Adopt-A-Manatee program. Twenty of the adoptive manatees live in the wild and migrate each winter to a natural warm water spring at Blue Spring State Park, near Orange City, FL. New Law To Require Defibrillators In All NJ State Buildings

STATE — The American Heart Association applauds acting Governor Donald T Di Francesco and the New Jersey legislature for the passage of legislation that requires the Commissioner of Health and Senior Services to establish guidelines for the placement of automated external defibrillators in all state buildings. The legislation was signed into public law on Jan 8 by acting Governor DiFranc sco. The American Heart Association, which has referred to sudden cardiac arrest as a major unresolved public health issue, called the new law a monumental step

toward improving the survival rate from sudden cardiac arrest in New Jersey The Commissioner now has 180 days, effective Jan 8, to issue guidelines to implement the law.

Two identical bills, Assembly bill A2873 and Senate bill S1584, were introduced and passed requiring the NJ Commissioner of Health and Senior Services to issue guidelines to place defibrillators in state buildings. The American Heart Association calls "early defibrillation" the critical link in the chain of survival that provides people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest the best chance at

survival Sudden cardiac arrest is different than a heart attack, and can strike anyone, at any age.

According to the American Heart Association, at least 220,000 Americans die from sudden cardiac arrest annually and the national survival rate is about 5% Few victims survive after 10 minutes and brain damage can begin in around the sixth minute. Most people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest suffer from a deadly heart arrhythmia called ventricular fibrillation. They are clinically dead and the key to survival is: Early 9-1-1; Early CPR; Early

Defibrillation; and Early Advanced Care. Early defibrillation, or an electrical shock with an automated external defibrillator (AED) to restart the heart, in the first five minutes is critical.

Hundreds of NJ companies, retail stores and public places now have defibrillator programs. At least 11 major NJ shopping malls have defibrillator programs as well as more than 40 NJ golf courses and more than 160 NJ police departments.

The legislation signed into public law by acting Governor DiFrancesco now requires guidelines to be established to place defibrillators in state

owned and operated buildings, such as: The Garden State Parkway and NJ Tumpike rest-stop facilities, DMV buildings, state parks, beaches and museums, more than 240 train, bus and ferry terminals, state court buildings, PNC Bank Arts Center, Newark International Airport, Meadowlands Raceway, the NJ State Aquarium, Giants Stadium, Monmouth Park Raceway, and others.

Study To Test Effectiveness Of A Pill For Glaucoma

AREA — Researchers at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (UMDNJ)-New Jersey Medical School are seeking volunteers to test the safety and effectiveness of a new medication that may prevent vision loss in glaucoma patients.

The four-year clinical trial is open to individuals between the ages of 18 and 82 with glaucoma. The drug being tested is Memantine, which is manufactured by Allergan Inc., in Irvine, Calif.

Glaucoma, a medical condition that occurs when pressure in the eyeball increases resulting in damage to the optic nerve and eventual loss of vision, affects nearly three million Americans Symptoms of this problem, which has no known cause, are rarely present until it is in advanced stages

Dr. Robert D. Fechtner, associate professor of ophthal-mology and director of the Glaucoma Division at the UMDNJ-New Jersey Medical School in Newark, said,

"Currently prescription eye drops or surgery are the two methods used to lessen the build-up of pressure in the eye that results in a gradual loss of vision."

"When glaucoma is detected in its early stages, the treatment success rate is about 90 percent," Dr. Fechtner said. "Yet more than half of the individuals with glaucoma are unaware that they have this medical problem."


Individuals accepted into the trial must have fairly good

vision (20/30) and a damaged optic nerve with peripheral vision loss. Participants who already are taking glaucoma medication will continue to do so during the course of the trial. In addition, each will be given either Memantine or a placebo, a substance containing no medicine.

Reservists, New Enlistees May **Got Deferral For Back Taxes**

AREA — The IRS reminds reservists called to active duty and new enlistees in the armed forces that they might qualify for a deferral of taxes owed if they can show that their ability to pay taxes is impaired because of their military service. The Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act provides this benefit.

The Act covers active duty members of the military services - Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard Reservists must be placed on active duty to qualify. National Guard personnel not serving in a "federalized" status - that is, called to active duty specifically by the President of the United States - are not covered.

The deferral applies to taxes that fall due before or during military service, and extends the payment deadline to six months after the military service ends.

No interest or penalty accrues during the deferral period.

The deferral is not automatic. A taxpayer must apply for the deferral When applying, the taxpayer must prove both an inability to pay the tax and that this inability resulted from military service. A taxpayer must also have received a notice of tax due, or be on an installment agreement with the IRS, before applying for the deferral.

The deferral is limited to an initial period of service, not reenlistment periods. This

would include:

- An active duty period pursuant to a first enlistment,
- A period of service following recall to active duty from a Reserve or National Guard unit, or
- The first period of reenlistment following a break in service of at least one year.

