Goodwill Celebrates Centennial

SOUTH AMBOY — Goodwill Industries of Greater New York and Northern New Jersey will hold a centennial birthday party at its Sayreville retail store, located at 989 Route 9 (at Ernston Road). In honor of the nonprofit's 100th year anniversary and 83 years of service in New Jersey, Acting Mayor Frank Makransky has declared May 11 "Goodwill Industries Day."

Giving rather than receiving gifts on its birthday (though donations are welcome), Goodwill plans special sales and promotions at all six New Jersey retail stores. The festivities will culminate on May 11, when each store will hold a drawing for a \$100 gift certificate as well as offer 25 percent off on all customer purchases.

Store hours are 10 a.m.-7 p.m., Monday-Saturday and 11 a.m.-6 p.m. on Sunday. As always, Goodwill appreciates donations of clothing, accessories, toys and household goods, and donors may ask for a tax receipt.

Goodwill Industries was founded in Boston in 1902 by the Rev. Dr. Edgar J. Helms, a Methodist minister. His goal was to help Boston's poor with "not charity, but a chance." Instead of gathering donations of clothing and household goods and giving them away to people in need. Helms organ-

ized the recipients in collecting, repairing and selling the donated items themselves. thereby earning a living wage.

Locally, Goodwill Industries of Greater New York was founded in Brooklyn in 1915. A New Jersey Goodwill followed soon after, founded in Jersey City in 1919. Merging in 1999 to form Goodwill Industries of Greater New York and Northern New Jersey, the agency now touches the lives of more than 55,000 persons a year. Besides offering vocational and job placement services for persons with disabilities and people moving from welfare to work, it provides varied programs to help keep youth on track and supplies education and training through its award-winning free Family Learning Centers.

In response to Sept. 11, the agency organized an emergency employment initiative for persons who lost their livelihood as a result of the attacks. More than 50 Goodwill programs are located throughout New York metropolitan area and 26 stores stretch from New York City to Albany and from Long Island to Somerset County, New Jersey, with many hosting retail training programs in partnership with boards of education, BOCES or other rehabilitation agencies.

The \$1 million project includes 7,000 linear feet of concrete sidewalks, 21,000 square feet of brick edging around the concrete, 126 new trees, 60 trash cans, 110 light posts and 60 benches.

National Organ And Tissue Donor Awareness Week

PERTH AMBOY-When you grow up in a house with many siblings, sharing is usually not an option. Raised in a family with 12 children, Perth Amboy residents Carlos Bermudez and his sister, Carmen Lopez, learned this first-hand. But it wasn't until they were adults and living their own lives that they truly shared something special.

Last June, Lopez, 40, donated one of her kidneys to Bermudez, 46. Today, as the first anniversary of their living-relateddonor transplant approaches. Bermudez said there is not a day that goes by when he doesn't think about what his sister has given him. "It's been nine months already, and thank God, "My life was so different before, but now I can do everything that I want to do, whenever I want."

For Bermudez, living with illness is something he has experienced his entire adult life. The kidney transplant he underwent last June was actually his second. At the age of 20, Bermudez received a donor kidney that functioned well in his body for 22 years, but about 2 years ago, it began to fail. His doctors tried renal dialysis several times a week, but it was not an effective treatment. Bermudez was placed on peritoneal dialysis, which he administered to himself 5 times a day at home. The only thing that would save his life was a second kidney transplant.

Then Bermudez and his family learned about the option of living-donor transplant. Lopez called each of their other sibeverything is alright," he said. lings in search of a match. Blood test results showed that two brothers matched, but they were anxious about donating.

Lopez also matched. The married mother of two teenagers knew what she wanted to do. "No ifs, ands, or buts," is how she describes her decision to donate one of her kidneys to Bermudez.

"She was adamant about giving one of her kidneys to Carlos," said Renal Transplant Coordinator Carmen Flores. R.N. "They are a very close-knit family. It was really great to work with them."

On June 7, 2001 the transplant was performed by surgeons Stuart Geffner, M.D. and Stephen Fletcher, M.D. Everything went smoothly. Twenty-two years after Bermudez's first kidney transplant, his sister had given him a second change at life.

Since the operation, Bermudez's life has changed for the better. He is now able to pursue his favorite activities, like fishing, without having to worry about administering treatment to himself several times a day. He is very close to his nieces and nephews, whom he refers to as "my kids." Lopez lives a block away from him and they visit each other often. "She checks in on me and my father to make sure we're OK," he said.

