Perth Amboy Tax Bills Go Out Without Municipal Rate Increase; County Taxes Rise

PERTH AMBOY — Perth Amboy tax bills for the 3rd and 4th quarter installments are being mailed out with a "no increase" municipal tax rate for the seventh straight year. During that time, the rate has remained at \$1.36 per \$100 of assessed property value.

The school rate also remained the same from last year at \$1.22 per \$100 of assessed value. However, the county tax rate is up by \$.04 per \$100 of assessed property

value. "I am extremely pleased that we have been able to do so much without any municipal tax increase whatsoever. Throughout our city there are visible signs of change with over 100 streets resurfaced in the last five years, an expanded police force, downtown streetscape improvements, an expanded marina, new parks and a complete shoreline restoration, just to name a few.

This proves that prudent fiscal management, coupled with a long-term vision for tax stabilization, can and will protect the interests of our tax payers," said Mayor Joseph Vas.

Looking ahead, the city projects an impressive increase in tax revenue over the next five years.

An analysis of the major redevelopment projects underway shows an estimated increase of \$12.5 million in annual tax revenue.

The \$600 million Landings Harborside project, Riverview Plaza, Arenum by Bay, Perth Amboy

Business Park, Kings Plaza and Harbortown will collectively provide more local purpose municipal taxes, which will enable the city to pay for future budget increases without increasing the municipal tax rate.

Residents should note that any current increase they may find in their bills is due to an increase in the county portion of the tax rate, which is up by \$.04 per \$100 of assessed property value. Therefore, the average Perth Amboy property

owner with a home assessed at a value of \$112,000 will pay \$895 for both the third and fourth quarters this year and a total of \$20 more for the full year in comparison to 2001. Anyone with questions regarding their tax bill should contact the Tax Collector at (732) 826-0290.

by a pool of \$200,000, donated Wells Fargo Home Mortgage, Mayor John T. O'Leary said.

The citywide grant application will follow the guidelines of Neighborhood the Preservation Program, which take income into account. The program's emphasis will be on exterior repairs and remedying code violations. Applicants must own and live in their own homes.

Low and moderate income residents of the 2nd Ward have been able to apply for grants from the state-funded Neighborhood Preservation Program. The five-year program is limited to that ward, however.

Camille Tooker, coordinator for the city's Neighborhood Preservation Program, said of the new program, "Not only is it important to revitalize the downtown area, but other areas where people need a little help."

In addition to providing funds for home repair in the downtown Broadway area, the Neighborhood Preservation Program has also helped fund a police bicycle patrol to help people feel safer downtown and in city parks. The bicycle patrol hit city streets on July 1.

The Neighborhood Preservation Program donated one bicycle to the unit, along with uniforms, helmets, shoes, gun belts and bike packs. Jorge and Rosaria Gonzales, owners Mid-Jersey Medical Supplies, donated a second bicycle to the unit.

Police Chief Stephen Pavich said that five officers are trained to use the bicycles. They patrol the Broadway business district, nearby parks and ball fields. He said he's received a good response from Broadway businesses.

Metuchen Receives \$225,000 Grant

METUCHEN—Last week, Metuchen received a \$225,000 federal grant to calm traffic and improve the street scape along south Main Street.

State Sen, Barbara Buono (D-Middlesex) said that the federal Transportation Enhancement

grant, given throughout the state, will help pay for the installation of sidewalks, trees, landscaping, decorative lighting and bicycle safety grates.

"The improvements to south Main Street will not only be aesthetic, but will provide a safer

area for pedestrians and bikers," Buono said.

Mayor Edmund O'Brien said that the grant will help beautify Main Street in the neighborhoods that link to the Metuchen train station.

Last year, the borough stud-

ied the area and suggested several methods of slowing traffic, including a sign to alert drivers leaving highways that they are entering Metuchen.

The grant is funded through federal **Transportation** Equity Act for the 21st Century.