For officers meeting one of these conditions, the period is limited to two years

The deferral does not extend the deadline for filing any tax returns. However, taxpayers

may get extra time to file under other provisions, such as being stationed overseas or in a combat zone. Afghanistan was designated a combat zone beginning Sept. 19, 2001, by Executive Order No. 13239

Details for applying for the tax payment deferral are in IRS Publication 3, "Armed Forces' Tax Guide," which is available on the IRS Web site, www. irs.gov, or by calling toll free 1-800-TAX-FORM (I-800-829-3676).

Forms And Publications — How To Order

AREA — The Internal Revenue Service has many forms and free publications on a wide variety of topics to help you understand and meet tax filing requirements. These forms and publications are available on the Internet, on CD-ROM, through fax on demand, over the telephone, through the mail, at local IRS offices, at some banks, post offices and libraries, and even at some grocery stores, copy centers and office supply stores.

If you know what form or publication you need, call the IRS toll-free order number at 1-800-TAX-FORM (1-800-829-3676). If you're not sure what to order, review IRS Publication 910, "Guide to Free Tax Services," which lists publications and related forms, with descriptions and a subject matter index.

Two other helpful publications are Publication 2053,

"Quick and Easy Access to IRS Tax Help and Forms/Fax Forms List." This four-page publication explains how to obtain forms and publications via personal computer, phone, walk-in, mail, or CD-ROM and includes a detailed list of forms available by fax.

Publication 2053A is a shortened version, omitting the threepage "Tax Products by Fax" list.

Personal computer users may download forms and publications from the IRS Web site at www.irs.gov. This site also has links to state tax forms and to forms that you can fill in online and then print.

During the tax-filing season, many libraries and post offices offer free tax forms to taxpayers. Some libraries also have copies of commonly-requested publications. Braille materials are also available. Many large gro-

cery stores, copy centers, and office supply stores have forms you can photocopy or print from a CD-ROM.

Current tax forms, instructions and publications, as well as prior-year tax materials, are available on CD-ROM. Publication 1796, "Federal Tax Products on CD-ROM," can be purchased from the National Technical Information Service (NTIS) for \$21, plus a \$5 handling fee for phone orders. Call 1-877-CDFORMS (1-877-233-6767), or save the handling fee by ordering online at www-.ntis.gov.

Taxpayer Rights A Priority For IRS

AREA — The law requires the IRS to protect taxpayer rights, and in its day-to-day operations, the IRS and its employees make taxpayer rights a top priority. This includes explaining those rights to taxpayers, keeping taxpayer information private and confidential and being professional and courteous.

Besides what is expected of IRS employees, taxpayers have many other rights. They have the right to have someone represent them before the IRS and to accompany them to any meeting with IRS employees. When there is a disagreement, they have the right to request that the independent IRS Appeals office review the case. Taxpayers who still disagree can put their case before the court system.

Taxpayers who have been unsuccessful in resolving issues with the IRS through normal channels have the right to contact the Taxpayer Advocate by calling, toll free, 1-877-777-4778. The Taxpaver Advocate can offer special help if an IRS action is causing the taxpayer significant hardship.

To let taxpayers know about their rights, the IRS produces Publication 1, "Your Rights as a Taxpayer." The Spanish-language version is Publication 1SP These publications, which highlight taxpayer rights and related IRS programs, are available on the IRS Web site at www.irs.gov or by calling 1 800-TAX-FORM (1-800-829-3676). Information on the Taxpayer Advocate Service is also available on the Web site

Real Reform So Your Vote Counts

When the Voting Rights Act was signed into law over thirty years ago, many thought it was the end of a long journey undertaken to ensure that the ideals on which this country was founded were more than just a stract notions. The Voting Rights Act, and before it the 14th Amendment, were definitive and much needed expressions by our nation's government that liberty and equality in theory is only as meaningful as liberty and equality in practice.

The immediate consequence of the 2000 elections and its unsettling debacle was a realization that even thirty years after the Voting Rights Act became law, the nation's election system was not what people imagined it to be. The election brought to light many problems with the nation's voting system, including the impact that outdated voting machines, undertrained pollworkers, and poorly-designed ballots can have on an election.

Throughout the past year, Congress and the nation have evaluated how best to ensure that future elections are ones in which Americans can have faith in the results. I have spent countless hours devoted to the subject. Over a year ago, I introduced one of the first bills seeking to improve election systems and procedures. Others soon followed with their own ideas about how to best bring about change to what we had learned was a clearly flawed system.

With so much at stake, the legislative process has not

been without disagreement and at times it seemed that little would be changed. Both the House of Representatives and the Senate, however, have finally made progress in crafting bipartisan legislation seeking to make elections more fair for all Americans. The House of Representatives has passed legislation supported by a majority of both parties. In December, along with a bipartisan group of Senators. I introduced the "Equal Protection of Voting Rights Act of 2001," bipartisan legislation to modernize the nation's election procedures.

The "Equal Protection of Voting Rights Act of 2001," represents a balance between establishing national standards for voting and giving states the flexibility to make improvements tailored to their state's needs. First, this bill creates a permanent federal system of analysis and assistance. This legislation establishes an Election Administration Commission, consisting of two commissioners from each party who will serve four-year terms. Commission will bring expertise to modernizing elections and provide states and localities with advice for enhancing voting procedures.