Taxpayers Urged To Utilize Tax Amnesty Program

MIDDLESEX COUNTY — Legislators from the 19th District encouraged eligible residents to take advantage of the Tax Amnesty Period to pay delinquent state tax without being charged a penalty. Senator Joseph Vitale (D), Senator Arline Friscia (D) and Assemblyman John S. Wisniewski (D), support enacting this program in order to provide residents an opportunity to become current on their state tax

debt. The program will be open from April 15-June 10. During this period, the state will be accepting full payment from outstanding sales, personal income and corporate taxes without charging any fees normally associated with collecting back taxes.

"The Tax Amnesty Period is a program that any New Jersey resident should take advantage of if they are behind in their state taxes," said Vitale. "This program is one that will benefit both the state and eligible taxpayers."

"This program presents an opportunity to help both individual residents and the state as a whole in that it enables residents to provide the state with vital revenues while avoiding the usual penalties," stated Wisniewski.

The program was created through legislation sponsored by Assembly Budget Committee

Chairman Louis Greenwald (D-Camden) and Assemblywoman Nellie Pou (D-Passaic) which was signed into law by Governor James E. McGreevey. It is expected to bring in \$150 million in delinquent taxes and is a integral part of the Governor's plan to eliminate a \$2.9 billion deficit in the state budget.

The tax amnesty program applies to those who failed to file returns with the state

between January 1, 1996 and January 1, 2002. It does not apply to those who are under criminal investigation or are being charged with tax evasion or fraud.

For those who are delinquent in their state taxes from 1996–2002 and fail to pay their back taxes during this amnesty period, an additional five percent penalty fee will be imposed in addition to the standard late fees.

MCEOC Expands Emergency Food Assistance Program

"With the news that SHARE of New Jersey was closing its operations, we knew MCEOC had to take over the important job of supplying its pantries and soup kitchens."

Food trucking facilities in Perth

Amboy, MCEOC accepts donated United States Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) foods as distributed through the New Jersey Department of Agriculture (NJDA) and distributes the food to 85 soup kitchens and pantries throughout New Jersey. The food consists of fresh, frozen and canned fruits, vegetables, meats and other food items.

MCEOC distributes the food to soup kitchens and pantry sites located in Middlesex, Monmouth, Union

and Somerset Counties in Central New Jersey and Hudson, Essex and Passaic Counties in Northern New Jersey. In January, the first full month of operation of former SHARE of New Jersey food distribution sites, MCEOC distributed a record amount of food exceeding 84,000 pounds.

According to a report by the U.S. Conference of Mayors, the economic effects of the Sept. 11 attacks and the recession are causes for a 23-per-

cent increase in emergency food assistance.

MCEOC is continually seeking soup kitchen and pantry sties in New Jersey to distribute USDA food commodities, regardless of location. MCEOC can assist soup kitchens in the start-up phase and supply pantries already in operation but not receiving USDA commodities. 



Lack Of Superfund Funding Directly Affecting New Jersey Sites

STATE—A Superfund site suspected of causing severe health problems in Edison will not be cleaned for several years despite earlier promises by the **Environmental** Protection Agency, according to recent testimony by Robert Spiegel, **Executive** Director of the Edison Wetlands Association. Spiegel appeared before a Subcommittee of the Environmental and Public Works Committee during a hearing on the superfund program, which has come under intense scrutiny in the last several weeks. A lack of funding from the Bush Administration and a major reduction in the number of sites being cleaned is having a direct impact on thousands of neighborhoods across New Jersey and the nation.

Representing a state with the largest number of Superfund sites in the nation, Senator Robert G. Torricelli has announced plans to offer an amendment to the Energy legislation being debated in the Senate, which would guarantee a steady flow of funds for Superfund cleanups. Today he

pointed to Spiegel's testimony as evidence of the urgent need for more funding.

"This is exactly the scenario I have feared. A Superfund site that is clearly contaminated and is in close proximity to families and children will now remain untouched because the EPA doesn't have the money to clean it," said Torricelli. "You cannot put a price tag on someone's health and this is a dangerous policy."

The Chemical Insecticide Superfund site in Edison is contaminated by the manufacture of pesticides, herbicides and fungicides, including Agent Orange, by the now bankrupt Chemical Insecticide Corporation. The EPA identified it as a Superfund site in the early 1990's making a commitment to begin work on the site in November 2002

According to Spiegel, just a few weeks ago, the EPA informed him that there was no money for the cleanup and there probably would not be for several years. Much of this lack of funding is due to the expiration of the Superfund Trust Fund tax, which

in the past funded the program.

The Hazardous Substances Superfund Trust Fund tax was allowed to expire in 1995. Efforts to reauthorize the tax have failed and President Bush in his current budget proposal specifically notes that he will not do so.