A-Bomb Survivors To Tour NJ And PA


AREA The Coalition for Peace and Justice is once again sponsoring the Hibakusha (Japanese A-Bomb Survivors) Tour of New Jersey and Pennsylvania, from August 6-10. The Hibakusha will give testimony about and describe their personal memories of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Koji Hayashida was A-bombed in Hiroshima. He is 66 years old, lives in Tokyo, and is the Chair of a regional chapter of the Tokyo Federation of A-bomb Sufferers. He speaks very little English.

Hayashida was A-bombed at his elementary school and suffered injuries to his head, ears and legs with debris and glass.

- Small Plastic Bucket. Bring something to hold toiletries and



Disgusting! Yes, funny to a point. But still, rather disgusting. Of course, some of it is funny because of how disgusting it is. And then, some of it is just plain disgusting.

That's a description of "Austin Powers in Goldmember." But if we were to grade producer/writer/actor Mike Myers not on his most recent film's actual worth but by whether or not he achieved his goals, he'd get an A...instead of the primarily mediocre notice he is about to receive here.

Once again exposing us to his bizarrely conceived world of secret agents, as well as their revoltingly evil enemies and sexy girlfriends, the former "Saturday Night Live" star pushes the PG-13 envelope without compunction. And while smirking adolescents may rejoice at the often funny but nonetheless dubious accomplishment, the rest of us can't help but wonder: How can you say all that and do all that and still not get slapped with an R rating? Indeed, it is a puzzlement.

But there's nothing puzzling about Mr. Myers's modus operandi. Building on his established franchise, he now simply throws any zany idea he can find against the wall. Some of it sticks; some doesn't. The hit and miss ratio is poor. But there's so much jammed into the hour and twenty minutes of what has become a big inside joke (and a rather dirty one at that), that it'll take Austin Powers aficionados at least five viewings to catch all the innuendoes, double entendres and scatological implications. And that's generally the idea, isn't it? Repeat business and a coffee table movie for the postpubescent set to sit around and cackle over ad nauseam.

However, while Mr. Myers's Carnaby Street-attired parody of James Bond has not lost his box office attraction, as of this third issue the send-up has begun to turn inward and satirize itself. Director Jay

Roach, previously a competent router of elements that comprise things Austin Powers, has now assumed the role of bulk packager as he figuratively jumps up and down atop a suitcase of this soft core smut to make it fit.

But now, there is an extraadded attraction. Mr. Myers's big-budget insanity has achieved a certain cachet in some Hollywood circles. It has become status to join in the filmic free-for-all. Thus adding to the madcap conviviality in this installment via cameo appearances are Tom Cruise, Danny DeVito, and Gwyneth Paltrow, among others.

In addition to portraying the title character and his evil antithesis, Myers once again reprises the ungainly persona of Fat Bastard, Austin's other major foe. A meanspirited, overweight offensively Scotsman, his preoccupation with matters better left unbreathed provides episode #3 with a verbal stench sure to please those who just can't get enough bathroom humor. And if that doesn't do it for you, about how another villain...one who can't help but dine on his own peeling skin? would That describe Goldmember, the other title character Myers delineates. As legend goes, the Dutch-born Goldmember earned his sobriquet following an unfortunate accident whilst smelting the namesake metal a bit too close



Surviving Card Cheats

AREA Whether you play penny-a-point rummy in the lunchroom at work or high stakes poker in a Vegas casino, one thing is sure to be in the cards--sooner or later there will be a sharper at the table.

Cheating at cards has become big business. Even modest games of poker, brag, or rummy between ordinary working folk can build up kitties of several hundred dollars. Regardless of where you choose to play, unless you watch your step, you will be taken to the cleaners.

There are many forms of cheating at cards.

One of the toughest to detect is belly-stripping, a technique in which all the cards except the high ones are shaved or "stripped" a fraction of an inch. Whenever the cheat squares or taps the pack and runs his fingers along the sides, the card he wants almost leaps into his hand. The cards are not notice-

ably marked, and shuffles, cuts, and deals look fair.