Secondly, this legislation establishes three minimum national requirements for voting procedures to ensure that voting across the nation is uniform and nondiscriminatory. These minimum national standards include requiring states and localities across the nation to utilize voting systems that

enable voters to verify how they voted and ensure accessibility to language minorities and individuals with disabilities. It would also obligate states and localities to provide for provisional balloting and direct them to establish a statewide voter registration list with the names and addresses of eligible voters.

Perhaps most importantly, however, this legislation provides \$3 billion in federal grants for states and localities to modernize voting systems, improve accessibility to polling places and train poll workers, among other things. States and communities must show that they comply with the three national requirements to be eligible for the grants.

An additional \$400 million is authorized for providing early funds so that states and localities can implement some improvements quickly. One hundred million of the bill's fundraising is directed to provide grants to make polling places physically accessible to those with disabilities.

I hope that this legislation once and for all, completes our nation's journey to ensuring that all eligible Americans are able to cast their vote fairly, accurately, and without interference. To some, this legislation may not be perfect, but it is the result of reasoned compromise and is a balanced response to all that our nation has learned from the 2000 elections. I will work to ensure that this legislation is passed by the Senate and signed into law by the President.

AREA -Respect is sometimes hard to get. The NJ State Bar Foundation is making it easier by offering its latest publication, a newsletter titled. Respect, free to interested schools.

Based on the popularity of the special diversity issue of the Foundation's legal newspaper for kids. The Legal Eagle, the Foundation developed the idea for Respect, a newsletter about law and diversity geared for students in grades 7 to 12.

Intended for publication three times a year, Respect's first issue features articles on the controversy over flying Confederate flags, hate speech in music lyrics and an essay which originally appeared in the diversity issue of The Legal Eagle Written by a young Japanese-American student, the essay recounts her family's struggle during World War II when Japanese-Americans were forced into internment camps

"We hope that the teachers and parents who read the newsletter will use it to stimulate a dialogue among students about the complex issues discussed in these articles," said NJ State Bar Foundation President Daniel M. Hurley

One teacher is using the newsletter to do just that Susan Santowasso, a teacher at Crossroads Middle School in Monmouth Junction, divided her class into three groups and assigned each group a different Respect article. Those three groups were then divided in half and asked to advocate one side of the issue presented in the article. The students were to read through the article highlighting the facts they would use to defend their particular side of the issue. In front of their classmates, each group debated their issues and then the class voted on which side presented the most convincing argument

"The students really en-

joved arguing their cases even if they had to defend a side they did not believe in," said Santowasso, who contends that certain issues have already come up in class where she or her students have referred back to those debates.

According to Santowasso, her students found Respect useful and liked the way the newsletter presented current events in an interesting way. She also said the students liked the way the articles provided both sides of the issues and, they admitted that the stories made them thinkabout things that they had not thought about, changing their views on certain issues for some.

Santowasso also encouraged her students to take Respect home and allow their parents to read it, which sparked a dialogue among many One parent remarked that he changed his opinion about the Confederate flag after reading the article in the

The Foundation's Tolerance Committee serves as the editorial advisory board for Respect and oversees its content. Board members are Louis H. Miron, an attorney in Westfield, who

chairs the committee, John J. Henschel, with the Rutherford law firm of Caron, Constants & Wilson, Maria E. Hernandez, with the law firm of Lopez-Montalvo in Newark; Desha Jackson, assistant corporation counsel for the City of Newark; Lisa H. James-Beavers, executive director of the NJ Department of Education's School Ethics Commission in Trenton, Caroline L. Meuly, assistant prosecutor for the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office in New Brunswick, Robin R. Parker, chief for the Office of Bias Crime and Community Relations in Trenton, Rafael Perez, with the law firm of Cozen & O'Connor in Newark; Lourdes I. YOUR COUNTY NEWS Young Men Display Original Web Pages, Receive Awards

MIDDLESEX COUNTY—The National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence (NCADD) Middlesex County, Inc., recently celebrated the completion of its third successful rotation of the Logging Onto Technology (LOT) program. An awards dinner was held at the First Baptist Development Conmunity Corporation (FBCDC) Family Resource Center on Jan. 23 where students received recognition for their original web page designs.

LOT, in its second year, is a collaborative effort of NCAP () of Middlesex County, Inc., the First Com-munity **Baptist** Development Corporation, and Spheres LLC and funded by a grant from the New Jersey Department of Human Services. The goal of the project is to teach internet skills and web design to young men from the Franklin and New Brunswick communities. The participants are all between the ages of 14 and 17 years old and completed a ten-week program to learn basic web design. The program included a brief introduction to browsers, the use of e-mail, searching for information on the World Wide Web, downloading graphics and creating tables.

Using html, all of the participants created original web pages during the ten-week course. Each student was encouraged to be as creative as possible, and was given the opportunity to work independently to develop their own idea for a web page design. The results of their efforts were put on display at the celebration, for their families and others in attendance to view.

Following the display, a presentation was made by a panel of professionals in the Information Technology field. They addressed such topics as computer networking, educational opportunities, and technology and community relations. After a question and answer session, prizes were awarded for best web page, most meaningful content, most improved and best effort.