Without the tax, the Superfund Trust Fund has fallen from \$3.8 billion in 1996 to an estimated \$28 million next year. In 1994, the last year the tax was in effect, the taxpayers paid \$250 million or 21 percent for Superfund clean-ups. while corporate taxes on chemical and other companies contributed \$950 million or 79 percent.

Under President Bush's plan, by 2004, taxpayers will pay 100 percent for cleanup costs. Torricelli's legislation would reinstitute the tax so the premise on which Superfund was created, "polluter pays," would once again be the policy.

In addition to the lack of funding, the Administration has announced plans to designate fewer sites for cleanup. Since its inception, 1551 sites have been put on the national Superfund priority list with 257 sites cleaned up and 552 mostly cleaned. In each of the previous four years, more than 80 sites were cleaned. Last year under the Bush Administration, only 47 were cleaned and only 40 are projected for the next two years.

Furthermore, the EPA has stated that prioritization of site cleanups will shift away from the smaller sites like the majority of those in New Jersey, to larger "mega-sites." like those in western states. This has serious consequences for New Jersey which has 111 Superfund sites currently on the EPA priority waiting list, more than any other state.

Torricelli's proposed legislation includes a 9.7 cents a barrel tax on petroleum, a tax on 42 chemicals and a corporate environmental income tax of .12 percent of taxable income in excess of \$2 million to be contributed to the Trust Fund.

Republicans Improperly **Obtained State Employee List**

STATE - The Office of the Inspector General has found that a state employee with ties to Republicans violated state regulations by providing a top State Senate Republican staffer with a list of names and addresses for all state employees, according to a report obtained PoliticsNJ.com.

The matter has been referred to the state Executive Commission on Ethical Standards.

The report says that Garret Hengeli, a former Republican operative who was Department of Personnel's legislative liaison in 1997, provided the list to Kevin Davis, the Director of Constituent Services for the Senate Republicans at the time. In turn, Davis sent the list to William **McClintock** Associates, a Republican political consulting firm that helped prepare taxpayer-paid constituent mailings for GOP Senators.

McClintock, a political consultant who frequently worked for former Senate President and Acting Gov. Donald DiFrancesco and the Union County Republican Party, was a Scotch Plains Township councilman during the same time that DiFrancesco, then the township attorney, repeatedly violated legal-ethics rules according to a 1998 report by lawyers for the township.

The Neafsey report does not accuse any senators or senate staffers of legal violations and seems to place the blame on Hengeli, a former Assembly GOP staffer and Republican campaign staffer.

An attorney representing the two Senate aides mentioned in the report, Davis and Rick England, says that "the investigation completely exonerated" his clients. Click here to read the attorney's letter. The home addresses of state employees are confidential. according to the report, under Gov. Brendan Byrne's 1974 Executive Order #11.

NJ Neuroscience Institute Leads The Fight Against Brain Tumors

EDISON — Each year, close to 200,000 Americans are diagnosed with brain tumors that can cause debilitating and even lifethreatening effects. But while the number of people with brain, tumors continues to rise across the country each year, so do the options for improved diagnosis and successful treatment.

"We're making incredible advances in the battle against brain and spinal cord tumors, which strike people of all ages from infants to senior citizens," says Joseph Landolfi, D.O., a neuro-oncologist at the New Jersey Neuroscience Institute located at JFK Medical Center. "We see over 170 brain tumor patients a year, right here at our facility in Edison. But at JFK, a patient's treatment for a tumor isn't limited to surgery, radiation or chemotherapy. We offer the state's most comprehensive program for brain tumors, including care that

extends beyond treatment to the rehabilitation for neurologic complications," adds Dr. Landolfi.

A brain tumor actually originates from elsewhere in the body, having been "seeded" by cancer traveling (metastasizing) throughout the patient. "Unlike most other tumors found in the body, even "benign" tumors in the brain can have devastating, even fatal, consequences," adds Landolfi. "Because of the location - at the control center for thought, emotion and physical function - brain tumors can be difficult and risky to treat."

Tremendous strides are being made in the diagnosis and treatment of brain tumors at the New Jersey Neuroscience Institute at JFK, a division of Solaris Health System, which is home to some of the most advanced medical technology available in the entire country for diagnosing and treating complex brain disorders.

"The Neuroscience Institute possesses one of the most sophisticated pieces of equipment available worldwide - the revolutionary Gamma Knife - for the treatment of brain tumors," says Martin Gizzi, M.D. acting director of the Institute. "This state-of-theart technology is so unique and powerful that it can treat tumors deep within the brain, without a single incision," explains Dr.