The only way to find out if cards have been stripped is to pick up the pack, square it, and run your finger and thumb along the edges. You will feel the wider cards protruding.

Stripping the pack is a professional way of cheating. In your local card school more amateurish methods are used, but a sharper can cheat with arthritis in both hands and still win. Here are some things to watch for.

SHINERS: Shiners are tiny mirrors or highly polished objects that reflect the faces of the cards. Cheats use a sliver from a broken Christmas tree ball under a fingernail, or a fragment of glass mirror in the bowl of a pipe, a glass ashtray, a powder compact, a wristwatch, a cigarette lighter, even a drop of brandy lying on the table top. As he deals over the shiner, the cheat can see the face of each card.

best kept secrets! Very affordable weekly rates, Call us today... MARKING: A cheat will mark the high cards he gets in the opening hands so that he can pick them out later in the game. Cards can be marked by nicking the edges with the fingernails, or by waving thembending them slightly around a finger. Cheats may also wear a ring with a tiny needlepoint on its underside to prick the high cards.

SHUFFLING: The cheat keeps the high cards in one place while performing an elaborate shuffle. He then deals the high cards to himself. This kind of cheating is hard to spot while it is going on, but there are signs to look for before the cheat shuffles. The shuffle cheat must keep his fingertips greasy, so he often touches greasy areas on his face or runs his fingers through his hair before picking up the cards. If a player consistently wins after greasing his fingertips in any way, chances are that he is cheating.

If you suspect a player of cheating, play a few more hands then make an excuse and leave. Never accuse anyone of cheating, even if you are certain. If you are up against a professional sharper, proving that he's cheating will be harder than drawing a royal flush from a pack with no aces.

ASSEMBLYMAN John Wisniewski's Report From Trenton

New Jersey's industrial past produced thousands of jobs for New Jersey's working families. It laid the foundation for our state's economic success. And it also spread pollution and waste into our waterways.

Over the last 25 years. since the introduction of "The Water Pollution Control Act," New Jersey has led the nation in cleaning up the environment. The results have been impressive. Rivers that you once could almost walk on have seen a return of wildlife. But despite the work and expense that our state and business community have undertaken, all is still not well.

The state Department of **Environmental Protection has** recently urged New Jersey residents to limit the number of meals that consist of freshwater fish. The reason? Over 21 species of fish from different bodies of water in the state were found to have unsafe mercury levels.

Mercury, when consumed, is a lethal neurotoxin. When taken in high doses it poses a dangerous threat to women and small children. High levels of mercury can cause developmental problems in children and neurological problems in adults. Besides pregnant women and children, women who plan to become pregnant within a year and nursing mothers should avoid consuming high quantities of

freshwater fish. So where is the mercury coming from? With our state's strict environmental laws many people justifiably ask, how can this be? The answer, unfortunately, lies well beyond our state's borders. It appears that coal fired power plants in the midwest are sending their pollution downwind to us here in New Jersey. That pollution contains mercury, a product of the combustion of coal.

In this day and age of scrubbers and high tech antipollution devices the natural question is how could this happen? The answer lies in the bureaucracy of the federal government and the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Not a very good trade for us.

Simply put, mid-western coal fired power plants were granted an exemption from strict EPA standards. It allows them to burn cheap dirty coal - producing cheap electricity. It gives us pollution and mercury.

The unfortunate result is that New Jersey residents cannot enjoy the freshwater fish they catch. In 74 of our 76 freshwater bodies the fish had unacceptably high levels of mercury.

It is time for our former Governor, Christie Whitman, to stand up to the interests of cheap and dirty electricity to protect the people of her home As EPA director state. Whitman can act to eliminate this source of pollution. She must not delay.

Mercury when consumed is a lethal neurotoxin. Let's get it out of our environment.

She added, "He's a savvy mouse; I love him!"

The Mexican rodent is famous for his quick wit and blinding speed, always foiling his nemesis, that "greengo pussygato" Sylvester. The character actually contradicts the stereotype of shiftless, dull-witted Mexicans.

Sure, there are some stereotypes. There's Slowpoke Speedy's Rodriguez, lazy cousin. There's the run-down pueblo where all the mice seem to live. So what, It's a cartoon. It's supposed to poke fun.

So it seems that most Hispanics, as well as Hispanic civil-rights groups, agree that Speedy should be back on the air. It might be that political correctness was to blame for pulling the show, but don't blame Hispanics for PC.

In any case, the online campaign, as well as the more than 2,600 signatures that die-hard Speedy fan Matthew Hunter rounded up, convinced the Cartoon Network to give Speedy a second chance.

Censorious

On July 2, The New York Times reported that New York State censored literary passages. The statewide Regents exams, required for high school graduation in New York, chopped up quotes that high school students were asked to analyze: "The works of Isaac Bashevis Singer, Anton Chekhov and William Maxwell, among others...had been sanitized of virtually any reference to race, religion, ethnicity...and just about anything that might offend someone for some reason."

A Singer reference, "Most Jewish women," was changed to "Most women." In fact, all mention of Judaism, so central to Singer's stories, was eliminated. In an excerpt from Ernest Galaza's "Barrio Boy," a skinny boy became "thin,"

and a "fat boy" became "heavy." (Much less offensive. obviously). The State Education Department's Roseanne DeFabio explained, "so no student would feel "uncomfortable in a testing situation."

A firestorm ensued, and three days later New York got out of the censorship business. That was after Columbia professor Caty Popkin wrote:

"I implore you to put a stop to the scandalous practice of censoring literary texts...It is dishonest.

It is dangerous. It is an embarrassment. It is the practice of fools." Well, that just about sums up the whole liberal education world, if you ask me.

Demolition Of Former Firehouse Underway; Commercial Plaza To Be Built

PERTH AMBOY

Demolition work is underway on the former city firehouse at the corner of State and James Street, paying the way for the future commercial center known as Firefighters Plaza. Presently, plans call for Firefighters Plaza to be constructed on land comprised of the former firehouse and a portion of a park that lies adjacent to this property. The plaza will be an approximately 20,000 square foot commercial development containing several stores to serve the community's needs.

"This is the first step towards bringing Firefighters Plaza to life. This project will allow us to replace vacant and underutilized properties with new productive uses, while also having a positive impact on the flow of traffic in the area," said Mayor Joseph Vas. The

project is being conducted jointly with funding and administrative support from the city's Urban Enterprise Zone (UEZ) program and the Perth Amboy Redevelopment Agency (PARA).

The \$102,725 demolition project will be paid for from the UEZ Assistance Fund, which collects the sales tax from participating UEZ businesses and allows the city to access these funds for capital improvements. The demolition work is being conducted by Mazza & Sons Demolition of Oakhurst.

The former firehouse, which had been used mainly for storage for the last several years, was vacated entirely by the fire department several weeks ago. The city conveyed the property recently to the Perth Amboy Redevelopment Agency, which has since signed a

redeveloper agreement with developer Aliland, LLC. Aliland will pay PARA \$133,000 in addition to transferring ownership of a vacant building located at the intersection of State Street and Hall Avenue.

This building will be demolished to allow for the extension of Hall Avenue through Harbortown to connect with High Street, in order to improve the flow of traffic and ease congestion in the neighborhood. The Hall Avenue extension will run through the site of the vacant building, as well as some land currently occupied by an adjacent park. The city has already received permission from the NJ Statehouse Commission to replace the park with facilities to be built by the Harbortown housing development.

Threatening Confrontation Ends Peacefully

EDISON—Two patrolmen and an armed Highland Park man, were recently involved in a tense standoff in which the man threatened to shoot himself and then police. The standoff ended peacefully with the man's surrender and hospitalization.

William Domanow, 23, was standing in the back yard of his grandfather's Plainfield Avenue home in the early morning hours of July 21. He was armed with a .40 caliber Glock handgun in his waistband and a camouflage 12gauge Mossberg pump-action shotgun over his shoulder. He had body armor on and was wearing a camouflage military flak jacket.