'The Gamma Knife at JFK is the only one in New Jersey and nationwide there are fewer than 45 medical centers that offer this advanced technology. The Gamma Knife is used exclusively for the treatment of brain tumors and vascular malformations, offering multiple benefits over conventional brain surgery, such as a significantly reduced risk of complications, shorter hospitalization and virtually painless treatment.

"In one brief, bloodless proce-

dure, the Gamma Knife delivers multiple beams of gamma radiation to tumors and other abnormalities deep within the brain," says Dr. Landolfi, a member of the Gamma Knife Team. Using sophisticated computer technology to plan and map the treatment, the Gamma Knife focuses narrow beams of colbalt-60 radiation through 200 portals evenly distributed around the patient's head, creating a precise intersection of beams exactly conforming to the location, size, and shape of the of the desired site in the brain. Only at the point where the narrow beams converge is the radiation at its most powerful. Thus, the Gamma Knife prevents injury of surrounding, healthy brain tissue, while reaching otherwise inoperable sites in the brain.

"The procedure requires a trained neurosurgeon, radiation oncologist and radiation physicist to work together to tailor the treatment specifically to each patient and to administer it," explains Dr. Landolfi "For patients who qualify for it, the Gamma Knife procedure is miraculous. In fact, they undergo no general anesthesia and may spend only one night in the hospital - able to resume their daily activities shortly after undergoing treatment."

Over 100 patients, as young as several weeks and as mature as 97, have undergone the Gamma Knife procedure at JFK. They have come from all parts of New Jersey, and as far away as Brazil and Puerto Rico.

Brain tumors are the second leading cause of cancer death in children under age 15 and in young adults up to age 34, according to the North American Brain Tumor Coalition. They are also the second-fastest growing cause of cancer death among those over age 65.

Spider-Man (PG-13) Columbia Pictures 121 minutes; Starring Tobey Maguire, Willem Dafoe, Kirsten Dunst and James Franco; Directed by Samuel

comic book movie since Tim Batman (1989). Burton's More importantly, Spider-Man is a good movie.

Tobey Maguire does an excellent job portraying Peter Parker, which is the key to making the movie work. Spider-Man worked as a comic because the audience could identify with Peter Parker - a regular kid who accidentally got superpowers - a kid who tried his best but could still make mistakes.

Director Samuel Raimi made a wise choice to cast someone who could convincingly play Peter Parker, rather than someone who would just look good in the Spider-Man costume. Action fans need not worry -- there are plenty of cool fight scenes and special effects -- but the movie's strength is more Peter Parker than Spider-Man,

The first part of the movie is devoted to telling Spider-Man's origin story, which has been updated slightly for the big screen. Parker's high school class is on a field trip to Columbia University. There, researchers are attempting to create a hybrid mutant spider that contains

genes and

several different species of spider. One spider has the ability to leap many times its own body length; another has reflexes so quick that it appears to have precognition.

One of these mutant spiders has escaped, and manages to bite Peter, causing him to fall ill.

The next morning, when he Spider-Man is the best wakes, Peter feels much better; he notices that he no longer needs his glasses and that he's gotten much stronger.

> At lunch, the nerdish Parker discovers more of his powers; he senses that his secret crush, his popular next-door neighbor Mary Jane Watson (Kirsten Dunst), is about to slip and

> Peter manages to impress her by catching her and saving her lunch, but the shy teen is unable to capitalize on the situation - he loses his ability to speak once Mary Jane actually notices him.

> He accidentally discovers his ability to shoot spider webs from his wrists in the cafeteria, too. He inadvertently attaches a web to another student's lunch tray. In his attempt to remove the tray, Parker inadvertently hits his nemesis,

Flash Thompson (Joe Manganiello). Flash wants beat Peter, but is sent flying after some Matrix-style fight moves.

This seems like it would be every underdog's dream - to finally be able to turn the tables on the bully - yet it only serves to scare Peter's classmates (including Mary Jane) and further isolate him.

Peter's Uncle Ben (Cliff Robertson) provides the inspiration for Spider-Man. Without knowing about Peter's new powers, Ben tells him "With great power comes great responsibility."

Peter remembers this warning after Ben's death, and takes it to heart. He can't change the past to make it so that Ben doesn't die, but he can use his new power to help So Spider-Man is people. born.

Spider-Man has a number of adventures (and an onscreen kiss with Mary Jane) before the final showdown with the Green Goblin (Willem Dafoe).

Dafoe also turns in a strong performance as both Norman Osborne and his Green Goblin alter-ego.

The only thing holding the movie back from a four-star rating is that some of the special effects and fight sequences didn't quite work. Really. though, this is a minor flaw.

The movie's ending leaves the door open for a sequel, and the opening weekend box office numbers all but guarantee it's coming. Hopefully it will be as well written and acted as this film.