When patrolmen Thomas Wall Michael Mintchwarner arrived at about 6 am, Domanow was the on the phone with 911.

"He told the dispatcher he wants to 'shoot it out with the cops'," said an officer.

Domanow, a self-employed landscaper, then told patrolmen, "I need help, just shoot me."

Domanow's father convinced him to put the weapons down and surrender. He was arrested and charged with unlawful use of body armor and a military flak jacket. Body armor is illegal when used during the commission of a crime. He was also charged with a weapons offense.

Domanow was released without bail and taken to a mentalhealth clinic at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in Piscataway.

Plans Delayed

EDISON— The township's plans to condemn a pallet factory and convert it into parkland have been halted by a Superior Court judge, clearing the way for the factory owner to appeal the case.

Middlesex County Robert

Longhi ruled that the land seizure should be put on hold while the higher court reviews the case.

Edison offered Don Baldwin \$350,000 for the factory and land on New York Boulevard, but Baldwin rejected it, saying the offer was too low.

Baldwin wants the case dismissed outright so he can recover legal expenses from the city.

Edison officials want to add Baldwin's land to a tiny park

tucked behind the factory to improve access to that park.

Edison Wetlands The Association offered to help pay the township pay for the parcel through its Green Acres state grant money and the township will tap into its own Green Acres fund to cover the difference.

Residents near the factory are hoping that the wetlands association will turn the area into an environmental center, and they fully support the proposal.

Five Solid Reasons For Investing In Bonds

AREA—The fluctuating stock market has made other investment vehicles, such as bonds, more attractive and for good reason. Although stocks can boast an average annual growth of around 11 percent as compared to less than 6 percent for bonds, bonds provide real benefits to a wide range of investors. According to the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants (NJSC-PA), these include safety, predictability, income, diversification and tax savings.

Reason #1: Safety — For many investors, bonds represent capital preservation. The degree of safety varies based on the bond's credit strength, but

investors generally can be reasonably certain that their original principal will be returned in full if they hold a bond to maturity. That's not to say that bonds are without risks. Bondholders face credit and market risk.

Credit risk refers to the possibility that the bond issuer will default. Market risk depends on whether interest rates will rise. making those bonds issued when rates were lower worth less.

You can minimize credit risk by limiting your purchases to Treasury securities and to bonds with the highest ratings. It also helps to diversify your bond holding across many industries or governments. Owning bonds that

have staggered durations, a practice known as laddering, can help to reduce market risk as well.

Reason #2: Predictability — Bonds offer a conservative way to fund future expenses. If you know that you will need money at a set time to pay for a child's education, for example you can buy bonds that come due then and give yourself the peace of mind of knowing the money will be there when you need it.

Reason #3: Income — Conservative investors often use bonds to provide steady income. When it issues a bond, a company guarantees to pay back your principal (the face value) plus interest at a preset, if modest, rate of return.

The interest they pay, known as the coupon, is typically a fixed amount. For example, a \$10,000 bond issued with a 7 percent coupon generates interest payments of about \$700 each year, thus the term "fixed-income investment." Generally, bonds pay higher income than shortterm investments, such as money

market funds, CDs, and savings accounts. Since different types of bonds pay interest at different times, with careful planning and purchasing, an investor can assemble a bond portfolio that offers a constant income stream.

ity's annual Hiroshima Day Commemoration, in front of Lockheed Martin, Mall and Goddard Blvds., Valley Forge, PA (behind King of Prussia Mall). The Hibakusha will speak and there will be music, a "die-in" dramatization and nonviolent civil disobedience.

On Thursday, Aug. 6, the Hibakusha have a busy schedule, starting at a 10:30 a.m. Evergreen tree planting ceremony at St. John's Church, 61 Broad St., Elizabeth. This will be followed by a 2 p.m. Peace and Friendship Program at Akaido Schools of New Jersey, 324 W. Westfield Ave., Roselle Park. At 7 p.m., there will be a Peace Service and Candlelight Vigil at the First United Methodist Church, I.E. Broad St., Westfield. This service will be followed by floating of miniature peace boats carrying peace prayers on a nearby lake. The 2 p.m. event is sponsored by the Union County Peace and Social Justice Action Coalition and the other events by the NJ Hiroshima-Nagasaki Remembrance Day Committee.

It is important to emphasize the focus of the Hibakusha Tour is to remind people of how much destruction a nuclear weapon can cause. Because the only two examples of nuclear weapons being used in war are the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, it is to these examples that we turn to remind nuclear ourselves that weapons must never be used in war again and should be eliminated. The Hibakusha Tour program is not about placing blame or questioning President Truman's decision to drop the bombs. It is in no way to be disrespectful of the millions of Americans who fought in World War II and to the many who gave up their lives defending their country.

The Coalition for Peace and Justice is a regional chapter of Peace Action, the country's largest grassroots peace and justice organization with over 80,000 members nation-wide. One of the Coalition's and Peace Actions main goals is the abolition of nuclear weapons in the world to ensure that these weapons will never again be used in war.

City Clinic Hopes To Expand

PERTH AMBOY A medical clinic that opened its doors in January to this Middlesex County city's poor and uninsured hopes to extend its reach with a \$1.25 million federal grant.

The Jewish Renaissance Medical Center, which has 600 patients under care, has been receiving funding from the 23-month grant since April 1.

The center held a grand opening Sunday, at which Bobby Polito, director of faith- and community-based programs for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, toured the clinic and met with its staff.

Polito said the clinic is the gaining the federal funding.

country's first federally qualified, faith-based medical center.

Promoting faith- and community-based programs is part of President Bush's domestic agenda. Besides Health and Human Services, the departments of Housing and Urban Development, Labor, Education, and Justice have offices for such programs.

Perth Amboy has been designated a medically underserved area, meaning it has too few primary care physicians to meet the needs of its 42,000 residents, 70 percent of whom are Latino. The designation was key to the center gaining the federal funding

David Jaslow, the clinic's chief executive officer, said the grand opening raises the clinic's profile. "We now have the money to do outreach and marketing in the community." he said.

Jaslow said the clinie's staff of about 10 includes a physician and nurse practitioner who both speak Spanish. The clinic serves the poor, but also those who are covered by Medicare, Medicaid and commercial insurance.

"We do not allow payment to be a barrier to care," Jaslow said.

Six of the clinic's 11 board members are would-be patrons of its services, while the remainder are people who live or work in the community and bring special skills to the board.

Opening the clinic was a three-year endeavor, said Alan Goldsmith, founder and executive director of the Jewish Renaissance Foundation. Goldsmith said a goal is to move the clinic from its 1,300-square-foot facility to a 30,000-square-foot one in two years.

School Board, Staff Get New Dress Code

sayreville Teachers are not the only ones with a new dress code when they return to school this fall. The Board of Education which established a new dress code for teachers earlier this month, has agreed to adopt one for itself.

Every member of the allmale board would be required to wear a shirt, jacket and tie to public meetings which are televised.

Board member Alvah Cox believes that if the employees must adhere to a new dress code that the board should adhere to one as well.

The panel is looking into getting its own blue blazers with a Sayreville Board of Education logo.

The staff dress code came about because Superintendent of Schools Dennis Fyfe said he felt that some of the staff were getting more casual than he was comfortable with, though most of the employees dress in a professional manner all the time.

The district's previous employee dress code was too vague, requiring employees to "dress in appropriate attire." Board President Kevin Clark complained there was no specific written policy and some teachers came in with jeans while others wore ties.

The new dress code policy prohibits short, tight fitting, or see through clothing, jeans, T-shirts, sneakers, beachwear or any item that may attract undue attention. District officials say that they expect no controversy. With increasing restrictions on student dress codes, it may not be surprising that districts consider stricter regulations for their employees as well.
